

(AFC) is a Texas Department of Human Services program promoting the availability of appropriate services for elderly and persons with disabilities. in a home-like environment. This program is designed to enhance the dignity, independence, individuality, privacy, choice and decision making ability of the participant.

AFC provides a 24 hour living arrangement in a DHS enrolled foster home for persons who, because of physical or mental limitations, are unable to continue independent functioning in their own homes. Up to four residents may be served in a foster home, though there are limitations as to the number of participants that may require certain tasks be performed before with them.


AFC homes must be enrolled by DHS, pass inspections for fire safety and health conditions. AFC requires the Foster

Adult Foster Care are needed as providers. They must be physically and mentally able to perform all the required duties and tasks delegated to them. The provider must live in and share the same household with the participants. These individuals need communication skills to exchange ideas and directions to the participant and the participant's family. These skills are necessary to comprehend the DHS

plans for care. Other considerations for becoming an AFC provider must include evidence of testing for tuberculosis, providing three references from persons not related to the applicant, and demonstrate financial stability. The applicant must own or lease the home to be considered for enrollment. have a substitute provider and not have a felony record.

The northside of the Square is basically the same as it has been all of my life. I don't remember a building being torn down and a new one rebuilt at any time in that block. The western extreme of the block housed a grocery store for many years was operated by Mr. and

Mrs. Bill Walters. Before they had their store this was the site of a bank and if one looks careful at the flooring in this building, now one can see where the line was between the lobby of the bank and the working tellers were. The lobby portion of the floor was tile, and still is, while that part behind the cageline

was a plain wooden floor. This was the bank that later was recognized and moved over into the 5story building west and called the Exchange National Bank.

There is a small building just behind this building that, so I am told, once housed the post office. Carl Boustead had a camera shop in this building in recent years. But back when I was a kid there was a barber shop

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Letter To **The Editor**

My comments in the ton. Jan. 15 edition of the Telegram in relation to bureaucracy and welfare failed to provoke those who think God lives in Washington.

So, now I chance comments on another subject getting public notice at this time. My views on crime and punishment WILL run counter to many being expressed. They may even confuse someone. Confuse because some will get the idea that I am a flaming Liberal and bleeding heart while I hear that one lady whispered to another that I was a member of the Ku Klux Klan (which I'm not).

I wouldn't sue for slander because I don't consider the connection bad at all; though untrue and evil intended.

But to the subject of crime and punishment, it is true that the public is punished with the cost of prisons and care for convicts to the extent that private enterprise sees an opportunity to compete with the bureaucracy in that area. Here I inject a "Klanish, racist" comment: A Black preacher was said to have said", They's just two kinds of people in this world, the caught and the uncaught." Well, as yet among the "uncaught" my scanty knowledge causes me to hope I am sent to a private joint if ever I am one of the "caught." The County Club prisons you hear about are strictly for crooked politicians, Wall Street swindlers, and high profile criminals. Now here is a peep at the Texas Department of Criminal Justice system that may not fit the picture you had. My prejudice against "the system" and bureaucracy was born in the Navy during WW II and twice my active time spent in Naval Hospitals. Such confinement seemed to a Hillbilly (born in W. VA.) like being suffocated. The crash mobilization resulted in myself and others trying to sleep in barracks the contractors had not even finished as half of the windows were still on back order and it was December - January with snow and ice. Furthermore, we marched for about ten days through snow and slush in civilian clothes as even the uniforms were not there when the men were shoved in. Those from Florida and sunny California suffered worse in thin clothes. One man froze to death waiting in chow line as three outfits had to eat at the one functioning mess hall. With a temperature of 104 I was sent back to barracks with a light duty slip as the hospital was overflowing with pneumonia cases. With that memory never erased I wrote letters protesting the stupid directive issued by TDCJ that states that inmates in Texas prisons south of Interstate 20 will not be issued a second blanket as in previous winters. No letters to big city papers have been printed and those to governor and TDCJ go unanswered. Can you believe the stupidity of bureaucracy thinking a blue norther will respect I 20 as a barrier? In the year screw worms were nearly eradicated pipes froze in Hous-

Ah, but some say, "If living in tents was good enough for our service men then it's plenty good for convicts!"

I protest that no jury sentencing a person of a minor crime intended his death by pneumonia. In fact, the cost of medication would wipe out and savings on blankets should one of those unusually cold blasts strike. Oh sure, they could get an emergency issue of blankets. As bureaucracy functions the blankets might get there by the Fourth of July. But what about the color

TV's and cable shows we hear about? Well, that is what the inmates in the four different Texas prisons I have contact with are asking. They get time in the day room where they can disagree with the choice of channels. In Michael Unit at Tenn. Colony they get one hour of TV per day. They can buy a little radio at the commissary IF they have the money and there are

.no bargain prices there either.

So one writes me that they didn't even exchange nor wash the single blanket issued to him last year. And he complains that his bunk is fastened to a cement outer wall through which cold penetrates. Well he hasn't promised a rose garden anyhow. He should be released in a couple more years and be graceful for what society has given him free of charge.

Now a report from a private enterprise operation:

Though there was a small riot at one private unit where the box lunches were protested, it is not nearly as bad as a real prison riot. Generally everything at a private operation is far better than the bureau units. The prisoners are kept as satisfied as possible because the contractors don't want to lose a paying guest even though the cost per prisoner is less than it costs to keep them in a state unit.

How can a private operation be cheaper than one operated by the state?

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Ranger Commissioners Roundup

Mayor Ronnie Ainsworth called a special meeting which was held at 5:30 P.M. on Tuesday. Feb. 7, 1995. This meeting was called for a discussion between the City of Ranger and the Economical Development Corp., concerning procedures to take when bringing a new business into Ranger. Also, a progress report on activities in progress and past projects undertaken.

Mayor Ainsworth called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M. and asked Dr. Paul Riffle, President of the EDC to give an update on the activities in progress. The EDC Pres. begin an update on the property sites which were for the location of a mobile home factory. At this point Tom Dunn, Pres. of People State Bank of Clyde Ranger Branch, gave a list of sites which included 60 acres of land across from Ranger High School Complex building, which he stated,

"was the most desirable site". A second site owned by the Chamber of Commerce (formerly the old Featherlite picnic grounds) and i other site owned by Mayor Ainsworth to supply a list of available land for sale, and the mayor agreed to do so by the next city meeting.

Commissioner Tankersley gave an update on the requirements that would be necessary to develope sewer and water systems on the Aishman property. Tankersley went into detail that these requirements were subject to change, depending on site location.

During this meeting, comments were made by Tom Dunn, Paul Riffle, Buster Robinson and Mrs. Steve Schooling concerning their disappointment in the facts and figures of the last Commissioner's Round-up.

Mayor Ainsworth disapproved of an unauthorized change being made in the option contract on the Aishman property, by person or person's outside the EDC, after being voted on by the city council. This could very well cost the tax payer's \$1,000.00.

Mayor Ainsworth asked those present if anyone would like to hear the city tape concerning facts and figures. None present was interested in hearing the tape. The EDC wanted to do a feasibility study to determine the desirability of the Aishman property for an industrial Park. The Mayor stated, "In my opinion this would cost the tax payer's thousands of dollars to complete this study on property which has not yet been purchased, and no business to locate on the property at this time". 

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
