County Stays With Cisco, Eastland Banks

Eastland County Commissioners Monday voted to continue with the First National Bank of Cisco as a depository for County funds, and the Eastland National Bank with Trust Funds.

In addition, the court requested that sufficient funds be returned from the Tex-Pool investment to balance out the service charges at Eastland National Bank.

The vote was unanimous on the depository motion, with County Judge Scott Bailey voting "aye" with the Commissioners.

It was explained during the meeting that the County had gained \$6,000 in interest by having funds in the Tex-Pool account. But this would be offset in the future by projected service charges of \$1,000 per month by Eastland National Bank for various small accounts left there in reserve.

By moving back some Tex-Pool funds the local balances would rise high enough to eliminate the service charges.

The County is permitted to keep the interest on funds held in trust.

The decision on county banking was reached after considerable discussion. Grover Hallmark, President of Eastland National Bank, was in the courtroom, as well as Dick Woolley,

President of the First National Bank of Cisco. Alan Masters of the Cisco bank was also present, as well as Jim Davidson of the Eastland bank.

The Cisco bank bid for the county depository only, and the Eastland bid for the county depository along with the Trust Funds.

After initial discussion the bids were referred to County Auditor Ken Parker and County Treasurer Ruth Hart for study.

They returned to the court at 11:30 a.m. with a report. Ken Parker said that the bids from the banks were basically the same, and Ruth Hart said that both banks had been helpful to work with and offered approx. the same services.

Pct. 4 Comm. Reggie Pittman made the motion to leave the county funds at Cisco National Bank and the Trust Funds at the Eastland National Bank. He added the stipulation on the Tex Pool funds.

Pct. 3 Comm. L. T. Owen said he was in favor of moving all the Tex Pool funds back to the county.

District Clerk Bill Mears told the court that the final discretion of where to place Trust Funds from the District Clerk's office lay with him.

But he said he would be glad to work with the court, and would consider the Commission-

er's recommendation.

In other business, the Commissioners voted to sign an off-system

bridge agreement on County Road 408 in Pct. 3.

Brian Neaves, area engineer for the Texas Department of Transportation, brought this request. He said it involves the replacement of an old wooden bridge with steel girders on the Sabanno River S. of Carbon.

He estimated the total cost as \$165,000, with \$35,840 being the County's part.

Comm. L. T. Owen said he had budgeted money to pay the County's share.

Neaves showed a picture of the interesting old bridge that would be replaced, saying that the bridge was probably constructed in the early 1920's.

On other TDoT work, Neaves reported that replacement of the Chock-A-Block bridge at Lake Leon is scheduled for August, 1995.

He said a new structure will be built east of the present bridge, on the downstream side.

In a change of plans, the traffic will cross the present bridge while the new bridge is being built. Previous plans called for detouring traffic through Ranger.

Neaves also said that new bridges on County Roads 183 and 180 in Pct. 4 are scheduled for later this year.

On another road matter, Fred Dickey discussed the need for maintenance from the county on an existing roadway leading to some property he owns.

This lane lies at the end of CR 486 in Pct. 2, and also provides an

TEXAS LAW ASK THE OFFICER

NO FOOLIN'
Q. If I gargle with a mouth wash after drinking alcoholic beverages, can I avoid a DWI?

M.S., Harlingen
A. No-chewing gum and mouthwash will only cover it up for a short time. A lot of DWI's get past officers because of 'Learned behavior' people learn to compensate for alcohol abuse by walking and driving straight, etc. But intoxication depends on size, weight, food in the stomach, chemical balance, learned behaviors,

adaptation, etc. The eye test proves intoxication, the jerkiness of the eye following a flashlight (maximum deviation, angle of onset). Legal intoxication level: .10 (even .04 could be considered intoxication. Depends on person's makeup.

THE LOW RIDER

Q. Is it a safety hazard to turn a car into a low-rider? You know, the kind that can rock up and down?

P.B., Baytown
A. If the car is not dragging bottom, it's not a safety hazard. It all depends on the driver, how he or she is driving. As long as they're being safe, and using common sense on the road, it's not necessarily a safety hazard.

SMOKEY HAS A LAWYER

Q. If I were camping at a popular campground and happened to start a fire that destroyed all the buildings and the forest, would I be held liable for the damages?

G.A., Big Spring
A. You very well could be, if negligence is proven on your part. Make sure when you're camping, if there's any kind of a ban on open flames, etc. Call park service in the area and find out fire conditions, or any kind of ban. It wouldn't be arson, but if there were signs stating against

open flames in the area, you're liable.

LICENSE TO SPRAY?

Q. Do you need a license to carry mace or pepper spray, and do you think these are effective means to deter an attack?

P.A., Arlington

A. Small chemical dispensers sold commercially for personal protection are legal and no license is required. These may be effective tools to deter an attacker. However, they may not be the right deterrent for everyone. You have to realize that some people are not affected as much by these chemicals, and they may only make the attacker

angrier and more violent. The wind could blow the chemicals in your face, or you could miss the target outright.

How you defend yourself will depend on what type of person you are, but most experts in self-defense agree that the best tactic is to try and run away screaming. But then the situation gets trickier if the attacker has a gun! With so many variables, you should concentrate on not letting yourself become a victim or getting yourself in potentially dangerous situations.

Yet another reason not to smoke: smokers have a greater risk of dying from breast cancer than nonsmokers. The risk rises with the number of cigarettes smoked, an American Cancer Society study found.

And more: secondhand smoke causes 3,000 deaths from lung cancer each year among nonsmokers, the Environmental Protection Agency says. A recent study found that women married to smokers were 30 percent more likely to get the disease than those married to nonsmokers.

The drug clomipramine, usually prescribed for obsessive-compulsive disorder and depression, seems to help men affected by premature ejaculation, researchers found at the Center for Marital and Sexual Health in Cleveland.

Doctors at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis are able to restore more function and feeling in surgery with donor-nerve transplants. The transplants serve as a structure onto which the patients' own nerve cells grow.

entrance to the pioneer Cook Cemetery. It runs through a ranch, and there are three gates on the road. Up until about 12 years ago the county apparently did some work on it.

Attorney Jim Farrah spoke to the court on the matter, saying that sometime before the holidays Leslie Vance (then District Attorney and the county's legal advisor) asked him to make a determination about the end of Rd. 486 near Mr. Dickey's property.

Farrah said he did not locate any right-of-ways in the area other than those for State Highway 16.

He added, however, that county surveyors up to the mid-1950's indicated there was a road from CR 486 to Dickeys property, where Cook Cemetery is also located.

He showed the court a map from 1966, showing approx. 2.3 miles of road leading through the ranch to Dickey's property.

Pct. 2 Comm. Calvin Ainsworth said he hadn't found anything on an easement on a county road beyond the first gate.

In the fall of 1994, Cisco Junior College had an enrollment of 2703 students. This enrollment consisted of 2600 semester hour students and 103 clock hour students. A plan to standardize almost all largemouth bass bag limits and a trophy red drum tag for exempt anglers highlight proposed changes to 1995-96 fishing regulations.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission's Regulations Committee told fisheries staff during a Jan. 18 meeting to move forward with several proposed regulations changes. All changes will be brought before the public during hearings in late February and early March before the full commission votes on final passage March 19.

In response to the public's request, coastal fisheries staff are proposing a \$6 exempt red drum tag that would allow anglers not required to purchase a fishing license to retain a trophy red drum. Currently, the red drum tag - which allows retention of one red drum longer than 28 inches per license year - is part of the resident fishing, combination, resident special and non-resident fishing licenses.

The exempt tag will have all the same benefits and restrictions as the current red drum tag. Once the exempt tag is used, the angler can return it to the department and receive a bonus tag as with the regular license. A duplicate tag will cost \$6 and license deputies will be authorized to retain \$1 as a fee for collecting each fee and issuing each tag.

Inland fisheries staff are proposing to standardize the largemouth bass daily bag limit at five for all length limit exceptions (except catch and release lakes and Toledo Bend). The lakes with catch and release only for bass include Lost Maples State Natural Area, Nelson Park in Abilene, Buck Lake in South Llano River State Park, Purts Creek State Park and Gibbons Creek. Toledo Bend Reservoir has an eight fish daily bag limit.

The proposal would change the largemouth bass bag limit on reservoirs with 18-inch minimum length limits and slot length limits (14 to 18, 14 to 21 and 14 to 24) from three fish per day to five. The bag restriction of only one bass 21 or 24 inches or longer on the 14- to 21-inch and 14- to 24-inch slot lakes would be

retained. Other regulations proposed by the department are:

Coastal Fisheries

* Change the daily bag on snook from three to one, possession limit from six to two and minimum size from 20 inches to 24 inches.

* Establish an exemption for persons shrimping under a commercial bait shrimp license from July 1- Aug. 31 from the provision requiring the nongame finfish portion of the trawl catch not to exceed 50 percent by weight of the total trawl catch, except for those species regulated by bag and size limits. The rule allows up to 1,200 live nongame finfish not regulated by bag and size limits to be retained.

Inland Fisheries

* Change the largemouth bass minimum length limit on Braunig Reservoir from 21 inches to 18 inches. Daily bag would increase from two to five.

* Change the largemouth minimum on Champion Creek from 14 inches to 16 inches. Daily bag would remain at five.

* Change largemouth bass regulations on 90-acre Lake in Choke Canyon State Park-Calliham Unit from catch and re-

lease to 14 inches and five fish daily bag.

* Change striper limit on the Red River from Denison Dam to, and including, Shawnee Creek from 18 inches to no minimum length to conform to Oklahoma regulations. Daily bag remains at five.

* Change white bass minimum on the Colorado River and its major tributaries from Lake Travis upstream to the U.S. Highway 190 bridge (includes lakes Travis, Marble Falls, LBJ, Inks and Buchanan) and Georgetown and Canyon reservoirs from 10 inches to 12 inches. Daily bag to remain at 25.

* Change the boundary for the 12-inch limit on white bass at Lake Limestone and the Navasota River from downstream of Lake Mexia to downstream of the Fort Parker State Park lake dam.

* Change statewide minimum on channel and blue catfish from 9 inches to 12 inches. Daily bag to remain at 25, except in designated urban lakes and five reservoirs wholly within state parks, which would have a daily bag limit of five.

* Delete exemptions to statewide channel and blue catfish regulations including those reservoirs with a 14-inch minimum

and 15 daily bag, a 14-inch minimum and five fish bag and a 12-inch minimum and three fish bag.

* Change statewide minimum length on flathead catfish from 24 inches to 18 inches. Daily bag would remain at five. The one exception would be Lake Texoma and the Red River from the Denison Dam to, and including, Shawnee Creek where the minimum limit would be 20 inches to conform to Oklahoma regulations.

* Change the crappie bag limit on Choke Canyon Reservoir from 15 to the statewide bag of 25. Minimum length to remain at 10 inches.

* Restrict angling on designated urban lakes to pole and line only.

* Add 4 lakes to the list of designated urban lakes.

* Change the name from designated urban lakes to community fishing lakes to more closely reflect the intent of the program.

At last they came to Texas and in a few months to Cisco, where they finished raising the family.

The club had their business meeting after the program and refreshments. There were seven members, one new member and one guest.



Gray Matter

Railroads

Railroads had much to do with the development of the Western part of the United States. The Iron Horse was the transportation of the 19th century and its age extended over into the twentieth century at least up until the end of the First World War.

The leading railroad and the first to come through here was of course the Texas and Pacific Railway Com-

pany which came through this county a little over a hundred years ago. It is still the leading railroad here and has changed ownership or management a time or two but on the whole it has been a stable operation.

During World War I the federal government under the urging of President Woodrow Wilson took over the operation of all of the railroads in the United States. At the end of the war when the government turned them back to their corporate ownership most of them were in bankruptcy. The Texas and Pacific however at that time was a subsidiary of the Missouri Pacific Railroad. The MP, as it was called in railroad circles, was bankrupt but for some reason or other the T&P, a subsidiary, was not. I never did understand how this came about.

But the end of war brought on some of the T&P's most prosperous days. The oil booms of this area certainly did not hurt it either. With the oil boom of Breckenridge, the Texas and Pacific decided to build from Cisco to Breckenridge. This branch outlet from the main line was named the Cisco and Northeastern Railway and went on past Breckenridge to Throckmorton. About this time another line was built from Wichita

Falls south bearing the name of Wichita Falls and Southern built into Breckenridge from the north on into Ranger and then connected with another railroad at Dublin.

Jake Hammon, a prominent oil man of that area, was the chief entrepreneur in the building of this rail line and in the vernacular of the railroad people it became known as the Jake Hammond.

The second railroad to come to Eastland County was the Texas Central. That was its chartered name but after several years of operation the Katy leased it with a lifetime lease. According to my dad, this was the only railroad he knew of that operated its own sleeping cars. In all other cases the sleeping car business was operated by the Pullman Company of Illinois. Shortly after they were married my parents went on the night train to Waco to spend a day at the Cotton Palace. That was about as big a fair then as the State Fair of Texas at Dallas. This railroad built up from Waco through Hico, Dublin, De Leon, Gorman, Carbon, Cisco then across Shackelford county into Stamford, by and Rotan. Later a line built a branch from De Leon by way of Sipe Springs to Rising Star and then on to Cross Plains. Back in

the days when cotton was the principal crop in the Rising Star and southern Eastland County this line was very important in getting cotton to the world markets.

At Eastland a short-line with a long name was built through the influence of C. U. Connelley and John Ringling, the famous circus man and the CEO of Ringling Brothers Circus. This line has its shops just east of town on the Eastland Cemetery. The graveyard now occupies the land formerly used by the railroad. This line crossed the T&P just south of the Leon River about where Jim Moylan now had his principal shops. They had a little depot there which was a small frame building. But the company offices were downtown on one of the upper floors of the Exchange National Bank building. The line went northwest out of Eastland and crossed between the Ringland Lake and Lake Eastland. Then it went north past Yellow Mound into Stephens County where it connected with the Jake Hammond at the little town of Breckwalker.

At that time the Arab Gasoline Company had a gasoline plant just north of Morton Valley. If one knows where to look, one can see evidence of a concrete block or two at this location. The Ringland built a spur to this plant as it shipped a carload of gasoline every day or two. Its chief customer was the United States Marine Corps. They used this gasoline in Marine Corps airplanes.

South, this railroad, whose official name was the Eastland, Wichita Falls and Gulf, crossed the South Fork of the Leon River just east of the Bassett Street bridge. On the south side of this bridge there was a loading dock afforded by a pipeline from the Consolidated plant on the Carbon highway just north of Gaeta's service station. This

plant has been closed for years and years. The rail line extended to Mangum where it connected with the Katy between Cisco and Carbon. There is one thing a railroad must have and that is a connection with another railroad or it's isolation soon will force out of business.

The rail line coming north out of Waco and chartered as the Texas Central became known as a part of the Missouri, Kansas, and Texas Railway. From its initials MKT railroads adopted KT and called it the Katy. The company even used the word Katy in some of its official advertising.

The names railroad employee gave these trunk line is sometimes amusing. That portion of the Missouri Pacific that was actual-

ly chartered as the International and Great Northern, from its initials, IGN, became known as the Jenny. That portion of the Missouri Pacific chartered as the Houston, Brownsville, and Mexico, headquartered in Kingsville, Texas, was called the Brownie.

In earlier day Texas, all railroads operating in this state had to maintain headquarters in Texas. That is one reason the Brownie's headquarters were in Kingsville. The King ranch people were fundamental in two systems in Texas. The Gulf and Santa Fe was headquartered in Galveston. Its trackage extended into Oklahoma all the way to the first division point in that state, Purcell. The other part of the Texas Santa Fe system called

itself Panhandle and Santa Fe, headquartered in Amarillo, embraced that portion of the company's properties in West Texas.

Now back to the nicknames of these lines. That portion of the Katy system that included the old Texas Central, the same line that ran through Carbon and Cisco and only was discontinued after the dam was built at Whitney, was taken for its initials of TC. Railroaders always in their slang referred to it as the Tin Can.

However, there was a line that operated out of San Antonio with the charter name of San Antonio, Uvalde and Gulf. The working railroad men constantly referred to this line as the Sausage, which was a name taken with the initials serving as a base.

Letter To The Editor



Dear Editor:
Unless we act now, Hillary and Bill Clinton may surrender our parental rights to the control of a foreign (and often hostile) body - the U.N.

Hillary announced Saturday, Feb. 11th, that President Clinton will sign the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child this week and send it to the Senate for ratification. If ratified, it will equal the U.S. Constitution in force of law. Implemented in the US, it will virtually destroy the parental rights we now have.

Article 3 of the treaty says, "In all actions concerning children," the courts, social service workers and bureaucrats are empowered to regulate families based on their subjective determination of "the best interest of the child." That subjugates your parental choices to the review of the State, and, thus, the UN.

This treaty gives children of all ages the right to freedom of:

- association (including undesirable or even dangerous friends or organizations)
- expression (including to "seek, receive, and impart information and ideas of all kinds")
- religion (including the right to reject religious training)
- privacy (including sexual expression and abortion)
- schooling contrary to parents' wishes
- access to media mate-

Tell them you oppose the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, that the UN has no business dictating your parental decisions. And call the White House (202-456-1111) to protest this unprecedented surrender of family rights to the UN.

VA Offers Gulf Hotline

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) established a toll-free number to inform Persian Gulf War veterans and their families of available medical care and other benefits. The toll-free information line is 1-800-PGW-VETS (1-800-749-8387).

Waco VA Regional Office Director Lois High said, "We want Persian Gulf veterans to know VA will take every initiative necessary to let them know how we can help them. The toll-free number gives them quick access to timely information."

The helpline, headquartered at a new Persian Gulf Information Center at the St. Louis VA Regional Office, is staffed with Persian Gulf War benefit specialists who are available weekdays from 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. (CT). The helpline includes a series of recorded messages that will enable

callers to obtain information 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

The helpline is a part of a comprehensive outreach program established to assist Gulf veterans. The Veterans Benefits Act of 1994, which President Clinton signed into law November 2, called for the implementation of the helpline and publication of a newsletter with information on research on illnesses of Gulf veterans and their families and benefits available through VA. VA had already begun publishing the newsletter, the Persian Gulf Review, in 1992 and distributes it to all veterans on the Persian Gulf Registry.

There are currently more than 39,000 veterans on the registry, which VA established in 1992 to identify patterns of illnesses among Gulf veterans.

VA also is providing information on VA bene-

fits, medical care and research, including assistance for Persian Gulf veterans, on an electronic bulletin board system available 24 hours a day. VA-ONLINE can be accessed by callers with a personal computer that includes a modem and a communications package. The toll-free number for the bulletin board is 1-800-US1-VETS (1-800-871-8387).

Outreach also will be conducted through special mailings to Persian Gulf Registry members. VA will begin these mailings with a letter from Secretary of Veterans Affairs Jesse Brown informing veterans that VA will review claims previously filed by those who believed they were exposed to an environmental hazard while serving in the Persian Gulf theater. The letter will also advise those veterans who have not filed claims to do so if they believe they are entitled to benefits.

VA conducts a number of benefit briefings with active duty service per-

Local FFA Members To Exhibit Prize Livestock At 1995 Houston Livestock

FFA members from Ranger will be joining other 4-H and FFA members from throughout Texas for show ring competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, Feb. 17 through March 5 at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show, the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, who are primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Entries from Ranger are Exhibitor Kevin Espinoza, 1 Beef Heifer, 1 Market Barrows, 1 Beef Scramble.

Exhibitor Brady McCormick, 1 Market Barrows.

Representing 900 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed 14,000 entries this year. A variety of animals is shown in the junior show division: Market Steers, Market Swine, Market Sheep, Market Poultry, Beef and Dairy Heifers, Breeding Sheep, Goats Commercial Steers and Breeding Rabbits.


