

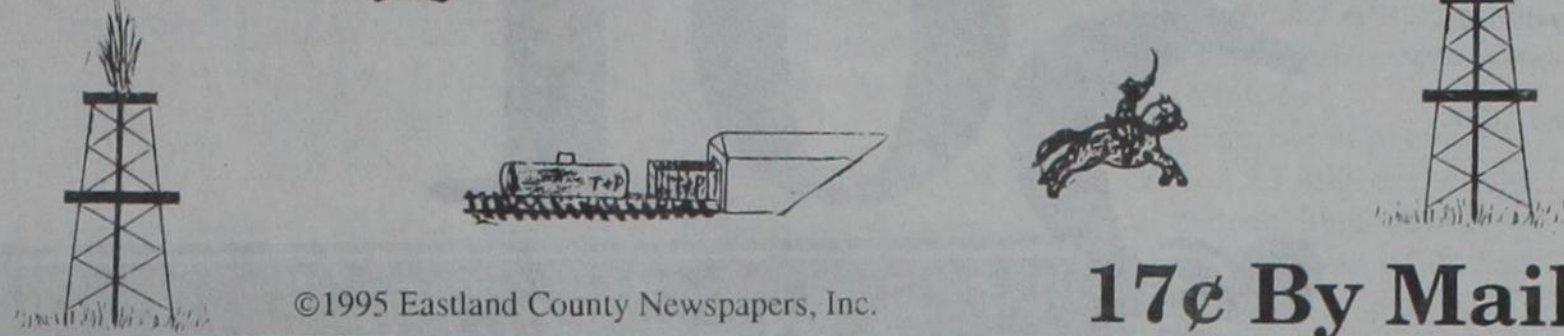

TEX. DEPT. Mental Health & Mental Retardation's bi-annual survey at end of '94, compared to end of '92, shows: 40,000 Texans -- 29,000 with mental illness and 12,000 with mental retardation -- are on waiting lists to receive services. That's up 30%.

Currently because of lack of resources, TXMHMR serves only about half of these: about 125,000 people receive mental health services, while 40,000 participate in mental retardation programs. TXMHMR estimates that another \$150 million would be required annual for the 40,000 on waiting lists.

Of those with mental illness, 173% more are waiting treatment services, counseling and medicines; 165% more offenders with a mental illness are waiting for services which, if available would provide appropriate treatment and lessen the burden on county and state jails. Annual costs for these mental health programs, which are about \$9,000 per person, are less than incarceration expenses in county and state jails; 135% more individuals with a mental illness also diagnosed with substance abuse have been added to the lists; 110% more individuals with a mental illness are waiting for supported housing at an annual cost of \$3,800. This program results in decreased hospitalization and increased independence and living skills; 80% more Texans with mental illness are waiting for in-home and family support, a program that affords individuals options which allow them to remain at home rather than receive more costly outpatient and inpatient services. These services cost the state an average of \$1,600 a year; The number of individuals waiting for case management has been cut in half, although almost 4,000 are still needing that service. This positive news is the result of growth in fiscal resources through Medicaid program.

On the mental retardation side, 92% more Texans are waiting for in-home and family support services. On average, the state spends less than \$2,700 per year for these services compared to \$67,000 for state school placement. These programs allow individuals to remain at home and be cared for by family members; almost 1,600 individuals continue to wait for community residential services such as group homes. Some people have been waiting four year for these programs; waiting list for mental retardation community-based personal and family assistance programs has grown by 77% with about 1/3 of them needing respite and crisis support services and another 1/3 needing family and personal support, including special wheelchairs and communication equipment.

Help Sought To Solve Recent Vehicle Burglaries

Eastland Police Department reports that a series of motor vehicle burglaries have occurred in the southwest part of town between February 7 and February 15. Flashlights, radios, CD players and cellular phones are among the items taken from unlocked vehicles, according to offense reports.

Most of the burglaries have occurred in residential driveways, some of them in well-lighted areas. Residents of Eastland are encouraged to remove valuables and lock their vehicles when leaving them unattended, even for short periods of time. Anyone who has been the victim of this type of crime should report it immediately because it may provide additional clues to the investigating officers.

Needs At County Clothes Closet, Food Pantry

At a recent County Resources Association meeting Ruth Cowley, volunteer, spoke of current needs at the Eastland County Clothes Closet and Food Pantry.

These are located in a trailer at 204 N. Lamar in Eastland. The facility is staffed by volunteers, who provide emergency food and clothing to needy people in the County.

Mrs. Cowley said she was very grateful for the response to a recent plea for children's clothing. She said there was an outpouring of help from people who learned of the shortage of baby and children's clothing.

She added there always seemed to be a need for children's clothing at the facility. Right now boys' clothing and all school-age children's sizes are needed. Also, there is a need for shoes for all sizes in a family.

Concerning needs at the Food Pantry, Mrs. Cowley said that the Pantry was short right now on canned meats, fruit, peanut butter, pastas, and cornbread mix. Any of these would be appreciated.

The report for Jan. 1995 showed that 38 families were served with emergency food, with 137 individuals in these families.

There were also a number of people in during the first week in February. On Monday, Feb. 6 there were 5 families, and on Wednesday, Feb. 8 there were 7 families.

The Pantry and Clothes Closet are open Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons, 1-5 p.m.

All the food, money to buy food, and clothing are donated to the facility by Churches, organizations and individuals of Eastland County.

In the nation's capital we will meet and exchange a high level of officials.

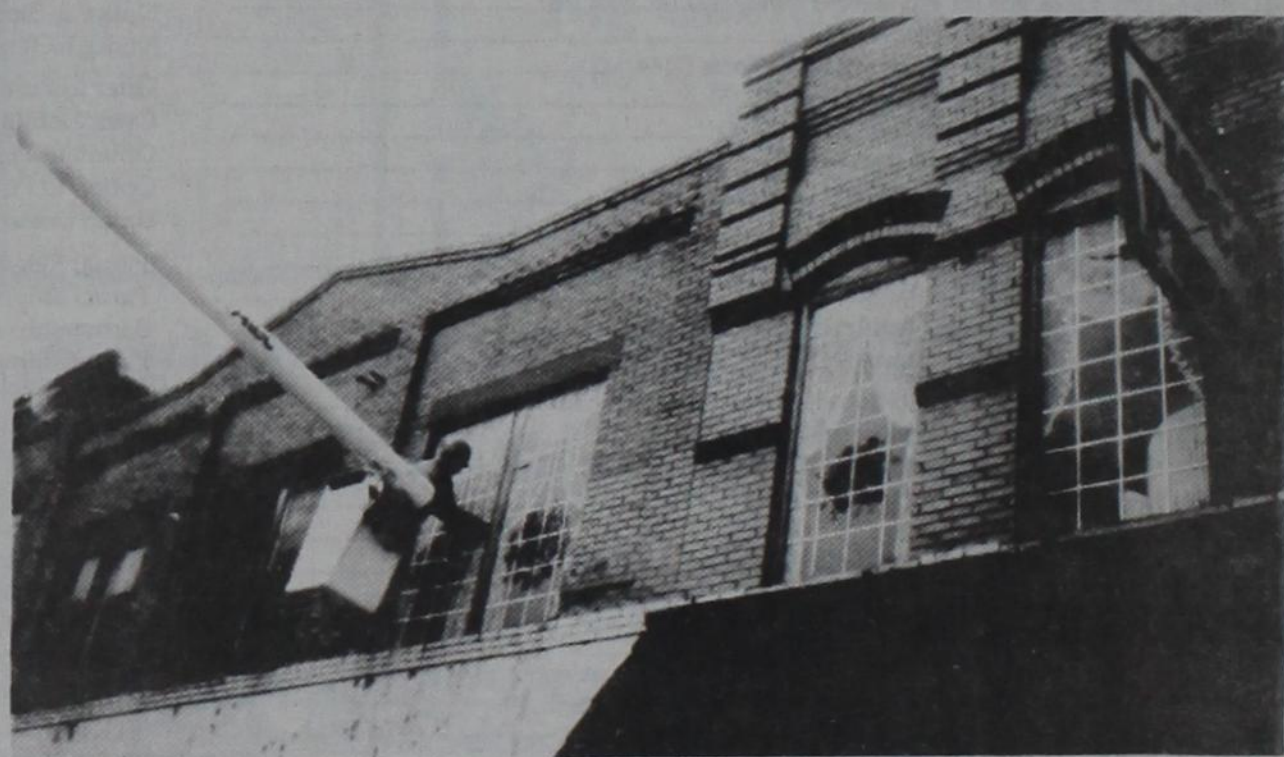

Workshops help develop local tourism opportunities

I keep reading about what an important industry travel and tourism is in Texas. How can my community learn to capitalize on this growing economic opportunity?

Travel and tourism in Texas is definitely a vital industry — the state's third largest to be exact. Travel expenditures pump \$22.85 billion into the Texas economy and support 422,000 jobs. What's great, is that this industry is not clustered to one or even two areas of the state, but is a statewide economic asset.

To help communities across Texas capitalize on this industry, the Texas Department of Commerce Tourism Division will begin holding Community Workshops for Tourism Development starting January 24 in Gainesville. Other workshops are scheduled for Rosenberg/Richmond February 7, Uvalde February 24, and Plainview March 14.

The workshops will provide an opportunity for communities and interested groups to learn some of the techniques used to develop tourism at the local level. Those attending will learn to identify tourism opportunities, build community consensus,

and secure funding for local tourism projects. Participants will play the Great Texas Tourism Game, network with state officials, and attend break-out sessions on a variety of tourism issues.

Cost is \$35 per person in advance and \$45 at the door. Registration fees are collected locally and must be accompanied by a registration fee. Cornelius's building on West Main. At this same location later, I think, Mr. Bernstein operated a men's clothing store known as the Men's Shop. He merchandised all of the brands of men's merchandise. The store was part of a partnership agreement with the one in Ranger whose name now escapes me. After Odessa had its oil boom the operations of these two stores later had another joint operation in Odessa. The manager of the local store moved from Eastland to manager the Odessa one. For the life of me I cannot at this writing remember what his name was but he lived on South Seaman in the same house that was later sold to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Durham. The Durham's lived out their lives in this home and it was sold to Dub Hoffman, so I am told, after Mrs. Durham's death. Her only son is an official with Oklahoma State University and has lived in Stillwater a number of years. My information on Norman Durham is that he is Dr. Norman Durham and is the Dean of the Graduate School at Oklahoma State.

Then as one comes down the east side we come to the location of another cafe. This one was operated by a Mr. Mike Andrews. He was here for several years and after he left here he had a cafe in downtown Marlin. I did not know what became of him but back just after the war was over in the Pacific, I was driving south out of Fort Worth and came to Marlin about time for supper. I went in

Also along in space somewhere in this neighborhood there was a photographic shop where one could have a portrait made that were superb. (Canaris?) This fellow did superb work and made a picture of me that was really good. Anyone who could make a good picture of me that was pleasing to the eye had to be a master at his craft. Then later, Taylor Smith had a jewelry store until he retired.

The last time I checked Taylor was still living and was living in the nursing home that was formed out of the old Crazy Hotel in Mineral Wells. I understand this is one of the better spots for people who are unable to take care of their daily needs.

Then along where James Wright had a store for a long time there was a man who was unique to Eastland who had a store here. He was Cecil A. Lotieff. He came here from Cross Plains as a merchant. However, he entered politics as a candidate for the legislature. He ran against an incumbent who was a native born American by the name of Gilbert. Cecil used to tell the people at our political gatherings that he was old enough to put on his pants when he came to this country and Mr. Gilbert couldn't.

At this point it is probably a good idea that I explain the political setup at that time. According to the census of 1920 Eastland County has a population large enough that it had a member of the legislature who represented only Eastland

County. Then added to Callahan County to the west of us we got another member of the legislature. This is the seat that Mr. Lotieff sought. He never did get it but he put up a pretty good political fight for it.

At that time there were 27, I think it was, voting boxes in the county. Flatwood for instance had its own box. So did Mangum. Then all of the local politics was settled with the Democratic Primaries as for as county officials were concerned. The Republican Party at that time did not put up an array of candidates for county offices in Eastland County. The primaries were always held in July and August, usually the voting day was the last Saturday of these two months. Anyone could run in the first primary who paid his filing fee. To be nominated, which was tantamount to election, a candidate had to gain one more than fifty percent of the votes cast. In the case where no one received a majority of votes the two who got the most votes ran again in the runoff primary. This was to assure that the candidate nominated was elected by a majority of the voter who voted.

So every election year the candidates got together and made out a schedule of speaking engagements for each voting box in our country. One of the local men would be the master of ceremonies and after a time-keeper was selected all candidates presented their cases to the inter-

esting citizens who had gathered for the political meeting. These meetings were usually pretty well attended as in the days before the popularity of the radio this afforded evening out for most families.

Cecil Lotieff was always a popular speaker at these contests but for some reason or other he failed to get elected. So after being in business here for a few years he moved his business to either Rotan or Roby. After being in that community for a few years he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives.

Along about that time, Bill Hightower, who grew up here in Eastland and was Happy's older brother, was working for the Texas Railroad Commission and stationed in Midland. On one of his visits back to Eastland, Bill told me that he happened to overhear a couple of oil men taking in Midland one day when one of them said to the other that there was no way one could buy the vote of that fellow Lotieff. Both Bill and I thought this was a high compliment of Mr. Lotieff's honesty.

I think Cecil was of Lebanese extraction. He was a Christian and years ago, in reading of his death I noticed that his funeral was conducted by a son who had become a Catholic priest.

Back to the east side of the square. South of the Lotieff store was for many years Satterwhite Brothers Hardware Store. I remember that this store was for the agency for Columbia bicycles. At that time I considered Columbia as the Rolls Royce of the bicycle trade. This is the same site where Luce Pittman operated his Western Auto Store for several years before moving to Lamar and Commerce in the building that once housed Pipken Grocery Company's store.

Next to the hardware was one of the oldest firms, if not the oldest in length of continued life, Toombs and Richardson Drug

Store. I just barely remember but during the flue epidemic at the later part of World War I, my father had the flue, and did almost every one else in town. I remember Dr. Johnson coming to see Dad and while he was at our house he wrote prescriptions for almost everyone in our neighborhood and had me to go back to town to get these prescriptions filled. They were filled at Toombs and Richardson Drug. I then took all of these medicines to my mother who sorted them out for me as I had not yet started to school and did not know how to read, and told me where to take each of them.

Then on the corner was the bank building. It was first the Texas State Bank until that failed in 1931 and from 1931 to 1934 they were without a bank until the Eastland National Bank was established.

On main street, east of the cafe, at the corner of Seaman and Main there were a couple of smaller locations. They are still there. At one time one of these places was a vulcanizing shop for auto tires. It used to be a heavy business and always put out a cloud of black smoke when in operation. Then east of it first was a vacant lot, which is now the parking lot for Bill Hoffman's place. The firm that occupied the two-story building Hoffmann is in was an oil field supply store managed by a Mr. Carl Angstadt. His living quarters were in the upstairs over this store and he had a place up there as nice as any two or three bedroom home in Eastland.

This is where Mrs. Neil Day grew up. She was the Angstadt's daughter. I remember the name of the firm but for the life of me I can't spell it. It had what I take to be a German name and I will spell it phonically just to show you that I do remember the name. It phonically would be Jay-reek-ia Oil Well Supply Company.

Developmental Screening Set Feb. 22 In Eastland

On Wednesday, Feb. 22, 1995, a developmental screening will be held for young children ages 0-3. This screening will be conducted at the Eastland County MHMR Center, 301 Pogue, Eastland, from 1 - 3 p.m.

The screening, which

takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests young children in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.) fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents, and teachers.

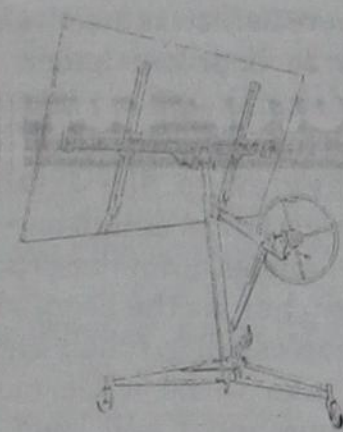

Pharmacy Topics

Yet another reason not to smoke: smokers have a greater risk of dying from breast cancer than non-smokers. The risk rises with the number of cigarettes smoked, an American Cancer Society study found.

And more: secondhand smoke causes 3,000 deaths from lung cancer each year among nonsmokers, the Environmental Protection Agency says. A recent study found that women married to smokers were 30 percent more likely to get the disease than those married to nonsmokers.

The drug clomipramine, usually prescribed for obsessive-compulsive disorder and depression, seems to help men affected by premature ejaculation, researchers found at the Center for Marital and Sexual Health in Cleveland.

Doctors at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis are able to restore more function and feeling in surgery with donor-nerve transplants. The transplants serve as a structure onto which the patients' own nerve cells grow.

Old Rip February Is His Month

(Aunt Sally Day used to say: "If I can live through February, I've got the year made." She lived to be 99 years of age.)

The Courthouse Frog

When I was young my attention was drawn

To an enormous crowd on the courthouse lawn, I wouldn't have gone there had I known

Those folks were laying a cornerstone,

But there I went and watching stayed

To see that fateful tablet laid,

And, though such a thing I can't condone,

They put me in that cornerstone.

Thirty-one years in a marble cell

Wasn't much fun. In fact, 'twas hell,

My advice to young frogs when out alone:

Don't go about the laying of a cornerstone.

'Tis true I now have quite a name

But, Oh, what a price I paid for fame!

Take warning, frogs. My lot has shown

'Tis bad business to mess around a corner-stone.

This poem was mailed to *The Eastland Telegram* on February 26, 1928. No doubt it expressed Blinky's feelings. Just wonder who C.E.T. was as the Editor's note, "Apropos the horned frog, this clever little poem was sent by some unknown and unsung genius."

The *Eastland Argus-Tribune* had the headline on Monday, February 20, 1928, *Who Knows Why Horned Frog Was Imprisoned*. The story had the headline, "Which is the Culprit, Frog or County?" Sub-headline was "Does Horned Frog Owe Eastland County For Lodging, or Must County Pay Damages To Frog?" The horned frog that was entombed in the courthouse cornerstone should have a name to distinguish it from other horned frogs. What would you suggest?" The article by Boyce House continued:

"Eastland's most famous personage - the horned frog who awoke from a slumber of 31 years Saturday afternoon when the courthouse cornerstone was opened - has been viewed by several thousand people who have come from points as distant as Abilene and Mineral Wells to see the creature.

"Many persons are asking what will become of the horned frog. There seems to be some question whether it is the property of E. E. Wood, who placed it in the cornerstone 31 years ago, or of the county, whose hospitality it has enjoyed for that length of time.

"It is understood to be the claim of the county administration, backed by learned legal counsel, that parking space within the courthouse cornerstone had a definite value and that the horned frog owed Eastland County a large bill for lodging during the 31 years of its captivity.

"On the other hand, equally learned counsel contend that the frog did not enter the cornerstone voluntarily, that it would have accepted eviction at any time without any protest, and that Eastland County has no right to charge it for sleeping

quarters. These same opposing learned counsel contend that the horned frog may rightly claim damages from Eastland County for unlawful and unjust imprisonment unless the county can show that the frog committed an offense and was formally arraigned, tried, convicted and sentenced.

"Inasmuch as the frog was imprisoned in the courthouse cornerstone and was placed there by a deputy sheriff (although not an officer at that time) it would appear as though the frog might really maintain an action against the county unless that it can be shown that the imprisonment was for punishment and justified. It is a question that may have to be adjudicated finally by the United States Supreme Court.

"On Sunday morning, the horned frog was accorded the honor of the top banner in the *Cisco News, Ranger Times* and *Eastland Argus-Tribune*; he received a double column writeup on the front pages of the *Dallas News* and the *Abilene Reporter*, and was given a "box" on the front page of the *Breckenridge American*. In today's issue the *Fort Worth Record Telegram* has an interesting account.

These are just the advance guard - the early arrivals - and doubtless many more newspapers will be received telling of "Rip Van Winkle". (First time that the name Rip was used?)

"County Judge Ed Prichard was aroused from his slumber at midnight Saturday by a call from the *Abilene Reporter*, anxious for full details on the frog and the newspaperman concluded with the remark that he was coming to Eastland the next day especially to see the frog.

"This morning, Judge Prichard received a telegram from a state newspaper for pictures of himself and the frog. Other newspapers communicated with the *Argus-Tribune*, desiring pictures and requests from New York City were telegraphed.

Also, on the front page was a poem by Florence N. Perkins, a seventh grade student from West Ward School:

A Toast To The Horned Frog
Here's to "the little horned frog,"

Who emerged a living thing to behold
He did not want to shatter our traditions of ole,
But instead, he wished to contribute his mite to science,

And tell of his stay in the deep, dark tomb,
Where there was nothing but darkness and gloom.

May some kindly hand take you to a bright, sunny land,
And try to repay what seemed your doom,
In the deep, dark, lonely cornerstone tomb.

xxx

The other headline and sub-titles were: *Rotary Teaches Service Declares Luncheon Speaker - Witnesses Are Certain Frog Was In Stone - Rotary Club Holds Trial and Gives Verdict Upholding Frog's Probity*.

"In a burlesque trial, the Rotary Club today decided that the live horned frog was in the courthouse cornerstone.

"Walter Clarke, as pro-

gram chairman, was the "judge" and he designated Sen. H.P. Brelsford to cross examine the witnesses.

"The Senator addressed a long and involved question, containing several 'whether or not' alternatives and hypotheses to which Dr. C.H. Carter, one of the witnesses, replied 'In my opinion, yes.'

"O.D. Caldwell, the next witness, testified that he was standing exactly 32 feet from the cornerstone when the frog was brought out.

"Garrett Bohning stated that he was about the same distance and that at first the frog was motionless as though dead, but in a moment the creature moved its hind leg.

"Was it the right hind leg or the left hind leg?" the attorney demanded, to which Bohning replied, 'Yes.'

Grady Pipkin, in the main, corroborated, the testimony of the other witnesses. He said he saw Bohning but was not sure that he saw Caldwell.

J.A. Beard testifies that he saw Caldwell. Beard was only a few feet from the cornerstone and looking down into it, he saw the frog before anyone had reached into the stone, he said.

"As the final witness, Boyce House of the *Argus-Tribune* was called but he was able to prove an alibi.

"The question as to whether the frog was in the cornerstone was then put to a vote and was declared a victory for the affirmative."

Meanwhile back in Fort Worth, one of the most famous photographers began his career when Mr. Record of the *Star Telegram* sent him and Stillman Evans, a writer, to Eastland. This phenomenon of unbelievable happenings was discussed as Mr. Record and Silliman both said it must be authentic, since Boyce House had never missed them on a thing and was absolutely positive of the story.

Mr. Record told him: "Ennis, you are now moving into big time news work. Up until now you have been testing out on local operations and you have proved yourself to be able of coping with the situation as it comes along, but now you're going out of town on a big story. Silliman is a good writer and he'll mother you and help you. He'll show you what to shoot and tell you to shoot it and school you as you go along."

They left with his equipment that consisted of an old 5 x 7 press Graplex with old glass plates, a 35 mm movie camera for newsreel coverage. Since they would be traveling into the night, they took a basket lunch. Back in those days roads were not that good, mostly gravel.

In Eastland, they spent the night with a friend of Silliman's. Ennis said: "Silliman was in one bed and I was in the other and man he snored up a storm all night, and kept me awake and nervous, afraid he was gonna have a fit or something."

"We got the pictures the next day fully assisted by Boyce and other members around town there. They brought old Rip out to make the pictures, he was all moldy like a snake who had gone into hibernation and lost his skin. He didn't have any horns on him, he'd lost his horns, and molded them off like deers mold their horns when

they hibernate. It's a form of nature because they just lose what they had. Now Rip didn't have any color he was white-Albino, and I noticed his eyes weren't like normal horned toad's eyes. He didn't pay particular attention to what we were doing. When put into position he'd stay in that position. He wouldn't try to run away or anything, I guess after he'd been asleep for 31 years, he'd naturally be that way.

On the return trip that afternoon, Silliman advised Ennis, "Whether you know it or not, but after all this publicity reaches the readers all over the United States and the world, that horny toad is going to be a looked-for character. I'm going to show you how to pick up some change . . . You go out to TCU Hill and you'll find frogs out there by the hundreds. You get a bunch of them school boys to gather you up some horned frogs. Wow, in this story I'm going to file, I'm going to tell that if they'll write to Ennis C. Helm in *Fort Worth Star Telegram* that you'll furnish them horned frogs for their study and research."

He took advantage of the tip and charged 25¢ for the small ones and \$1 for the large ones, and 25¢ for the small package. He sold 2,000 of those horned frogs.

Ennis explained: "I covered myself on the expedition with the syndicate still pictures for AP-Atlantic and Pacific News photos, *International News* photos, that was the Hearst Chain, the *Central Press News* which was the Script-Howard chain, and several other syndicates. Then for the newsreel, I shot newsreel film for MGM. Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Hearst International, Newsreel, Fox Newsreel, Pathe Newsreel and several other independent newsreels who paid 50 cents a foot for national coverage or 25 cents if they used it for local coverage. Most of my film being in Fort Worth was some at 50 centers a foot and the average story was around 60 to 80 feet. So we didn't ever get rich on it but we made good pocket money. As I recall on the trip to Eastland an Old Rip, sold all totaled to the syndicate less than a hundred dollars worth of pictures, and my newsreel was around \$250. But it was a start of a career which would lead to a future. I know now looking back."

"Ennis gave this taped information to Vance O'Brien, who interviewed him after he had a severe stroke in 1965. He had retired in Carlsbad, N.M.

He had photographed so many notables and important events on his seven trips around the world. If all of his films were connected, it would reach around the world 25 times.

Ennis Helm had a sad experience in Eastland during the Cisco Santa Claus Bank Robbery just before Christmas less than two months before. On the way back after taking pictures in Cisco, he was stopped at a road block and detained for three hours as he did not have his press card. He did have his Masonic card and Elk Club which had his name wrong with an S. He was driving a Model T Ford Roadster, just like the robber, Henry Helms who drove the same type of car to get away.

It was about the time when Old Rip came out of the cornerstone that the Henry Helms trial was being held in the City Hall. Marshall Ratliff, Santa Claus's trial was the last one in the old courthouse.

The world was eager to hear about the horned frog. Old Rip reached the glory of the front pages of the nation's newspapers. *The New York World* in Monday's issue; *The Kansas City Star*, one of the greatest and most conservative in the US, carried a half column story in the middle column top of the front page on Tuesday; *The Chicago Tribune* with a circulation of nearly 750,000 daily devoted half a column; An *Associated Press* dispatch from San Antonio had a note from Bob Coley to Earl Bender, "I want to know from you if this frog story is true. It is a wonderful frog that can survive such imprisonment. Just shows the kind of stuff we can produce in Texas." On the front page of the *Chicago Tribune* had a cartoon: "First straphanger - 'The paper said he was as flat as a silver dollar! Second straphanger - 'Well, you would be, too, if you'd had a courthouse resting on your chest for 31 years.'" Arthur Brisbane in his "Today" Column in many papers said Rip probably received his strength from the Bible in the cornerstone. *United Press* quoted New York Governor, Al Smith who said there would be no horned frog in the State's new office building. *United Press* also reported that the Smithsonian Institute experts said that the frog story was false.

(Edith's Note: Although I have many articles, so many have been lost, misplaced, crumbled, pasted in scrapbooks, stolen, or were not saved in the first place, the continuity may like a little to be desired. My mother often told me that my facts were not right, but I told her that it made a better story. Now, since I am 80, I have hardening of the arteries, so I can blame it on everything!)

The *Eastland Telegram* of Sunday morning, February 26 must be the first newspaper pictures that I have. The headlines on the pictures were "Eastland's Rip Van Winkle Horned Toad and 'Coming Out' Party Scene." Explanations were: "First pictures of Eastland's famous horned frog which slept for 31 years in the cornerstone of the old courthouse. The views are: upper left: the stone from which the frog was removed. Blair Cherry, coach of the Ranger Bulldogs and former 'horned frog star' of TCU, and who was a member of the frog's 'coming out party' is shown holding the frog by the tail. (It also had T.E. Ward, a Ranger coach and Jim Golden). Upper right: E.E. Wood of Eastland, holding the frog on a piece of paper." The other articles including a copy of the *Eastland Chronicle*, predecessor of the *Eastland Telegram*, were also taken from the stone where they were put more than 31 years ago. Center: the "old boy" himself. Below is shown a part of the huge crowd which gathered on Feb. 18 to witness the removal of the frog from the stone. The sign on the razed building covers the cornerstone."

A box had: "Give Froggie Nice Home, Is Desire of Most People." Approximately 32% of the per-

sons who suggested means of disposing the horned frog . . . would keep the harmless little reptile and provide him a comfortable abode for the remainder of his life.

About 29% of those who voted expressed the desire to sell the frog and 16% voted to turn him loose to roam about his native haunts. 7% voted to place the frog in the cornerstone of the new courthouse. Then in a longer article on page 2, Raymond Teal, Ranger, said it in poetry:

Since frogs are up and oil is down,
Coast to coast highways right through the town,
Millions of tourists traveling 'round
Would like to see this frog of great renown.
He suggests to keep him or her.

Mrs. C.S. Hubbard, Ranger, "Sell the frog to Henry Ford for \$2,500 to put among his souvenirs. Start a fund with the money to pay doctor bills for the poor sick people.

Adele Pool, "Sell the frog to the University for a mascot, Give the money

to help fix up the poor farm."

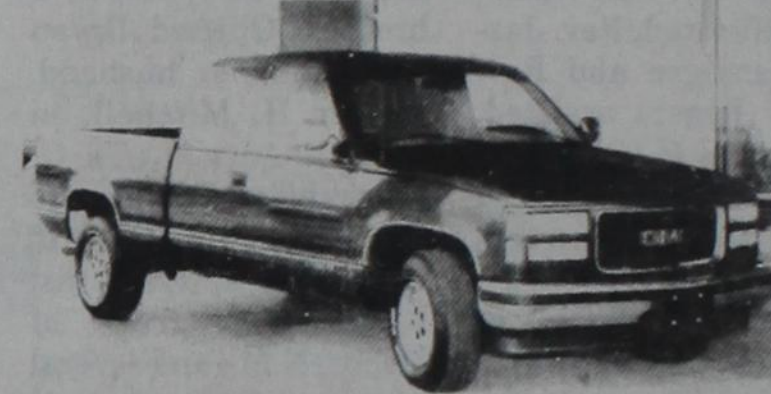

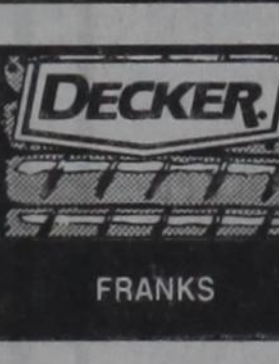

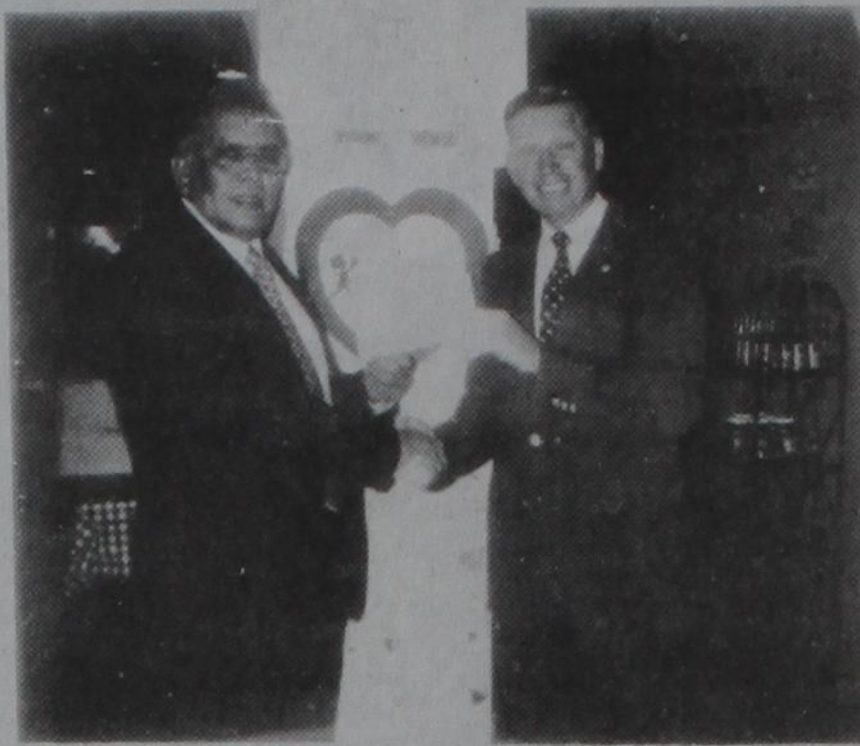
