TEX.DEPT. Mental Health & Mental Retardation's bi-annual survey at end of '94, compared to end of '92, shows:

40,000 Texans -- 28,000 with mental illness and 12,000 with mental retardation -- are on waiting lists to receive services. That's up 30%.

Currently because of lack of resources, TXMHMR serves only about half of these: about 125,000 people receive mental health services, while 40,000 participate in mental retardation programs. TXMHMR estimates that another \$150 million would be required annual for the 40,000 on waiting lists.

Of those with mental illness, 173% more are waiting treatment services, counseling and medicines; 165% more offenders with a mental illness are waiting for services which, if available would provide appropriate treatment and lessen the burden on county and state jails. Annual costs for these mental health programs, which are about \$9,000 per person, are less than incarceration expenses in county and state jails; 135% more individuals with a mental illness also diagnosed with substance abuse have been added to the lists; 110% more individuals with a mental illness are waiting for supported housing at an annual cost of \$3,800. This program results in decreased hospitalization and increased independence and living skills; 80% more Texans with mental illness are waiting for in-come and family support, a program that affords individuals options which allow them to remain at home rather than receive more costly outpatient and inpatient services. These services cost the state an average of \$1,600 a year; number of individuals waiting for case management has been cut in half, although almost 4,000 are still needing that service. This positive news is the result of growth in fiscal resources through Medicaid program.

On the mental retardation side, 82% more Texans are waiting for inhome and family support services. On average, the state spends less than \$2,700 per year for these services compared to \$67,000 for state school placement. These programs allow individuals to remain at home and be cared for by family members; almost 1,600 individuals continue to wait for community residential services such as group homes. Some people have been waiting four year for these programs; waiting list for mental retardation community-based personal and family assistance programs has grown by 77% with about 1/3 of them needing respite and crisis support services and another 1/3 needing family and personal support, including special wheelchairs and communication equipment. Workshops help develop local tourism opportunities

I keep reading about what an important industry travel and tourism is in Texas. How can my community learn to capitalize on this growing economic opportunity?


Travel and tourism in Texas is definitely a vital industry — the state's third largest to be exact. Travel expenditures pump \$22.85 billion into the Texas economy and support TDD: 512/936-0555, Relay 422,000 jobs. What's great, is that this industry is not clustered to one or even two areas of the state, but is a statewide economic asset.

To help communities across Texas capitalize on this industry, the Texas Department of Commerce Tourism Division will begin holding Community Workshops for Tourism Development starting January 24 in Gainesville. Other workshops are scheduled for Rosenburg/Richmond February 7, Uvalde February 24, and Plainview March 14.

The workshops will provide an opportunity for communities and interested groups to learn some of the techniques used to develop tourism at the local level. Those attending will learn to identify tourism opportunities, build community consen-

sus, and secure funding for local tourism projects. Participants will play the Great Texas Tourism Game, network with state officials, and attend break-out sessions on a variety of tourism issues.

Cost is \$35 per person in advance and \$45 at the door. Registration fees are collected locally and must be accompanied by a registration fee. Co-sponsors are Texas A&M University Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Commission on the Arts, Texas Department of Transportation, Texas Historical Commission, Texas Parks and Wildlife, and the Office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts. We had quite a visit about Eastland and some of the people here. He said his son was finishing up at the University of Texas College of Medicine in Galveston and would be interning somewhere in the near future.

I don't recall having seen or talked to Mike Andrews since that date so long ago.

Also along in space somewhere in this neighborhood there was a photographic shop where one could have a portrait made that were superb. (Canaris?) This fellow did superb work and made a picture of me that was really good. Anyone who could make a good picture of me that was pleasing to the eye had to be a master at his craft. Cecil used to tell the people at our political gathers that he was old enough to put on his pants when he came to this country and Mr.

Gilbert couldn't. At this point it is probably a good idea that I explain the political setup at that time. To be nominated, which was tantamount to election, a candidate had to gain one more than fifty percent of the votes cast. In the case where no one received a majority of votes the two who got the most votes ran again in the runoff primary. This was to assure that the candidate nominated was elected by a majority of the voter who

#### esting citizens who had gathered for the political meeting. These meetings were usually pretty well attended as in the days before the popularity of the radio this affored evening out for most fami-

lies. Cecil Lotieff was always a popular speaker at these contests but for some reason or other he failed to get elected. So after being in business here for a few years he moved his business to either Rotan or Roby. After being in that community for a few years he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives.

Along about that time, Bill Hightower, who grew up here in Eastland and was Happy's older brother, was working for the Texas Railroad Commission and stationed in Midland. On one of his visits back to Eastland, Bill told me that he happened to overhear a couple of oil men taking in Midland one day when one of them said to the other that there was no way one could buy the vote of that fellow Letieff. Both Bill and I thought this was a high compliment of Mr. Lotieff's honesty.

I think Cecil was of Lebonese extraction. He was a Christian and years ago, in reading of his death I noticed that his funeral was conducted by a son who had become a Catholic priest.

Back to the east side of the square. South of the Lotieff store was for many vears Satterwhite Brothers Hardware Store. I remember that this store was for the agency for Columbia bicycles. At that time I considered Columbia as the Rolls Royce of the bicycle trade. This is the same site where Luce Pittman operated his Western Auto Store for several years before moving to Lamar and Commerce in the building that once housed Pipken Grocery Company's store.

Next to the hardware was one of the oldest firms, if not the oldest in length of continued life, Toombs and Richardson Drug

I just barely remember but during the flue epidemic at the later part of

World War I, my father had the flue, and did almost every one else in town. I remember Dr. Johnson coming to see Dad and while he was at our house he wrote prescriptions for almost everyone in our neighborhood and had me to go back to town to get these prescriptions filled. They were filled at Tooms and Richardson Drug. I then ad took all of these medicines to my mother who sorted them out for me as I had not yet started to school and did not know how to read, and told me where

to take each of them. Then on the corner was the bank building. It was first the Texas State Bank until that failed in 1931 and from 1931 to 1934 they were without a bank until the Eastland National Bank was estab-

On main street, east of the cafe, at the corner of Seaman and Main there were a couple of smaller locations. They are still there. At one time one of these places was a vulcanizing shop for auto tires. It used to be a heavy business and always put out a cloud of black smoke when in operation. Then east of it first was a vacant lot, which is now the parking lot for Bill Hoffman's place. The firm that occupied the twostory building Hoffmann is in was an oil field supply store managed by a Mr. Carl Angstadt. His living quarters were in the 19 upstairs over this store b and he had a place up ?? there as nice as any two or m three bedroom home in io Eastland.

This is where Mrs. Neil Day grew up. She was the Angstadt's daughter. I remember the name of the firm but for the life of me I can't spell it. It had what I take to be a German name and I will spell it phonically just to show you that I do remember the name. It phonically would be Jay-reek-ia Oil Well Supply Company.

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
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### Old Rip February Is His Month

The Courthouse Frog

When I was young my attention was drawn To an enormous crowd on the courthouse lawn,

I wouldn't have gone there had I known Those folks were laying

a cornerstone, But there I went and

cornerstone. Thirty-one years in a marble cell Wasn't much fun. In

fact, 'twas-hell, My advice to young frogs when out alone:

Don't go about the laying of a cornerstone.

'Tis true I now have quite a name But, Oh, what a price I

paid for fame! Take warning, frogs. My lot has shown

'Tis bad business to mess around a cornerstone.

This poem was mailed to The Eastland Telegram on February 26, 1928. No doubt it expressed Blinky's feelings. Just wonder who C.E.T. was as the Editor's note, "Apropos the horned frog, this clever little poem was sent by some unknown and unsung genius."

The Eastland Argus-Tribune had the headline on Monday, February 20, 1928, Who Knows Why Horned Frog Was Imprisoned. The story had the headline, "Which is the Culprit, Frog or County? Sub-headline was "Does Horned Frog Owe Eastland County For Lodging, or Must County Pay Damages To Frog." "The horned frog that was entombed in the courthouse cornerstone should have a name to distinguish it from other horned frogs. What would you suggest?" The article by Boyce House continued:

"Eastland's most famous personage - the horned frog who awoke from a slumber of 31 years Saturday afternoon when the courthouse cornerstone was opened -- has been viewed by several thousand people who have come from points as distant as Abilene and Mineral Wells to see the crea-

ture. "Many persons are asking what will become of the horned frog. There seems to be some question whether it is the property of E. E. Wood, who placed it in the cornerstone 31 years ago, or of the county, whose hospitality it has enjoyed for

that length of time. "It is understood to be the claim of the county administration, backed by learned legal counsel, that parking space within the courthouse cornerstone had a definite value and that the horned frog owed Eastland County a large bill for lodging during the 31 years of its captivity.

"On the other hand, equally learned counsel contend that the frog did not enter the cornerstone voluntarily, that it would have accepted eviction at any time without any protest, and that Eastland County has no right to charge it for sleeping quarters. These same opposing learned counsel contend that the horned frog may rightly claim damages from Eastland County for unlawful and unjust imprisonment unless the county can show that the frog committed an offense and was formally arraigned, tried, convicted and sentenced.

"Inasmuch as the frog was imprisoned in the courthouse cornerstone and was placed there by a deputy sheriff (although not an officer at that time) it would appear as though the frog might really maintain an action against the county unless that it can be shown that the imprisonment was for punishment and justified. It is a question that may have to be adjudicated finally by the United States Supreme Court.

"On Sunday morning, the horned frog was accorded the honor of the top banner in the Cisco News, Ranger Times and Eastland Argus-Tribune; he received a double column writeup on the front pages of the Dallas News and the Abilene Reporter, and was given a "box" on the front page of the Breckenridge American. In today's issue the Fort Worth Record Telegram has and interesting ac-

These are just the advance guard - the early arrivals - and doubtless many more newspapers will be received telling of "Rip Van Winkle". (First time that the name Rip was used?)

"County Judge Ed Prichard was aroused from his slumber at midnight Saturday by a call from the Abilene Reporter, anxious for full details on the frog and the newspaperman concluded with the remark that he was coming to Eastland the next day especially to see the frog.

"This morning, Judge Pritchard received a telegram from a state newspaper for pictures of himself and the frog. Other newspapers communicated with the Argus-Tribune, desiring pictures and requests from New York City were telegraphed."

Also, on the front page was a poem by Florence N. Perkins, a seventh grade student from West Ward School:

A Toast To The Horned Frog Here's to "the little

horned frog," Who emerged a living

thing to behold He did not want to shat-

ter our traditions of ole, But instead, he wished to contribute his mite to science,

And tell of his stay in the deep, dark tomb, Where there was noth-

ing but darkness and gloom. May some kindly hand take you to a bright, sun-

shiny land, And try to repay what seemed your doom,

In the deep, dark, lonely cornerstone tomb.

J.A. Beard testifies that he saw Caldwell. Beard was only a few feet from the cornerstone and looking down into it, he saw the frog before anyone had reached into the stone, he said.

"As the final witness, Boyce House of the Argus-Tribune was called but he was able to prove an alibi.

"The question as to whether the frog was in the cornerstone was then put to a vote and was declared a victory for the affirmative."

Meanwhile back in Fort Worth, one of the most famous photographers began his career when Mr. Record of the Star Telegram sent him and Stilliman Evans, a writer, to Eastland. This phenomenon of unbelievable happenings was discussed as Mr. Record and Silliman both said it must be authentic, since Boyce House had never missed them on a thing and was absolutely positive of the story.

Mr. Record told him: "Ennis, you are now moving into big time news work. Up until now you have been testing out on local operations and you have proved yourself to be able of coping with the situation as it comes along, but now you're going out of town on a big story. Silliman is a good writer and he'll mother you and help you. He'll show you what to shoot and tell you to shoot it and school you as you go along."

They left with his equipment that consisted of an old 5 x 7 press Graplex with old glass plates, a 35 mm movie camera for newsreel coverage. Since they would be traveling into the night, they took a basket lunch. Back in those days roads were not that good, mostly gravel.




