March Brings Winter To County

A cold front stalled out over Texas this week, bringing ice into Eastland County and a large area around it. Things went from bad to worse from Tuesday on, when cold north winds plowed into some Gulf moisture. But, hadn't the realists among us warned that we were going to get "paid back" for all those wonderful, warm days we had in February? Eastland Volunteer Fire Chief Philip Arther summed up the week this way: "This was unusually cold weather that just skirted north of us. Fin-

gers of moisture would hit, then would moderate and hit again. It wasn't a solid mass of ice, but that made it even more treacherous." A light mist and sleet began Wednesday, March 1, and soon laid a glittering coating on the vegetation. By Wednesday night there was treacherous "black ice" covering I-20. The temperature hung at 24-25 degrees. The public was warned to stay off roads - especially the Interstate. And accidents began to be reported, with all DPS Troopers out and Fire Departments and Ambulance Service busy.

At midnight that night an accident on the Olden overpass caused the death of two children. Their grandmother, the driver of the car, was injured and transported to Eastland Memorial Hospital. By Thursday morning the ice was even heavier on the countryside and roadways. Schools were either delayed or closed, with no busses running. Both Eastland and Cisco had no school. At times the rain intensified, freezing as it fell. Porches and walk-

ways became almost as dangerous as the roads. Businesses were curtailed or shut down. Most people stayed home if they could. Around noon Thursday there was a serious accident on I-20 just over the overpass near Ruben's Fina Station and the Red Star Truck Stop. A westbound jeep skidded across the median into the path of an eastbound truck. The driver of the truck was not injured, but the man in the jeep had a broken leg. Although the break was bad and he reportedly needed to be carried out by helicopter, the chopper from Hendricks Hospital could not fly in through the freezing rain. So the individual was carried to Eastland Memorial Hospital, where he is reported (Friday) to be doing well. It took about 1 1/2 hours to clear I-20 after that accident, a spokesman at the Eastland Fire Department said. Thursday night saw no break in the weather, and a number of travelers along I-20 got a taste of Eastland County hospitality. The Eastland Fire Department and First Baptist Church assisted them in every way possible, with Thrift Mart grocery providing food. Thirteen to fifteen families were sheltered in various places: the Cub Scout hut, a house belonging to the Baptist Church, the fellowship hall of the church, and a rent house

Ranger Commissioners' Roundup

Monday 27 February 1995. Mayor Ainsworth called the meeting to order. The financial report by Commissioner Tankersley showed the General Fund to be \$56,986.61; Water-Sewer & Sanitation \$7,425.73; Hotel-Motel \$96.43; Police Special \$122.37; Ambulance Fund \$44.99; Sewer Line Reserve \$799.54. All minutes of the previous meeting were approved. First item of business was the discussion of the final judgement in the Carl O'Neal Litigation. It was decided to pay Mr. O'Neal the judgement without an appeal. Suggestion was to pay in one lump sum. Next was old business. Doyle Russell spoke in regard to the Scout Hut. Mr. Russell thanked the council for what they had done and ask that they give the Scouts a 50 year lease at one dollar per year. The council agreed, voted, and passed the request.

Item number three dealt with the need to pass a rate increase on Sewer and Sanitation. Due to the new State and Federal MANDATES the City is forced to increase the Sanitation rate \$3.00 per month and the Sewer \$3.00. Commissioner Tankersley presented a list to the council that consists of several improvements to the city's water and sewer system that was required by the State. Over a period of 14 months these MANDATES were completed for a total cost of \$359,018.20 to the City of Ranger. Without any funding from the Federal Government the City was also forced by the State to close its Landfill, that cost \$58,375. This Landfill closing also cost the City \$72,000. per year in Landfill revenue, and forced the City to haul its garbage to the B.F.I. Landfill in Abilene. (We should all give thanks for 'Big Federal Government' and ask for more!!).

Prior to these mandates the City of Ranger installed a new lift station, new manholes and laid 15,000 feet of new sewer pipe that cost a total of \$325,000. The City received a grant from the State for \$250,000., the balance of \$75,000. was paid by the City. Fourth Item on the agenda was the approval of elected officers and terms of board members for the Ranger Economic Development Council. Dr. Paul Riffle presented the City Council with a list of members and their terms to be approved. Dr. Riffle, Bobby Adams and Jeane Pruitt received three year terms. James McDonald and James W. Rushing received two year terms. Officers elected were President: Dr. Paul W. Riffle, DDS. Vice-President: Jeane Pruitt, Treasurer: James McDonald, Secretary: James W. Rushing. Suit Asks Damages From Eastland Memorial

A 20 million dollar damage suit has been filed against Eastland Memorial Hospital and its board of directors by a former employee. The suit was filed in Austin Tuesday by Juanita Walton, who was dismissed by the hospital as Special Services Supervisor in December of last year. She is listed as a resident of Taylor County. The suit alleges that she was fired for "reporting the hospital's violations of federal and state laws." She says in the suit the hospital violated laws in the manner of transfer-

ring critically ill patients to other area hospitals in ambulances not properly equipped to carry them and staffed by nurses practicing outside the scope of their licenses. Neither the hospital nor the directors had been served legal papers on the suit at press time. No one locally would comment on the case. Ms. Walton said she believes the hospital endangered patients' lives by putting patients on ambulances without the equipment and staff required by law. "I felt I had a responsibility to patients and to the public to report what I believed were violations of important laws affected the quali-

ty of patient care. I just couldn't stand by and ignore them," she said in a prepared statement. The Travis County suit states that the lawsuit pursuant to the Texas whistleblower's Protection Act, alleging false accusations against plaintiff of misconduct and malpractice in retaliation. Important Dates Ahead For Staff Water District

Important dates loom for the Staff Water Supply District. March 6th is the deadline date for plaintiff's briefs in 11th Court of Appeals by those asking that the District's board of directors be re-called and the District be placed in receivership. April 6 is the District's annual membership meeting. Last year's meeting was a talk-fest with charges and countercharges with at least one fist-fest. A ballot offering choices is being sought by a number of members of the District this year. The terms of Directors Truett Hart, who repre-

sents the Lake Leon area, and Lane Campbell, who represents the Flatwoods, Carbon, Kokomo and Gorman area, expire this year. In a January letter to the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission, the District complained of the quality of water purchased by it from the cities of Ranger, Eastland and Carbon, who in turn buy the water from the Eastland County Water Supply District. Often criticized for not making additional meters available to potential customers in their area,

Traffic Fatalities Occur In Olden During Bad Weather

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, March 1st was a bad day. In a weather related traffic accident, which occurred on an Olden overpass; two children were killed and their grandmother injured. On the night of March 1st, Annie Gilbert of Cincinnati and her grandchildren, both ten years of age; were traveling westbound on I-20. In deteriorating weather conditions, the vehicle driven by Annie Gilbert hit ice on the Olden overpass and slid into the other westbound lane. The out of control vehicle slid into the path of a com-

mercial 18-wheel truck and was struck. The truck licensed in Illinois, had no time to avoid the accident or brake to stop, before striking the Gilbert vehicle. The 1995 Freightliner, was driven by Ina Chandler of Mt. Vernon, Illinois. Annie Gilbert is in stable condition in Eastland Memorial Hospital, and is under observation; waiting for the arrival of her family. The children were taken to Edwards Funeral Home in Eastland. Numerous other accidents have occurred since and are occurring at present. Almost all are weather related.

Ranger Chamber Elects 1995 Officers, Sets Date For Banquet

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce officers and directors held a luncheon meeting Monday, February 27, 1995 to elect officers and to approve plans for the annual recognition dinner. The dinner has been scheduled for Saturday, March 25 and will be held in the Ranger Public School cafeteria. At a previous meeting a nominations committee was appointed by president Buster Robinson. The committee submitted a slate of candidates, and after a period of discussion during which the

list of candidates was modified somewhat, Shawn Wells was elected president, J.R. Hunt, vice-president and and and Phylecia Schooling, secretary/treasurer was elected for 1995. They will be installed during the banquet. In other business, president Robinson submitted two bids for the repair of a leak in the roof of the depot/museum. For sometime, because of the deterioration of the tar paper beneath the roofing tiles, the area around the chimney on the west side of the building has been leaking to the extent that the ceiling beneath has caved in. Although no threat to the museum holding has been a result of the leak, much of the storage space has been made unusable. Ricky Henson's bid was selected over an Abilene Company's, the only other bid submitted. The maintenance of the museum building has been provided for by Mrs. Ruth Terry Denny, a strong sup-

porter of the museum and other Ranger activities, and the repair of the roof will be made from this fund. The chamber board also voted to support Brandy Briggs, a junior at Ranger High School, in her quest to attend the Congressional Youth Leadership program to be held in Washington D.C.

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Tornado Drill Scheduled For Wednesday, March 8th

A tornado drill is scheduled for this area on Wednesday, March 8th between approximately 10 and 10:30 a.m. There will be a special test of the North Texas NOAA Weather Radio alarm system as well as the transmission of the Tornado Drill exercise on the CONTEL, weather wire service. The drill will give those in homes, schools, hospitals, and businesses the opportunity to see if they can receive a test severe weather watch and warning in a timely manner and then take the same precautionary actions which would be carried out during an actual tornado event. In some areas emergency management officials will test local sirens when the practice tornado warning is issued. Should the weather ACTUALLY be threatening at that time, the drill will be postponed until the following day at 10:15 a.m.

Eastland Police Cecil Funderburg has not been able to secure broadcast of television channel 3 which covers weather news for this area because channel 12-Sweetwater requests continued blackout, or secure special equipment to broadcast the CONTEL signal.

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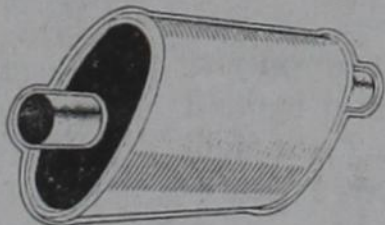
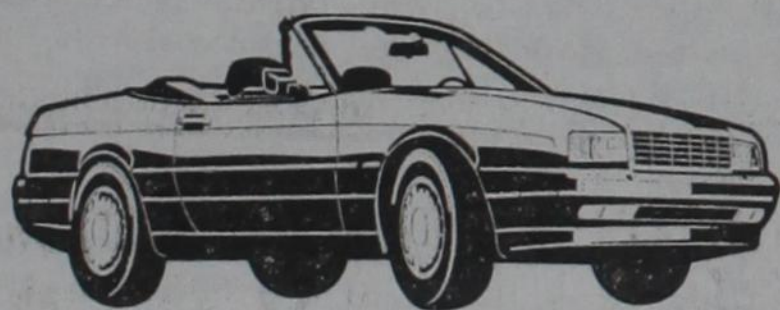

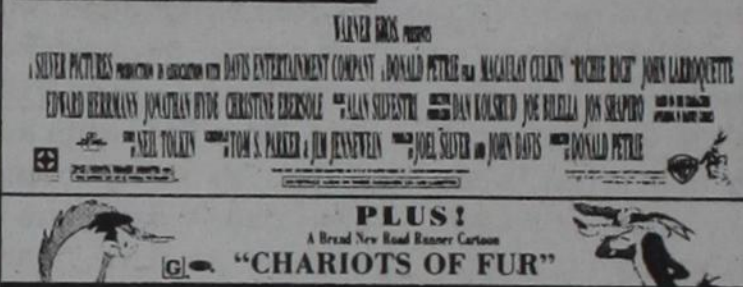
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Letter To The Editor

belonging to a church member. Cisco churches also helped those in need. These included people from all over the country, as well as tourists from England and Germany.

Some other hardy travelers spent the night in vehicles at the old parking lot of Super-Duper near Wal-Mart.

DPS Sgt. Jerry Mathews said Friday that all the DPS Troopers had been out for two days, so they hadn't had time to sum up their reports on accidents. But he estimated that wrecks had been "numerous," and mostly on I-20.

Also on Friday Chris Ledbetter of the Eastland Emergency Medical Service listed activities over the past two days as: Responded to 15 wrecks (some canceled). Nine

motor vehicle accidents covered, with five people transported to the hospital.

"Cisco and Ranger EMS probably responded to more wrecks than we did," Ledbetter noted.

Other reports said that during the hours of 4-7 Friday morning there was a solid layer of ice on the Interstate west of Cisco out to the roadside park. That was the scene of several accidents.

By noon Friday the temperature had gone up from a nighttime low of 24 degrees to around freezing. The sky was still gray, but predictions were for the thermometer to rise to the 60's over the weekend.

Local people were ready for it. But several citizens remembering the past two days asked:

"Who had the authority to close down I-20, when it becomes so dangerous that people are being killed on it?"

the District told the TNRC in the letter: "We could do nothing about more connections when Eastland County Water Supply District could not even furnish acceptable potable water for the customers already on their systems." The city of Eastland has still not given Staff a Contract to

furnish enough water for more connections to be added so as to satisfy our waiting list."

The letter blamed the "opposition" for killing Staff's recent effort to secure a grant for expansion and expressed hope that the opposition will not be able to stop the district's present applica-

tion over the viola-

tions. The suit describes a "heated discussion" between Administrator Carr and Ms. Walton, and on Dec. 2nd Ms. Walton was advised that her employment was terminated effective that date. The suit says that Mrs. Carr wrote a letter to the board of directors and to the Texas Employment Commission, falsely accusing Ms. Walton of misconduct and malpractice as a nurse.

Ms. Walton, the suit claims, appeared before the board on Dec. 22nd with an informal oral grievance, and by hand-delivered letter dated Feb. 9th, 1995, to Administrator Carr, sought to present a written grievance pursuant to any grievance procedure which the hospital may have. Ms. Carr in a letter dated Feb. 14th, advised Ms. Walton that "Eastland Memorial Hospital does not maintain an employee grievance procedure." The suit re-states that Ms. Walton believes that she was discriminated and retaliated against and falsely accused for reporting what she believed to be violations.

The suit asks equitable relief, including but not limited to reinstatement and an award of lost past and future compensation, compensatory and exemplary damages, interests, attorney's fees, additional legal or equitable relief, for total damages not in excess of \$20,000,000.

Ms. Walton is represented by the Austin firm of Pittman and Fink.

CLIP AND SAVE: TORNADO WATCH--is issued when conditions are favorable for tornado formation. Watch and listen. Continue normal activities during the watch but be aware that there is a possibility of tornadoes and severe thunderstorms. Take shelter if you see or hear a tornado, or threatening conditions.

TORNADO WARNING--means a tornado has been reported or detected by radar. If you're close to the tornado, TAKE COVER IMMEDIATELY, or be prepared to take cover whenever you see or hear a tornado.

At home: get away from windows, doors and outside walls. Go to a first floor bathroom, closet or room in the center of the house, and if possible, under heavy furniture or cover heads.

At school: get to the lowest floor or basement, or interior small rooms or halls. Stay away from windows and large areas (auditoriums & gyms).

In public buildings: go to a designated shelter area or an interior hallway or small room on a low floor. DO NOT GO TO YOUR PARKED CAR.

In open country: move at right angles away from the tornado path, if possible. If there is no time, leave your car and lie flat in a ditch or depression. Avoid large trees, metal poles and other possible electrical conductors.

In Mobile homes: should be abandoned immediately. If there is no reinforced building or underground shelter nearby, take cover in a ditch or depression.

DO NOT LEAVE YOUR SHELTER UNTIL THE STORM THREAT IS PAST.



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



related to this system. The most common symptoms are aggressive behavior, excessive salivation, and disorientation. Some animals exhibit a form of rabies known as "dumb" rabies in which the animal is immobile and appears to stare into space. Cattle that have rabies are often reported to be choking and will bellow constantly. When the animal is examined, nothing is found to be blocking the passage of food.

A rabies suspect should be avoided if possible. Exposure to the saliva of a suspected rabid animal could be dangerous. Any area of the body exposed should be cleaned thoroughly. The animal should be detained for further evaluation. If the animal cannot be detained alive, it should be destroyed and taken to your local veterinarian for submission to the state lab in Austin. If the animal has to be destroyed,

we would have to have a suitable hotel to take care of the trade. Ranger citizens got after their problem early and the Gholson Hotel was built and completed long before Eastland and Cisco came up with something comparable.

I have read some of the stories of the days when mud on the Main Street in downtown Ranger was so bad that one had to pay to get transportation across the street on a horse-drawn sledge just to the other side. I personally was too young to have any memory on this at all. Nor do I know when the first downtown street in Ranger was paved. But it was a long time ago and I think it was in place by 1920, or at least in the early part of the '20s.

It took two attempts to get a nice up-to-date hotel in Eastland. The first attempt failed. I have no idea who formed the corporate or business structure that attempted to build at the site immediately west of the Exchange Building. These two buildings are now only separated by a narrow concrete alley that is not open to auto transportation.

The original attempt did dig up the basement and erected a flock of concrete pillars but never got so far to lay a brick. I suppose this failure to complete the building was due to lack of money to finish the job. So as a result this old skeleton job stood as an eyesore for several years.

Finally, however, a firm that apparently was financed by the Jesse Jones interest of Houston decided they would scrap the partial construction and with new plans from the beginning started work on the present building.

The Jones interest in Houston was headed by Jesse Jones who was one of the wealthiest men in Houston and a power in Texas and national politics. Among his real estate holdings were both the Rice Hotel, then the largest hotel in the South, and the Houston Chronicle,

the afternoon paper for Houston.

The Chronicle was across the street from the Rice Hotel. I do not know what the names of these two streets were but the hotel occupied all of a block on one side and at least part of the block on two sides. I remember reading where on the big wigs in Houston once suggested that as Jones had both sides and two corners in this part of two that the Houston City Commission ought to change the names of these streets to Jones. Then this location would be Jones and Jones.

So construction got underway and the hotel was completed about 1928 I think it was. At the time it was finished my brother Rex had a paper route delivering the Eastland Telegram to about a 100 homes here in Eastland.

His boss was Winifred Crossley, who was the circulation manager of the Telegram then. Its office and print shop were on Plummer just east of where Buddy Aaron now has his insurance office. The building is still in use and is still standing and one can see that the signs on the side of the building advertising it as a paper.

Ordinary Rex could carry all 100 papers in a large shoulder bag the publisher furnished for its delivery boys to use. And he could easily cover the route on his bicycle without an undue effort on his part nor any strain on the bike. But then came the Sunday edition celebrating the opening of the Connellee Hotel.

That special job that was several days in printing as a lot of the feature stuff carried was not spot news. This issue must have had 100 pages in it. It was impossible for Rex to deliver the paper so I had to get out Mother's Hupmobile. We got the papers delivered but it wore Rex out so badly that he turned his bag back in to Mr. Crossley the very next week.

Several years after

the hotel was finished I remember hearing one of the investors in the original venture that failed complaining that although he had invested money in the first attempt, the present management would not give him a discount on a room if he wanted to stay there. Of course they wouldn't. The people who built the hotel had nothing to do with the failed attempt to build.

Back to who Jesse Jones was. Toward the end of President Hoover's term of office and when the Democrats gained control of Congress the President and Congress decided to start a PWA (this is not to be confused with the WPA which came along a little later after Roosevelt became President) for the building of special projects all over the country to try to stem the Depression. President Hoover decided to do this job he would put a Democrat in as head of the PWA. That appointment was Jesse Jones.

Jesse Jones and Amon Carter, who in turn was the publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and also a wealthy man in real estate himself, decided that they ought to have a joint operation in the form of a special correspondent in Washington. So they sent Mr. Sillman Evans to Washington to represent them and their papers. He as a reporter for one of these papers before going to Washington but I am not sure which one it was, but I am thinking he worked first for the Houston paper.

After being in Washington several years Jesse Jones had an insurance company that was under a PWA loan that was having trouble meeting its expenses. Jesse appointed Evans to take over the operation of this compa-

ny on behalf of the government. Evans complained that he did not know anything about the insurance business and was not qualified for such a job. Mr. Jones reportedly told his that is the reason I want you in there. I want someone I can trust who is not interested in the insurance business ad see if we can't get this company straightened out. Apparently he did. At one time Roosevelt appointed Sillman Evans to be Fourth Assistant Postmaster General of the United States. It was his job to oversee that all of the transportation and transportation cost of the pot office was handled in a businesslike manner. With his experience with failed companies or companies that were having trouble meeting their financial obligations Mr. Evans discovered what he thought was a good deal if he could buy it in the form of a Nashville newspaper called the Nashville Tennessean. He got together enough capital to buy this paper.

During his reporting days he covered Marshall Ratliff's trial here on Eastland. While here he met and later married a Cisco girl. It is interesting to note that he came to Amon Carter's funeral when it was held in Fort Worth and died in his bed that same night while a guest at the Fort Worth Club where he stayed when in Fort Worth. During his lifetime he was very active in the press association and the newspaper business in Tennessee one of his boys was named Amon Carter Evans. The last time I was in Nashville I noticed that the paper listed Amon Carter Evans as its publisher. This indicated to me that the family has kept the firm alive.

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FISHING OUTDOORS

The first of seven events for the West Region Anglers Choice Team events was held Feb. 19th at Lake Colorado City. This small warm water lake has traditionally turned out some heavy strings of bass during the winter months. But as luck would have it the T.U. Electric plant was down for repairs. This does two things, drops the water temperatures over most of the lake and it does not produce any current.

Despite these negatives, fishing was still fair. Crankbaits and jigs were reported as the top baits. Chunk rock banks and boat docks in 13 feet of water were the favorite areas.

Our top 5 finishers were: 1st Bob Koncak and Rick Martin of Graford, TX., 3 fish, 17.26, \$1,000 and Big Bass of 9.73, \$222.00; 2nd Gary Carr of San Angelo and Trevor Romans of Grapevine, 3 fish, 14.83, \$540 and second Big Bass 9.14, \$148; 3rd Earl Armstrong of Midland and Monty Kirby of San Angelo, 3 fish, 12.53, \$375; 4th Gary Harton of Ranger and Bobby Maynard of Eastland, 3 fish, 11.38, \$300; and 5th Mark Bedunah of Euless and Alan Gregston of San Angelo, 3 fish, 10.46, \$250. A total of \$3,130.00 was paid to 7 places. Eighth places received prizes sponsored by Great Outdoors, Bill Lewis Lures, Streamline, Fishing Outdoors, Fullen Motor and Boxey Lures.

A total of 39 teams weighed 42 fish, weighing 132.70 pounds. Eighteen of our teams zeroed this first event.

Our next event will be held at Possum Kingdom Lake March 12. Headquarters and weigh-in will take place at Possum Hollow Marina. For more information phone (817) 629-3255.

This past weekend the 915/817 region of B.A.S.S. held its opener for the

Roadrunner events. The Breckenridge Club hosted this event Saturday.

The top baits were white crankbaits and black and blue power lizards. 1st place went to Charles Credicott, Breckenridge, 5 fish, 18.92; 2nd Tommy Maynard, 5 fish, 17.52; 3rd and 1st Big Bass Ed Henry, Breckenridge, 3 fish, 10.73, B.B. 8.07; 4th Terry Wilson, Eastland, 2 fish, 8.95, 2nd B.B. 7.02; 5th Glenn Todd, Graham, 3 fish, 7.84.

A few March events coming are: West Texas Bass Trial March 4 Lake Brownwood; March 12th Anglers Choice Team, Possum Kingdom; March 19th, Brownwood Club Open, Lake Brownwood.

If you are looking for really big crappie Hubbard Creek is the place to be. In the past 3 weeks there have been some monsters reported. A 3 pound, 9 ounce; 3 pound, 11 ounce and a unverified 4 pound, 2 ounce. The Hubbard Creek side is where the big ones are coming from, but Sandy Creek still has the numbers.

Austin - Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries offices spent much of the fall and winter conducting gill net and electrofishing surveys to gain information on the status of game fish populations and their fisheries potential.

Information concerning age and growth, reproduction and length frequency distribution within a population is collected. The accumulation of data over several years enables department personnel to detect changes in fish populations and provides a firm base upon which management decisions can be made.

Reports from some of the lakes surveyed, many of which are small lakes less than 500 acres in size,

are listed below.

Lake Austin
Fall electrofishing data indicates the largemouth bass population in this 1,830-acre reservoir has improved significantly since 1989, said Steve Magnelia, TPWD biologist in San Marcos.

The total electrofishing catch rate has risen from 62.7 bass per hour in 1989 to 96.7 in 1994, the highest catch rate ever at the reservoir. Largemouth bass at least 14 inches long have almost doubled, going from 4.67 in 1989 to 8.0 last fall. The proportion of adult bass 15 inches and larger in the population has increased from 3 percent to 14 percent. Five bass greater than 18 inches were collected in 1994 compared to only one in 1989.

Magnelia said a 14-inch minimum length limit established in 1986 has helped. Since 1986, the catch rate of bass 10 inches and longer has increased from 15.5 per hour to 18.5 in 1988 to 30 per hour in 1989. In 1994, the rate increased to 35 per hour.

In 1989, about 15 percent of largemouth bass sampled had Florida bass influence; this past fall, 56 percent of bass surveyed had Florida influence. In 1994, 27 percent of bass sampled were pure Florida bass and 21 percent were first generation hybrids.

Lake Brownwood
A fall crappie survey showed numbers of white crappie 5 inches or longer to be similar to 1992 when 15 percent of adult white crappie were legal size. Thirteen percent were legal in 1994. Spencer Dumont, TPWD biologist in Abilene, said 20 percent of adult white crappie typically are legal size (10 inches) on other area lakes.

Lake Clyde
This lake, which has been surveyed five times since 1987, has an average crappie population, Dumont said. Adult white crappie numbers have

remained fairly stable and slightly higher than the area average. About one third of adult white crappie were legal size. Previously, only 3 percent to 26 percent have been legal size.

Lake Coleman
The adult white crappie in this lake is similar to other area lakes. The numbers have fluctuated up and down over the years - the 1994 survey indicated the population is on an upward swing. The number of legal size crappie was similar to previous years at Coleman.

Lake Daniels
Lake Daniels appears to have the best white crappie population of the Abilene-area lakes sampled by the department this fall, Dumont said. The number of adult white crappie was more

than six times higher than the area average and fish up to 15 inches long were collected.

This year's sample at Daniels was the second highest catch rate of legal size crappie ever recorded from area lakes (sampling began in 1987).

Fort Brown Resaca
This 60-acre lake in Brownsville is more like a pond than other resacas in the area with its complete shoreline not connected directly to any other resaca sections, said Mike Reed, TPWD biologist in Mathis. The lake has abundant numbers of smallmouth buffalo, tilapia and Rio Grande perch. Channel catfish are stocked annually and catfish up to 18 inches were collected. Freshwater drum also are present.

Lake Nueces
This 32-acre lake north

of Uvalde has large numbers of largemouth bass, evidenced by the 52 bass collected in 30 minutes of electrofishing. John Wray, TPWD technician in San Antonio, said not only is this a relatively high density, but a length distribution of 2 inches to 17 inches indicates a healthy, balanced population.

About 8 percent of the bass were above the legal minimum length limit of 14 inches. Wray said few were of harvestable size, but the potential exists for a good catch and release fishery with 25 percent of those surveyed at least 12 inches long.

Twenty-eight catfish were collected - 16 by gill nets and 12 by electrofishing. Nine of the 16 netted fish surveyed were 12 inches or longer. Thirty minutes of electrofishing produced 91 sunfish, including bluegill, longear and redbreast sunfish. Thirty-three sunfish were at least 6 inches long.

Resaca de la Guerra
Running along the north and east sides of Brownsville, this resaca has an abundant sunfish population (bluegill and redear) as well as warmouth, white crappie and largemouth bass, Reed said. Growth rates for these fish are good because of the abundance of habitat and food present.

Town Resaca
Town Resaca runs through the heart of

Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram, Ranger Times, Sunday, March 5, 1995

Brownsville. This lake supports bluegill, white and black crappie and largemouth bass. Reed said bass up to 17 inches long were collected. Tilapia and channel catfish also were collected.

Other Lakes
Samples from Fort Phantom Hill, Graham and Kirby indicated below average white crappie populations. Fort Phantom Hill surveys showed a below average

population but angier surveys indicate some nice catches were made around boat docks and brush piles this fall. Kirby's crappie population is dominated by small, slow growing fish with few legal size fish available. The number of adult and legal size white crappie at Graham have improved since the last sample in 1990, but abundance remains low compared to area lakes.

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Judge Bailey To Participate In Regional, National Conferences

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey had been appointed as a delegate to a Regional Conference on Aging, and also as a Delegate to White House Conference.

The Regional Conference will be held at the Hilton Towers in Dallas on March 26, 27 and 28, and the White House Conference will be held at the Hilton Towers, Washington D.C. May 2-5.

At these Conferences Judge Bailey will be a representative of the office of the Governor of Texas. Walter Graham of Abilene will represent the office of Congressman Charles Stenholm.

Judge Bailey says that the Dallas Conference will include discussion and working on issues to be carried on to Washington.

At this 1995 White House Conference he expects the issues to fall into these general categories: Economic Security for Seniors, Health and Well Being, Long Term Care, and Housing and Transportation.

The White House Conference will bring together thousands of delegates from around the United States. It is expected to provide quite a forum for issues affecting older people, and new legislation will probably come from it.

The first Conference of this type was called by President Harry Truman in 1950, and only three have been held since. The most recent White House Conference on Aging was held in 1981.

The 1981 meeting came at a time when inflation was a great concern. There was also an increased awareness of diminishing natural resources.

The Conference brought out many topics of concern to older Americans, including discrimination, elder abuse, housing, adult education and long-term health care.

This Conference also helped fend off cuts in Social Security. The 1995 Conference is also expected to have debates and recommendations on Social Security.

Judge Bailey is expected to contribute input to these meetings, for he has dealt with the needs of the elderly for many years.

His personal interest in the subject probably began in his childhood in Cisco, when a very dear grandmother lived for a time with his family.

Later his mother, Mrs. Maude Bailey, was a highly esteemed senior citizen of this area.

As a young State Congressman in 1961, Bailey co-sponsored a bill providing Homestead Tax exemptions for the elderly.

When he became Eastland County Judge in 1963 he began working with elderly people on problems - some of them concerning Old Age Assistance.

When the Older Americans Act came into existence community action services were set up, the Judge recalls. In 1975 the 19-County West Central Texas Council of Governments set up an Area Agency on Aging. Nutrition programs and vari-

ous services were begun in Eastland County towns.

Judge Bailey has served in several official capacities for WCTCOG, including Vice-Chairman in 1983. He also served as Chairman of the Citizens Advisory Council from 1984-89.

He has also worked on a Committee on Elder Rights.

Judge Bailey was admitted to the State Bar of Texas in 1980, and his legal knowledge has been useful for the Seniors of this area. Over the years he has given individual attention to any elderly person who came to his office with a problem.

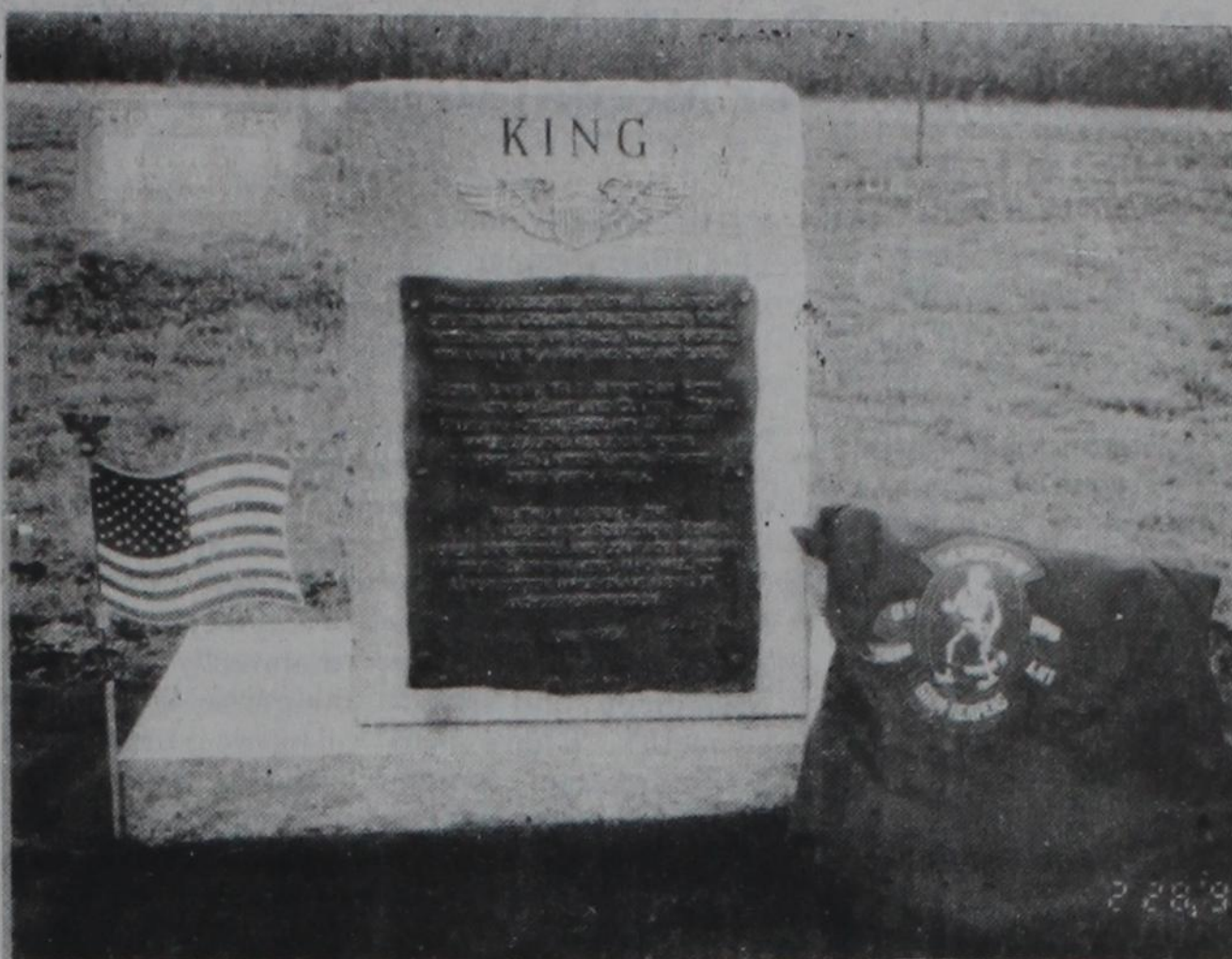
"I estimate there are around 5,000 people in Eastland County past 60 years old," the Judge says.

He lists their main needs as protective services, economic security, medical care, transportation, and proper information on how to deal with insurance, estate planning and the like.

Another thing - Judge Bailey notes that the school systems prepare students for an active life and how to make a living - but there is almost no education on how to prepare for retirement and aging.

Judge Bailey says that he considers it a privilege to serve on the up-coming Conferences on Aging.

"I hope to bring some insight from the meetings back to Eastland County," he says.

Blue Ribbon Day Highlights People With Mental Illness or Mental Retardation

On March 2nd, Texas Independence Day, people throughout the state wore blue lapel ribbons and conducted Blue Ribbon Day special events to spotlight the potential in everyone who has a mental illness or mental retardation. The blue ribbons signify that individuals with mental disabilities are winners, and they deserve the chance to become independent, contributing citizens of Texas. Blue Ribbon Day is sponsored by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TXMHMR), state MHMR facilities and community MHMR centers.

Among those who plan to celebrate Blue Ribbon Day is Dana Daily. Since her mother's death a year ago, 37-year-old Daily has needed a little extra assistance. She has Down's syndrome.

"MHMR has helped me a lot. They taught me how to cook and do laundry and now I can do it for myself," Daily said.

Currently, Daily said, she lives in a group home sponsored by Dallas Country MHMR, but she has dreams of having her own apartment one day soon.

Ann Keller is another Blue Ribbon winner. She is a member of Partners in Policymaking, an advocacy group for people who have a disability, and she knows firsthand about the potential of people with mental retardation. "Some of us need help, but most of us don't need a lot of help," Keller said of the group's and her own strengths. "I have mental retardation," she explained. "I have a reading disability and some other problems, but with a little help I have my own apartment. I have a lot of independence."

Keller works as a nurse's aide's assistant in a nursing home in the Dallas area.

Like Daily and Keller, Greg Beavins has experienced the satisfaction of striving to achieve his hopes and dreams, just as other people do.

"There's no shame in having a mental illness," said Beavins. "It doesn't mean anyone did anything wrong. Even though a person might be diagnosed (with having a mental illness), there's no reason that person can't seek help and most likely lead a productive life."

He should know. Beavins, who has been diagnosed with depression, works for Dallas County MHMR as a transitional into lives outside the hospital. He sees individuals with mental illnesses become more independent every day.

"Anyway," he added, "there really isn't any such thing as being normal. We all have our little quirks."

This is the third year that consumers of mental health and mental retardation services, family members, MHMR employees and supporters at state and local levels have observed Blue Ribbon Day.

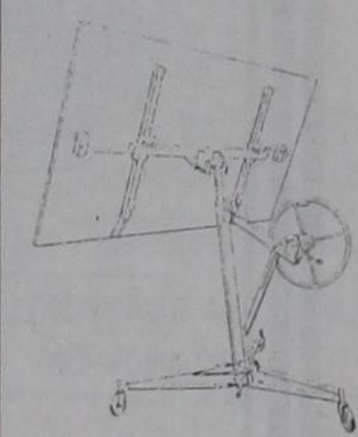

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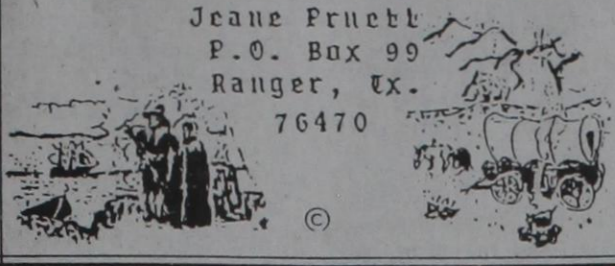

...NEW HAMPSHIRE 1742 ESTATE LIST, by Pauline Johnson Osterline. Reviewed by Jeanne Pruett.

This important new reference provides information on the heads of households in New Hampshire in 1742, and helps to span the dismal gap between the 1742 enumeration and the Association Test Lists of 1776.

In the 1742 New Hampshire Estate List we find over seven hundred different surnames, many with only one or two representatives. Surnames with roots particular to New Hampshire include COLBATH, CRAM, DEARBORN, FOGG, KENISTON, LAMPREY, PHILBRICK, RAND, SANBORN, SHERBURNE, AND TOWLE. Surnames with

more than thirty heads of household include BATTLE, BROWN, DOW, PAGE, SANBORN and SMITH.

When Benning Wentworth took office as Royal Governor of New Hampshire in December of 1741 he was under instructions from the King to prepare a census of the population. The enumeration made the following summer, and published here for the first time, did not follow precisely the King's instructions; it lists by name only polls and omits all mention of women and children, except the occasional reference to "widow." The good news is that it provides some detailed statistical information on the numbers of houses owned, the amount and types of land owned, and on the various types of livestock owned by each head of

household. Thus it is certain to become an essential reference for New Hampshire genealogists, historians, sociologists, etc.

Much useful information can be gleaned from the statistical presentation for individual households. The number of polls is of considerable interest, being evidence for the likely presence of adult sons or brothers in a household when the number is more than one. Over 2,800 individuals in nineteen towns are named here.

The present work is Special Publication Number One of the New Hampshire Society of Genealogists, and we hope it is just the first of many such basic references. HB

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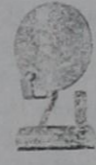
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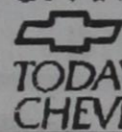
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Local Girl Scouts Receive Silver Award

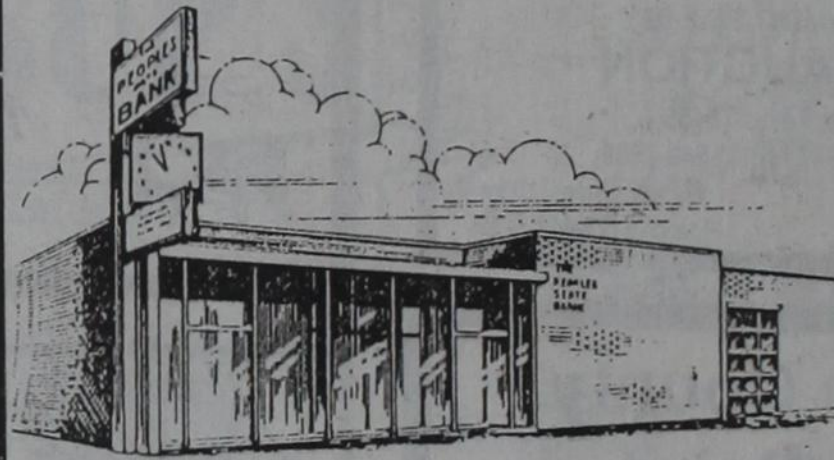
