





Ms. Walton, the suit claims, appeared before the board on Dec. 22nd with an informal oral grievance, and by hand-delivered letter dated Feb. 9th, 1995, to Administrator Carr, sought to present a written grievance pursuant to any grievance procedure which the hospital may have. Ms. Carr in a letter dated Feb. 14th, advised Ms. Walton that "Eastland Memorial Hospital does not maintain an employee grievance procedure." The suit re-states that Ms. Walton believes that she was discriminated and retaliated against and falsely accused for reporting what she believed to be violations.

The suit asks equitable relief, including but not limited to reinstatement and an award of lost past and future compensation, compensatory and exemplary damages, interests, attorney's fees. additional legal or equitable relief, for total damages not in excess of \$20,000,000.

TORNADO WARNING -- means a tornado has been reported or detected by radar. If you're close to the tornado, TAKE COVER IMMEDIATELY, or be prepared to take cover whenever you see or hear a tornado.

At home: get away from windows, doors and outside walls. Go to a first floor bathroom, closet or room in the center of the house, and if possible, under heavy furniture or cover heads.

At school: get to the lowest floor or basement, or interior small rooms or halls. Stay away from windows and large areas (auditoriums & gyms).

In public buildings: go to a designated shelter area or an interior hallway or small room on a low floor. DO NOT GO TO YOUR PARKED CAR.

In open country: move at right angles away from the tornado path, if possible. If there is no time, leave your car and lie flat in a ditch or depression. Avoid large trees, metal poles and other possible electrical conductors.

In Mobile homes: should be abandoned immediately. If there is no reinforced building or underground shelter nearby, take cover in a ditch or depression.

His boss was Winifred Crossley, who was the circulation manager of the Telegram then. Its office and print shop were on Plummer just east of where Buddy Aaron now has his insurance office. The building is still in use and is still concrete alley that is not open to auto transstanding and one can see that the signs on the side of the building ad-

vertising it as a paper. Ordinary Rex could carry all 100 papers in a large shoulder bag the publisher furnished for its delivery boys to use. Information concerning age and growth, reproduction and length frequency distribution within a population is collected. The accumulation of data over several years enables department personnel to detect changes in fish populations and provides a firm base upon which management decisions can be made.

Reports from some of the lakes surveyed, many of which are small lakes less than 500 acres in size,

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

Fall electrofishing data indicates the largemouth bass population in this 1,830-acre reservoir has improved significantly since 1989, said Steve Magnelia, TPWD biologist in San Marcos.

The total electrofishing catch rate has risen from 62.7 bass per hour in 1989 to 96.7 in 1994, the highest catch rate ever at the reservoir. Largemouth bass at least 14 inches long have almost doubled, going from 4.67 in 1989 to 8.0 last fall. The proportion of adult bass 15 inches and larger in the population has increased from 3 percent to 14 percent. Five bass greater than 18 inches were collected in 1994 compared to only one in 1989.

Magnelia said a 14-inch minimum length limit established in 1986 has helped. Since 1986, the catch rate of bass 10 inches and longer has increased from 15.5 per hour to 18.5 in 1988 to 30 per hour in 1989. In 1994, the rate increased to 35

per hour. In 1989, about 15 percent of largemouth bass sampled had Florida bass influence; this past fall, 56 percent of bass surveyed had Florida influence. In 1994, 27 percent of bass sampled were pure Florida bass and 21 percent were first generation hybrids.

Lake Brownwood

A fall crappie survey showed numbers of white crappie 5 inches or longer to be similar to 1992 when 15 percent of adult white crappie were legal size. Thirteen percent were legal in 1994. Spencer Dumont, TPWD biologist in Abilene, said 20 percent of adult white crappie typically are legal size (10 inches) on other area

Lake Clyde This lake, which has been surveyed five times since 1987, has an average crappie population, Dumont said. Adult white

The adult white crappie in this lake is similar to other area lakes. The numbers have fluctuated up and down over the years - the 1994 survey indicated the population is on an upward swing. The number of legal size crappie was similar to previous years at Cole-

Lake Daniels

Lake Daniels appears to have the best while crappie population of the Abilene-area sampled by the department this fall, Dumont said. The number of adult white crappie was more than six times higher than the area average and fish up to 15 inches long were

This year's sample at Daniels was the second highest catch rate of legal size crappie ever recorded from area lakes (sampling began in 1987).

Fort Brown Resaca This 60-acre lake in Brownsville is more like a pond than other resacas in the area with its complete shoreline not connected directly to any other resaca sections, said Mike Reed, TPWD biologist in Mathis. The lake has abundant numbers of smallmouth buffalo, tilapia and Rio Grande perch. Channel catfish are stocked annually and catfish up to 18 inches were collected. Freshwater drum also are present.

> Lake Nueces This 32-acre lake north

of Uvalde has large numbers of largemouth bass, evidenced by the 52 bass collected in 30 minutes of electrofishing. John Wray, TPWD technician in San Antonio, said not only is this a relatively high density, but a length distribution of 2 inches to 17 inches indicates a healthy, balanced population. About 8 percent of the

bass were above the legal minimum length limit of 14 inches. Wray said few were of harvestable size, but the potential exists for a good catch and release fishery with 25 percent of those surveyed at least 12 inches long.

Twenty-eight catfish were collected - 16 by gill nets and 12 by electrofishing. Nine of the 16 netted fish surveyed were 12 inches or longer. Thirty minutes of electrofishing produced 91 sunfish, including bluegill, longear and redbreast sunfish. Thirty-three sunfish were at least 6 inches long.

Resaca de la Guerra Running along the north and east sides of Brownsville, this resaca has an abundant sunfish population (bluegill and redear) as well as warmouth, white crappie and largemouth bass, Reed said. Growth rates for these fish are good because of the abundance of habitat and food present.

Town Resaca Town Resaca runs through the heart of

Brownsville. This lake supports bluegill, white and black crappie and largemouth bass. Reed said bass up to 17 inches long were collected. Tilapia and channel catfish also were collected.

Other Lakes

Samples from Fort Phantom Hill, Graham and Kirby indicated below average white crappie populations. Fort Phantom Hill surveys showed a below average

population but angler surveys indicate some nice catches were made around boat docks and brush piles this fall. Kirby's crappie population is dominated by small, slow growing fish with few legal size fish available. The number of adult and legal size white crappie at Graham have improved since the last sample in 1990, but abundance remains low compared to area lakes.

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
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
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. Judge Bailey To Participate In Regional, National Conferances

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey had been appointed as a delegate to a Regional Conference on Aging, and also as a Delegate to White House Conference.

The Regional Conference will be held at the Hilton Towers in Dallas on March 26, 27 and 28, and the White House Conference will be held at the Hilton Towers, Washington D.C. May 2-5.

At these Conferences Judge Bailey will be a representative of the office of the Governor of Texas. Walter Graham of Abilene will represent the office of Congressman Charles Stenholm.

Judge Bailey says that the Dallas Conference will include discussion and working on issues to be carried on to Washington.

At this 1995 White House Conference he expects the issues to fall into these general categories: Economic Security for Seniors, Health and Well Being, Long Term Care, and Housing and Transportation.

The White House Conference will bring together thousands of delegates from around the United States. It is expected to provide quite a forum for issues affecting older people, and new legislation will probably come

The first Conference of this type was called by President Harry Truman in 1950, and only three have been held since. The most recent White House Conference on Aging was held in 1981.

The 1981 meeting came at a time when inflation was a great concern. There was also an increased awareness of diminishing natural resources.

The Conference brought out many topics of concern to older Americans, including discrimination, elder abuse, housing, adult education and longterm health care.

This Conference also helped fend off cuts in Social Security. The 1995 Conference is also expected to have debates and recommendations on Social Security.

Judge Bailey is expected to contribute input to these meetings, for he has dealt with the needs of the elderly for many years.

His personal interest in the subject probably began in his childhood in Cisco, when a very dear grandmother lived for a time with his family.

Later his mother, Mrs. Maude Bailey, was a highly esteemed senior citizen of this area.

As a young State Congressman in 1961, Bailey co-sponsored a bill providing Homestead Tax exemptions for the elderly.

When he became-Eastland County Judge in 1963 he began working with elderly people on problems - some of them concerning Old Age Assistance.

When the Older Americans Act came into existance community action services were set up, the Judge recalls. In 1975 the 19-County West Central Texas Council of Governments set up an Area Agency on Aging. Nutrition programs and vari-

ous services were begun in Eastland County

Judge Bailey has served in several official capacities for WCTCOG, including Vice-Chairman in 1983. He also served as Chairman of the Citizens Advisory Council from 1984-89.

He has also worked on a Committee on Elder Rights.

Judge Bailey was admitted to the State Bar of Texas in 1980, and his legal knowledge has been useful for the Seniors of this area. Over the years he has given individual attention to any elderly person who came to his office with a problem.

"I estimate there are around 5,000 people in Eastland County past 60 years old," the Judge says.

He lists their main needs as protective services, economic security, medical care, transportation, and proper information on how to deal with insurance, estate planning and the like.

Another thing - Judge Bailey notes that the school systems prepare students for an active life and how to make a living but there is almost no education on how to prepare for retirement and

Judge Bailey says that he considers it a privilege to serve on the up-coming Conferences on Aging.

"I hope to bring some insight from the meetings back to Eastland County," he says.

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
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Memorial Monument In Honor of Lt. Col. Walter Siler King



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

On March 2nd, Texas Independence Day, people throughout the state wore blue lapel ribbons and conducted Blue Ribbon Day special events to spotlight the potential in everyone who has a mental illness or mental retardation. The blue ribbons signify that individuals with mental disabilities are winners, and they deserve the chance to become independent, contributing citizens of Texas. Blue Ribbon Day is sponsored by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TXMHMR), state MHMR facilities and community MHMR cen-

Among those who plan to celebrate Blue Ribbon Day is Dana Daily. Since her mother's death a year ago, 37-year-old Daily has needed a little extra assistance. She has Down's syndrone.

"MHMR has helped me a lot. They taught me how to cook and do laundry and now I can do it for myself," Daily said.

Currently, Daily said, she lives in a group home sponsored by Dallas Country MHMR, but she has dreams of having her own apartment one day soon.

Ann Keller is another Blue Ribbon winner. She is a member of Partners in Policymaking, an advocacy group for people who have a disability, and she knows firsthand about the potential of people with mental retardation.

"Some of us need help, but most of us don't need a lot of help," Keller said of the group's and her own strength's. "I have mental retardation," she explained. "I have a reading disability and some other problems, but with a little help I have my own apartment. I have a lot of independence."

Keller works as a nurse's aide's assistant in Day. a nursing home in the Dallas area.

Like Daily and Keller, Greg Beavins has experienced the satisfaction of striving to achieve his hopes and dreams, just as other people do.

"There's no shame in having a mental illness," said Beavins. "It doesn't mean anyone did anything wrong. Even though a person might be diag- speak on Historical nosed (with having a mental illness), there's no reason that person can't seek help and most likely lead a productive life."

He should know. Beavins, who has been diagnosed with depression, works for Dallas County MHMR as a transitional into lives outside the hospital. He sees individuals with mental illnesses become more independent every day.

"Anyway," he added, "there really isn't any such thing as being normal. We all have our little quirks."

more than thirty heads of household include BAT-CHELDER, BROWN, DOW, PAGE, SAN-BORN and SMITH.


