THE WORLD HAS seen during the past week or two the difference of living in a country having freedom of information, and one in which the news is controlled by the government.

The following editorial, written by Noel C. Gordon in the Quay County (N.M.) Sun last Saturday, pretty well sums up our feelings in the situation:

The Soviet Union is experiencing more than nuclear fallout after the nuclear accident in Chernobyl.

Of course, the radioactive rain is the primary concern worldwide. Western Europe has experienced radiation levels on the average of 10-15 times above normal with some areas in Norway claiming 60 times more radiation. As yet, the United States has not experienced fallout from the accident. If and when it does, such fallout is not expected · to be significant or dangerous.

For the Ukraine and its capital of Kiev, just 80 miles away from the disaster, the effects of the fallout could be horrible. World prices of corn and wheat have already skyrocketed in anticipation of the possible poisoning of Soviet crops. The water supply to Kiev may be affected as well as dairy products and produce. It will be years, probably decades before the human cost in terms of future cancers and genetic damage can be measured. At present, the numbers of deaths and injuries coming out of Russia are not believed by U.S. intelligence. The Soviets claim two dead, 197 injured--18 seriously. Other estimates put the human cost much higher. The land within 30 miles of the plant could be poisoned, perhaps unapproachable for decades to come, or it may have escaped relatively easily. How the radiation has affected the Soviet populace is not known, the extent of the nuclear spill is not known, why the accident occurred is not known, and the Russians aren't talking. When the accident occurred at Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania in 1980, there was a similar reticence by the company to disclose just what had happened and to what extent. Rule Is Given On Runoffs

However, those voters who did not vote at all in either primary can still participate in the runoff elections, to be held June 7.

One of the purposes of having your voter's card stamped "Democratic" or "Republican" is to prevent voters from swapping parties for the runoffs. If you voted Republican last Saturday, you have to stick to the Republican runoff, and vice versa. For the runoff election, voters are asked to bring their yellow registration card. However, if you do not have your card, you will still be able to vote.

On the backs of the registration cards, these words appear: You may vote without your certificate by signing an affidavit at the polling place. If you lose your certificate, you may request a replacement certificate by won contacting the voter registrar.
