Four Charged With Deception Business Practices

County Sheriff Bob Richardson reports that on Wednesday, May 22 his Department made an arrest of four individuals on the charge of deceptive business practices.

Charged were Jeffrey Dobbs, Terry Gordy, Sandra Patterson and Oscar Hutchins, all of Ranger. They are being held in the Eastland County Jail on bonds of \$15,00 each.

Recently these four opened up a shop at the old Ranger Hill Truck Stop. They are accused of preying on unsuspected elderly people traveling on I-20, by telling them they needed car repairs when they did not.

At the time of their arrest the four individuals were under investigation by the Department of Public Safety and the Sheriff's Department for suspected fraud. Their charges came after an

incident Tuesday in which an elderly couple in a motor home stopped at the Love's store in Ranger.

As the couple pulled away, a pickup came up beside them, and reportedly someone in it told them the travelers that the rear end of their motor home appeared to be going out. He told them he could fix it at his shop.

The elderly couple followed the repairman to the shop. There part of the rear of the motor home was removed, and allegedly carried to a car wash and cleaned. Then an attempt was made to sell it back to the couple as a new part at a cost of \$1,000.

There are also other incidents of fraud reported. Apparently the four people arrested here had operations in the Texas Panhandle and New Mexico before coming to Eastland County.

The drivers license, of the lady whose purse was

taken, was reportedly found on one of the two men arrested. The two men were in custody in Fort Worth, but the stolen car and pickup had not been found when this newspaper received the information.

Other vehicles taken locally, and one taken in Fort Worth, had been recovered. A pickup taken locally was damaged when it was driven through a fence. It was taken from the owner by threat of bodily harm by a man who was running from pursuing officers.

91st District Jury Gives Near Maximum Sentence

On May 22, 1996, a felony jury trial was conducted in the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas with Judge Steven R. Herod presiding. The defendant James Daniel Brown was charged with possessing over 50 pounds of marijuana, a second degree felony. The evidence at trial showed that Mr. Brown and a co-defendant were transporting over 700 pounds of marijuana from El Paso to Alabama through Eastland County on Interstate 20. A Department of Public Safety Trooper had made a routine traffic stop on March 18, 1995 and discovered the load of marijuana. After finding Mr. Brown guilty, the jury then as-

essed a seventeen (17) year sentence.

District Attorney Mike Siebert, who prosecuted the case, was grateful that the jury returned a stiff sentence in that Mr. Brown was eligible for probation and twenty years was the maximum allowed under the law. "Seventeen years out of twenty, with no probation, for a first time offender is a great message of deterrence from law abiding citizens of this community to those who traffic in dope" Mr. Siebert said.

The case was investigated by Department of Public Safety Troopers, John Hall and Curtis Price and Department of Public Safety Narcotics officers, Lt. Don Bush and Sgt. Art Casarez.

Comanche County producers are experiencing heavy egg lay and thus spraying has begun. At last check the Eastland County traps are continuing to catch large numbers of moths, but relatively low egg lay has occurred.

However, with the numbers building we should have a signifi-

cant egg lay over the next seven days. With this in mind, an insecticide spray program would be advisable by midweek of May 27-30.

Children's Miracle Network Campaign Follows National 'CMN Sports Champions' Theme

The 1996 Children's Miracle Network Telecast is slated for June 1 and 2, and it's adopting a new theme this year. CMN is moving both its annual campaign and broadcast to a sports format with high-profile sports figures as spokespersons.

The campaign, on both national and local levels, is called "CMN Champions," and it is part of a comprehensive strategy to raise more money for Meek Children's Hospital at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene and the 161 other hospitals nationwide affiliated with CMN. Hopefully this format change will bring a larger audience to the annual broadcast, which is aired on KTAB-TV (32/10).

Meek Children's Hospital at Hendrick serves a 22-county region. It is the largest pediatric hospital between Fort Worth and El Paso.

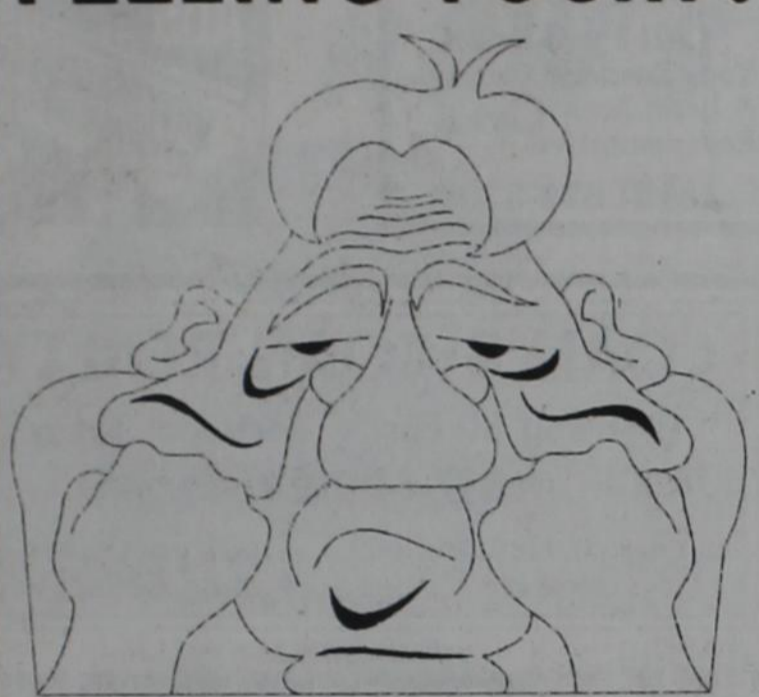

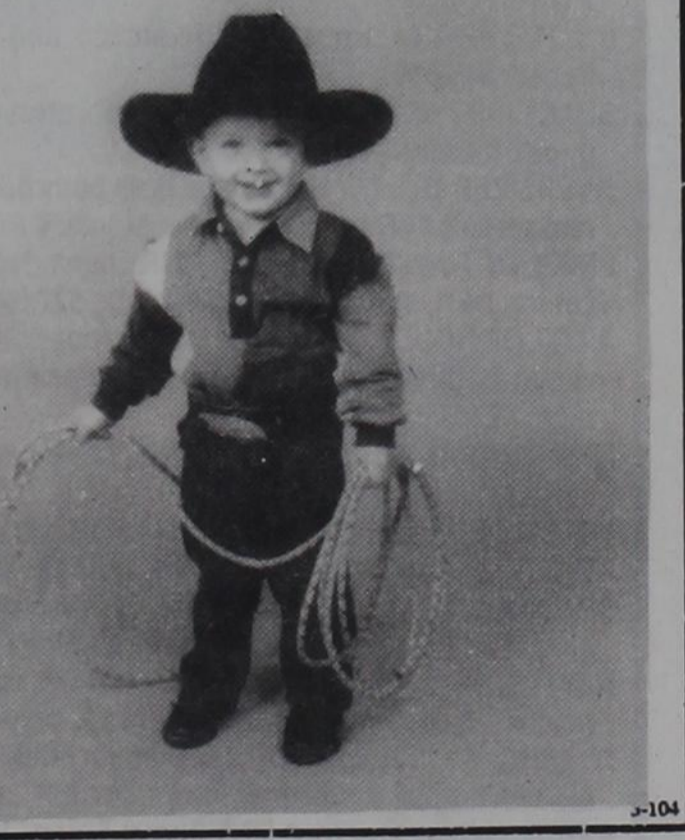

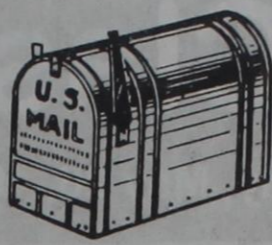

PRIME TIME WITH KIDS

Snacks that Imitate Nature



Strolling in a city park or walking the trails of a local nature preserve on a spring day is a relaxing way to spend time with young children. The seeds, nests, animals, insects, even the air and the light are all part of a natural system with many lessons to teach and learn.

Like most curious kids, yours may want to gather the fascinating critters and plants along the path even though some discoveries aren't meant to join rock and shell collections back home. They are part of a natural system that should stay just where you found them.

When you return, your kids won't feel so empty-handed if you talk about what you saw and heard and transfer that knowledge into a creative snack-making activity. The whole family will have fun imagining the critters and woodlings they've seen that day. Food imitates nature!

SIMPLE SPIDER CRACKER SNACK:
Spread peanut butter on a Ritz Cracker. Set another cracker on top. Poke the ends of chow mein noodles into the peanut butter along the sides of the cracker "sandwich" to resemble spider legs. Add raisin eyes on top using more peanut butter as the glue.

FRUITY BIRD NESTS:
In a mixing bowl, crumble 2 large shredded wheat biscuits with your fingers. Use a spoon to stir in 1/4 cup shredded coconut and 1 tablespoon brown sugar. Pour in 1/4 cup melted margarine or butter. Stir ingredients together.

Line muffin tin cups with aluminum foil. Press the shredded wheat mixture onto the bottoms and up the sides of the foil-lined cups. Bake in a 350F. oven about 10 minutes or until crisp. Cool.

Remove the nests from the cups by lifting up the foil. Carefully peel the foil off the nests. Fill the nests with "fruity" bird eggs. Try red or green grapes, (they really look like birds' eggs), blueberries, strawberries, melon balls or drained canned fruit. Top the fruit with a spoonful of yogurt, if desired.

Father-Daughter Team Leaping Into Action For Young Cancer Patients At M. D. Anderson

Houston— Jeff and Rachel Daly recently sprang into action to support young cancer patients and their families. The father-daughter team celebrated the onset of spring by showcasing a new line of greeting cards—called "Everyday Greetings"—designed by young patients at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center. Proceeds from the sale of cards fund a wide variety of patient-focused programs.

Produced by the Children's Art Project, "Everyday Greetings"

cards and gift items are purchased nationwide through a mail order catalogue. Customers may order a free copy of the catalogue by calling 1-800-231-1580 or 713-792-6266.

Rachel is one of the many beneficiaries of programs funded by the Children's Art Project—and one of the Project's most important designers. Since receiving news of a leukemia diagnosis just three days after Rachel's third birthday eight years ago, the entire Daly family has practically lived at the cancer center.

"At the time, our doctor told us that we were lucky to be at M.D. Anderson because most other institutions did not treat children with her diagnosis," Jeff said. "If you saw Rachel today, you would never think she had been sick a day in her life."

At Age 11—after three relapses and rigorous treatment for her leukemia that has included countless rounds of aggressive chemotherapy and a bone marrow transplant—Rachel is a happy and healthy fifth-grader. Her leukemia is in remission, and unless there are

any complications, she won't be spending much time at M.D. Anderson this year.

Jeff said he is more than happy to spend time promoting the Children's Art Project because he has witnessed first-hand the ways young cancer patients at M.D. Anderson benefit from the cards.

"It's amazing to see the thousands and thousands of volunteers who help the Project and who take such a personal interest in it," Jeff says. "We're grateful to them, and of course, to everyone who purchases cards and gifts from the Project."

Jeff is a member of the Children's Art Project Proceeds Allocation Committee, which determines which programs will receive funds raised from card sales. This year, the committee allocated more than \$840,000 to a variety of patient-focused programs at M.D. Anderson, including one of Rachel's favorites, Camp Star Trails.

"One of the things that kept Rachel going through her years of treatment was her anticipation of going to Camp Star Trails and jumping off the high

diving board. Often, when she got tired of the endless 'How do you feel?' questions, she would respond by telling us what else she planned to do at the camp in a voice loud enough to drown us out," Jeff said.

Since 1983, hundreds of young cancer patients and their siblings have experienced Camp Star Trails and Camp A-OK, both overnight summer camp programs established in keeping with M.D. Anderson's emphasis on normal childhood development. The camps give these youngsters a rare opportunity to experience a typical childhood summer.

Proceeds from the Children's Art Project also fund the salaries of four child life specialists trained to provide therapeutic play and emotional support to the children.

"They hold parties for the children, they play with them, they read to the kids, there's a movie night—the child life specialists are at the very center of the children's lives as they go through treatment at M.D. Anderson," Jeff said.

Other programs made

possible by Children's Art Project support include educational programs such as a year-round school curriculum in the M.D. Anderson classroom. A school liaison visits a patient's school to educate teachers and fellow classmates about the patient's experience as he or she prepares to return home. The Project also provides college scholarships allowing many M.D. Anderson patients to pursue their dreams for the future; more than 40 young people received scholarships last fall.

In addition, the Project funds a beauty shop that offers free wigs, hair care, and scarves for patients who lose their hair during treatment, art supplies, playground toys, an annual ski trip for young amputee patients, family support provided by staff and through the Candlelighters parent-support group, and writing and music therapy classes.

In recent years, Rachel has become a noted designer for the Children's Art Project, creating a Hanukkah card sold in the 1993 season, bluebonnet cards and t-shirts featured in 1994, and a colorful fish card that is included in the current collection of "Everyday Greetings." Rachel also designed a special angel with a big heart glowing in her chest, a depiction of her sister who died of heart complications before Rachel was born. Rachel's angel was featured in the Children's Art Project 20th anniversary "Angel Journal."

Rachel said she likes being a card designer and enjoys all the attention. "It's fun!" she says in her

Why I Believe In Old Rip #8

Will Wood and Webb Ruff were in Washington, D.C. with Old Rip as they continued their tour. However, this was the news in the Eastland paper: "RIP ON WAY TO NATIONAL CAPITAL." Rip is now in Wheeling, WV according to a telegram received by E.E. Wood.

"The famous frog has left St. Louis where he created a wild sensation. Advices from that city are to the effect that the creature drew the greatest crowds that ever flocked to see the animal in the history of St. Louis and the throngs were so great at closing time that attendants had to usher them out in order to close for the day.

"Apparently, the report that the frog had been sold to a zoological society in St. Louis was incorrect."

They registered at "THE MAYFLOWER, Washington's Finest Hotel, an institution in keeping with the beauty and grandeur of the Nation's Capital, Connecticut Avenue at L Street," according to their booklet.

Will was most impressed with Washington and enjoyed telling about it when he returned home.

Cisco Press - Eastland Telegram - Ranger Times-

Sunday,

May 26, 1996

We felt as if we had been on the trip with him. He had quite a collection of newspapers, literature and the hotel booklets.

Boyce House reported this in THE DALLAS MORNING NEWS on February 13, 1938: "The climax of the tour occurred in Washington. Wood called at the office of Earle B. Mayfield, then United States Senator from Texas in the hope of getting an appointment to see President Calvin Coolidge. Mayfield took the matter up with the president in these words: 'Mr. Will Wood of Eastland is in the city and wants to see you.'"

"The Chief Executive replied: 'I'm very busy; I haven't time, Senator.'"

"To which Mayfield countered; 'But he is the man who owns the horned frog.'"

"With unaccustomed eagerness, Coolidge asked; 'Does he have the frog with him? Very well, I'll see him.'"

"Wood was notified that the appointment was for 12 noon sharp. The Texan hurried from his hotel room to Mayfield's office instead of the White House, he was so excited. Advised of his mistake, he ran out and hailed a taxi to dash down Pennsylvania Avenue, with the result that Old Rip kept the President of the United States waiting 15 minutes.

"President Coolidge asked numerous questions concerning his celebrated guest; stroked the frog's back with his horn-rimmed glasses, and the

President and Old Rip gazed steadily at each other for a full minute without a sound - Silent Cal had met his match!"

The press was there from the Washington Post and Old Rip had his picture made with President Calvin Coolidge, Senator Earle B. Mayfield, Will and Webb. It made front page of the May 4th or 5th.

Will was interviewed in the Abilene Reporter-News in 1937: "Old Rip's fame grew by leaps and bounds, and by May 4, I was in Washington, D.C. and had an appointment with President Calvin Coolidge. Insignificant as I was, I kept the president waiting 15 minutes and still didn't lose my appointment - that's how important that frog was!"

"The president asked only the customary questions that most people asked."

"When Will came out of the office, much to his surprise, there were many reporters there wanting to know what the president said."

"Neither the frog nor the president chose to speak!" Will flippantly replied and walked away without the thought ever occurring to him that his statement would be seen in print in every newspaper in the city."

"When he saw the papers, he said, 'I learned my lesson about when and what to say things like that. I never felt so cheap in all my life.'"

Arthur Brisbane, who wrote for the Hearst

Newspapers was one of the first to write about the frog in February, learned about the visit and had it all over the front pages of many newspapers with one headline; "President Kept Waiting 15 Minutes By A Frog."

Many celebrities met Old Rip before the end of the day's activities. Since Webb Ruff was a pilot, they were guests at the Washington banquet honoring the Trans-Atlantic fliers, Captain Koehl, Major James Fitzmaurice and Baron Von Huenefeld. This was from an article by Nuñez Wischkawmper probably from an Abilene paper.

"As a part of the program, the toastmaster introduced Arthur Brisbane and Wood to the audience and to each other. The witty Brisbane said to Wood, 'Mr. Wood I don't believe your frog lived for 31 years in the courthouse without food, water or air, but I hand it to you for getting the publicity.'"

Meanwhile, back in Eastland, the hometown newspaper reported in the VIEWS AND INTER-VIEWS column: "The suggestion that the special train of newspapermen who will write up the national Democratic convention be invited to visit Eastland County for a day, or even for a few hours, is a good one," declared Harry Brelsford, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

"Rip has made Eastland famous and he is adding to that fame every day of his present tour" said J.A. Beard, local capitalist.

"President Coolidge showed great interest in Rip," said E.E. Wood this morning. He had just received a letter from his son, Will, telling of the recent meeting between the president of the United States and Eastland's famous frog. "The president asked many questions about the frog. Lots of newspapermen were on the job and motion pictures were made. The Texas delegation in Congress, when they learned of the frog's presence in Washington, visited the hotel where Wood and S.W. Ruff, who have Rip, were staying.

"Mr. Wood said today that he presumed that the frog and his companions are now in New York City."

"Boyce House wrote in his COWTOWN COLUMNIST published in 1946: "Horned frogs were sold as souvenirs at \$2.50 each during the national Democratic convention in Houston. Small boys of West Texas rounded up horned frogs by the thousands. In fact, so many were shipped out as curiosities that a Department of Agriculture bulletin warned that damage amounting to thousands of dollars would be done if the shipments did not stop, as the frogs preyed on insects that otherwise would devour crops. The Fort Worth Star-Telegram published an editorial suggesting that the legislature prohibit the exportation, lest nature's balance be destroyed."

A frog was shipped and when it arrived, the box had several little ones that had been born enroute. There were many re-

quests for frogs to be shipped.

Col. Dick McCarty wrote an article in the Albany paper that was reprinted in THE MIDLAND REPORTER on March 27, 1928: "THAT FROG MIRACLE OVER AT EASTLAND - Of all the publicity bull, that horned frog miracle at Eastland caps the climax-resurrection ... brining it back to life, after lying in dark tomb for 31 years. Shake, Eastland Boosters, the sheep skin is yours. The very idea of a pool little old horned toad being sealed in a tin box ... Why, shuckiness folks, that's against every known law of nature ... Now, nothing short of a miracle can do a stunt of this kind, and get this, folks, the miracle workers were on the job, sleight of hand jugglers - did you ever attend one of their performances? ... Good job, Eastland County boosters, you cinched your publicity stunt and put it over good and now the famed horned frog and the city of Eastland are front page copy throughout the nation-grave and gowned scientist are trekking to

Eastland to view this frog-wonder ...

"Oh, yes, horned frog farms will spring up all over Eastland County, the demand is going to be great, the fashion monger will catch the spirit and stuffed toad frogs will adorn the headgear of the American women, horned frog lockets on the dainty necks of dame fashion, and the very latest fad for society belles will be stringed beads fashioned out of frog horns. The old saying, 'Found a jewel in a toad's head has proven true. Eastland has found fame and fortune in a horned toad. Smooth game, boys, just wave your wand and keep the spell hot and the shekles will keep—" (the rest of the article has been torn off and lost.)

Just wonder if the Al-

bany paper let Jack McCarty cover the Old Rip famous tour. Also, wonder if THE MIDLAND REPORTER ever wrote of Old Rip's future fame?

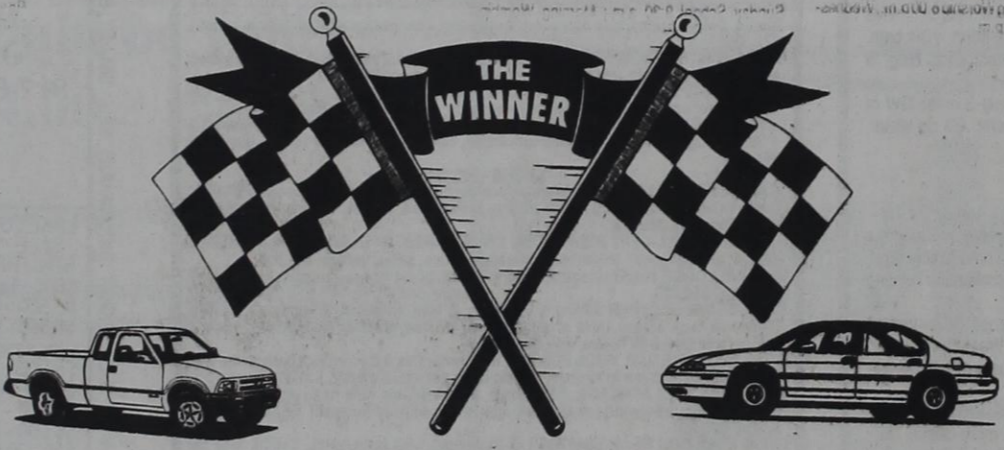
Now to Philadelphia, PA on May 4, 1928 where Will sent the following telegram:

"WE ARE LITTLE BEHIND SCHEDULE STAYED WASHINGTON LONGER THAN WE EXPECTED SPENDING NIGHT HERE WILL GET TO NEW YORK BY NOON TOMORROW SEND MY LETTERS BY AIRPLANE MAIL AM WRITING YOU TONIGHT PRESIDENT SAW RIP YESTERDAY WIRED TRIBUNE ABOUT IT SEND ME THE CLIPPINGS ABOUT IT LOVE TO ALL- WILL M. WOOD."

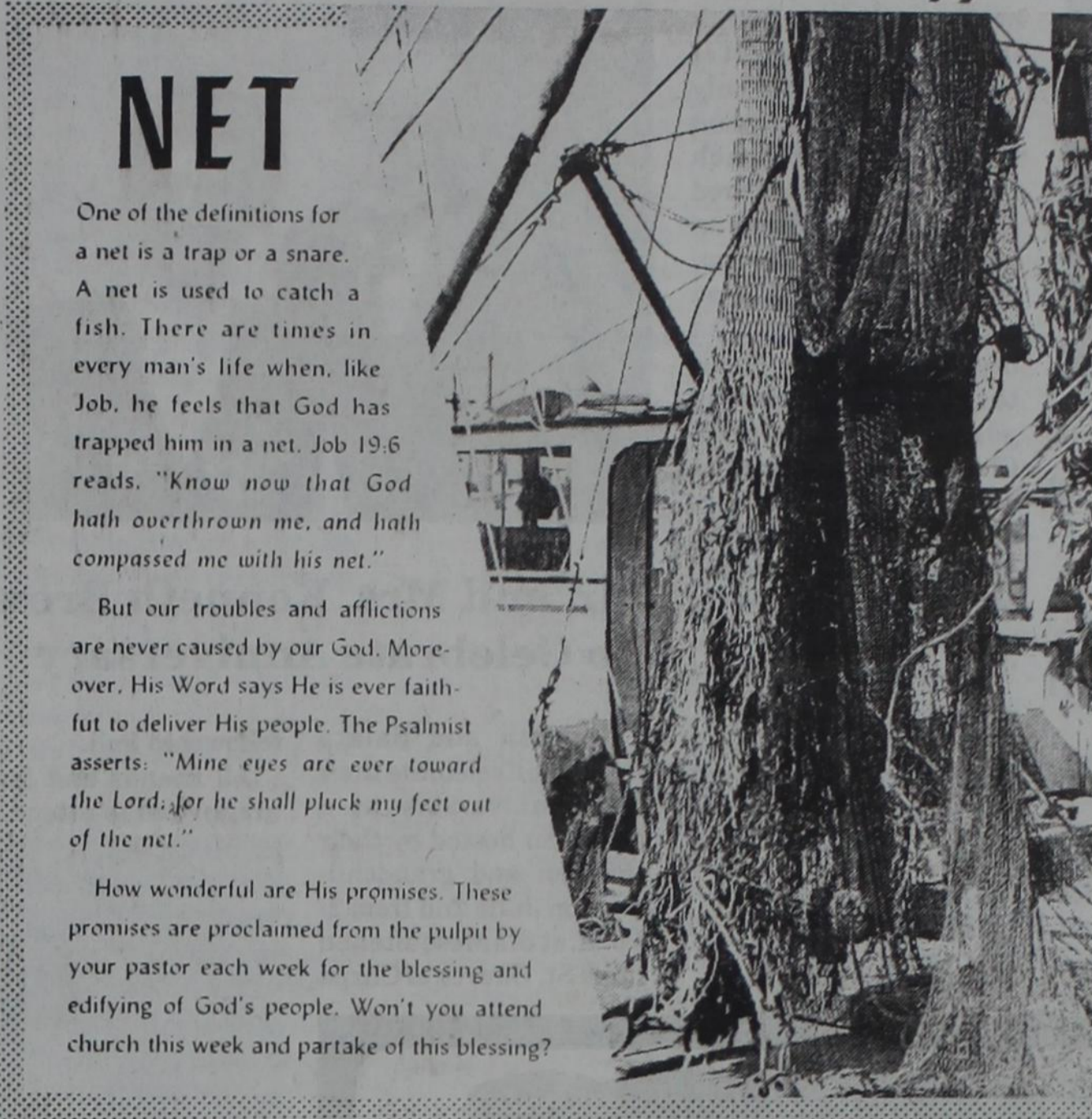

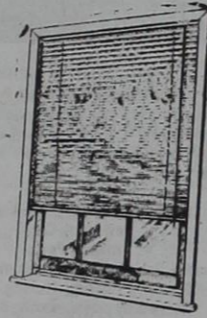

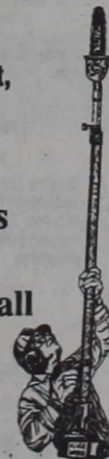

Chasing Twisters Can Be Hazardous To Your Health

The movie *Twister* uses spectacular special effects to give audiences safe thrills by showing stars searching out tornadoes and surviving their deadly winds. Read tornadoes are neither safe nor fun, State Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer said.

"No place in Texas is completely safe from tornadoes, especially this time of the year," Bomer said. "We can't stop these storms from happening, but taking a few precautions can save lives and reduce damage to property."

Advice on what to do before, during and after a tornado is available in a Texas Department of Insurance brochure entitled *Tornado Alert*. For a free copy, call TDI's Publications Order Line toll-free at 1-800-SHOP (7467).

Last year, Texas recorded 216 tornadoes, the second highest number of tornadoes recorded in Texas. The worst year on record was 1967 with 232 tornadoes — 150 of them spawned by Hurricane Beulah.

This year, so far, has seen few tornadoes because of the drought-like conditions that prevail over many areas of the state.

In the movie *Twister*, only one of the tornado chasers had ever seen a twister that measured 5 on the Fujita scale. This tornado produces winds in excess of 260 miles an hour.

Most tornadoes carry winds less than 73 miles an hour, or 0 on the Fujita scale.

The last killer tornado measuring 5 on the Fujita scale struck Lubbock on May 11, 1970, claiming 26 lives, injuring 500 and causing millions of dollars in damage.

Tornadoes measuring 4 on the Fujita Scale struck Saragosa in 1987, Paris in 1982 and Wichita Falls in 1979. Meteorologists disagree on whether the Wichita Falls tornado was actually a 4 or a 5.

Most tornadoes strike at dark when only the flash of lightning reveals their horrific presence. Unless alerted by a siren or radio or television reports, many people never know the actual danger they are in.

Actions To Take After A Storm

If your property has been damaged in a storm, there are several steps you should take to make the insurance claim process run smoothly.

- Call your insurance agent immediately, even if the damage was not major. To speed claims, provide the policy number from the first page of the policy. If the policy was lost in the storm, the agent can look up the information.

- Go ahead and make emergency repairs to prevent further damage and protect your property. For example, immediately repair broken windows in your home or car but wait until an adjuster has inspected the damage before making permanent repairs.

- Keep receipts for all repairs. Owners must have proof of these expenses.

ditures for insurance reimbursement or for income tax deductions.

- If you cannot stay at home because of damage, homeowners and renters policies cover the cost of staying in a hotel, motel or other temporary residence while repairs are being made. If you must relocate temporarily, be sure to tell your insurance company where the insurance adjuster can find you.

- Rake lawns to remove broken glass or other dangerous debris.

- Make a list of damaged items and take pictures of the damage.

- Before hiring a contractor for repairs, check references carefully. Insurance adjusters sometimes provide a list of recommended contractors, although policyholders are not required to choose from that list. Your local Better Bureau can assist you.

- Be patient when filing a claim. Insurance companies bring in additional adjusters after natural disasters. Policy holders with the most significant damage will receive the earliest service.

- You probably don't need the services of a public adjuster, but if you hire one to help with your



some other issues. He said that the election was about "getting our fiscal house in order."

"We don't pay our creditors - we (as a nation) spend more than we bring in. It's time for a change!"

Izzard said he looked forward to the final six months of his campaign, in which he is striving to unseat Democratic Congressman Charles Stenholm of the 17th District.

"Stenholm is particularly vulnerable," he stated. "He has voted on a number of measures against the wishes of the people of the 17th District."

"I urged him to vote for the gas tax repeal - he voted against it. He also voted against the line-item veto."

"And I think he is devoting a lot of effort to returning the Democrats to Congress."

The Republican candidate added that he, Izzard, was the only one of the two who actually lived in the 17th District.

Rudy Izzard went on to say, "It is well past time that our government develop a national energy policy. I feel our national security is threatened by our dependence on foreign oil."

"I'm for term limits," he declared. After leaving Eastland Izzard and Williamson traveled to Abilene, where they held another press conference. After that they attended a reception at Cypress St. Station.

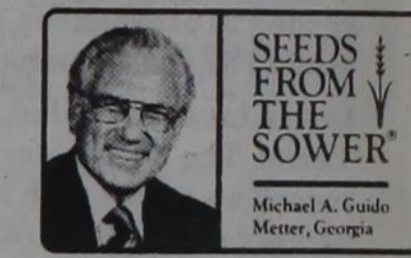
