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Texans Win All-Star Game In Ranger Sat.

There was a large crowd in Ranger Saturday night, July 27, as Texas High School Football laid claim to its dominance even in Six Man Football. It was the inaugural International Six-Man All Star Football Game with three Canadians joining the Six Man All Star from the other states as they challenged the Texas All Stars.

Defense played a major role in the outcome of what is traditionally a high scoring offensive game. The start of the game was delayed as a four inch rain fell in just over 30 minutes. The cloud burst, which one Ranger resident said was the heaviest rainfall he had seen, ended a dry spell which is so common in July and August in Central and West Texas. But it seemed to be limited to the Ranger area, so local farmers and ranchers may want more All Star games.

Texas won 60 to 38 with the North being limited to only one touchdown in the second half after the

South, or Texans, changed up their defense. But the South, which also made offensive adjustments in the second half, exploded for six touchdowns in the last half.

A key play for the South came in the third quarter when punter Casey Rowland didn't have time to kick the ball. He threw it as he was falling, and Chris Fisher ran under it for a 29 yard gain. Four plays later, Petey Salaiz of Mullin scored to give the South a 48 to 38 lead. It was one of the two touchdowns by Salaiz in the second half. Justin Lawrence of Strawn rushed for 101 yards and a touchdown as the South found more success with the tight formation. In a defensive change, the South rushed only one player while covering with the others. And it shut down the North's passing attack.

The first touchdown was scored by a Canadian as the North took a 14 to 0 lead before the South caught up.



downpour on Friday night around 11 p.m. brought 3 inches, and a spectacular rain beginning after 5:30 Saturday drenched the area with 4 inches in about an hour.

The Flatwood community got 2 1/2 to 3 inches Friday night, but only a trace Saturday afternoon. Rainfall was spotted in other areas of the county, with nothing like the totals in Ranger.

The Friday night and Saturday rains there each moved into the town from the NNW, the result of a cold front drifting down from Panhandle and Red River.

On Friday night the rain fell on parched ground, but fulled creeks and low places in the town. The Saturday afternoon cloudburst overflowed creeks, and high water threatened some buildings.

Acting Police Chief Don Enix said there was some damage to Bulldog Floral during the storm. So much water collected on the roof of the building that it was unable to handle the weight. Part of the roof collapsed and water ran into the building.

The Police Chief said that Volunteer Firemen were out helping the Police Department during the worst of the storm. There was a lightening strike somewhere near Western Manor Nursing Home. It threw an electrical surge into the building, but there was no damage. The Police Department Firemen checked this over carefully.

"During the storm a lot of citizens were out, trying to drive through deep water," Enix said. "Some streets were blocked off. Thankfully there were no accidents."

Southeast of Cisco, 6 miles, there was a 1 inch rain on Friday night, and .22 on Saturday afternoon.

Lesser amounts were reported around Rising Star, with around .50 in and around the town.

County Agent Davy Vestal says that irrigated peanuts look really good, but the dry land is suffering. "The rains have been too spotted," he notes. "We need general, soaking moisture."

At presstime Tuesday the weather forecast held some promise of just that. Another mass of cooler, wet weather was hanging around the Red River.



the left side of the roadway which takes time to get used to. Speed and distances are in metric. Funds are limited causing poor conditions of some city highways. Rural roads test the durability of their vehicles. Road maps are hard to obtain and directional signage is poor. Traffic control does not exist while roadways are under construction, so let the traveler beware!

A group of Eastland County residents experienced "different roads" in a trip to Lusaka, Zambia last month. Our team included Dr. Thomas Goodman, Dr. Robert Matthews, Charlotte Matthews, Terri Harris, Amy Harris, Betty Hughes, Loys Allman, Rev. Danny Brown, and Bryan Neaves.

The purpose of the trip was to visit established missionaries and provide service for their needs. Medical work, evangelism, and training leaders of a local church were some activities of the group.

There are other transportation subjects to address. A motorist could encounter almost anything. Military personnel set up check points at fifty kilometer intervals to monitor the vehicles and cargo. People respect the guards with their shouldered AK-47s.

Grass grows five feet tall next to the pavement and venders sell charcoal, firewood, and vegetables close

to the roadway.

Pedestrians and cattledrawn carts use the highway forcing drivers to be alert. They can purchase gasoline for about \$2.40 per gallon.

Most vehicles are Vokeswagon and Mercedes-Benz models. The poor economic conditions force most people to car pool or walk.

Temperatures ranged from 43-80 degrees because it is the winter season. Crops of cotton, corn, and sugar cane are currently in the fields.

The skies were clear at night revealing the southern hemisphere constellations such as Crux (the southern cross). We could see many stars normally hidden from our view in Texas. Zambia is seven hours ahead of our time making the trip confusing to our biological clocks.

We enjoyed the friendliness and fellowship of the Zambians. They love to read. They have limited exposure to television and radio. Therefore, they enjoy spending time discussing almost any topic with people.

We had many opportunities to tell unbelievers about the gospel of Jesus Christ. People in Eastland and Lusaka need to know the truth of Christ and how to receive the gift of eternal life. Zambians have more respect for the Holy Bible than most Americans, and listen seriously when scriptures were read aloud. Zambians love to worship by singing and clapping. They were not concerned about time and remained attentive to sermons lasting an hour and a half!

God blessed our group throughout the trip. We appreciate the prayers of our friends and families. It was our sincere motive to glorify God in the things we did on this exciting

Bush and lawmakers are to decide what to do after Bomer's panel concludes its work in the fall. Cancer Society Lauds Demos

The American Cancer Society praised the Texas Democratic Party for its decision last month to no longer accept contributions from tobacco companies.

"It's not easy to turn away money. They are very courageous, and we'd love to see lots of other states follow," American Cancer Society spokeswoman Jerie Jordan told the Associated Press last week. California Democrats banned the acceptance of tobacco money over two years ago.

Lester Van Pelt III of the Republican Party of Texas said the state GOP plans no ban on tobacco donations, the AP reported.

The \$50,000 the Texas Democratic Party received from Philip Morris last year made up about one-fourth of the state party's corporate account donations, according to reports filed with the Texas Ethics Commission.

Last spring, Attorney General Morales, a Democrat, filed a \$4 billion federal lawsuit against the tobacco industry seeking reimbursement of Medicaid money spent on treating tobacco-related illnesses.

Other Capital Highlights

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, has been named chairwoman of the Subcommittee on Surface Transportation and Merchant Marine. She moved into the post after Majority Leader Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., relinquished chairmanship. The post is her first subcommittee chairmanship since she came to Congress in 1993.

For the first time in two decades, the number of state government jobs in Texas has declined, the Wall Street Journal reported last week. The decrease is 1.1 percent, or 2,919 positions for the first six months of the fiscal year, reducing the total payroll to 258,536 as of Feb. 29. Comptroller John Sharp estimated the reduction has saved taxpayers \$40 million.





SPARE THE LIGAMENTS

Ligaments are bands of fibrous tissue that connect bones and tissue and help to control joints such as the ankle. Few people think about their ligaments unless they suffer a sprain. This happens when a ligament's fibers are stretched or tom, usually because of a sudden, awkward movement that creates excessive stress.

Sprains vary in the intensity of their effects -- swelling, pain, discoloration and loss of joint mobility. Cold compresses applied immediately can help relieve swelling. The process of healing depends on how much the ligament bands were stretched or if they were tom. In most cases the podiatrist treats sprains, even some involving tears, with moderate means. For some torn ligaments, surgery is the solution.

Legislation To Provide **Planting Flexibility**

Washington, D.C.-Congressman Charles Stenholm announced House passage of legislation that will allow farmers to plant blackeyed peas and other crops following the failure of crops on contract acres, without forfeiting their transition payments.

Stenholm cosponsored this legislation because of an interpretation of the 1996 farm bill by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibiting the planting of most fruit and vegetable crops on contract acreage.

According to the USDA, producers in Texas, even in counties designated as "double cropping regions," cannot plant blackeyed peas following a failed cotton crop, without forfeiting their transition payments.

Under the 1990 farm bill, program crop producers who met the USDA's criteria for having suffered crop failures on paid acres were permitted to plant a fruit or vegetable crop on those failed acres without the loss of deficiency payments.

"I do not believe the authors of the 1996 farm bill intended to prohibit or restrict planting options relative to the past, and I feel certain that their aim was, at a bare minimum, to maintain the producer's freedom to farm his land at 1990 levels," said Stenholm.

In Texas, blackeyed peas have been historically grown on "failed" cotton acreage because of
