



Essentials of salesmanship as it is linked with merchandising were interestinlgy outlined by J. E. Niland of Houston in an address Tusday noon when the Lions Club observed "Humble Day," arranged in honor of the workers of the Humble Oil & Refining Co. in Sutton county.

Mr. Niland, one of the Humble "family" eleven years, spent a year in the engineering department after he was graduated from Rice Institute. The last ten years he has been in sales work and for four years has been assistant to the retail sales manager.

Every One A Salesman

Taking as his cue the National Salesmen's Crusade, a promotional effort being carried on in 451 towns and cities, Mr. Niland told of the slogan-"Sales Mean Jobs" -and that the idea behind the all of the recession-ending campaign horn, wiring; Gilmore Hardware is "to promote and inspire action of customers in supplying immediately, needs for which buying has been long deferred."

"Life is one perpetual struggle to sell," Mr. Niland declared, "with every person having something to sell. It may be a product of one's hands, it may be a creation of the mind but everyone has something to market. Even the retired person may be said to have his philosophy of life to sell-

Persistence An Essential

"My words will not be so much on the enormous subject of 'merchandising' as on only one phase of that massive subject, namely 'A good salesman and the development of his characteristics."

### Sutton Men's Silos

"Hoarded" For Winter Use

Silo building work in Mother Earth is continuing apace in Sutton county where a number of the trench type storage places for feed were constructed last year.

The Otto Mund silo on his place is 100 feet long, 11 feet wide at the top and 7 feet wide at the bottom. The wedge-shape "container", which will house kaffir from a 30-acre field, is not quite as large as that built in 1937 by William Allison. The Mund silo is 8 feet deep.

Completion of a silo 120 feet long is expected in about two weeks by Frank Bond, Sutton ranchman, whose twenty-five acres of red top cane should be ready for cutting and storage just about the same time. 



#### A Sextant Is Not a Thing-a-Ma-Jig!

HE sextant, Captain F. J. Haasters of the Royal Dutch Mail explained to Mrs. LaVarre, takes the guesswork out of modern navigation. It measures angles. Though it can be held in one hand, it is a complete nautical observatory. Looking through its telescope you can see the horizon and sun at the same time and get an amazingly exact approximation of latitude and longitude. At sea captains use their sextant each day about noon to measure the distance they have traveled the past 24 hours. It seems impossible, but seeing is believing!



#### QUARTER MILLION TEXANS OWN DRIVERS' LICENSES

Austin, Aug. 24.—State driver's license bureau officials announced today that nearly a quarter-million driving licenses have been issued in Texas since last Septem-

The new licensing law requires state police to examine the qualifications of applicants before driver's licnses are issued. There were 242,384 drivers tested in the ten months' period.

Chief Ralph L. Buell of the license bureau said at least three per cent of the applications are turned down because of drivers' mental or physical defects. Many are denied licenses because their vehicles are mechanically faulty. Thirteen licenses were suspended in July after drivers were convicted of driving while intoxi-






