City's Sales Tax Check Shows Gain

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$96.4 million to 948 Texas cities as their share of the one per cent city sales tax for November.

The payment this month is \$16.3 million more than Texas cities received during a comparable period in 1980.

The payments push totals for Texas cities through November of this year to \$614.7 million--a 16.6 per cent increase over payments for the same 11-month period in 1980.

Payments to Texas metropolitan cities for November include: Houston, \$20 million; Dallas, \$10 million; El Paso, \$2.2 million; San Antonio, \$5.2 million; Fort Worth, \$3.5 million; Austin, \$3.1 million, Corpus Christi, \$2.5 million; Midland, \$1.3 million; Odessa, \$1.3 million; Lubbock, \$1.3 million; Arlington, \$1.5 million; Amarillo, \$1.2 million and Abilene, \$1 million.

Members of the Bovina School Board met in their regular monthly session November 10 in the superintendent's office of the school at 7:30 p.m.

Present at the meeting were Edwin Lide, Tom Ware, Keith Garner, Herb Howell, LeRoy Mayfield, and Jon Lin Riddle. Not present at the meeting was board member Gaylon

Two representatives of the Jim Berry Accounting Firm in Farwell were also present. The auditors explained the outcome of the school system's audit and the board voted to accept the audit.

Members of the school board cast their votes for the County Appraisal District nominee from Bovina, Lawrence Jamerson.

The bills for the month were also paid by the board members.

The next school board meeting will be December 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the superintendent's office at the high school.

resulted in \$68,852.18 as compared to \$79,066.93 at the same time last year. Totals paid to date included \$450,082.22 as compared to last year's sum of \$37,794.95, an increase of 2.81 per cent.

In the county seat of Bailey County, Muleshoe received rebates for \$28,492.53 compared with last year's \$30,268.84. But Muleshoe paid a total of \$185,984.13 to date compared to \$168,714.79 last year, which resulted in an increase of 10.24 per cent.

Friona received a payment of \$12,013.41 which compared to last year's figure of \$12,701.36, but had paid in \$84,388.17 as compared to \$75,947.43 at the same time last year, which was an increase of 11.11 per

By contrast, Farwell received a net payment of \$461.83, which was a 31.26 per cent decrease in payment from the amount paid last year at this time which amounted to \$3,568.96. In 1981, Farwell had paid \$16,272.76 compared to \$23,671.84 at the same time last year.

Bovina received a net payment of \$4,152.73, which was an 11.31 per cent increase over the amount of \$3,506.36, which was the payments comparable from last year and has paid in \$23,297.41 to date, as opposed to \$20,931.10 at the same time last year.

The optional one per cent sales tax is collected along with the state four per cent sales tax by merchants and businesses and is rebated each month by the Comptroller to the cities where it is levied.


Third place was a tie between Johnny Curtis (last weeks winner) and Don Spring, who has said each week that his would be the winning



According to one of the area's basketball prognostication books, the Bovina Mustangs are picked as the district favorites and the Fillies are not far behind them as they are picked fourth.

In the girls' basketball race, Bovina is fourth behind Springlake, Farwell and Vega, but the Fillies will be a surprise to a lot of people, predicts Paul Topliff, coach.

Coaching the Fillies for his second year, Topliff said that the enthusiasm of youth will be a key in their season this year.

"We may have only three seniors, two juniors, two sophomores, and two freshmen on the varsity, but they have the potential of winning a lot of ball games."

One of the stalwarts coming back from a knee injury last year will be senior Connie Shelby, who at 5-10 will be handling forward duties, as well as playing low post.

Joining her will be senior Jeanna Richards, 5-1, and Teresa Quiroga, at

Lisa Schilling will play center and she is a 5-10½ junior, with experience at post. Lisa Shepherd, also a junior who is returning, will be a big help at guard. She is 5-4.

Stacey Whitecotton will add talent as a forward, and she is a 5-6 sophomore. Randee Cupit, a 5-4 guard, who is also a sophomore is also coming along well, added Topliff, "She may be the most

improved player we have."

Freshmen Sonya Mayfield (5-7),
and Misti Boozer (5-9) will also add
to the Fillies' attack.

Beverly Barrett, a junior forward (5-6) will also alternate on junior varsity and varsity as will all the JV players from time to time.

On the Fillies JV team will be Beverly Barrett, who will also see time on varsity, and Gail Williford (5-2) junior, who is a forward; Vickie Tamez (sophomore, 5-3), Casey Riddle (freshman, 5-4), Shana Gober (freshman, 5-1), Kathy Moore (freshman, 5-3), Sylvia Guevara (freshman, 5-2), Sally DeLaRosa (freshman, 5-4) and Yesenia Antillon (5-0 freshman.)

All the JV players will be rotated to varsity to play at some point during the year, stressed Topliff.

After losing a 6-2 post to California (Lynette Bentley), the Fillies

had a void there, but Topliff said he feels that Lisa Shepherd and Connie Shelby can make up for that deficit, as can the remainder of the team's members.

On offense, against a man-to-man defense, the Fillies will use a 1-3-1 attack and against the zone, they plan to use a 2-2-1 attack.

On defense, the Fillies will use the zone trap alot, said the coach and will try to force turnovers. Topliff said his team would not be pressing, since he felt the quickness to use the press was not there.

One of the main objectives this year, as far as the girls team goes, Topliff said, is that he would like to end up winning at last half the games they play.

"We are a relatively young team and will be experiencing inconsistencies, but if we can keep our composure we will surprise some teams who are rated above us. Most of the team leadership will have to come from the coaching staff, however. This team will take a lot of patience to bring them along, but before the year is over, they will be playing good, tough basketball."

The most improved area of the team, according to Topliff, is their ability to shoot the ball better.

"Many of the girls came in early and began working on shooting, as well as running to get in shape. They did alot on their own," commented Topliff.

"I could not possibly ask for a better bunch of young ladies," continued Topliff. "They have realized that you have to work at it in order to be successful."

Meanwhile, the Mustangs, who are coached by Clifton Neal, are picked by some to be the team in the district to beat.

Asked if he felt that this was a fair assumption, Neal said, "Well, we had a record of 22-6 last year, and got beat by Vega in the district tourney," so it could be anybody's year.

Also in his second year as head boys coach, Neal cited Ricky Shepherd as a potential outstanding player for the Mustangs this year.

Also listed as strong players were Edward "Bull" Chisom, Charlie Trimble and Joe Black, whose height and quickness will be an asset.

Neal listed the team's quickness, form and aggressiveness as their strongest points, while having less height was a weakness. "We have no player over 6'3."

Neal pointed out, however, that several of the junior varsity players would see action on the varsity during the season.

Varsity team members include Edward Chisom, center, 6-1, senior; Ricky Shepherd, forward, 5-11, senior; Charlie Trimble, centerforward, 6-0, senior; Richard Shepherd, guard, 5-9, sophomore; Joe Black, forward, 5-10, junior; Greg McClaran, center, 6-3, junior; and those sharing JV time are: Dale Gilbreath who will also play on JV, 5-9 forward, junior; Jay Judd, forward, 6-0, junior; Joe Pat Wright, forward, 5-9, junior; Jon Riddle, guard, 5-8, junior; Paul Topliff, guard, 5-8, freshman; Johnny Villarreal, guard, 5-6, freshman; Tommy Hutto, center, 5-10, freshman; Charles Johnson, forward, 5-10, freshman; Don Paul Spring, guard, 5-11, junior; and Henderson Griggs, forward, 5-10, sophomore.

Coach Neal said he was looking for success. "Everyone wants to win."
But, he also said he wanted to see good attitudes on the court and stated that nearly all the players listed one of

their goals as winning district.

Farwell has two players which will be outstanding: Daniels and Eubanks.

Kress's Wayne Johnson will also be a good player and according to the Mustangs coaches, Hart will be the dark horse, who will surprise everyone with a better season than their last place finish indicates.

Neal said the Bovina kids are affected by head coach Paul Topliff's good attitude and enthusiasm.

"His attitude as a winner has really rubbed off on these kids," commented Coach Neal.

And, if the predictions hold true, the attitudes and enthusiasm will land the Bovina basketball teams right up there among the best, where they belong.

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
