There are, also, to be a liberal number of prizes awarded to those who are fortunate enough to excel in his or her particular field.



field mice, frogs, crayfish, snakes and insects. The other three species eat grasshoppers, crayfish, lizards, frogs, mole crickets, and some vegetable matter. All take fish occasionally, but ones of no interest to the fisherman.
