Next 10 Years?

With the decade of the 60's beginning, it's comforting to look back at the growth and progress accomplished in Bovina in the past 10 years and a challenge to make the next 10 even more productive.

As late as 1955 when The Blade was established here, Bovina was a struggling community with a population of about 600. Since then paved streets, sewers and a modern water system have been added by the city. But the most important thing Bovina can boast about is its population increase -- from 600 to 1500 in five years.

Businesses have been built, not in a boom-town fashion but steadily so that Bovina firms now number around 70.

Many things are lacking, but progress has been good during the last 10 years. If people don't abandon the idea that Bovina has a bright future, progress in coming years can far surpass that just accomplished.

Steps that have been taken so far will make those yet to be taken much easier. Improvements such as paving, sewers, water and zoning ordinances give prospective citizens and business people confidence in Bovina and its future. They are more likely to cast their lot with a town that is growing but as yet has had no severe growing pains.

Rough edges still exist, however, that cast a vote against Bovina when one is looking for a community to settle in. Law enforcements is inadequate. One man, regardless of how well qualified he is, can't protect the town 24 hours each day. A night watchman is a glaring need.

A drive through certain areas of Bovina reveals another rough spot that is really rough -- the streets. While paving was probably the best imporvement made in the '50's, the job was only partly done. When a person, institution, or community starts looking back with pride and fails to look ahead with anticipation, progress doesn't stop, it retreats.

People who need medical attention now have to drive to another town for it. A doctor is a necessity, a hospital something to set our sights on. Those who think these goals are distant and unattainable are out of step with this community. J. V. S.





for ordering evergreen trees, County Agent Joe Jones reminds area farm families this week. Planting trees for windbreak and landscaping purposes is increasing in popularity in the Parmer County area, and farm families who have put out and taken care of trees several years ago are now proud of the improvement that has been made to the farmstead. The price for small trees is \$1.50 per 100 trees, and that is the minimum order. Species that are available include the Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, red cedar, Chinese elm, cottonwood, sycamore, osage orange, Arizona cypress, and mulberry. All of the above are not evergreens, of course, However, evergreens are what mostfarm families of this area order. Trees should be ordered from the Texas Forest Service at College Station.

crossbreeding. John Holland has probably been in the sheep business longer than anyone else in Parmer county. He first began sheep feeding and raising in 1947.

"I was in the business before they ever thought of having a sheep market in Clovis," he says.

In his feed lots east of Far- operation. well, Holland presently has about 100 head of ewes and feeder lambs. He does not run a mother herd operation, but runs mostly stockers and feeders. He says the ewes he has that are lambing were bred before he bought them.

"Last week I had nearly 500 head of feeder lambs in here. I buy and sell these things all the time."

Holland buys sheep in large numbers and sells them in small numbers to area farmers. He finds this more profitable than fattening them for market. He is getting set up to buy wool from his customers. He plans to ship it to San Angelo.

"Feeder lambs are worth about 16 cents a pound. That's what I get for them. I paid 14.75 cents and 15 cents a pound for these sheep.

"You can't make anything on one sheep. It's volume, because you haven't got anything invested in one sheep."


