

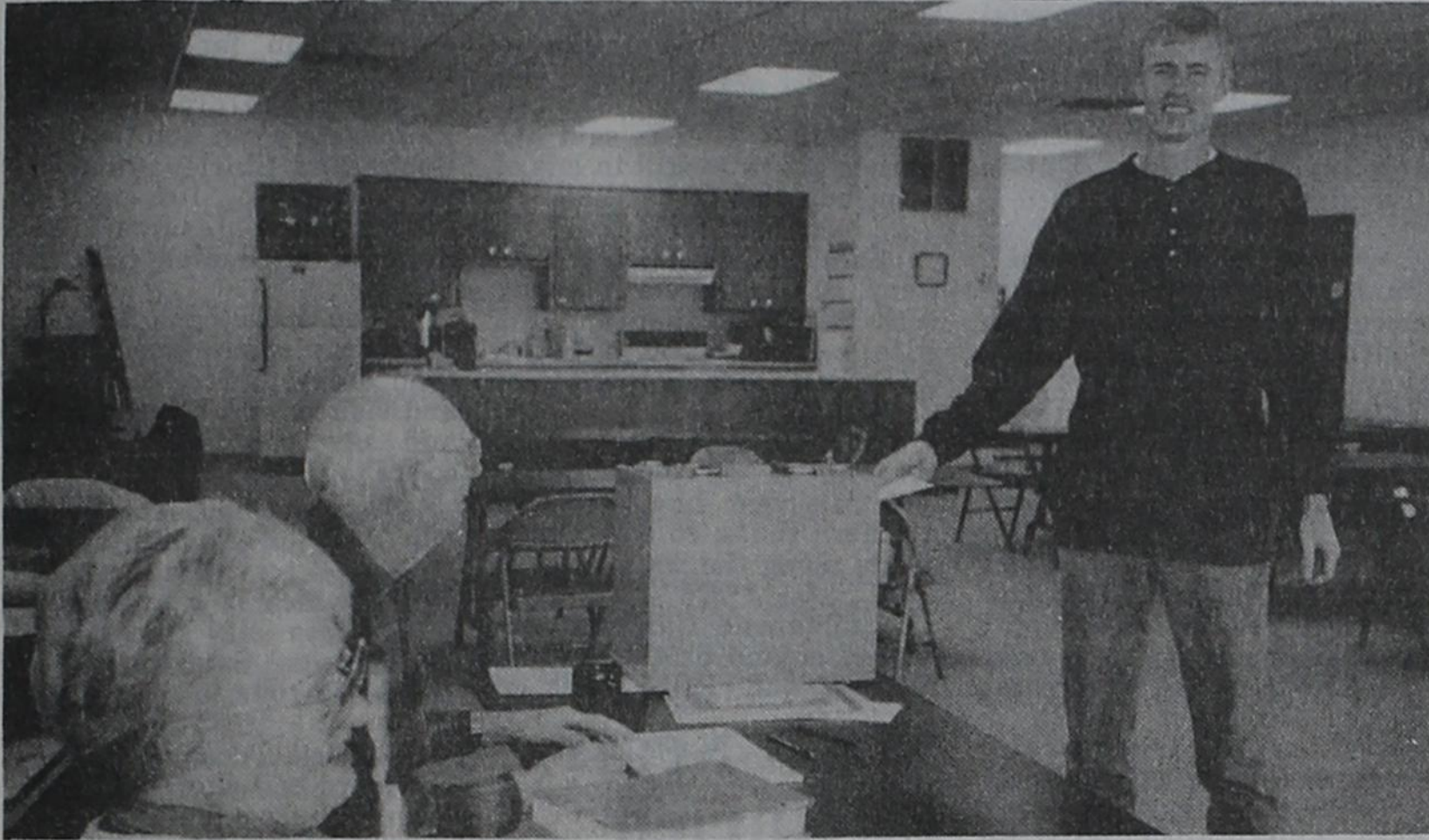

Bovina ISD Health Fair Set For Thurs Nov 12

The public is invited to attend a "Health Fair" sponsored by Bovina ISD on November 12, 1998, from 2 p.m.-6 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Representatives from various health care agencies, public and private, will be on hand to provide information about area health care.

South Plains Health Provider will offer flu shots for \$7 and pneumonia shots for \$10. Plans are for the Life Star helicopter to be on display during the fair.

Organizations and individuals included are Bovina EMS; Medical Center representatives from Hereford, Muleshoe, and Clovis; Home Health Care providers from

Friona, Muleshoe, and the Department of Health; Texas Health Steps, and Head Start.

Area dentists, optometrists, and massage therapists will also be available to provide dental screenings, vision screenings and free massage. Blood pressure checks and glucose testing will also be available.

"Our goal is to inform the public of area health care agencies," said Lou Behrendsen, Bovina school nurse. "We feel that the more information our citizens have, the healthier our community will be."

Rainfall Report

Reports of rainfall in the area last weekend totaled about 5 inches in Bovina and 5 1/2 to 6 inches at Rhea.

Rhea also received some hail Friday night but crop damage seems to be minimal.

Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain estimated that Bovina received about 7 inches of rainfall in October.

Local Man Has Brush With Death

Local rescue volunteers agreed that another few inches and Dwight Ontiveros would likely have died last Monday.

Ontiveros, 22, decided to change the oil in an old pickup in the backyard of the residence at 407 4th Street.

He pulled the front wheels onto a concrete pad in the yard and slid underneath the truck about midway of the driver's side.

The heavy rains during the weekend apparently had weakened the ground around the concrete which covered an old cess pool or sewer pipe ditch.

The wet ground caved in and the front of the truck fell part way into the deep ditch, pinning Ontiveros. Luckily he had slid under the truck far enough back to avoid being crushed as the area just behind the front wheels rested only inches from the ground.

Another few inches forward and the entire weight of the truck would have no doubt crushed him. As it was, Bovina EMS and Fire rescue workers worked frantically to raise the truck enough to extricate Ontiveros.

They had to bring a front end loader to raise the vehicle enough to slide him free. Reports are that he suffered no broken bones but will likely have some nerve damage to his right arm which was pinned by the truck.

Ontiveros was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital by Bovina EMS.

LANEY PREVAILS

GOP Candidates Win In County

In a somewhat low voter turnout featuring state and national candidates, Parmer County voters by and large went Republican in Tuesday's general election.

The only Democrat with an opponent on the ballot to win was State Representative Pete Laney, who won his race, 1170-769 (60.3% to 39.7%).

County voters favored Governor George W. Bush by 86.3%, Rick Perry for Lt. Governor by 62% and Larry Combest, 84%.

A total of 417 county voters voted "straight Republican," so that accounted for 54 per cent of Cain's total. Just 205 people voted "straight Democrat."

The total turnout was 2,009 voters, which was 22 per cent less than the 2588 who cast votes four years ago, the last non-presidential general election.

With a brand new system of marking ballots which were automatically machine-counted, Parmer County's votes per precinct was not available for probably the first time in history. Just an overall county result was tallied by County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

"I am hoping that by the time we have another election, we will be able to break down the totals for each precinct as we have in the past," Mrs. Warren said.

The new voting system consisted in blackening an area beside the candidate's name or the party at the top if voters were voting a "straight ticket." In this manner, the ballots were tallied by a machine.

The complete results were available by 9 p.m. at the court house, just two hours after polls closed. Voting by the old method sometimes resulted in complete results not being available until midnight or later.

Teachers Selected To Who's Who

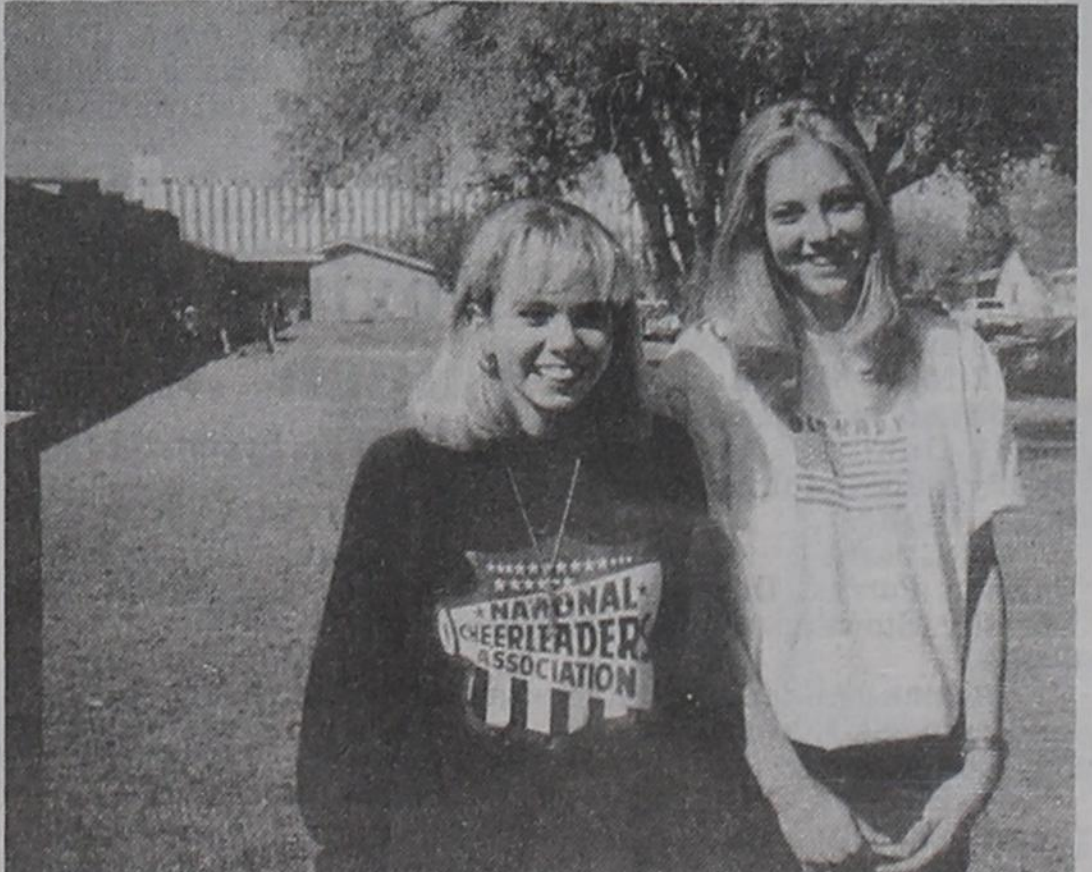
Bovina high school principal Wayne Erwin announced that three BISD teachers were selected to "Who's Who Among America's Teachers."

Bull Town Bulletins By Bill Ellis

YE EDITOR WAS STILL a student when I had my first exposure to "grown up politics." Amarillo was losing its air base. The Amarillo Globe-News charged that the decision was made (or approved) by a Democrat-controlled U.S. Congress, as punishment to Amarillo (and the area) for favoring a Republican, of all things, in the presidential election.

The Republican of choice was, you might recall, Dwight David Eisenhower, the World War II commander of the U.S. and Allied Forces in Europe, who had been given virtual single-handed credit for winning the war for the Allies and preserving freedom.

"Ike" wasn't even sure what party he belonged to before being cornered, then nominated by the Republicans at their 1952 convention. He could probably have won the 1952 election running as a Whig, so popular was he with the American public. He perhaps could have been elected as British Prime Minister, for that matter.

It has been a while since the Bovina Mustangs and Farwell Steers have clashed as Parmer County rivals.

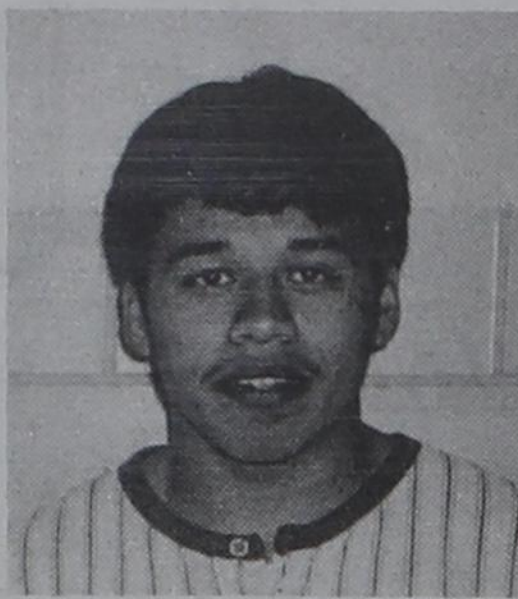

The young Mustangs were in the lead over Hale Center at the end of the first quarter 12-6. Lucas Ramos led off the scoring with a 53-yard touchdown run. Josh Quintana added a 5-yard run.

But Hale Center took the lead for good in the second quarter, scored 13 points in the fourth quarter, and beat Bovina 31-12.

Coach Scroggins said "the young men played very hard, but we ran out of people." Several Mustangs had injuries in the game, including Josh Quintana (sprained ankle) and Billy Chisom (dislocated shoulder).

He also noted that Tyson Kerby, Cameron Charles, and

Cliff Rocha played well, as did the offensive line in the first half. Also John Solorio had a good night kicking.

Lucas Ramos ended the night with 198 yards rushing, a 20-yard pass reception, and a 25-yard kick return.

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COTTON NEWS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

The United States Department of Agriculture will begin dispersing \$2.8 billion in supplemental Agriculture Market Transition Act (AMTA) payments November 3. The payments are also known as Market Loss Assistance (MLS) payments.

MLS payments will equal 49.72 percent of the 1998 AMTA payment rate. For cotton the MLS payment rate will be around 4 cents per pound.

All recipients of the MLS payments should be aware that the income it represents CANNOT be deferred and will be taxable on 1998 tax returns. Producers who want, or need, to limit their 1998 tax burden should look for ways to defer other areas of expected income to offset the taxes payable on the MLS payment.

Additional information about MLS payment rates for other crops can be obtained from local USDA Farm Service Agency offices.

Negotiations continue within USDA as to the method for dispersing the remaining funds approved in the recently passed ag disaster assistance package. Additional details will be published as they become available.

Paymaster Cottonseed and the Monsanto Corporation announced two new programs for cotton growers who purchase and plant stripper varieties of Roundup Ready® cottonseed.

The new programs apply only to PM 2326RR, PM 2200RR and PM 2145RR cottonseed. The programs will provide a grower the opportunity to receive free seed for replanting or provide a rebate up to \$17.50 per bag of seed purchased if initial acreage is lost and the grower opts to switch to an alternated crop.

"PCG continually works with the companies that provide the tools growers use to grow their crops. The announcement by Paymaster of their 1999 Replant and Crop Destruct programs will provide growers with an economically viable option for incorporating new technology into their farming operations," says PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett.

"We strongly support new programs and services, no matter who provides them, that benefits the grower and provides them with useful new tools."

PCG has been working with Monsanto and Paymaster for several months and has encouraged them to develop programs that will make new technology available to more cotton growers.

PCG efforts to obtain a deviation from the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation for 1998 boll count appraisal methods were successful and that success has helped spur further changes effective for the 1999 crop year.

For the past several years the FCIC has used a boll count factor of 250 green and unopened bolls per pound when adjusting damaged cotton before bolls are open. If the changes currently contemplated go through, this factor will change to 350 green and unopened bolls per pound of lint for 1999.

The change is good news for producers. PCG officials believe the change more accurately reflects the boll sizes of today's most popular cottonseed varieties and will give a more accurate measure of the crops yield potential when it is utilized.

Work is currently being done to gather data about boll size and yields from a number of varieties to confirm the change in the boll count procedure.

Researchers with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are gathering and extrapolating the necessary data for this purpose.

A series of educational meetings has been scheduled for cotton growers in the Western High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

The educational meetings will be focused on getting information about the upcoming referendum on starting boll weevil eradication activities in the five county zone.

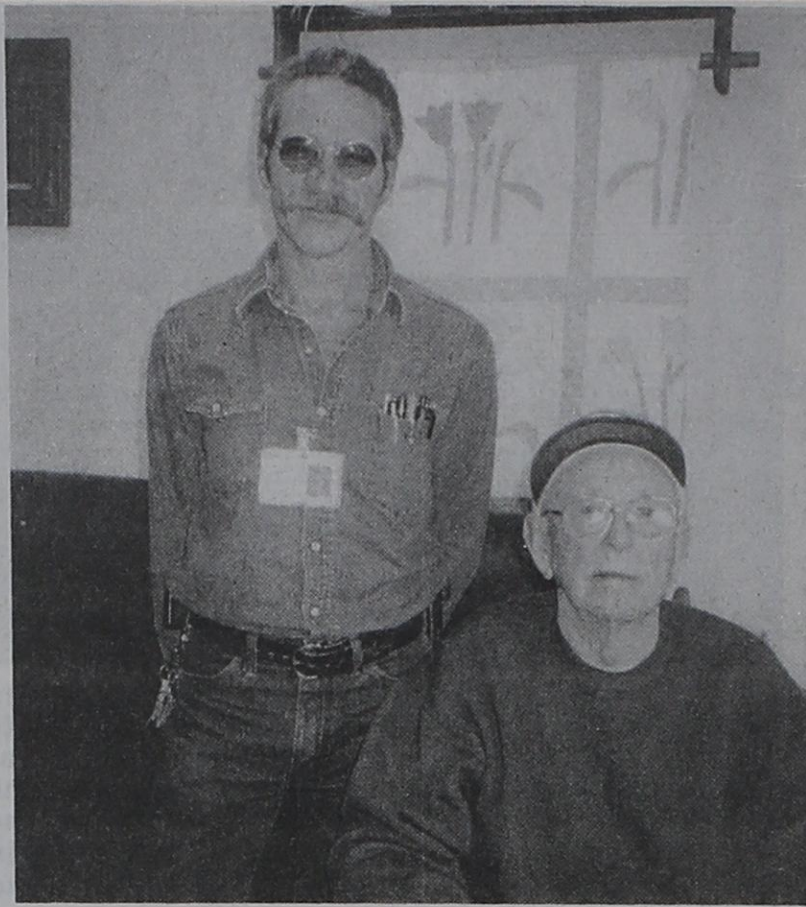

Checkoff's Health Partnership Impacts Millions In Texas

A partnership between Texas' beef checkoff program and an influential dietitians' organization reached millions of consumers with information on beef's nutritional benefits during this year's State Fair of Texas in Dallas.

The Texas Beef Council (TBC), which administers the \$1 per head beef checkoff program in the state, and the Texas Dietetic Association (TDA) have joined forces to educate consumers about proper nutrition. Part of their partnership included programs at the State Fair of Texas that ended October 18 after drawing 3.4 million persons through its gates.

TBC staff, registered dietitians and student dietitians manned the checkoff's exhibit at the State Fair. They answered nutrition questions and corrected misconceptions about beef's role in the diet by explaining beef's favorable comparison to poultry. For instance, consumers learned beef has seven cuts that fall between a skinless chicken breast and thigh in cholesterol and fat content.

Consumers also received factual beef nutrition information produced through the checkoff program. The TBC/TDA exhibit disseminated almost 22,000 brochures explaining beef's seven leanest cuts, 16,000 refrigerator magnets reminding consumers that cuts from the round and loin are beef's low-fat cuts, and 3,150 copies of the "Why Beef?" brochure that explains beef's essential role in women's diets.

"The State Fair of Texas

allowed TBC to impact millions of consumers with information on beef's nutritional benefits," said Richard Wortham, TCB executive vice president. "This is a public relations campaign that not only is important to beef producers but to diet/health professionals as well. We appreciate the strong support in this area that we received from TDA and the Texas Department of Health."

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for November.

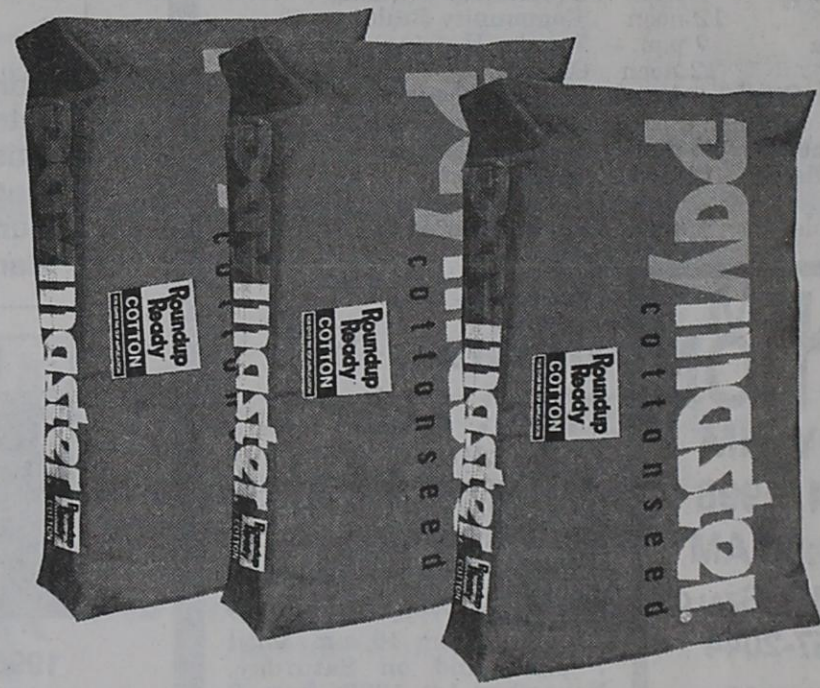

Claudia Marie Adams was born on June 6, 1914 to John Dave and Julia Farrar Holladay in Fisher County, Texas. While she was a child she moved to Floydada, Texas with her family. She was the youngest of six children, three girls and three boys.

Claudia grew up learning how to work. She spent many hours pulling cotton, hoeing and doing farm chores since she grew up on a farm. She was proud of the amount of cotton she could pull in one day.

She married Clyde Hinkle in Floydada and continued to live on a farm where she continued to work helping with farm chores. They had two sons, Rodney and Jerry, and they lived in Floydada until 1946 when they divorced. Soon after that, Claudia moved to Amarillo where she worked many places. She worked as a cook at Amarillo Air Base. She worked as a nurse's aide at St. Anthony's Hospital.

It was while she was working at the air base that she met Casey Adams whom she married. Soon after they married, they moved to Friona with their boys.

Casey worked on windmills with his brother, Raymond Adams. They lived in Friona until 1957 when they moved to Amarillo and Casey went to work for Sid Stout Ford and she worked as a waitress. Claudia enjoyed her work as a waitress very much. She would get up at 5 a.m. and go to work and would work long hours.

During those years in Amarillo, she and Casey worked making various crafts. They made and sold many things such as windmills, doll houses and doll furniture.

She crocheted many pot holders, sweaters, baby clothes and numerous other things which they sold. They spent many hours working together and had a good time making these things but more than that, they had a good time selling these things at different places.

During these years they had a garden in their back yard and enjoyed the vegetables that they grew.

About 1965, they purchased a mobile trailer which they enjoyed very much taking to the lake and to recreational areas. Claudia was very proud of this trailer she purchased with the money she made as a waitress.

Casey died in 1983 and Claudia continued to live in

Amarillo. She became active in her Sunday School class at Bykota Baptist Church in Amarillo. She continued to crochet and sell these items. She served as a Meals on Wheels volunteer for awhile.

Rodney Hinkle married Oleta Lloyd and they moved to Panhandle, Texas, where they operated a grocery store. They had four children: Delwin, Roderick, Tommy and Chandra. Rodney died in 1976.

Jerry married Lucy Beth Miller and they live in Friona where he works at Friona State Bank. They have three children: Brent, Wendy and Wade.

Claudia has nine great-grandchildren. Claudia has always enjoyed the grandchildren and made many homemade gifts for each of them. She made

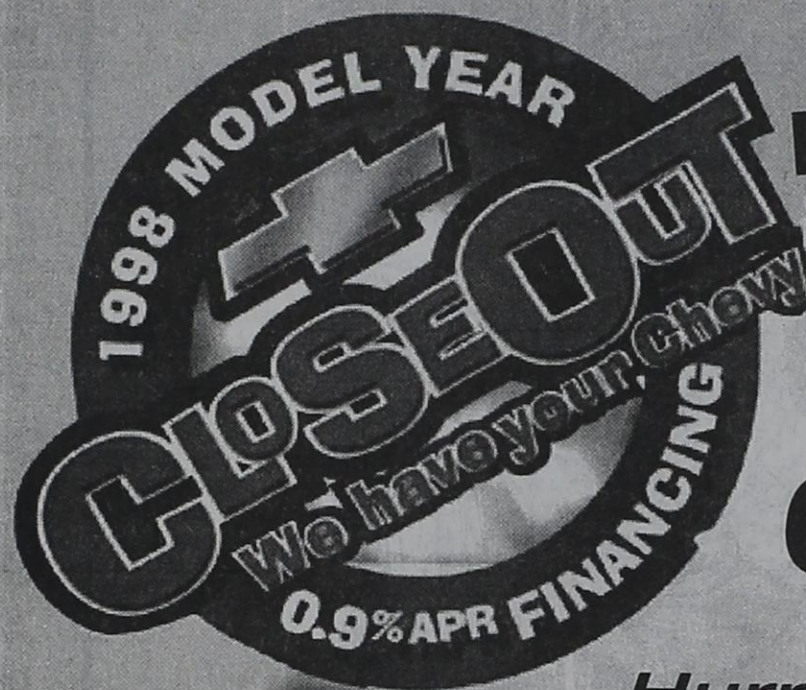

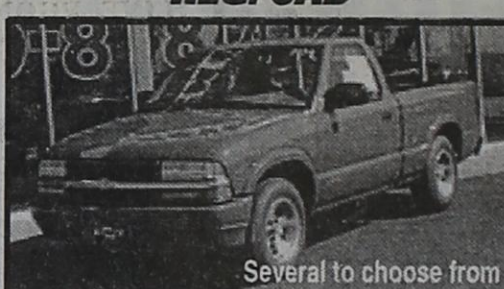

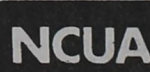
