

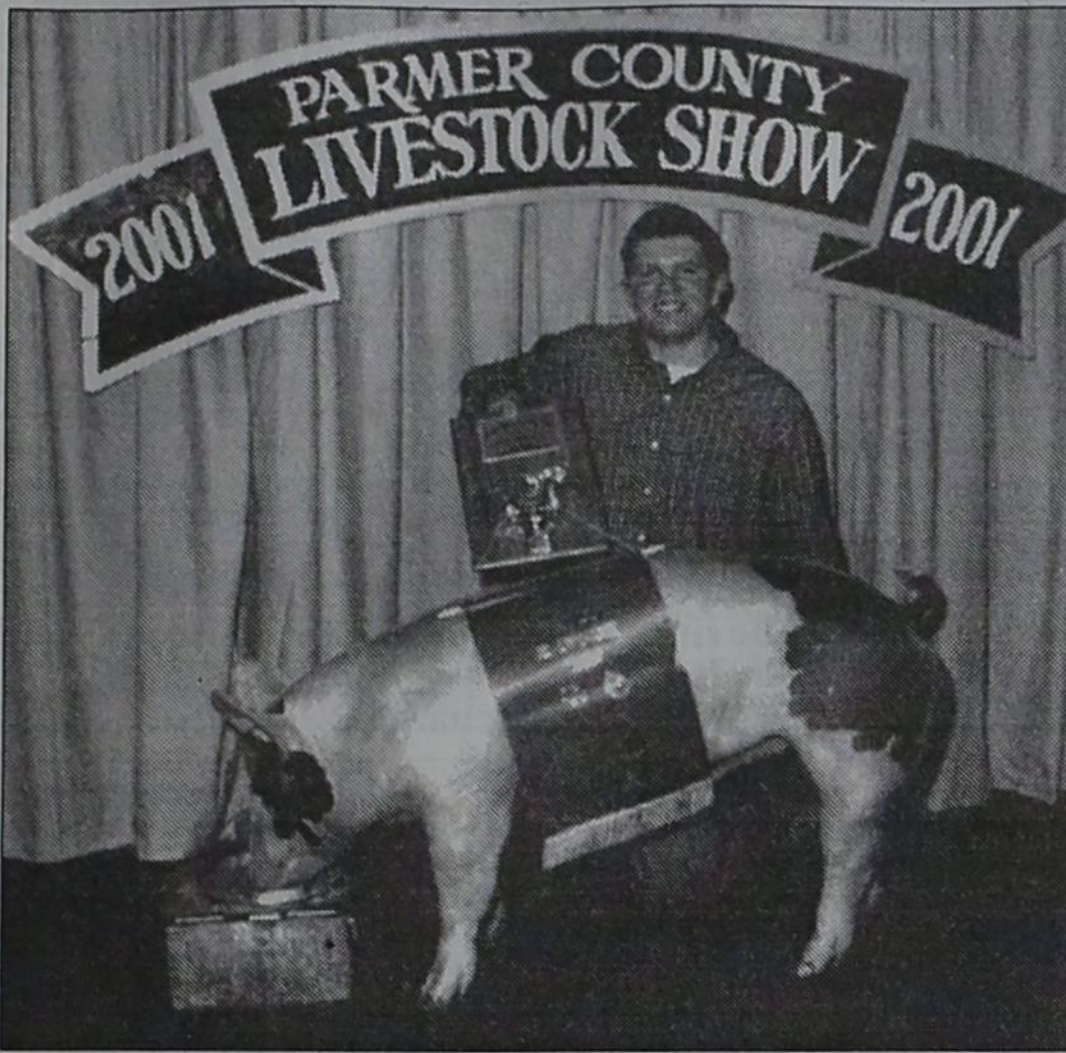

Kerby's Barrow Makes History At County Show

Josh Kerby of Bovina showed Parmer County's Grand Champion barrow at last week's county show for the first time in 47 years. Kerby's barrow was the champ of the show's crossbred division.

Last Bovina entry to win the Grand Champion honors at the county show was Kent Glasscock, with a Hampshire pig in 1957. The previous year, Don Bandy had won the show with his Duroc. These two, plus Kerby's are the only barrow titles for Bovina since the show has been held annually (since 1948) in Friona.

Josh's brother, Tyson Kerby, exhibited the Chester White breed champion, which was Bovina's only other championship at the 2001 show. For complete results, see inside this issue.

Band director Bill Shelly said Sammy Espinoza and Sandra Guevara performed very well also and finished in the top 25% of their sections.

Shelly related that 29 total students from Bovina made all-region bands this year, an increase of 2 1/4 times the previous two years.

IN 'PHONE INTERVIEW

Combest Discusses Farm Problems; Education Bill

Larry Combest, U.S. Congressman for Parmer County and the 19th Congressional District, discussed the pending 2001 Farm Bill as well as general problems facing farmers, and the pending education legislation, during a conference call with six or eight editors/publishers in his district Thursday.

Cong. Combest (R-Midland) first said that there was a large delegation of people from not just Texas, but from this area, attending President George W. Bush's Inauguration, and other activities last weekend in Washington.

"We had a lot of folks from Texas in Washington 12 years ago when George, Sr. was inaugurated, but not nearly as many as this time,

and especially from West Texas," Combest said.

The congressman said he was excited to have Bush, a Republican, in the White House. "The Congress passed several bills last session, such as repealing the estate tax (death tax penalty) and the marriage tax penalty, which President Clinton vetoed. I think we can get these two bills back to President Bush, and feel certain he will sign them," he said.

As to the farm situation, Combest said he was sensitive to the problems facing farmers this year, such as the extremely high price of natural gas. Again, the congress had a bill in front of President Clinton to reimburse farmers for the extremely high cost of fuel, but Clinton would not okay it.

"Those of us from the oil producing areas have known

for years that the oil and gas prices would skyrocket and have tried to get something going to hike the production of oil and gas. About all we can say now is 'I told you so,' but we'll try to get something going in congress," Combest said.

The congressman spoke to the energy problem in California. "We need to implement a policy to encourage energy production and not depress it, and it should help to have someone in the White House who should be supportive of the problem.

Combest pointed to the changes for crop insurance, which should help farmers. The crop year 2001 will be the first ones to come under the new eligibility program. "We feel this will be more of a safety net for farmers than

Mustangs, Fillies Split With Sudan and Kress

The Sudan Hornets are good. State ranked and potential state 1A finalists. Ask the Fillies.

Bovina's girls traveled to Sudan last Friday and were trounced by Sudan, losing by a score of 75-22. The game was never close as Sudan had ten players who scored in the game.

The Fillies top scorer was Jennifer Cantu with 12, including two 3-pointers in the fourth quarter.

The Fillies made up for the Sudan game by swatting the Kress girls for the third time this season on Tuesday.

Four Fillies scored in the double digits as the Fillies defeated the Lady Roos 51-36. Marissa Rodriguez led with 14, Jennifer Cantu had 13, and Christen Stowers and K'Leigh Scroggins pitched in 10 each.

The Mustangs battled the Sudan boys and the officials last Friday night and finally gave up a narrow 59-52 loss.

Bovina led at the half 29-26 and 43-38 at the end of the third quarter. But the momentum shifted to Sudan in the fourth quarter. Thanks to some questionable calls, Sudan scored 21 points in the fourth quarter. Ten of those 4th quarter points were free throws.

This statistic speaks for itself: Bovina had 8 free throw attempts during the entire game while Sudan went to the line for 44 foul

shots. They made 24 of their 59 points on free throws.

Top scorer for the Mustangs was Jason Stone with 15 points including three 3-point goals. Cameron Charles had 10, Josh Kerby and Jeremy Ortiz 10 each, Chris Antillon 6 and Tyson Kerby 5.

The Mustangs rebounded to attack Kress for a 50-38 victory, also the third time the boys have defeated Kress this year. The 'Stangs were cool in the first half, trailing 17-14 at halftime. But they warmed up, tossing down eight 3-point goals for a 36-point second half.

Leading the scoring was Tyson Kerby with 14. Chris Antillon added 13 points, Jason Stone 12, Josh Kerby 5, Cameron Charles 4 and Jeremy Ortiz 2.

The teams host rival Farwell in Bovina tonight, Friday, January 26 and travel to Hart on Tuesday

Loflin died Monday, January 22, 2001 in an Oklahoma City hospital as a result of an automobile accident.

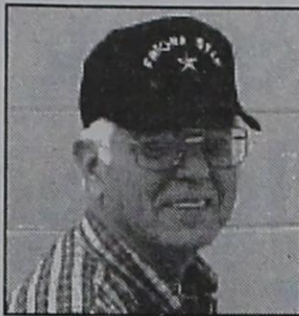
He was born January 25, 1974, in Blackwell, Oklahoma. He loved driving trucks and rodeos.

Out Here

"Civility, Courage, Compassion, Character"

For better or worse, G Dub has been sworn in and Billy Jeff is yucking it up in New York for the time being.

Was glad to see that President G Dub Bush put a hold on all the executive orders and last minute laws that Billy Jeff tried to sneak through in his waning hours.

Over 800 pages of laws he tried to add to the Federal Register were in effect canceled by G Dub and his staff. Nothing they could do about the pardons he handed out though.

Oh, and Independent Counsel Robert Ray said that Billy Jeff's "deal", which was cut on his last day in office, was not a plea bargain. He admitted that he "gave false answers" in his Paula Jones deposition. True to form, Billy Jeff has still never said the word "lie", and he never will. Not even in his forthcoming book.

Speaking of books, the flap about Hill Rod's \$8 million advance for her book has died down. Book experts say that no matter what Hill Rod might write (and she won't spill all the details), her book could never sell enough copies to recoup the \$8 million. So why the \$8 million advance?

The publisher, Simon and Schuster, is owned by a giant telecommunications company named Viacom. Could it be important to Viacom's future to have a friend in the Senate? Or maybe Viacom owes the Clinton family a debt for past favors.

After all, in today's world of big bucks, \$8 million ain't much for a favor is it?

I've always had a tough time with forgiveness. I have never been able to get a handle on true forgiveness: what it is, when you have really done it, and how long it lasts.

I think many of us claim to forgive but really don't. On the other hand, I think people do things that are wrong, knowing they can get off the hook by asking for forgiveness again.

As Willie Nelson sings, "Forgivin' you is easy but forgettin' seems to take the longest time."

The subject of forgiveness came up again for me when the Reverend Jesse Jackson confessed to fathering a child out-of-wedlock with an employee of his organization.

Jesse is 58. The mother is 39. He paid her off, moved her to Los Angeles and started paying her \$3,000 a month. We would never have known about Jesse's baby except he was forced to confess before the National Enquirer broke the story.

Jesse has been married for what, 38 years? Has five grown children and several grandchildren? He preaches to us about how racist we are and how young black men should not be absentee fathers, and all the rest of his condescending morality.

He had the fortitude to put on his pastoral robe, take the pulpit last Sunday, look down at his wife of 38 years and tell her he loved her. Is that a conflict somehow. Was that hurtful and embarrassing to his wife? Did she believe him or do you suppose?

The big question in my mind is, has she forgiven him? Should we forgive him

too and if so, how do we do that? How do you know when you have 100%, no doubt in your mind or heart, forgiven someone?

Forgive me, but I don't have anything to forgive Jesse for. I didn't think much of him before this happened.

Jesse is not the only black leader setting examples for young people. San Francisco Mayor Willie Brown has impregnated Carolyn Carpeneti, described as his chief fund-raising coordinator. Willie is 66. The report didn't say how old Carolyn is.

Willie has been separated from his wife Blanche for 20 years and says he does not plan to divorce or get remarried. He has three grown children and two grandchildren.

Willie told reporters this was something certainly not planned and he told her that it would not affect his career. At least Willie does not feel he needs any forgiveness.

Other matters I don't understand include Billy Jeff holding a ceremony last week to award Presidential Citizens Medals to 28 people, including Muhammad Ali and Elizabeth Taylor.

Muhammad was the first high-profile draft dodger during the Vietnam War and a three-time heavyweight boxing champ.

Liz has had a few good movies and several bad ones. She has been married eight times, graduated from the Betty Ford Center a couple of times, and had a rather photogenic chest. Billy Jeff referred to her as "American

royalty."

If that kind of behavior deserves a Presidential Citizen's Medal, then I figure I should be going to Washington to pick up about a half a dozen of them.

Hank Aaron got a medal too. That's okay. he was a great baseball player. Broke Babe Ruth's home run record.

But he said something curious. He said he has been spoiled because Bill Clinton "has done what's right for African-Americans" and now he is going to be afraid and frightened (of the Bush Administration) until something happens that's "good for all of us."

What exactly did Billy Jeff and Al Gore do in their eight years that made life so much better for the black community? What did he do? Does anybody know? I don't.

G Dub Bush said he would govern with civility, courage, compassion, and character. I think he will.

I just hope the Democrats will still be able to recognize it when they see it.

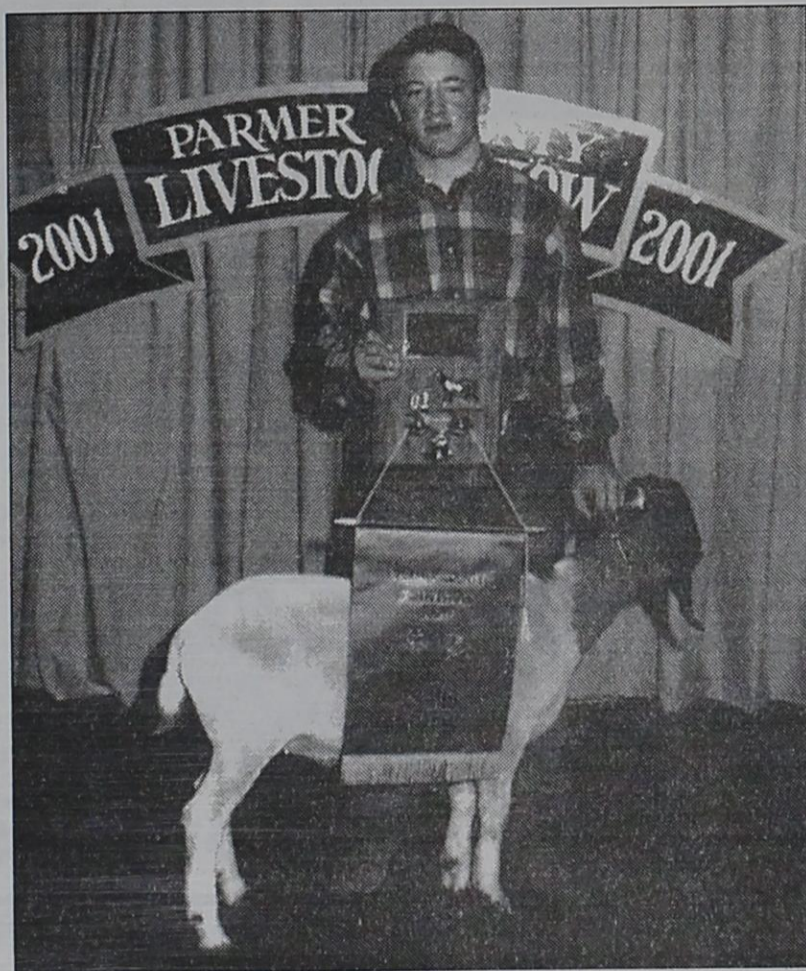

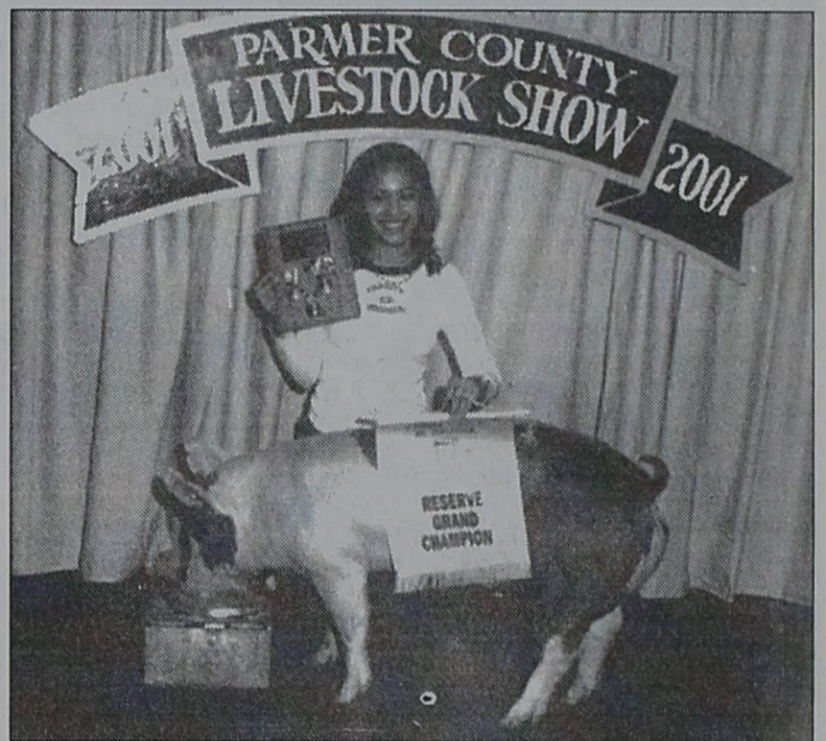

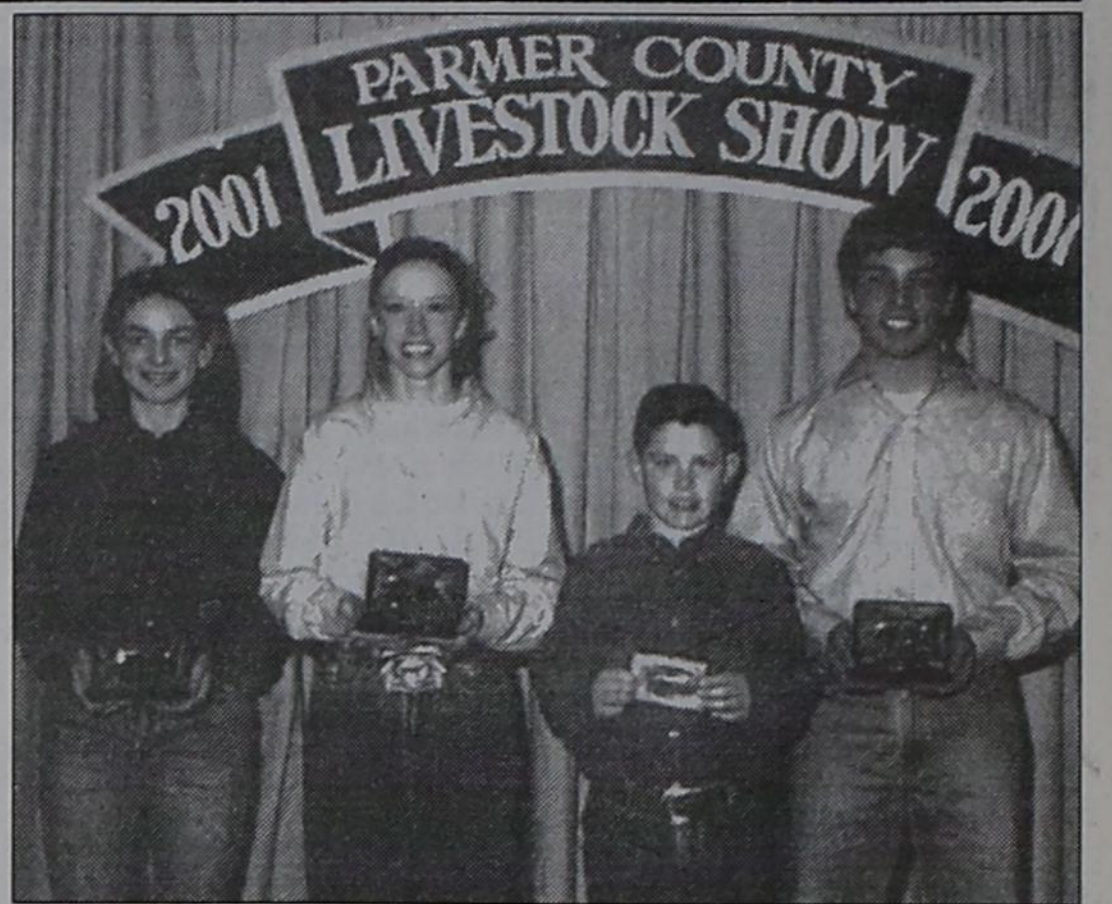

Services for Leslie Fay Bruns, 87, of Muleshoe are scheduled for 11 a.m. Saturday, January 27, 2001 at the Ellis Funeral Home Chapel in Muleshoe with Curtis Shelburne and Rev. Brad Reeves officiating.

Burial will be in Muleshoe Memorial Park Cemetery under the direction of Ellis Funeral Home.

Brun's died January 25, 2001 in Muleshoe. He was born October 6, 1913 in Snyder, Oklahoma. He married Ruby Nell Morris in Clovis, New Mexico on July 5, 1937.

Les was preceded in death by his parents and two brothers.

Les was the eldest child of the late Fred and Edith Bruns. The pioneer family moved from Mountain Park, Oklahoma to Parmer County in early 1930's. After he and Ruby married they moved to the Stegall Community in Bailey County where Edith taught school and Les farmed.

During WWII they moved to Clovis where he served as a brakeman for the Santa Fe Railroad.

In 1951 Les moved his family to their farm in Parmer County where he drilled one of the first irrigation wells. During the following decade he was instrumental in bringing irrigation, natural gas lines and telephone service to the southwest area of Parmer County. He is also survived by seven grandchildren and one great-granddaughter.

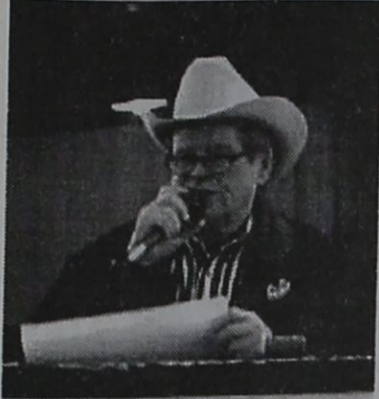

they have had in the past. This is the most radical change in the farm program than we've ever had," he commented.

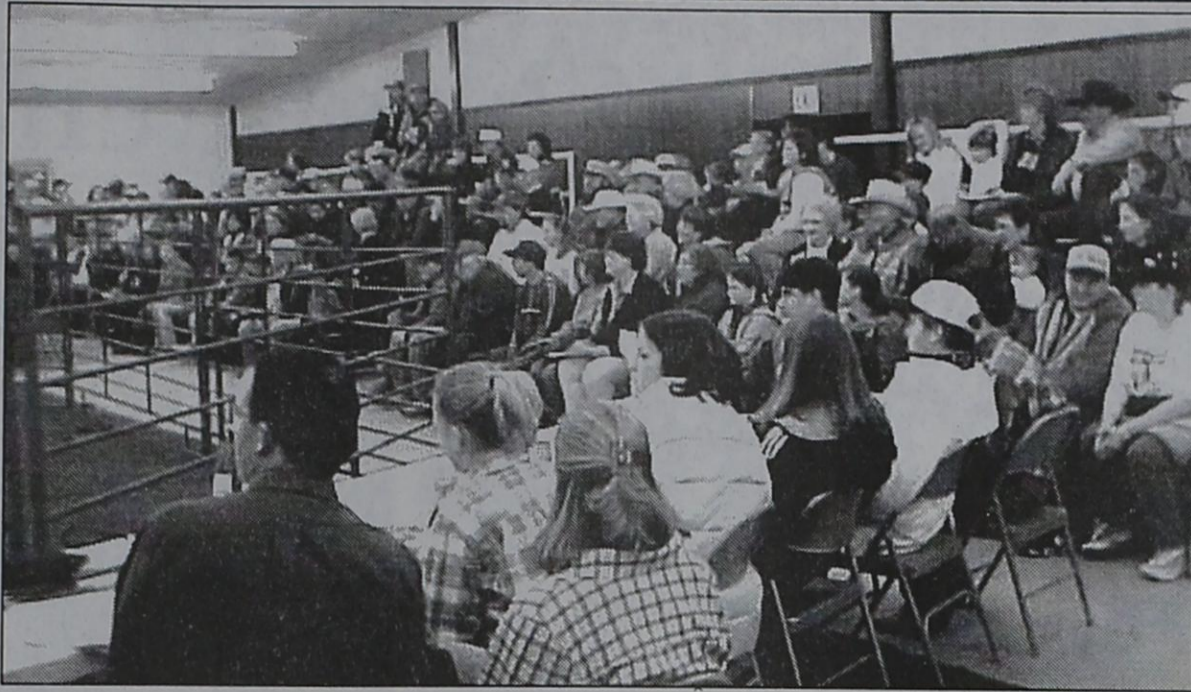
Hearings will be held in the farm belt on things to be included in the new farm bill. Those on the House Agriculture committee have challenged farmers to attend and tell the elected officials what they need. (Watch for announcements regarding the hearings, which will start within a week).

Combest also addressed the education package, which the Bush administration is reading. He said he was certain that Pres. Bush's program, which will encourage improvement in education, will be good for the nation. The education proposal will challenge schools to do a better job, and will reward those school districts who do so.

"Schools which are doing a good job now should have no problems with the new proposal. Those who are not will have to come up with some improvements," he said.

Combest said he was proud of the Bush Administration for looking into the things that Clinton did prior to leaving office. He had heard about the general "mess" that was found in the White House itself.

Congratulated by this writer for being one of the early elected officials to predict a Bush win, he said "I decided that after all the work the Bush campaign had done, that being out in the cold for the inauguration was a small price to pay. I was so happy to see him (G.W. Bush) being the one taking the oath," he commented.

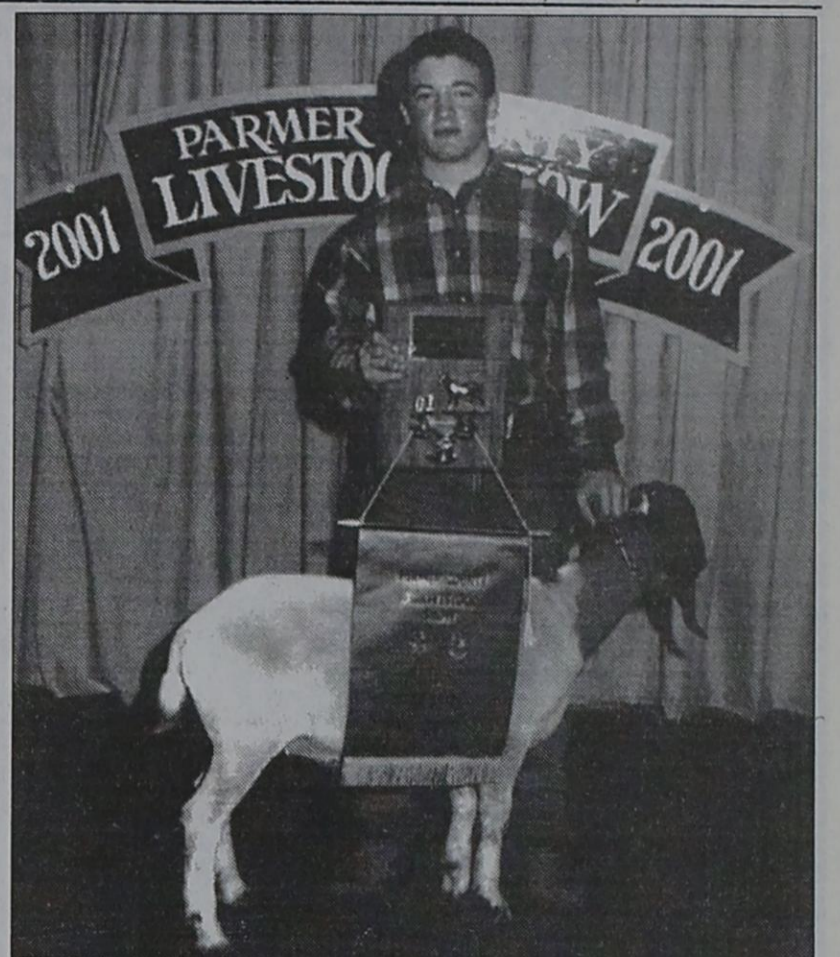

YOUR EYES

Coating Eyeglass Lenses For Safety

Eyeglass lenses can be treated with different coatings for greater protection or safety. Plastic lenses are more easily scratched than those made from glass. A scratch resistant coating can protect these lenses from normal wear and tear. A special coating is also available for protection from the sun's ultraviolet rays. The coating can be applied to a full range of eye wear--from polycarbonate lenses to the thin high index lenses in lightweight glasses. Remember, tinted glasses do not eliminate ultraviolet rays unless the label states differently. These lenses reduce glare, but are used primarily for cosmetic purposes.

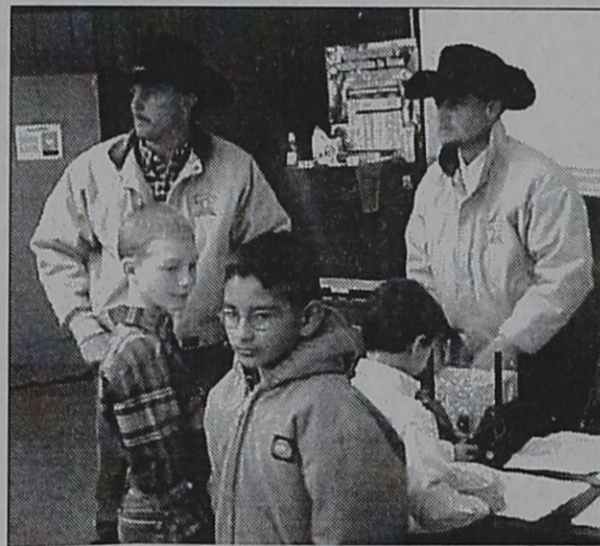

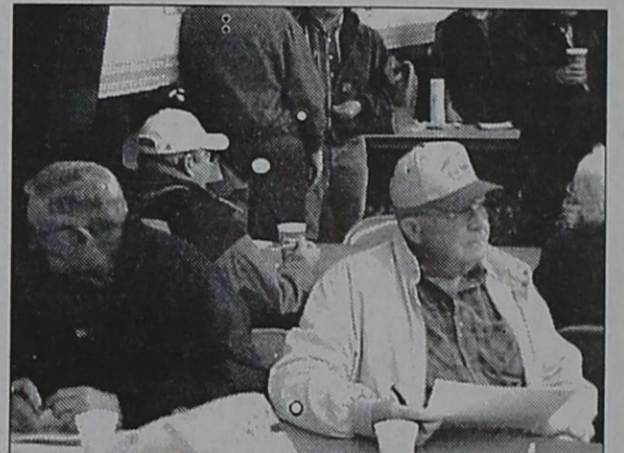

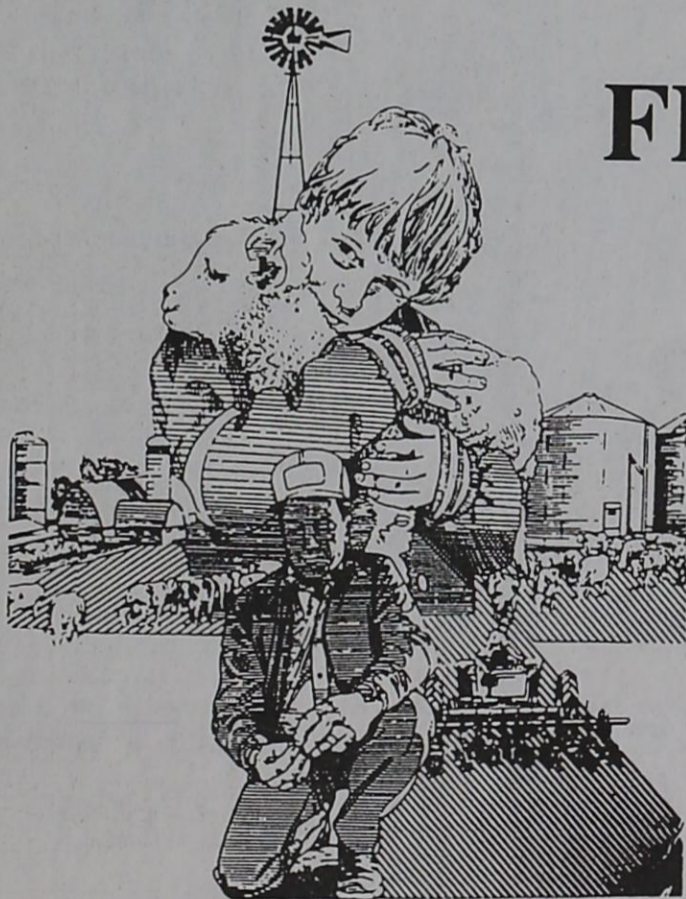

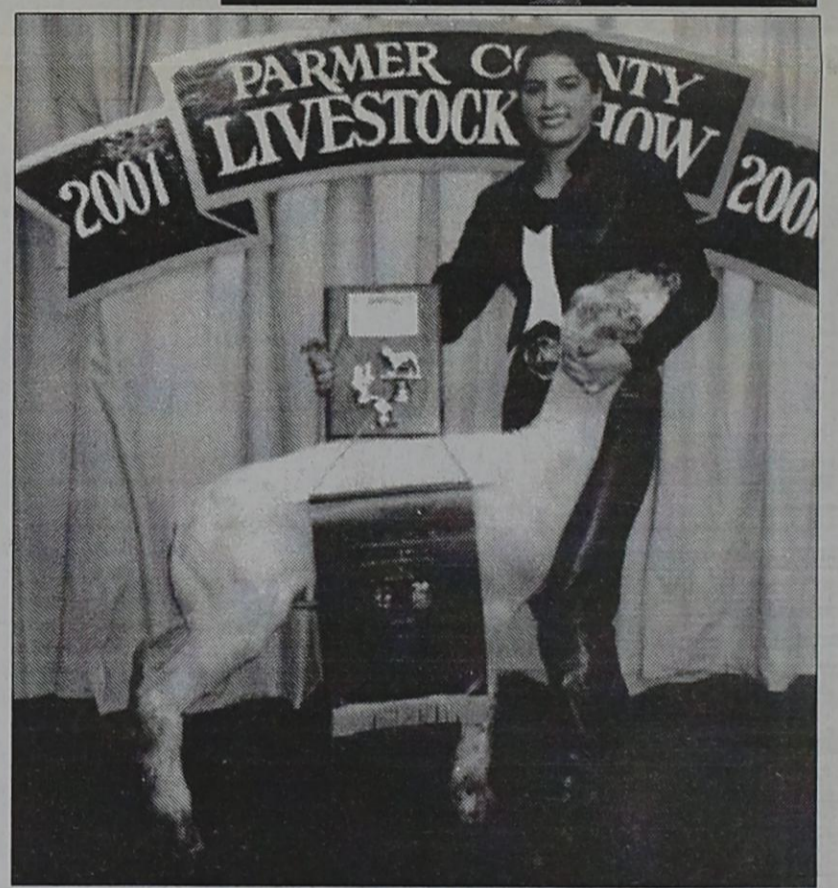

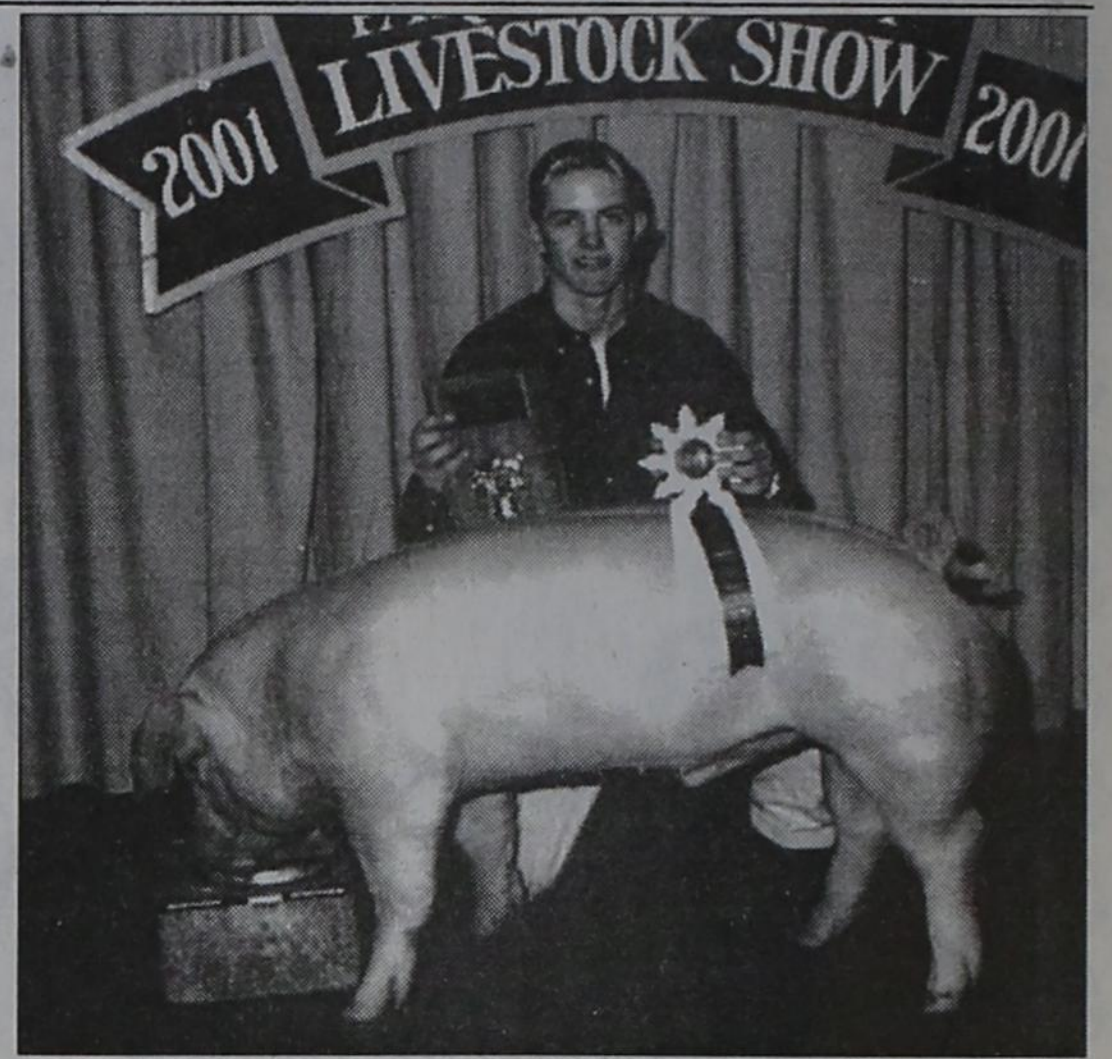
