Special Mohair Meeting April 7

In order to find out what is on the producers' minds in regard to the failure of mohair to move in quantities and at prices comparable with that of wool and to see if they want to ask for government help with support prices, Clayton Puckett, President of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, has called the Board of Directors of the Association to meet in special session in the Court House at Rocksprings, on April 7. The meeting is called for 10 o'clock. This special session was voted by the directors at their regular quarterly meeting in Ozona, March 27.

"It is very important that all mohair producers attend this meeting," Puckett stated. "The Association is anxious to take whatever steps the majority of the growers desire. There will be a full discussion of this problem, and we want the producers to express their opinions."
