Funeral services for Roy Hudspeth, 72, West Texas ranchman, banker and philanthropist, were held Tuesday afternoon at the First Methodist Church here at 4 o'clock with the Rev. Ray Johnson of San Angelo officiating. Mr. Hudspeth died in a San Angelo hospital early Monday morning. He had been ill about a week, suffering a heart ailment. Burial was in the Sonora Cemetery beside his wife, who died two years ago. Pallbearers included Dan Cauthorn, Joe Brown Ross, Vernon Hamilton and Sam Allison of Sonora, J. Autrey Walker of Del Rio, Houston Smith and Vic Pierce of Ozona and Herman J. Perry of San Angelo.

Survivors include a nephew, Claude Hudspeth, Jr., of Del Rio and a neice, Mrs. W. C. Abbey of San Antonio.

Mr. Hudspeth was born Oct. 25, 1875 in Monticello, Ark., and came to Texas with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Hudspeth, locating in Bandera County where the family ranched.

In 1888 the family moved to Crockett County where livestock grazed on the open range. When the county was organized H. S. Hudspeth was one of the leaders and became county clerk, serving for many years. When the senior Hudspeth retired from office in 1898, Roy Hudspeth was named clerk and served in that capacity for 10 years.

Previously he had worked as a ranch hand for C. C. Hammond, taking his job at 15 years of age and was employed there two years. He also did general ranch work for his uncle, J. B. Hudspeth, on the

County Judge George Wynn appointed Herman J. Perry of San Angelo as temporary admintrator of the estate of the late Roy Hudspeth. The application was filed by H. C. Upton of the San Angelo law firm, and L. W. Elliott, Sonora attorney. The application stated that the will is to be filed for probate in the near future. Perry was Mr. Hudspeth's business manager for 18



The drive for \$50,000 in Sutton County to match \$50,000 donated by Roy Hudspeth for construction of the Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital here, was completed Friday morning, April 9. L. W. Elliott, chairman of the drive, sent Mr. Hudspeth a wire Friday afternoon stating, "I am pleased to advise you that the citizens of Sutton County have now contributed more than \$50,000 to match your donation for a hospital here at Sonora."

In a financial report released April 12, it was announced that donations and pledges for the hospital amounted to \$100,805. No expenditures have been made to date. The federal government is expected to give an additional \$50,000 under provisions of the hospital aid pro-
