THERE ARE SOME changes in store for some county voters for the May 1 primary, but there are less for the voters in the Bovina area than for other areas of the county.

The main change in the immediate area was the addition of an area three miles in width west of Highway 1731 south of Bovina, to the Oklahoma Lane voting precinct from the Farwell voting precinct.

Commissioner's precinct two, represented by Jack Patterson, has been enlarged to include a small portion of the city of Friona, but this will not effect Bovina's voting procedure.

The commissioner's race locally should be a highlight of the primary, although the race has been rather low-key in nature. With three candidates listed on the Democratic ballot, a good turnout should be evident, and speculation is that a runoff will be in the offing for the first Saturday in June for this nomination.

But there are a number of other offices where more candidates are running, such as the governor's race, where six men have thrown their hats into the ring. This race is bound to necessitate a runoff.

If you are like many voters when you get to those judicial races, such as justice of the Supreme Court, etc., and don't know "beans" about who to vote for, then you will appreciate the endorsement by area attorneys.

District Attorney Jack Young sparked a move by the attorneys, whose endorsements are given in a political advertisement elsewhere in this issue.

The attorneys have rated the various candidates on such matters as their records in overturning court decisions, which causes cases to be retried, and have come up with some recommendations which should come in handy before you mark your ballot in these races. Thanks to Judge Young and his co-horts for giving us this insight.

GOP, Demo Conventions Set Here

For all of those persons in Bovina who will be voting in the May 1 Primaries, there will be precinct conventions held following the voting.

According to Ellen Estes, the Republican Convention will be held at Bovina High School Cafeteria beginning at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

Ken Horn, Democratic chairman for Bovina, stated that the Democrats will have their precinct convention at the Legion Hall at 2 p.m. on Saturday.

A voter must have cast their vote in order to attend their respective convention.

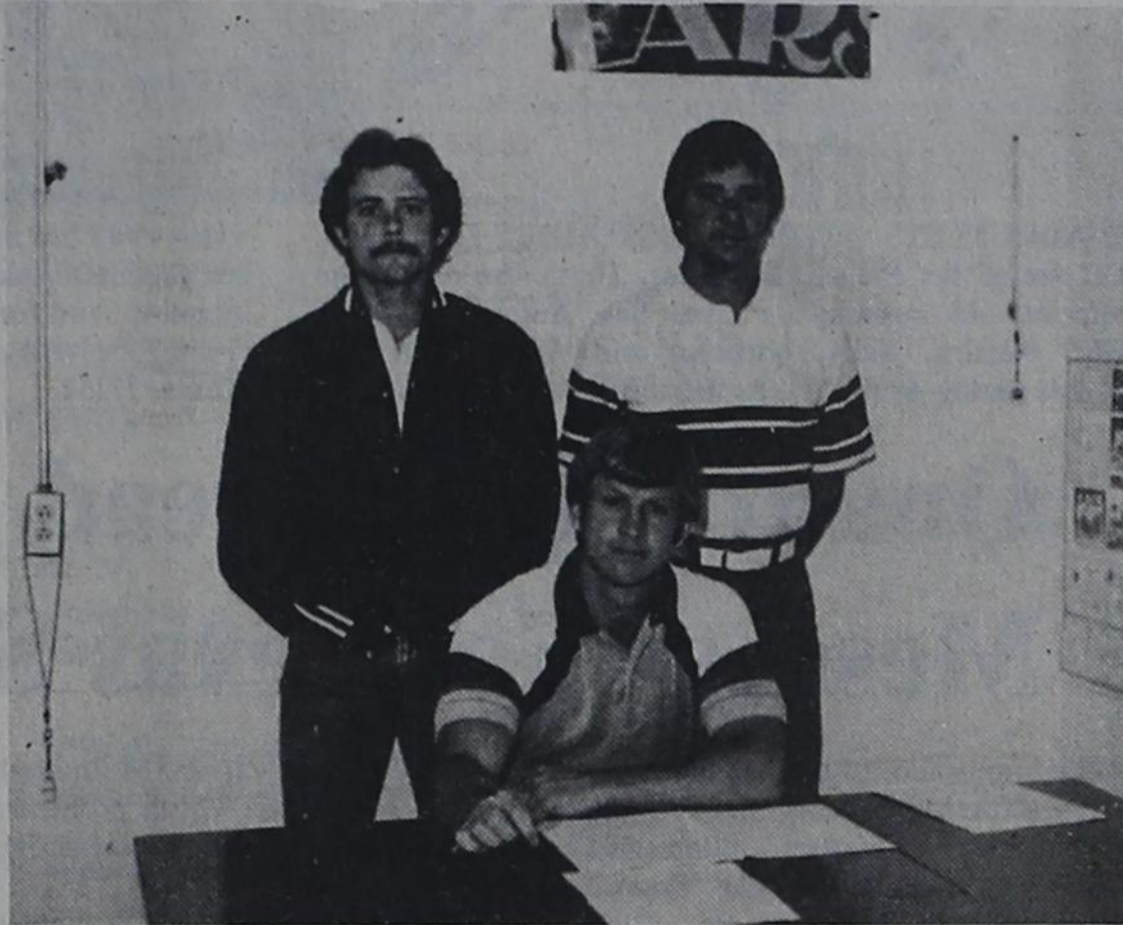
Both the conventions are equally important and there will be several issues in each of these conventions which will need to be decided.

Topliff Resigns For AAA Job

In a statement made by Coach Paul Topliff, Tuesday, the head coach and athletic director at Bovina for the past two seasons indicated that he will be leaving Bovina to assume the same duties at Lubbock Cooper High School as of May 1.

Topliff, 34, led the Mustang football team to back-to-back successful seasons of 6-4 and 6-3-1 in the two years he was coach here.

A graduate of Westmar College in Iowa, Topliff has a master's degree in science and had previously coached at Everly, Ia., and Texico, N.M., as well as a year as an assistant at ENMU, prior to coming to Bovina.

He will be taking over the head coaching duties at Lubbock Cooper High School, a class AAA school whose football team went 1-9 the past season.

Also joining Topliff from the Bovina staff will be Coaches Robert Ulibarri, Roy Phelps and Clifton Neal as well as Mike Prokup from Farwell.

In making his decision Topliff said, "This was the most difficult decision I have ever had to make in my entire career, because I love Bovina and I love the kids here."

Citing that he felt that this was a career move for him, Topliff also said that, although he was leaving May 1 to begin his new duties, he would always be extremely fond of the administration at Bovina High School and would also be fond of the entire community, stating that he and his family would miss Bovina "tremendously."

"I have never worked for a better administration and school board than

this one," said the coach.

Another point that the coach stressed was that he felt that the program here would continue after he was gone.

"The kids built this program and they are not the types who will see it fail after I have left. Bovina will go on without me!"

When asked how he measured the success here, Topliff said he measured the success by the smiles on the kids' faces when they finally are able to feel good about themselves.

Mrs. Topliff has also been accepted as a second grade teacher in the Cooper system and she will join the coach when school is out in Bovina.

In conclusion, Coach Topliff summed up his feelings by saying, "I will really miss all of this...the kids, administration, and people of Bovina. Everyone has just been super to us, and I want everyone to know how very much their support and friendship has meant to us. We are not leaving because we don't like Bovina but are leaving because I feel it is the right thing for me to do at this time in my career."

Commissioner's Race Highlights Primary

Saturday, May 1, is primary election day across the state of Texas. Some interesting races are on tap in the local area.

Spicing up the local Democratic primary is the County Commissioner's race, where three candidates, the incumbent and two challengers, are on the ballot.

Polling place in Bovina for the Democratic Primary is the American Legion Hall, with Jay Sherrill as presiding election judge.

The Republican Primary will hold its primary election in Bovina at the School Cafeteria. There will be no Republican polling place at Rhea, nor in the District 2-2 voting precinct in Friona, all of whom will have to drive to Bovina if they vote in the Republican primary.

County Democratic Chairman Richard Collard, whose name is not on the ballot, has indicated that he would serve another two-year term if elected, but his name will need to be written in by voters in the Democratic primary, if they so desire to re-elect him to that office.

OTHER POLL SITES

The Oklahoma Lane voting precinct will vote at the Community Center, and the Rhea precinct (democrats) will vote at the Rhea Community Center.

Four candidates are seeking the position of County Commissioners, Precinct 2, three in the Democratic primary and one in the Republican.

Incumbent Jack Patterson is being opposed by Tommy Williams and Radford Venable in the Democratic primary. Dale Hart is a candidate in the Republican primary.

Another highlight of the Democratic primary will be the governor's race, where six candidates are seeking the nomination. The best known of the six are present attorney general Mark White, present land commissioner Bob Armstrong, and industrialist Buddy Temple.

A runoff in June appears to be virtually certain for this race.

The attorney general's race also looks to be interesting, due to the re-emergence of Max Sherman into the political arena. Jack Ogg is his principal opponent in the primary, although two other Democrats are running.

The state treasurer's race also drew four candidates, principally Lane Denton and the incumbent with the famous name, Warren G. Harding.

On the county level, two county-wide offices are contested. Benna Felts, the incumbent treasurer, is opposed by Anne Norton of Farwell.

For District Clerk, where longtime clerk Dorothy Quickel is retiring, Cynthia Thigpen and Marjorie Watkins, both of Farwell, are the candidates.

In commissioner's precinct four, which now includes a portion of Friona (east, southeast and northeast), incumbent Raymond McGehee and a former commissioner, Raymond Treider, Jr., both of Lazbuddie, are the candidates.

In commissioner's precinct two, which also has been redrawn to include the portion of Friona north and west of Highway 60 and north

New Precinct Lines Enforced During Primary

The new precinct lines, which were proposed earlier in the year and approved by the County Commissioners, will be effective in the primary elections, coming up May 1, according to County Judge Porter Roberts.

Although these lines have not yet been approved by the Justice Department, these will be the guidelines that voters should go by when casting their votes.

Most adversely affected will be the voters in Friona, whose precincts have been worked around in a very confusing maze of patterns.

As far as Bovina is concerned, there should not be any real problems, as the precinct has been able to remain pretty much intact, even after the re-apportionment.

For those of you who are Blade readers, you may want to come into the office prior to the election and look at the February 10, 1982 issue of the Blade which contains maps showing the new precinct lines.

Highway 214, incumbent commissioner Jack Patterson is opposed by Tommy Williams and Radford Venable, both of the Bovina area.

Other county officials, including Judge Porter Roberts, Charles Aycock, clerk Bonnie Warren, and district judge Jack Young, are unopposed.

Quadruplets Spread Blindness Message For Texas Society

The importance of early childhood vision screening is being highlighted during April, Prevent Blindness Month by the bright-eyed Tyson quadruplets of San Antonio. The message that four-year-old Kendra, Kelly, Nicholas and Aimee bring is that all children should have an eye test by the age of four.

"One child in 20 has an eye problem that can be best corrected if detected in the preschool years," says R.E. Margo, M.D., State Medical Chairman of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. "If the child's problem is amblyopia or 'lazy eye' it must be corrected by the age of six or the child may lose all functional sight in that eye."

"Unfortunately parents can't detect a problem just by looking at the child. Unless a child has a condition such as crossed eyes, there is seldom an external sign to indicate that an eye problem exists."

Dr. Margo explained further that a child has no way of knowing if he is seeing poorly. If a child sees a tree down the street as a green blur, he thinks trees look like that to everyone.

"This underscores the need for an

eye test," he said. "Even the simplest one can help detect vision problems such as amblyopia or refractive errors."

Many parents think that a child's vision can't be tested until the child is old enough to read the letters on the eye chart, Dr. Margo went on. That is erroneous. Doctors can readily test a baby's sight and Prevent Blindness looks forward to the day when every child's eyes will be examined by a professional at birth and during the preschool years.

"That, however, is still the impossible dream," he said, "so special eye charts have been devised for screening young children. In the Prevent Blindness and Texas school programs a 'Tumbling E' chart is used. The 'E's' are faced in four different directions on the chart and the child is asked to indicate which way the 'E's' are pointing. It's a simple test, often played as a game with the children, yet it can detect major problems. Failure to pass the test has also led to such diagnoses as traumatic cataracts and retinal detachments."

"If a child has not had a professional eye examination or been

tested in a vision screening program, Prevent Blindness-and the Tyson quadruplets-encourage the parent to write for the Society's free Home Eye Test for preschoolers. This test will give the parent an opportunity to play this important 'game' at home," Dr. Margo said.

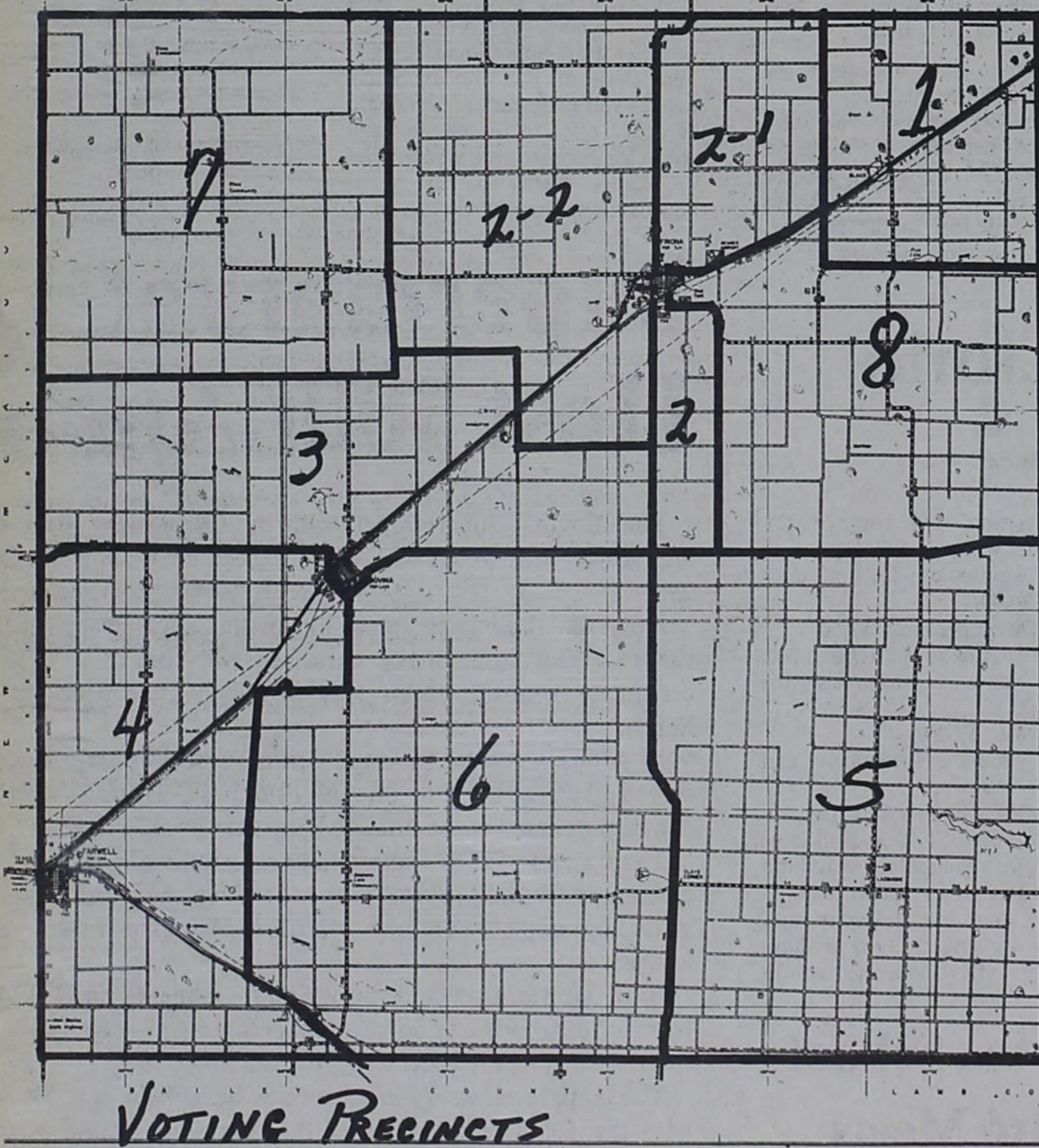

Living Bank To Register Donors

The First Annual Organ Donation Awareness Week will be held April 26-May 1, and is a special national project of the Texas Medical Association Auxiliary and the other state auxiliaries. Mrs. George Bush has accepted the National Honorary Chairmanship for this drive to increase awareness of the importance of the need for people to register as organ donors with The Living Bank.

The Living Bank, founded in Houston in 1968, is a non-profit service organization which coordinates the anatomical donations of donors throughout the United States. The organization is the only national donor registry. At the present time, approximately 100,000 people are registered with The Living Bank.

The purposes of The Living Bank are to (1) educate the public about the importance of organ and/or body donations; (2) register those who wish to be donors; and (3) when death occurs, refer the donations to the appropriate medical facilities closest to the place of death.

The Living Bank provides a donor registration form and a Uniform Donor Card—the only legal document needed in 50 states under the Uniform Anatomical Gift Act. The member should fully discuss his wishes to be a donor with his family since at the

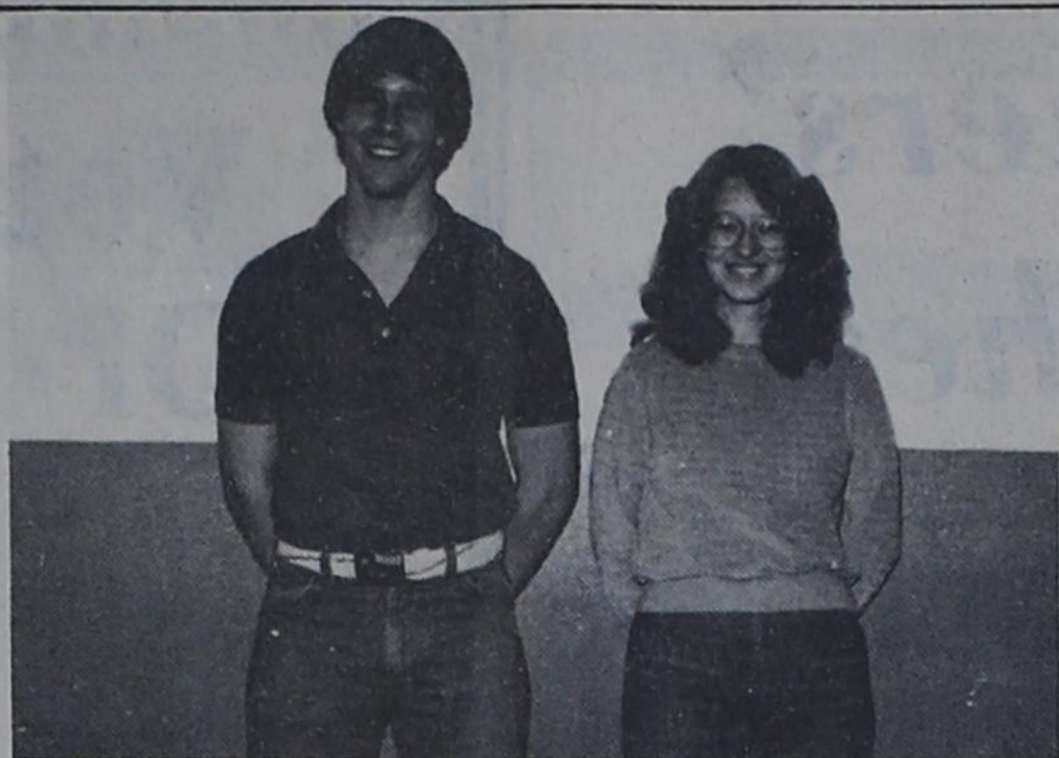
time of death, the medical personnel will not remove any organ for transplant without the consent of the next of kin.

The organization maintains a 24 hour telephone service, (713) 528-2971, to refer donations to medical schools, eye banks, kidney transplant facilities and other organ banks wherever the donor is throughout the United States.

There is only a limited time following the death of a donor in which to retrieve organs: vital organs (kidneys, hearts, lungs, livers, etc.)—minutes after death. Donor must be maintained on life support system; eyes—4-6 hours; bone—8 hours; and skin—18 hours.

The most awesome medical era of all—the transplant era—continues to advance remarkably. There are many among us who are so critically ill as to be in need of an organ transplant. 1981 figures indicate that approximately 62,000 Americans are on kidney dialysis with 10,000-12,000 people waiting for transplants; 25,000 cornea transplant operations were performed in 1981 but some 50,000 people were waiting.

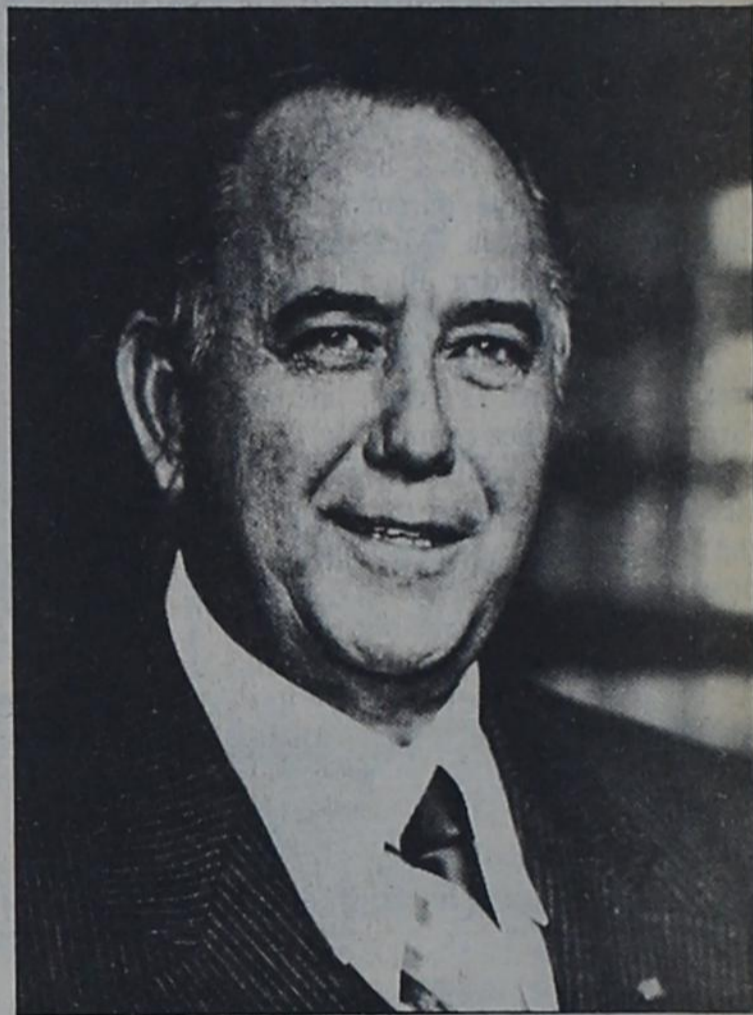

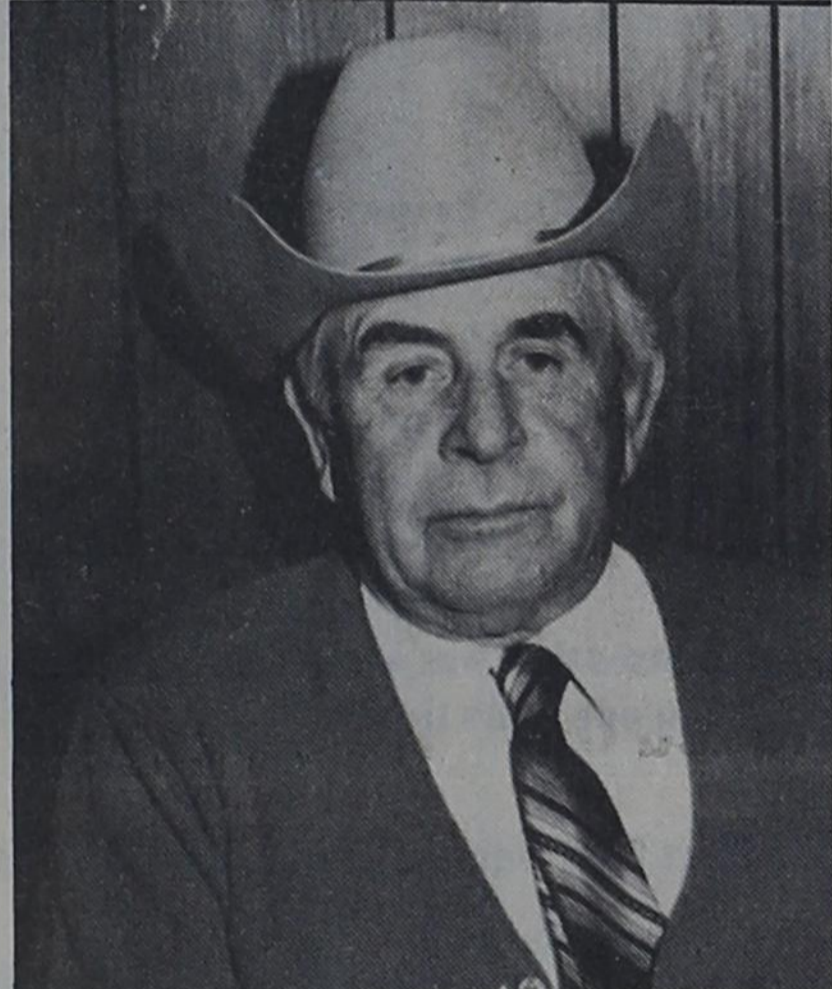

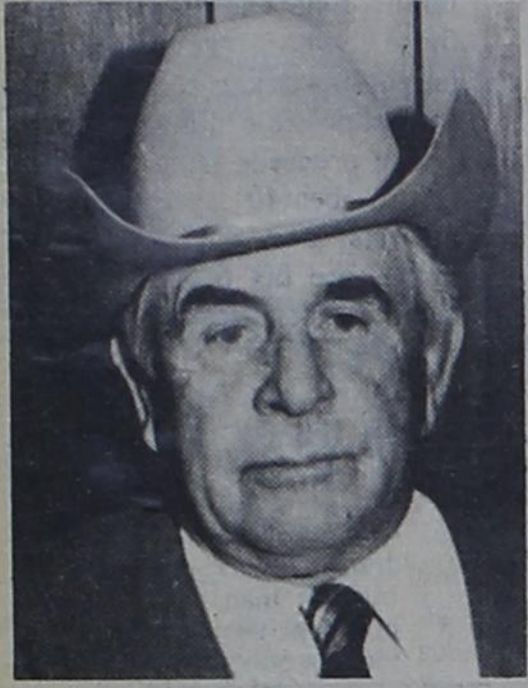

Among Patterson's objectives, if elected, are to represent the people of the precinct fairly and as equally as he possibly can.

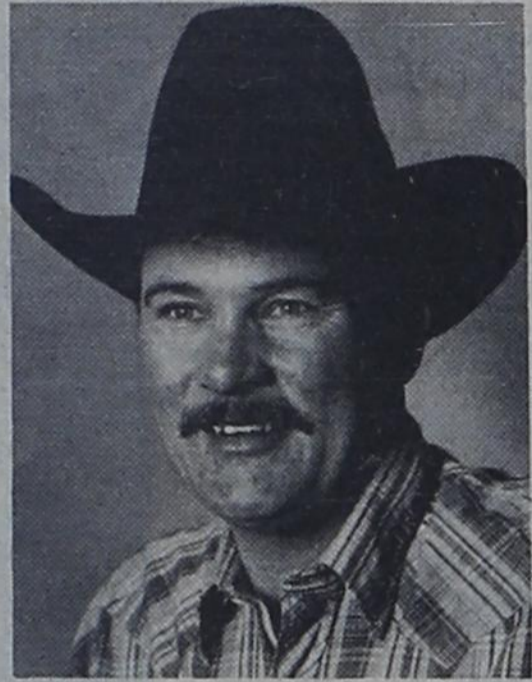
The Pattersons are members of the First Baptist Church in Bovina.

West Texas plants may be fuel source

COLLEGE STATION — Texas A&M University plant scientists say vast quantities of land in semi-arid regions of West Texas may be used for mass cultivation of plants to provide additional sources of fuel.

After screening more than 2,900 Texas plants for biomass energy potential, the researchers say at least four and perhaps as many as 12 varieties of weeds that grow in the Southwest promise potential as sources of fuel.

"We're primarily looking at crops that could have multiple uses," says Dr. Ron Newton, a researcher with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Texas A&M assessing the kinds of plants that would be best suited for energy conversion.

Among the plants found as good candidates for energy conversion are kochia, Johnson grass, saltbush and mesquite.

"Car-train" crash barrier protects highway crews

COLLEGE STATION — An experimental, mobile crash barrier designed to protect road repair crews performed "excellently," says a state highway department official who watched a recent crash test at Texas A&M University.

The unconventional barrier, consisting of five old station wagons, guardrails and wood, was designed by researchers of the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) to stop vehicles from hitting workers performing repair work on busy freeways and streets. Last year, 12 workers were killed in Houston alone.

The barrier — designed by TTI researchers Don Ivey, Hayes Ross and Ted Hirsch — is five cars connected together. Only the first car needs to run, and like a train engine, pulls the others along. Guardrailing is attached to the sides of the vehicles with heavy wood beams and metal bolts.

At present, workers are protected by either orange plastic cones or concrete, the researchers said. The cones offer virtually no protection and the concrete barriers are expensive and time-consuming to position.

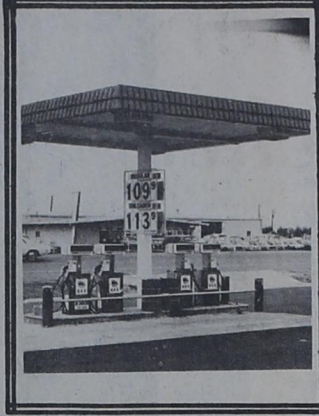

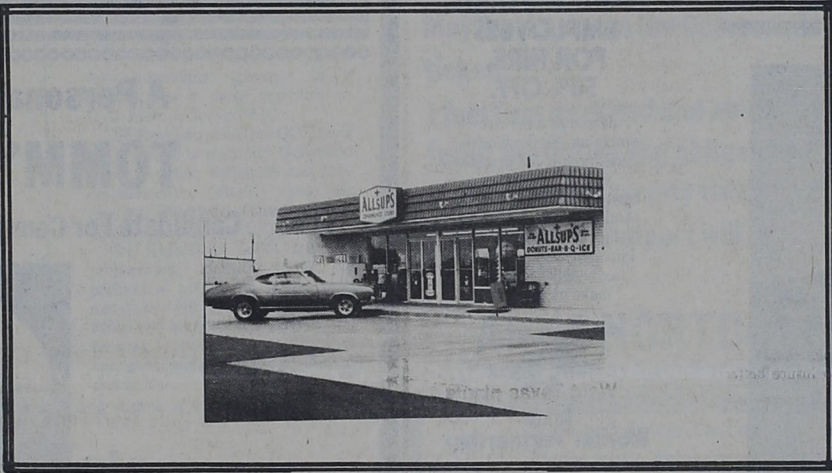

Houlettes Honored At 65th Anniversary

Rev. and Mrs. Ernest Houlette, of South Prince Street, Clovis, New Mexico, were honored on the occasion of their 65th wedding anniversary with a luncheon in the home of Kenneth and Ann Houlette, Dumas, on March 28. Ernest and Bessie Houlette were married on March 25, 1917, nineteen miles north of Texico, New Mexico, in the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George McLean.

The highlight of the day was a family biography as delivered by Ernest. It was pointed out that Rev. Houlette's great-grandfather came to the United States from France and lived in America during the time of the American Revolutionary War, and that Ernest's father was a soldier in the Civil War and later fought with the American Cavalry against the Indians of Texas and New Mexico. At the conclusion of their skirpmish his regiment walked from San Antonio to New Orleans.

Ernest came to Friona from Iowa in 1908, at age 13, with his parents and twin brother. Bessie came to Friona by train in 1901. Her father and stepmother, George McLean and Ollie Whitaker, were the first couple to be married in Parmer County.

The Whitakers were pioneers in Parmer and Curry counties, having a farm and ranch southwest of the Rhea community. After Ernest and Bessie married in 1917 they moved into Friona where they raised their seven children, all of whom attended

the Friona school systems. Houlette related other pioneer

experiences including the great prairie fire of 1906 and the depression days and the dust bowl days of the 1930s and 40s, and of early courtship days. The Houlettes established one of the early businesses in Friona, a full service laundry, which they opened in the early thirties, and operated until the mid-fifties. They also founded the Friona Pentecostal Church in 1939. He served as the pastor until 1958 and has since served as pastor to churches in Plainview, Littlefield, Albuquerque and Clovis.

Mr. and Mrs. Houlette are the parents of Kenneth of Dumas, Ted of El Paso, Betty Gore of Clovis, N.M., Dale of Friona, Wayne of Plainview, Jerry of Lubbock, and Pearl Hutchins (deceased).

Mr. and Mrs. Houlette currently live alone and enjoy reading, gardening, raising chickens and visiting with family and friends. In 1977, at age 83, Ernest undertook the task of paying off a church note by making and selling peanut brittle candy.

In four months time, with one volunteer to help him, he had earned more than \$3200, enough to clear the debt and pay for all the necessary supplies. Both Houlettes are still active in their church where he serves whenever the pastor needs to be away and Mrs. Houlette occasionally plays the piano.

In the Republican primary, there are only four contested races. The race drawing the most interest is that for U.S. Senator, where Dallas legislator Jim Collins hopes to challenge incumbent Democrat Lloyd Bentsen. He first must beat GOP challengers Don Richardson and Walter Mengden, but should have little trouble.

Governor Bill Clements, the state's first Republican governor in a century, has a party opponent in Duke Embs, whoever he is.

The other two contested GOP races are for state comptroller (Raymond Frank vs Mike Richards) and land commissioner, where three are running: Woodrow Glasscock, Jr., Andrew Jackson and Al Gutierrez.

The Republican ballot has five propositions, including those for parimutuel betting on horse races, mandatory jail time for repeat DWI offenders, initiative and referendum, banning private ownership of handguns, and abolishing the Sunday closing laws.

Commissioners Okay Payment For Pickup

County commissioners, meeting in regular session Monday, April 12, approved payment of \$11,488.70 to Friona Ford Sales, Inc. for the pickup purchased for the County Extension Agent at a previous meeting, in which the county Ford agency submitted the lowest bid.

Payment of a bill for boarding care of five Parmer County children, in the amount of \$1,271 was approved. This amount will be re-imbursed.

County Treasurer Benna Felts' quarterly report was approved, with the added stipulation that the report be published in the county's three newspapers.

Approval was granted to pay Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley \$54 for services, through March 15 regarding the reapportionment of commissioners' precincts.

A motion was approved to pay a fee of \$25, as the county's part of the planning for the dedication of the Running Water Draw Watershed

Project in September.

Approval was granted to purchase an "Information Guide to County Government" for the county attorney, at \$65.

Requests were approved to (1) help pay a county woman's prenatal aid due to circumstances involved in the case and (2) help another county citizen pay their gas and drug bill, on a one time only case.

Easement was granted on a request to cross a county road with a water line.

County agent Seth Ralston reported that he has been busy doing soil tests. He also noted that there would be a 4-H Club District Livestock Judging and rifle contest in Lubbock on April 24.

Approval was granted for soil conservation work for 20 separate individuals when county machinery is in their area, for which the county will be re-imbursed.

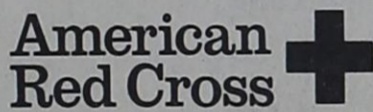

Relative Is Hit With New Song

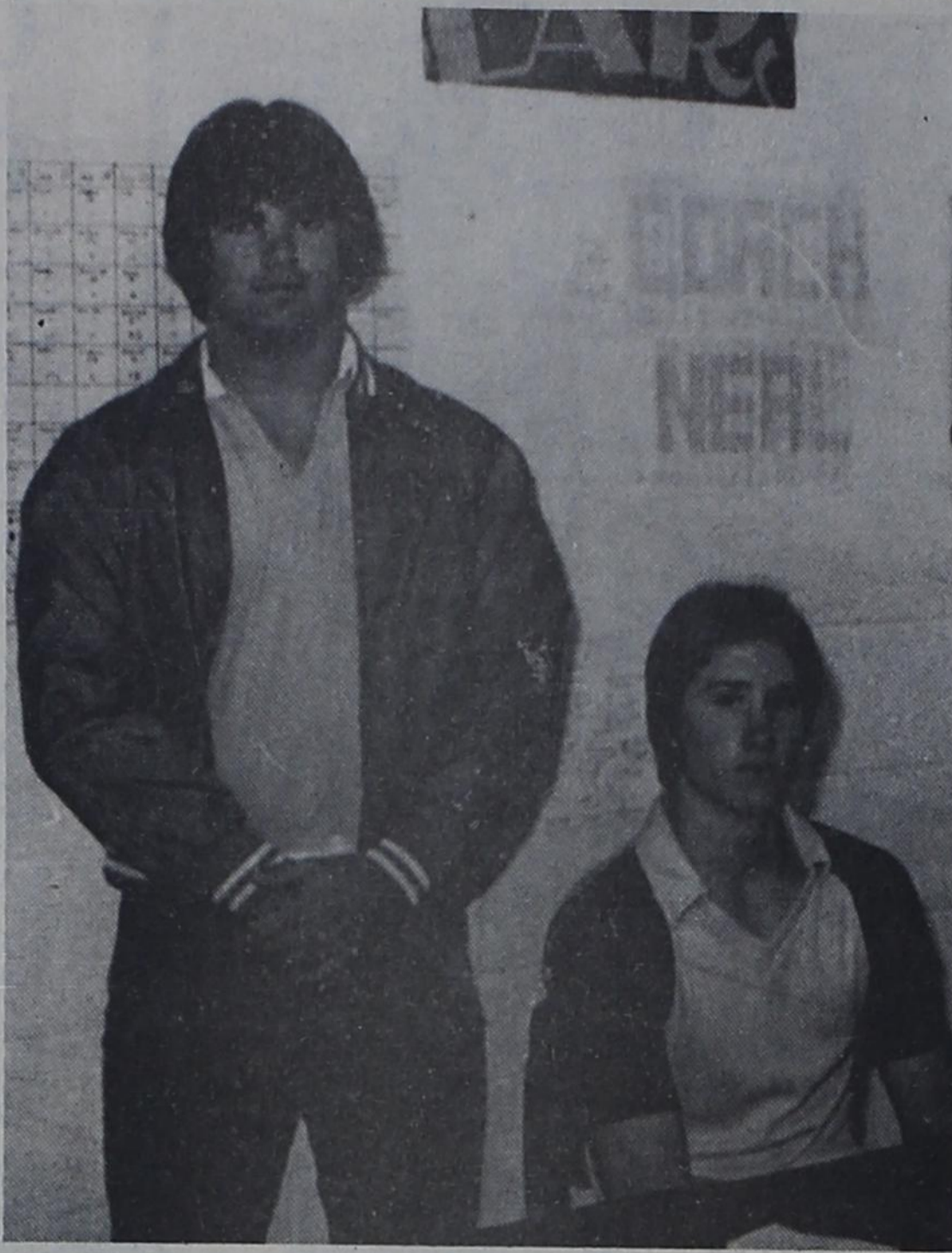
Margaret Charles traveled to Lubbock last Thursday to hear a variety show in which Melissa Glasscock of Bovina sang her new song, "Baby In Town."

In the mile relay team, these girls did well also, as they beat their

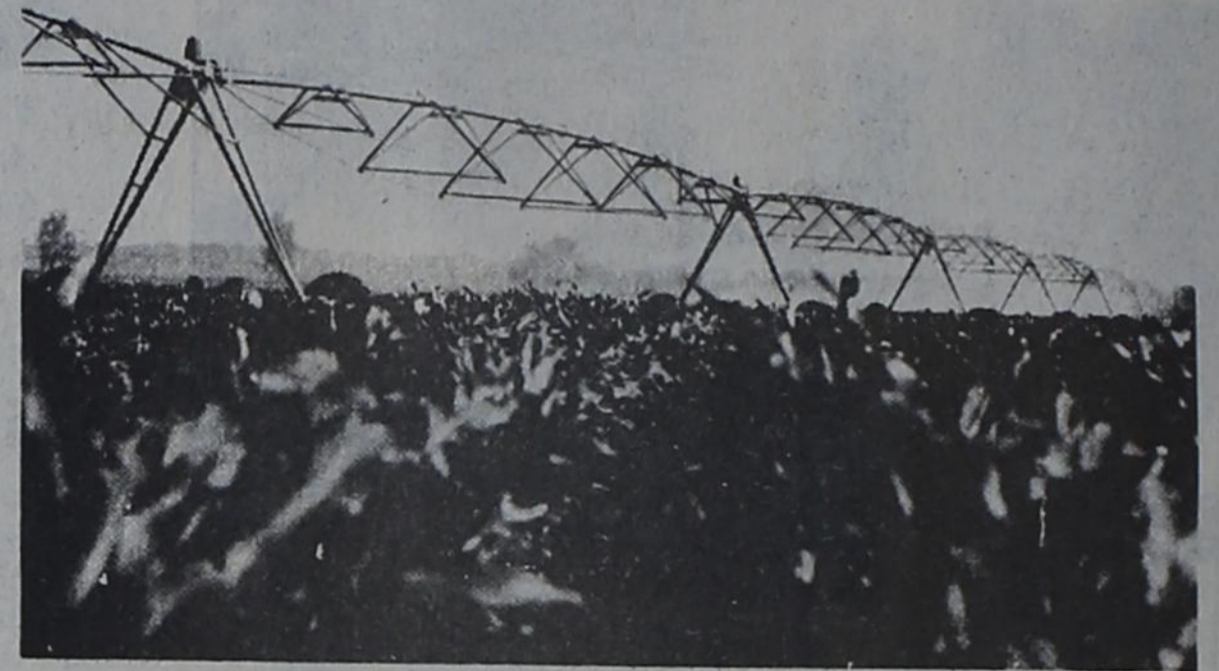
previous best time of 3:25 by running a 3:22.3 but this was still not good enough to qualify for state.

With energy costs zooming just any center pivot won't do.



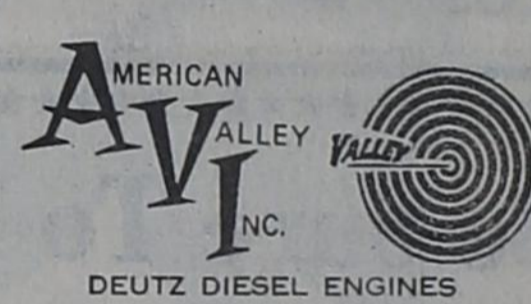
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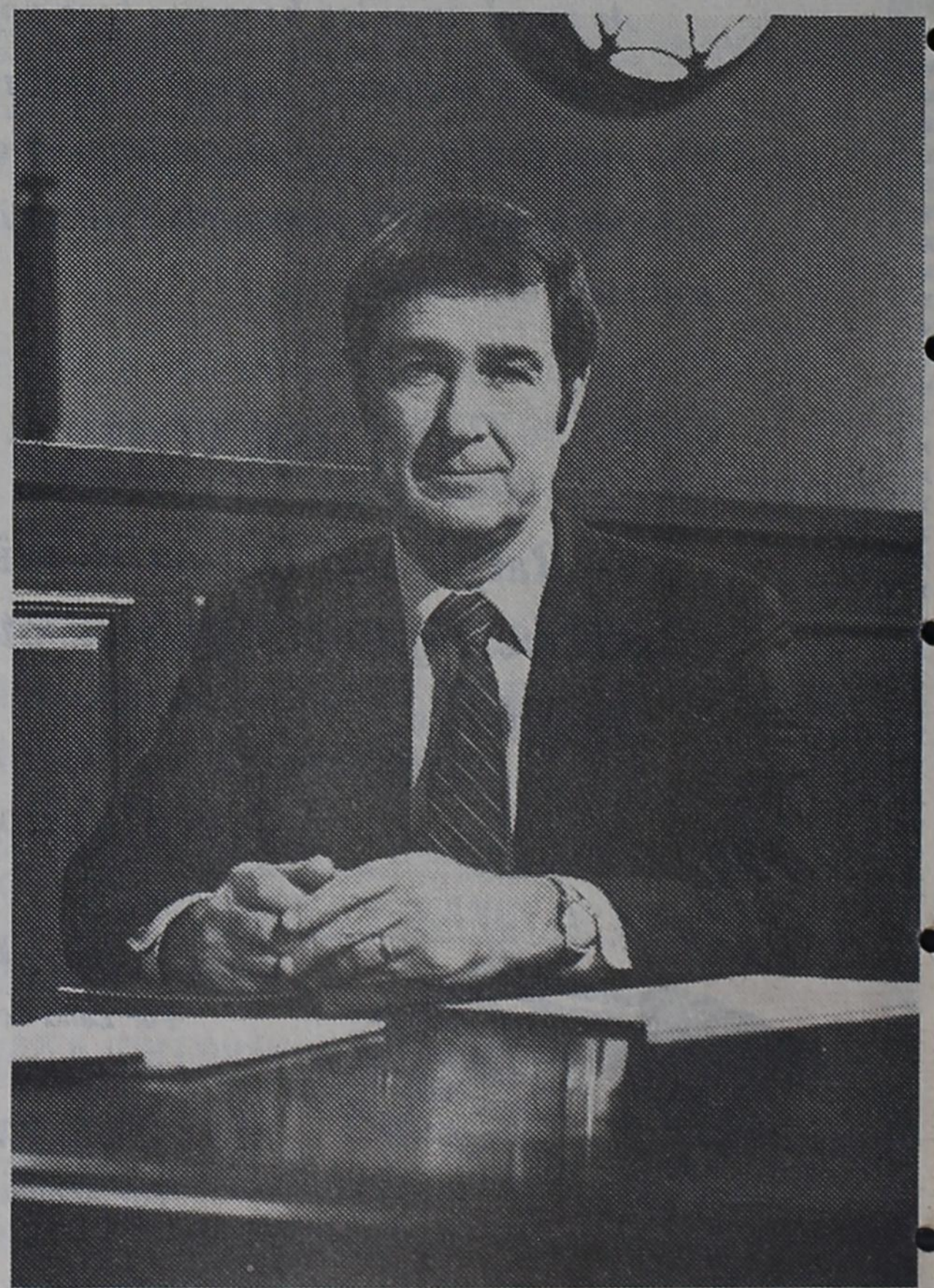
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
