Honey, And The Process It Goes Through Before It's Ready To Eat

During a recent visit to the Lee Ivey home, east of Baird, this reporter was invited to watch Mr. Ivey and his two grandsons in the process of extracting honey in the bee house out back of the home. Besides, being very good to eat, it is also interesting to know what is done to the honey before it is placed on our tables.

The honey is removed from the bottom of the extractor through a faucet into buckets weighing 50 pounds when full The honey-filled buckets are placed into hot water and heated to 75 degrees. This is done so that the honey becomes as thin as possible, so that it can be poured through strainers that it is also easier to seal in quart containers when it is at a hot

The honey bee, with its life and work is a very interesting thory. Eees are divided into hree groups, queen, drones and vorkers. Each has a special part op lay in the life of the colony, there is one queen. All the cork of the colony is done by he workers. The worker is a male who cannot lay eggs. Jimson weed, sometimes called thornapple or stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves.

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
