### Alpine Man Dead. Sonoran Injured In Hiway Wreck

HANK FINGER KILLED: BUD HALBERT, OTHER HURT EARLY SUNDAY

An Alpine man was killed, and three others, including B. M. (Bud) Halbert III of Sonora were injured early Sunday morning when the car in which they were riding struck a Highway 90 guardrail 14 miles northwest of Del Rio.

The dead man was Henry Cecil (Hank) Finger, Jr., 24, manager of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce. Finger died of a fractured skull in a Del Rio hospital Sunday morning about 3 hours after the accident.

Halbert and Jimmie Rush of New Mexico suffered minor injuries. Halbert, who was driving at the time of the accident, was taken to the home of his aunt. Mrs. Willie B. Whitehead, in Del Rio and Rush was taken to the hospital. Both were thought to have rib injuries. James Dyer of Baird, the fourth occupant of the car, was not injured.

Halbert and Dyer are Sul Ross students. Finger graduated from Sul Ross last spring.

The accident occurred in the Castle Canyon area about two miles west of the Devil's River Bridge on a comparatively straight stretch of highway. The car crashed into the end anchor post of the guard rail unit. The rail ripped through the front grill of Finger's Mercury sedan and pinned him against the seat.

Funeral services for Finger were held Tuesday afternoon from the First Methodist Church in Alvin. Burial was in the Confederate Cemetery. The Rev. William Hattaway officiated. Finger is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Finger, Sr., who live in Alvin, and three sisters.




Organized in 1887 as an honor company and crack drill unit, the Ross Volunteer company at the A. and M. College of Texas is the oldest student organization in the state. The first company was called the "Scott Volunteers" in honor of the popular Col. T. M. Scott, then business manager of the college. In 1890, when the illustrious Lawrence Sullivan Ross, Confederate General and former Governor, became president of the college, the name was changed to honor him, and the group became permanently established as the honor company of the college. Through the years the Ross Volunteers have held to high standards of character, scholarship and military precision. In addition to their spectacular precision drills, they have served as honor guards for distinguished visitors to the campus and have participated in many for distinguished visitors to the campus and have participated in many state ceremonies as an honor guard to the Governor. Less than a generation ago grain sorghum was a tall spindling chickenfeed crop, grown on a few Texas farms. Today it is the state's second
money crop, valued at \$166,000,000 a year. A \$24,000,000 plant for
processing this one crop has been built at Corpus Christi. This amazing
development is the result of research by plant scientists of the Texas
Agricultural Experiment Station of the A. and M. System, under the
eadership of R. E. (Bob) Karper, A. and M. agronomist at Lubbock.
By juggling the genes within the grain sorghum seed, Karper and
others have been able to pull it down to a thrifty low-growing plant with
big heads at uniform height throughout the field. This made it possible
to harvest the grain mechanically, completely revolutionizing the agriuniture of the Texas plains area. The present day combine type grain
torghum is being further developed for a variety of uses and is
increasing rapidly in value to Texas farmers, as a result of the work
of this Pennsylvania farm boy who has been engaged in agricultural
research on the Texas plains since 1915.






1/2 cup chopped walnuts

in nuts. Pour into greased one and one-half quart mold. Cover, or tie a double layer of waxed paper securely over top of mold. Steam one hour and 15 minutes. Unmold. Serve with whipped cream or hard sauce.
