



State Announces May Draft Quotos

Texas draft boards have been called upon by state Selective Service headquarters to order 6,807 men for physical examinations during the month of May.

State headquarters originally had intended to examine around 10,000 men in May, but cut the figure down after the April induction call was reduced from 4.150 to 2,075, Brigadier General Paul . Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said.

General Wakefield said that local boards quotas for the May physical examinations and May inductions are now in the hands of local boards. The May induction quota for the state is 3,112.





POISONOUS RANGE PLANT CONTROL TEST RESULTS RELEASED

Control of many poisonous range plants is practical with herbicidal sprays such as 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T, according to Dr. Omar E. Sperry, professor of range and forestry, Texas A. & M. College System.

In tests conducted by the Texas received his registration number Agriculture Experiment Station, ontrol costs, when applied on large acreages, ranged from \$2.00 to \$4.00 per acre.

For lasting benefits, Dr. Sperry emphasizes that lighter stocking of ranges, deferment of poor-condition ranges and isolation of heavily infested areas should be practiced along with the spraying of poisonous plants.

Effective kills of bitterweed, rayless goldenrod, peavine, loco, garboncillo, groundsel and desert baileya were obtained with different concentrations and mixtures of 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T in field tests conducted in 1950.

A summary of results from experiments work in controlling poisonous range plants conducted in 1950 is given in Progress Report 1334, available from the Publications Office, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas.







Pennywise Frosted Twists



Would you guess that you can make these tempting Twists for just a cent-and-a-half apiece? Serve them for family meals and coffee hour refreshments.

For a new twist to your "sweets" assortment, make glazed Twists from a kneaded sweet yeast dough. These rolls are a take-off on the popular cruller, but are baked instead of being deep-fat fried.

popular cruller, but are baked instead of being deep-fat fried. Use recipe suggested here, or your own favorite sweet yeast roll recipe. If you wish, make one coffee cake and use the rest of the dough to shape Twists. No special equipment is needed. Just fold 8-inch strips of dough in half and roll so the strips twist. If you pre-fer, cut dough into four-inch strips and twist together by twos. Pinch ends of dough together so the Twists won't uncurl during baking. When cool glaze with confectioners' sugar icing. Make this by combining three tablespoons milk and one cup confectioners' sugar. Good nutrition goes hand in hand with economy when you serve these tempting sweet rolls. The enriched flour used in making breads of all kinds provides essential B-vitamins and food iron needed for vitality and good health.

Y₂ cup sugar Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour. Mix well. Add eggs and lemon rind. Beat well. Add softened yeast. Mix well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until satiny. Place in greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled. Makes about 3 dozen twists.

bugs, harvest mites, chiggers or engorged. That severe itching is caused by an anti-coagulant materal they inject into their host, according to the health official. Favorite spots seem to be feet, hands, and stomach. Secondary infection in the form of boils and sores results from persistent scratching. Dr. Cox says chiggers are tough to control in heavily wooded sec-

ions, but in lawns, camp sites, and picnic grounds where grass can be cut close, the job can be done inexpensively and without much trouble.

He recommends dusting or sprayng the area with crude benzine hexachloride at the rate of 2 to pounds per acre. "Your summer will more plea-

sant for the effort," the doctor advised.






