Everyone is invited to attend the carnival on Halloween night.

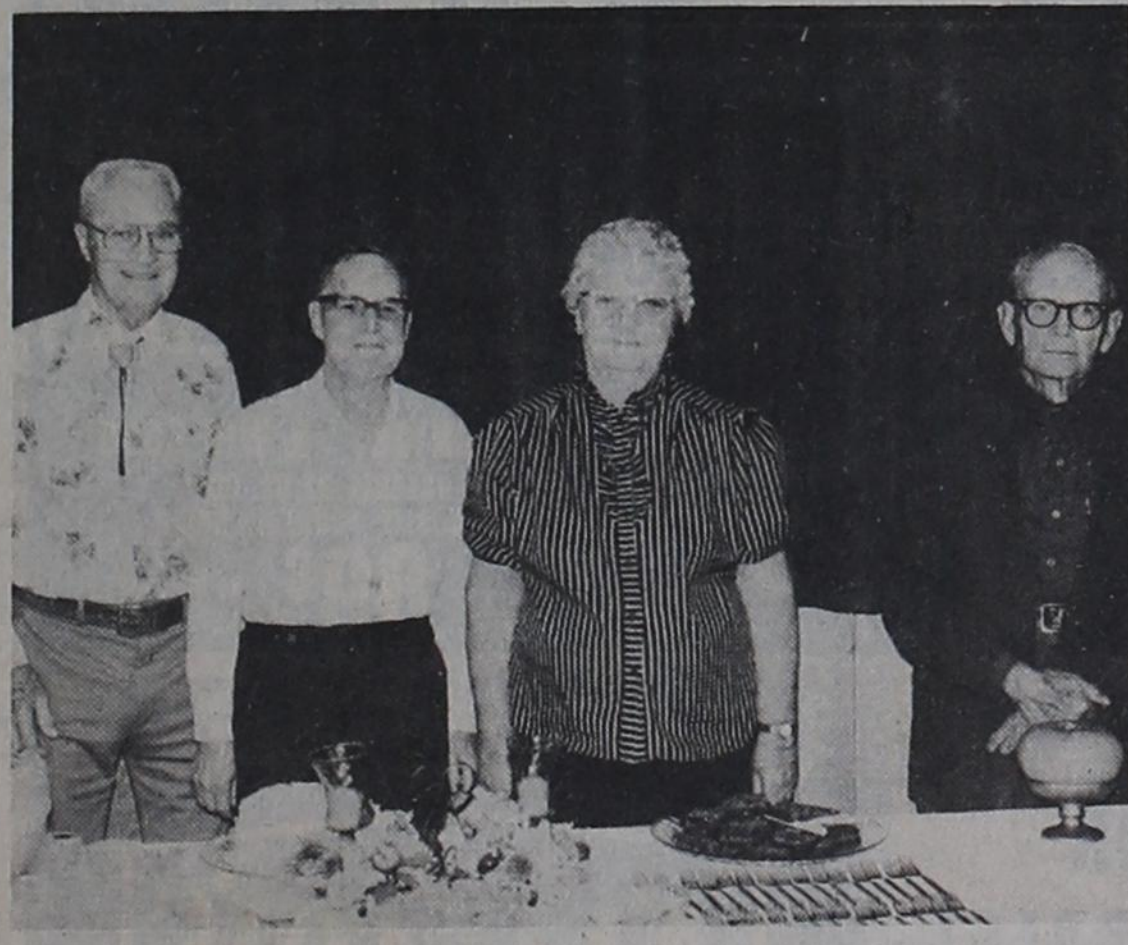
## 4th Graders Set Play

## EMS Gives Halloween Warnings

Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System paramedics issued a few warnings for the ghosts, goblins and witches out on Halloween. It is the time of year when some special problems occur. Here are a few tips on warding off these unwanted tricksters:

Halloween costumes are notoriously poor insulators from the cold, so be sure to bundle up under the costume. The head accounts for the greatest percentage of heat loss from the body. A good stocking cap or other well insulated head gear is in order. Of course, well bundled bodies are musts in the cold, since a child is less likely to complain of being cold in the excitement of the moment. Extra pairs of socks and a warm pair of gloves is recommended. It's a good idea to unbundle as soon as you get home to prevent overheating the child.

Unfortunately, parents must beware the criminally insane people who seem to enjoy giving out dangerous treats on Halloween. Anything from chocolate covered mice to razor blades in apples have been reported in the past. Parents can best avoid these idiots by following a few basic rules for trick or treaters:

- 1) Only visit people you know well.
- 2) Caution your children to never accept treats from other children, especially older children.
- 3) Never allow your child to have homemade treats such as candied apples or popcorn balls unless you know the giver well.
- 4) Examine each treat yourself for any evidence of tampering and caution your children to never eat a treat until you have examined it.
- 5) Only allow individually wrapped treats that can be examined easily for evidence of having been opened or tampered with.
- 6) Caution your children to never let someone else examine or handle their treats.

If your child eats one of their treats before they get home and begin to manifest symptoms of nausea, vomiting or general distress after having been well all evening, you may want to notify Emergency Medical personnel.

## Court Awards Pact For Roof Renovation

At the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court October 10, a contract was awarded to Leaway Roofing of Hereford to re-roof the county courthouse, in the amount of \$13,410.

Leaway's bid was the only one received on the project, but after some discussion, was accepted by the court.

Boarding care bills on Parmer County's foster children, in the amount of \$2,073 were approved. The amount will be re-imbursed to the county.

A motion was passed to advertise for bids for the purchase of a motor grader for Precinct 4. Bids are to be opened at 11 a.m. on October 24. Two bids are being asked for: one for a standard purchase and one for a lease-purchase arrangement.

## Support Is Sought For Amendment

Texas taxpayers have a lot to gain and nothing to lose in voting FOR Proposition 5, the school bond amendment, in the November 8 constitutional amendments election.

"This amendment could save our schools and local taxpayers \$435 million in interest payments alone in just the next 17 years," said Bovina Superintendent Bob Owen.

At the present time local school district bond ratings and interest rates are judged solely by the local district's financial situation. Proposition 5 would cure that by permitting qualified local school bond issues to be backed by the state's \$3 billion Permanent School Fund. The result would be better bond ratings and lower interest rates for the local districts.

"The state's Permanent Fund would simply be lending its good name; it would not be paying off the bonds. Texas schools have a fine bond record. In the unlikely event of a default, the state would simply pick up the payments by withholding the local district's state allotments," Owen said.

"Bovina Schools are not planning a bond issue anytime in the near future, but because of the tremendous savings this proposition can mean to the taxpayers I strongly urge you to vote for Proposition 5 on November 8," the local school official concluded.

## BHS Hosts Kress In Vital Contest

With a new lease on life and spurred on by the possibility of grabbing one of the two playoff spots for District 5-AA, the Bovina Mustangs will host the Kress Kangaroos in a vital game at Mustang Field Friday at 7:30 p.m.

"We have been improving every week, and that has been our goal. We have put together six consecutive scoreless quarters on defense, and we plan to see how far we can extend that record," says Mustang Coach Larry Helton.

Kress will bring probably the biggest team which the Mustangs will face this season. Their defensive line averages 230 pounds, and they have a player or two in the 250-pound range.

But Helton isn't worried about the size of the opposition. "The key to the game will be in how we play and execute," he stresses.

For the year, Kress has struggled somewhat, with a 2-6 season record. Both wins have been in district play, over Olton and Hart. Farwell beat the 'Roos, 28-7 last Friday.

Kress has scored only 69 points (8.6 per game) and given up 262 (32.8 per game), having the worse defensive average in the district in that record. Bovina, meanwhile, with its 47-point output against Springlake-Earth, now is averaging 22 points a game.

Helton said the Kangaroos ran the straight T, wing T, power I and do some sweeps. "They just try to run over you," he said. He called the Kangaroos a well-coached team.

Helton said the team had only a minimum number of new injuries. "Terry Glasscock aggravated an ankle, but he was at about 80 per cent speed by Monday, and should be near 100 by Friday," the Mustang coach said.

As to the team's chances to make the playoffs, Helton said, "We have our destiny in our own hands—we don't have to depend on anyone to help us at this point," he concluded. At the present time, Bovina, Kress and Olton are in a three-way tie for second place with records of 2-1. Bovina's last two games are with each of the teams with which they are tied.

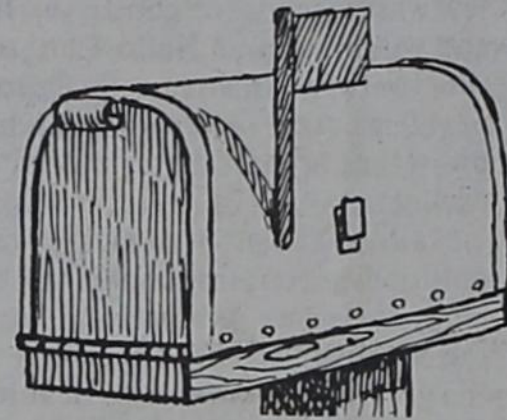

In a time when declining college entrance scores are constantly in the limelight of the news, it is refreshing to see our local high school students scoring above both state and national averages in the ACT tests.

Bovina High School scores, state scores, and national scores are compared on the following chart. Please note that our local average is 2.4 scores higher than the state average and .2 higher than the national average. This does not mean that our school does not need to seek improvement; it does indicate that we are headed in the right direction.

One reason for the higher scores is that most students take college prep courses if they plan to attend college. According to ACT officials, one reason for declining scores is that many students are taking the easy way out instead of the more complicated courses. For a student to score high on ACT tests a student should take advanced science classes, such as chemistry and physics; advanced math classes such as Algebra I, II, geometry, and trigonometry; and four years of English.

I would ask parental support in encouraging our students to take the college prep courses instead of the more remedial courses. With school



officials and parents working together to insure broad student participation, interest and concentration in the more advanced courses, Bovina students will continue to score high on college entrance tests such as the ACT test.

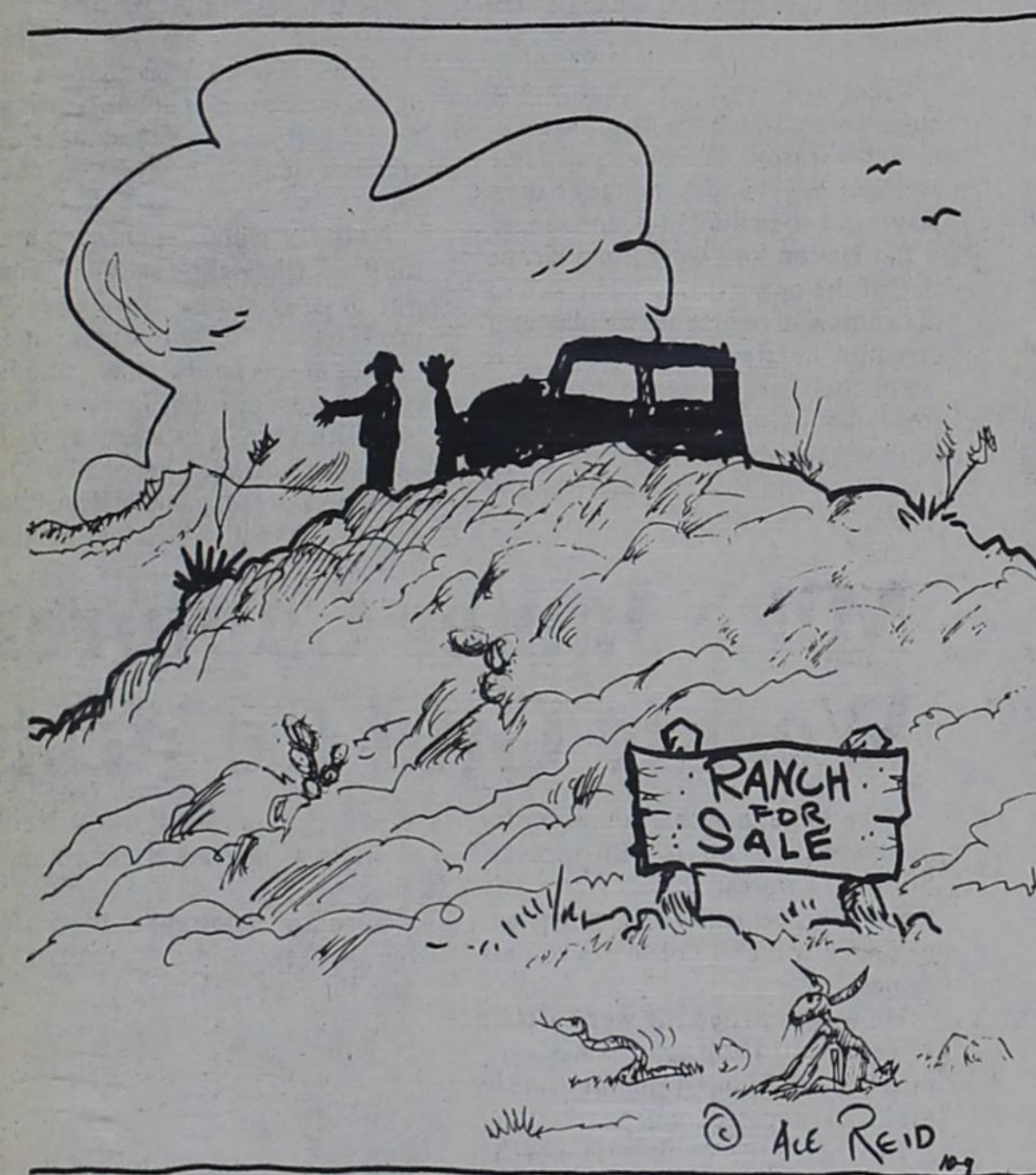



They went to Brownwood on Tuesday of last week and came home on Friday. The group reported a good trip and a lot of fun together.

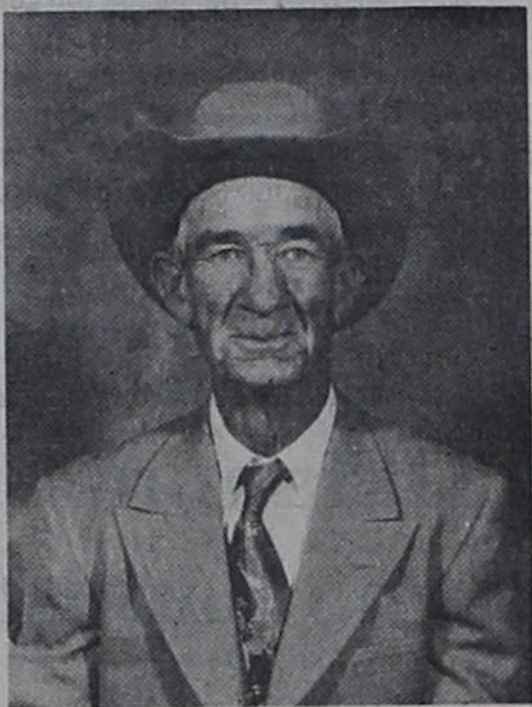
The group stayed at the Texas 4-H Camp while there. All kinds of workshops were available for those attending the camp. The workshops included: fishing, basket weaving,

## Safety Is Urged On Halloween

Miniature monsters will soon invade the neighborhoods and the cry, "Trick or Treat," will be heard throughout the land.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Motorists and parents need to take precautions to protect children and prevent disasters this Halloween."

He stated, "I would suggest house or block parties for the kids. Children will invade many neighborhoods in spite of past unfavorable incidents, and he offered the following safety rules to help protect the kids."

Cawthon said, "Small children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating be confined to their own neighborhood. Costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and non-flammable. Facial make-up should be used instead of masks or hoods that restrict vision."

Trick or Treaters should not eat unwrapped candy until the parents inspect it and fruit should be washed and cut into small pieces to be sure nothing has been placed inside it.

Children should be told to look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by a child can serve as a warning to motorists and children should be instructed to use sidewalks when possible.

Motorists are advised to use extra caution in residential areas and look for children crossing streets in a haphazard manner.

Major Cawthon said, "732 pedestrians were killed and 6,367 injured in Texas during 1982. A pedestrian's chance of getting killed or injured are increased at night. If parents and motorists join together and think of children's safety, Halloween 1983 can be a safe and enjoyable evening for everyone."

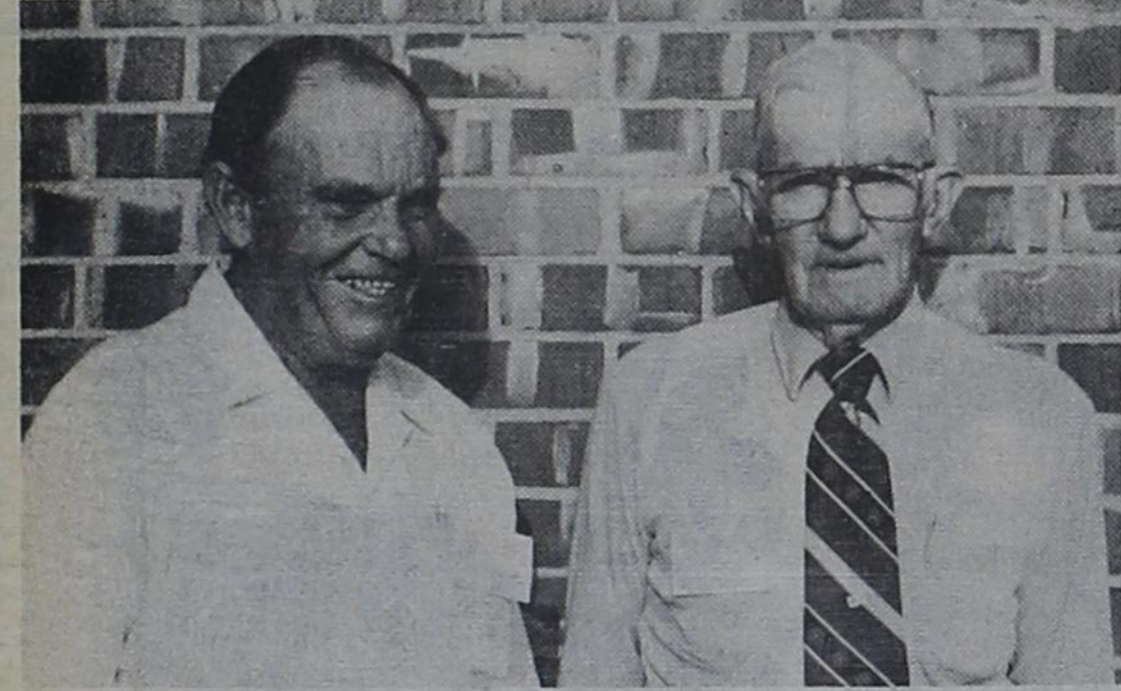

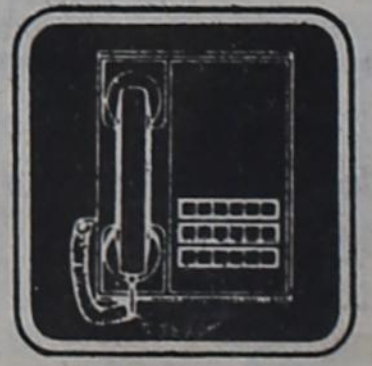

**Mustangs Keep Playoff  
Hopes Alive With 47-0 Win**

Bovina's Mustangs came up with  
their best offensive night of the  
season last Friday at Springlake,  
routing the Springlake-Earth  
Wolverines, 47-0.

The win left the Mustangs' district  
5-AA record at 2-1, and kept  
them much in the running for one of  
the two playoff spots in the district.

Richard Shepherd had a fantastic  
night for Bovina. The Mustang star  
scored three touchdowns, and threw a  
TD pass to Raymond Rocha.

Bovina built up a 21-0 lead by  
halftime, and then roared back with  
26 second-half points to claim the  
lop-sided win.

The Mustangs broke the scoring ice  
when Jesse Gonzales ran six yards for  
a score, and Jose Gomez added the  
point-after kick.

Later in the opening quarter,  
Henderson Griggs took a 25-yard  
pass from quarterback Blake Scaff.  
Shepherd then tossed a two-point  
conversion pass to Gonzales, and  
Bovina had increased its lead to 15-0.

In the second quarter, Shepherd  
began his scoring spree with a 20-yard  
run to paydirt. The kick failed, but  
Bovina had a 21-0 lead which they  
took with them to the dressing room  
at halftime.

Apparently, Coach Larry Helton  
must have said something at the half  
like "Whatever it is you're doing out  
there, go ye and do likewise for the  
rest of the game," because the Bovina  
onslaught continued.

In the third quarter, Shepherd got  
things going by hitting Raymond  
Rocha with a 25-yard scoring strike.  
The kick failed, but Bovina's lead  
became 27-0. Shepherd then picked  
off an S-E pass and made a beautiful  
60-yard runback for a touchdown. A  
running try for points failed, but this  
increased Bovina's lead to 33-0.

Now playing in the fourth quarter,  
the Mustangs began to try some  
different things, and virtually  
everything they tried worked. Jesse  
Gonzales threw a pass to Shepherd,  
who danced his way 66 yards for a  
Bovina score. Scaff then passed to  
Gonzales for two points and Bovina's  
point total had become 41.

Nor were the Maroons through  
scoring for the evening. Homer  
Renteria ran seven yards for Bovina's  
final tally in the 47-0 victory, the  
PAT kick failing.

"We executed real well.  
Springlake-Earth is a much better  
team than the score indicated. Things  
just started to snowball on them and  
they couldn't stop it," said Coach  
Helton, reminding that Farwell had  
had trouble beating the Wolverines in  
their district opener.

The Mustangs had a super night on  
offense, rolling up 361 total yards,  
including 183 yards rushing and 178  
yards passing, about as balanced as  
you can get. Helton praised the  
quarterbacking of Blake Scaff, who  
he said is continuing to build his  
confidence with each game.

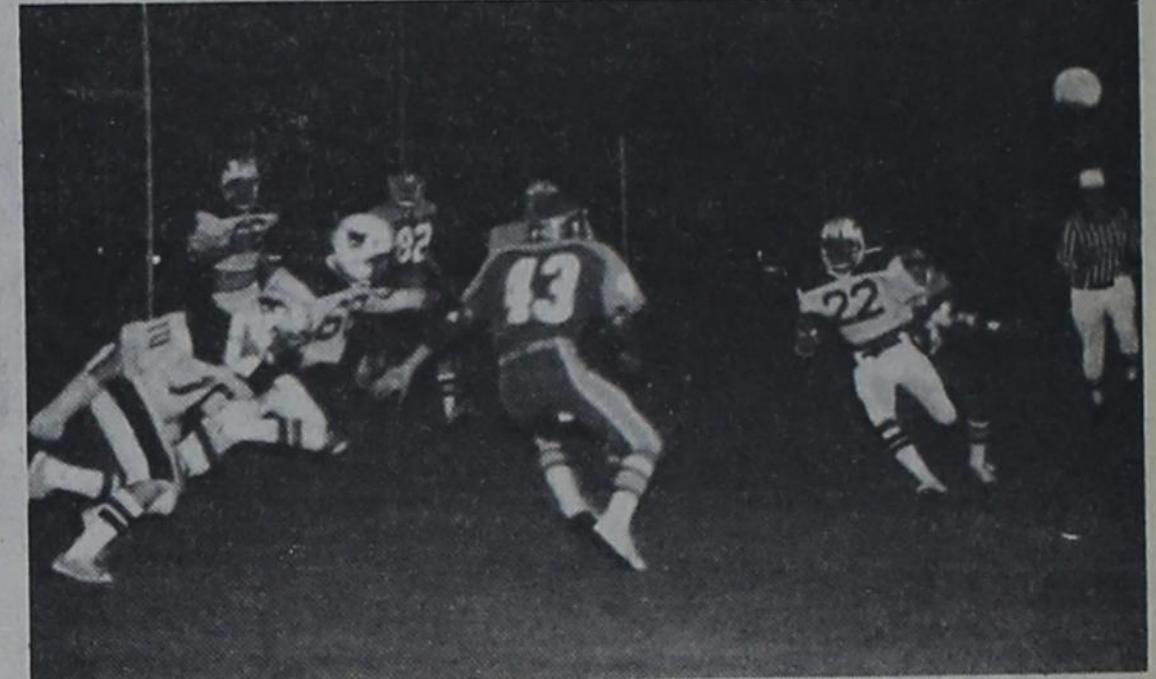
Helton also complimented the work

Gomez.

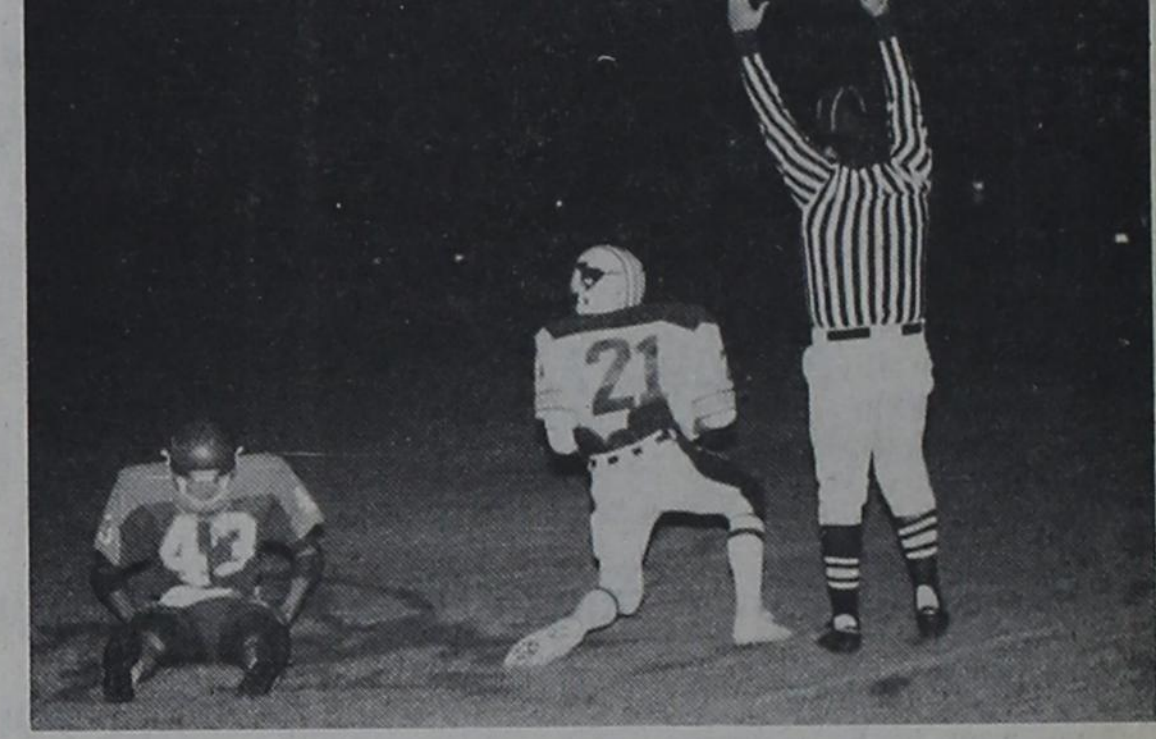
A top defensive play was made by

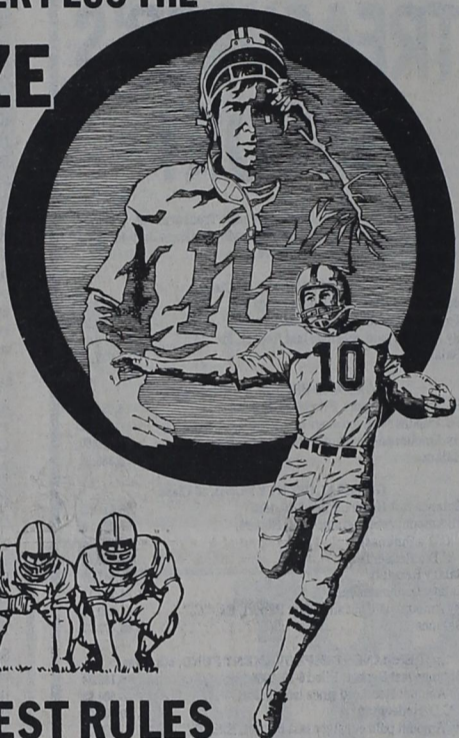

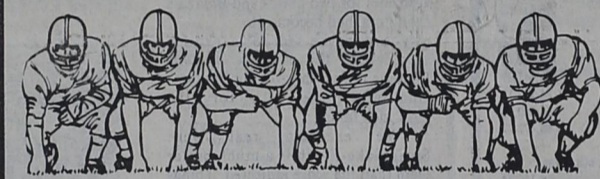
