Q - I'm planning to buy a house with a GI loan. My lender wants security in addition to the house itself. Is this allowed under the

A - Yes. It's a matter between the veteran and the lender. Q - - I have a National Service

Life Insurance term policy. Now that I'm on active military duty, my premiums have been waived. What must I do, after I am discharged, in order to pick up my insurance again?

A - - You must start paying the required premiums to VA, within 120 days after your seperation from service. It's best to start paying the premiums as soon as you get out of service. The premiums won't be applied to your policy until it falls due, but in the meantime you'll be guarding against any chance of your policy lapsing. Q _ - I am eligible for a pension because I am totally and permanently disabled as the result of a nonservice - connected disability. Will I receive an extra amount of pension because I have a wife and

A _ - No. Under the law, pension rates are not based on the number of dependents you might have.

TB X-Ray Survey Here Turns Up 16 Definite Cases, Report Shows

Thirty-six Sutton County residents were referred to their phy- DR. BOUGHTON SUFFERS sicians as the results of the x-ray survey conducted here last winter by the county Tuberculosis Association. The figures were made public last week by Mrs. Charles F. Browne, president of the association last year. Mrs. Browne said the survey showed 16 definite cases of tuberculosis, 20 suspicious cases, and seven cases of lung trouble other than tuberculosis.

The annual report submitted by Mrs. Browne mentioned the following activities between April 1, 1951 and March 31, 1952:

1. Provided 14 chest x-rays for patients referred by family physicians as unable to meet the cost. 2. Sent delegates to the Texas TB Assn., conference and sponsored two educational and promotional programs at the Lions Club.

3. Conducted x-ray survey with the Texas TB Assn., mobile x-ray unit, x-raying 778 persons at a cost of 0155.20. Members of Sonora Woman's Club, W. S. C. S., Wesleyan Service Guild, and Sonora In Auto Wreck Music Club assisted.

Conducted Christmas Seal Sale. Sent Christmas seals to 485 persons. 200 responded with an average of \$3.03 per contributor for total of \$605.50. Of this amount \$108 was sent to the state associa-




