SUNDAY DINNER at the Ellis house must wait each week until after Bob Phillips' "Texas Country Reporter" program at 12:30 on KVII-TV (Channel 7).

It is patterned after the popular Charles Curral show, "On The Road." Of course, sometimes the Texas version gets shifted around to accommodate whichever sporting event is scheduled to appear immediately following. So you will occasionally find it on Sunday morning at 11:30 a.m. instead of 12:30. You might want to set your VCR before you leave for church. We have a tape on which we have recorded several segments of this interesting program.

If you are proud of your state and the hometown folks which make Texas great, then you will enjoy traveling the backroads as Bob Phillips shows you around and introduces you to the most interesting people.

With Phillips as our guide and Larry Ellis doing the breathtakingly beautiful photography work, we have visited with the cowboys on the 6666 Ranch, with a teacher and students of the Alamoore one-room school house, and watched the horse and buggy competition at McKinney.

Otho Stubbs is a working cowboy at Turkey and also a renowned Western artist. According to Bob Phillips, Otho is a "walking encyclopedia of Panhandle history." He records the Old West on canvas with scenes of Indian buffalo hunts, trail drives, and herds of wild ponies.

In the cemetery at Paris, Texas is the tombstone which bears a statue of Christ wearing cowboy boots. We have visited the beautiful ranch home of popular cowboy cartoonist Ace Reid. We met the 80-year-old mayor of Pittsburgh, Texas who has single-handedly built several of the fire engines used by their volunteer fire department.

There is a flock of about 35 bald eagles who come down from Canada and winter at Lake Buchanan, Texas each year. A group of volunteers brave the chilly weather to watch, count and keep tabs on the birds each winter. The flock, which was once endangered, has been on the increase in the past few years.

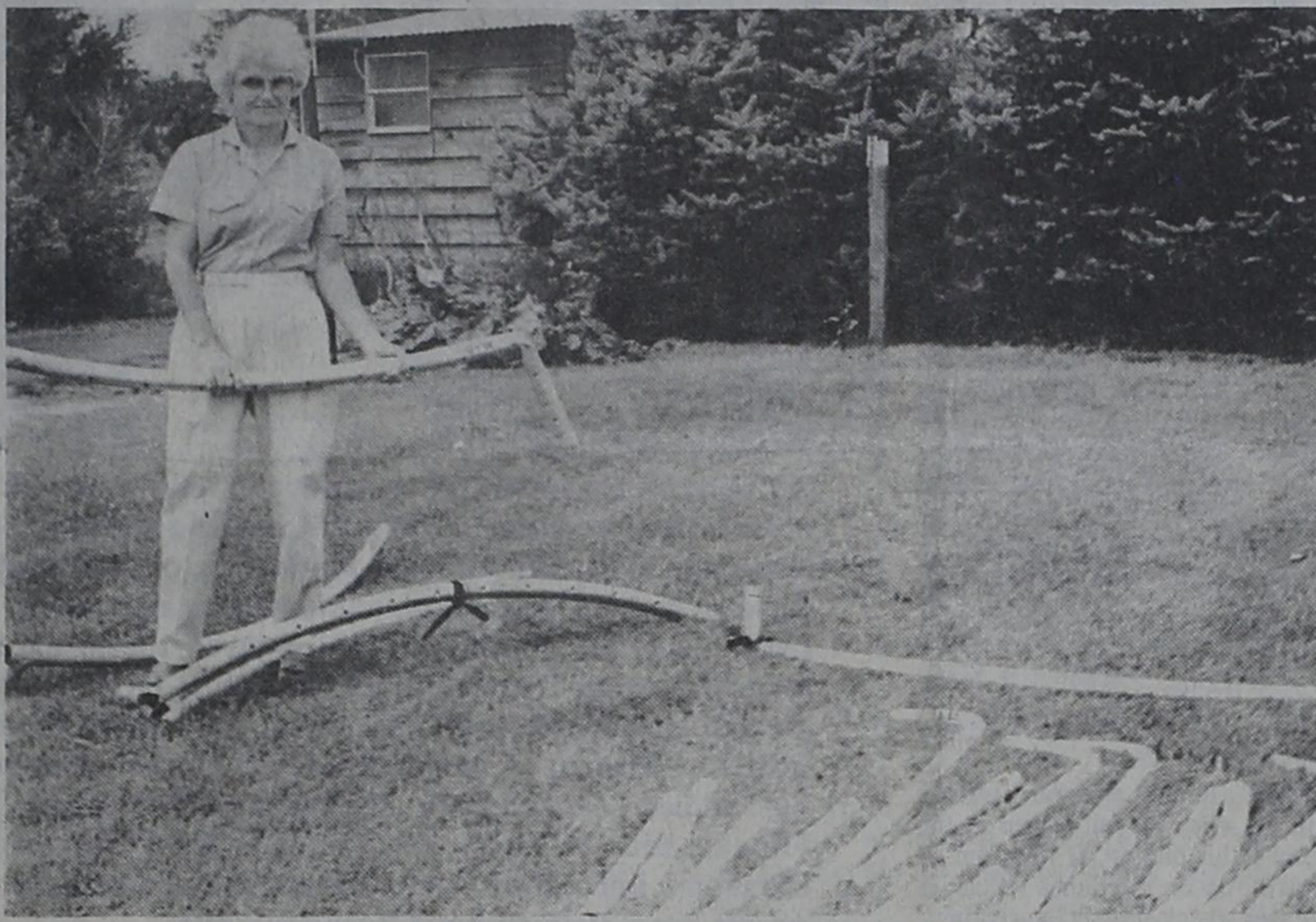
The first female member of Congress in Texas was Lara Thomas, now age 86, living in Nacogdoches, Texas. She has taken on the task of preserving many of the old homes and other buildings of that area which were scheduled for demolition. Many are 150 years old, as Nacogdoches calls itself the oldest city in Texas.

The result is her own little village called "Millard's Crossing," consisting of a general store, barber shop, fire station, church, school house, a couple of log cabins and about five lovely old victorian homes. All have been restored and filled with antiques befitting their period of time. Mrs. Thomas says, "It's not a museum, but a collection of memories."

We were so impressed with the "Millard's Crossing" segment of the "Texas Country Reporter" show, that we made a point of traveling through Nacogdoches on our way to vacation in New Orleans earlier this summer. We discovered that there have been several weddings held in the little church with receptions following in the stage coach house. Also family reunions have been scheduled there with people attending from all around the U.S.

Senate Candidates Campaign Locally

In an unusual coincidence, both candidates for the 31st Senatorial District--Democrat Mel Phillips and Republican Teel Bivins, campaigned in Parmer County last Thursday.

Due to the size of the district, which stretches from the top of the Texas Panhandle to Hockley County on the south, the candidates' paths hardly ever cross. But they did on Thursday.

Both candidates attended the press open house for Merrick Pet Foods in Hereford, and used the occasion to swing by Friona for campaign stops.

Phillips feels that the naming of Lloyd Bentsen, his uncle-by-marriage, to the national Democratic ticket, will be a big shot in the arm for himself and the area.

"If the Democrats win, we should be able to do some economic development in our area. There is always a 'honeymoon period' after a new administration goes in, when you can accomplish some things..."

Phillips urged local leaders to discuss possible programs they

would like to see implemented. "I feel that I will be in a unique position to secure some financial aid for our area, whether I'm working with Vice President Bentsen or Senator Bentsen," he said.

The candidate said that the area needs to look closely at ways of hanging onto the processing dollars from local products. "We can't continue to buy our things at retail and sell our products at wholesale," he said.

Bivins likewise referred to Lloyd Bentsen's choice as vice-presidential candidate. "I think that linking Bentsen with the liberal presidential candidate (Dukakis) probably helped my campaign as much as anything," Bivins said.

Bivins cited the state's workmen's compensation set-up, pointing out that Texas ranks in the top ten states in the cost for workmen's compensation premiums, yet is in the bottom ten per cent for the value of benefits paid to employees.

"We need to get our workmen's compensation program leveled

out, or it's going to cost our state when it comes to attempting to lure new industry," Bivins said.

Bivins said he would work toward the consolidation of state agencies if he were elected. "We have 240 different state agencies. The national average is 100 state employees per 100,000 population, and in Texas, this figure is 120 state employees," the candidate said.

"When I watched the recent debacle regarding tax reform, I decided we hadn't begun to trim the state budget.

"I'm not interested in running for a higher office, but I feel that the Texas senate would allow me to maintain a family life," Bivins stated.

Damage Noted From Wind

Electricity was off in Bovina for three and one-half hours Sunday evening following twister-like winds that lasted only a few seconds.

Football practice began Monday morning at 8 a.m.

Coach Bean and his wife, Shelly, will be living at 102 Highway 86. His wife is a senior in college and will be moving to Bovina next

week. Bean will replace Bill Talley, who resigned to accept a position with Ector Junior High in Odessa.

"I felt that it was time to move on. I had accomplished basically what I set out to do," said Talley, who re-built the Mustangs from back-to-back winless seasons to a playoff team that set a school record with an 8-3 season record.

Around The House In Parmer County

The money saved by freezing fresh produce or food bought on sale can easily be eaten up by energy costs if you don't make good use of your home freezer.

A frost-free freezer costs about \$15 per month for electricity, depending upon its size and your local electric rates. You can keep your freezer from using more electricity than necessary by making sure it operates efficiently.

A freezer inside the home requires less energy than one kept in the garage because it doesn't have to work as hard to maintain its low temperature.

When the garage is the only space available, put the freezer against an inside wall, if possible, since it will be cooler there. If your garage has no ventilation, consider adding a roof vent for air circulation and lower temperatures.

A full freezer runs more efficiently than one that's half empty. If you use your freezer very little, consider pulling the plug on it, buying only what you need for a short period and storing it in the refrigerator-freezer.

Older freezers often use extra energy because they have leaky gaskets that let cold air escape. Test the rubber gasket by placing a piece of paper in the door and closing it. If you can pull the paper out without tearing it, the gasket needs to be replaced.

Depending upon the size of the freezer, replacing a rubber gasket is about a \$15-\$25 do-it-yourself job.

Don't freeze foods you eventually have to throw away. Freeze foods you need and use most often and in amounts you can use within the recommended storage time.

For best quality in frozen foods,

check the temperature of the freezer with a freezer thermometer to make sure it is at 0 degrees Fahrenheit or less. And, remember, freezing foods will not improve their quality; you must freeze high-quality foods in order for them to be good in the months to come.

Invest in moisture-vapor proof plastic bags and wraps, freezer wrap, freezer containers or heavy duty foil to prevent freezer burn. Don't try to cut corners by using old plastic bread bags or containers not meant for freezing since that will just reduce the quality of the food.

Also label and date frozen food packages. Then keep a simple inventory of your freezer to tell you what's on hand and remind you to use packages of food within the recommended storage time. Make use of the tips and enjoy the fruits of summer all year long.

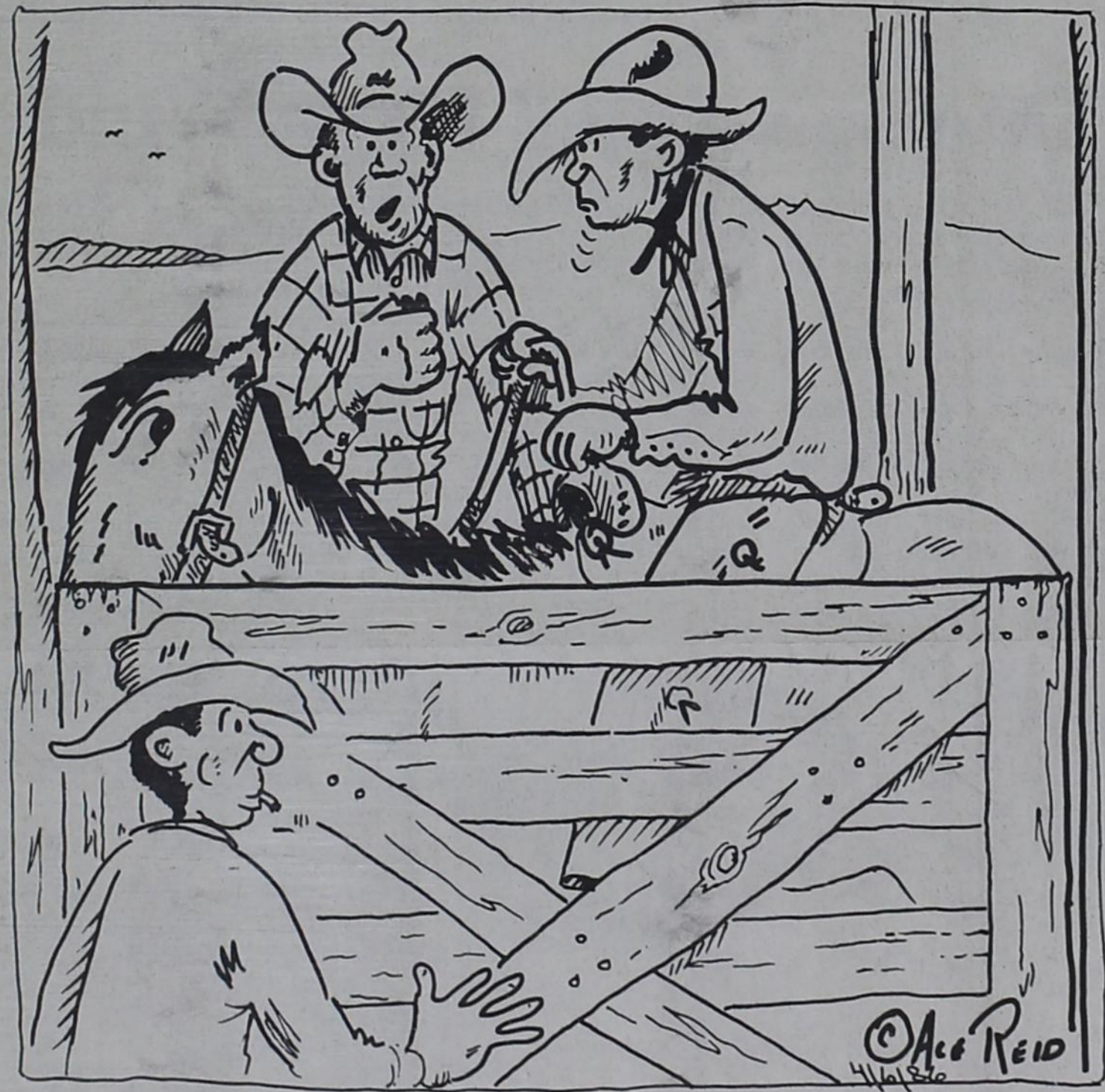

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

THE MOBILE BREAST CANCER DETECTION UNIT WILL BE IN BOVINA ON FRIDAY, AUGUST 19TH.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Emergency Loans Are Available

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or agriculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Weldon Rainey, FmHA County Supervisor, said this week.

Weldon Rainey asked that those who need farm credit as a result of adverse weather make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 207 Avenue D, Farwell.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home

until February 22, 1989, for physical losses only.

FmHA loans covering actual physical losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 per cent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

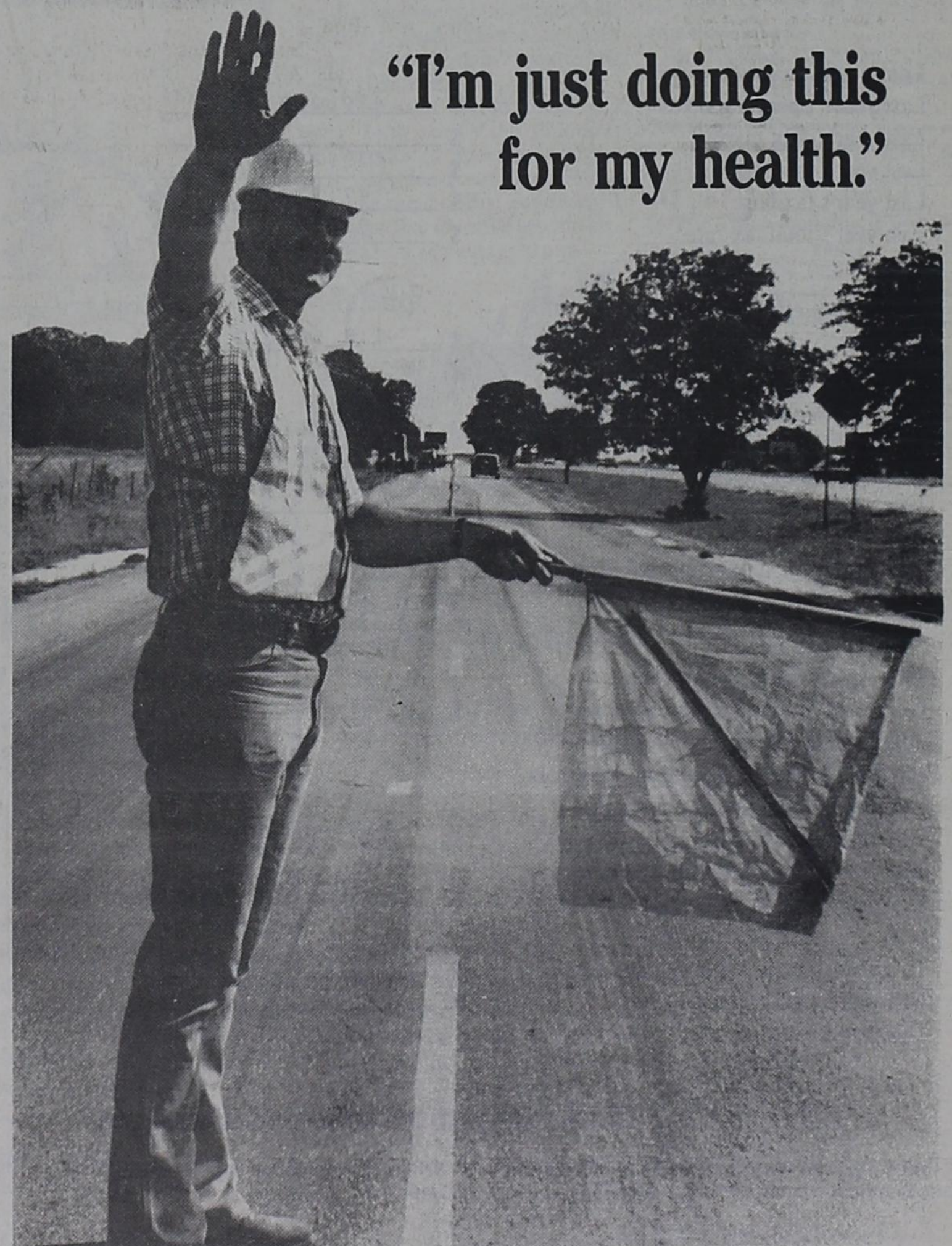

"Texas" Cast Members Recall Past Experiences



SANDY SIERRA TREVINO and ANTHONY R. SOSA... Mr. and Mrs. Joe M. Trevino of Bovina announce the engagement and approaching marriage of their daughter, Sandy Sierra Trevino, to Anthony R. Sosa, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Sosa of Farwell. Wedding vows will be exchanged Saturday, August 20 at 6 p.m. in Primer Iglesia Bautista Getsameni in Friona. All friends and relatives are invited to attend.

Three "Aunt Anna's" outlasted twelve "Uncle Henry's" during the 23 seasons of "TEXAS," the musical drama that plays to 100,000 people each summer beneath the enormous cliffs of Palo Duro Canyon near Amarillo.

Each "Aunt Anna" brought strength to the part, and molded the "TEXAS" matriarch into the memorable character that she is today.

All three had the opportunity to work with "TEXAS" author Paul Green, the Pulitzer Prize winning author who dubbed this show as his "happiest."

Loris Clifford of St. Louis won hearts as the first "Aunt Anna" from 1966 through 1968, followed by Jane Lipscomb of Amarillo who gentled the lady for another seven years.

The current "Aunt Anna," Lois Hull, has continued to endear audiences with her portrayal for thirteen years.

"TEXAS" is the story of the settling of the Panhandle. Centered around eight principal players, "TEXAS" reveals how the eventual collaboration between the ranchers ("Uncle Henry" and "Aunt Anna") and the farmers ("Calvin Armstrong") brings the railroad and new town to the frontier.

A love triangle between "Calvin," and ranch foreman, "Dave," develops when both vie for the affections of "Elsie," the niece of "Uncle Henry" and "Aunt Anna." Further distraction is provided by the old prospector "Tuck," his love "Kate," and "Parnalee Flynn."

A cast of 80 works with these lead characters to unwind this tale of drought and plenty, sorrow and joy, using spectacular song and dance mixed with the latest sound and light technology.

To all who have seen "TEXAS," Aunt Anna provides a tenacity found in early pioneer women. However, all the "Aunt Anna's" agree that the character has changed throughout the years.

Clifford said when author Paul Green first wrote for Aunt Anna, he included a scene that used

Clifford's then knee-length long hair.

Clifford also remembers the first script as much longer. "Paul Green said it was too long a show and he had to cut," she said. "Originally (before produced), Aunt Anna had a much bigger part."

Lipscomb remembers "Aunt Anna" as an old witch and asked Paul Green to make her softer. "I thought that since 'Aunt Anna' and 'Uncle Henry' had no children of their own, she should baby him," she said. "She had not a thing to do but dote on 'Uncle Henry' and 'Elsie.'"

Hull sees "Aunt Anna" as a helpmate to Uncle Henry. "She is determined to help his ventures, as one who sees things must change and is excited as time goes on to see progress."

In all their descriptions of "Aunt Anna," Clifford, Lipscomb and Hull used the words "strong" and "capable."

You are asked to bring a pen to fill out your physical forms (name, etc.) on the way to Muleshoe. Coach Kathy Rundell said if you know of any girl that is new, or who didn't sign up for athletics, but wants to be in athletics, please pass this information along to her.

Kathy also said that the group should be back home in Bovina by 4:30 or 5 p.m. and telephones will be available if they need to call their parents.

"Circumstances forced her to make decisions, to do what was needed with what was available," Clifford said, "and above all was her faith in God."

Humorous incidents occurred often during these 23 years. Clifford recalls wearing basketball knee pads to avoid callouses caused by kneeling.

"And one time following the dream scene, I spotted a scorpion coming toward me," Clifford said. "There I was trying to remember my place, lines and when the lights would go out where that scorpion would be."

Lipscomb's favorite humorous incident occurred with Pinkie Floyd as "Uncle Henry."

"At the end of the dream scene, I would tell him what I had fixed," she remembers. "My recipes were authentic and researched and one night I said, 'Come on precious, I'll fix you some mesquite bean jelly on toast.'"

"He always responded," she said. "We had great rapport."

Hull recalls one night when the "Uncle Henry" went to open the door on the ranch house, and ended up with the handle in his hand.

"I also remember during the party scene when 'Chief Quannah Parker' played by Alan Shankles put a lance through his foot and never lost his composure."

A challenge all faced was outdoor theatre. Clifford reminisces on the nights when there was little moonlight. "When it was dark, it was dark," she said. "I always carried a pen flashlight in my dress."

Clifford also remembers no restrooms or dressing rooms. "There wasn't even a paved parking lot or a cast house," she said.

Lipscomb recalls, "the cement didn't get any softer," and she eventually retired when her knees did.

A major challenge, according to Hull, is keeping the character fresh for 62 shows a season. "You must continue to keep the intensity of the character every night, but maintain the excitement and energy."

Clifford and Lipscomb agreed the dream scene conjured their best memories. Hull likes the socialism scene, when "Calvin" names the town, Henrianna.

Hours have stayed much the same. Each recalls the strenuous month prior to opening when ten hour days were not uncommon. Once the show opens, however, all left about five to arrive around six. Curtain time remains 8:30 p.m.

Clifford contacted founder Margaret Harper when she heard about "TEXAS." Founding director Bill Moore convinced Lipscomb and Hull to take the part. All have semi-professional theatre experience and great singing voices.

Clifford currently resides in St. Louis, where she is a professional volunteer in the arts.

Lipscomb is a native of Amarillo. She also is active in the arts.

The cast of 80 in "TEXAS" come from 14 states and one foreign country in 1988. They perform before near full houses of an average 1,650 persons from all over the world each night.

"TEXAS" plays through August 27 every night except Sundays at 8:30 p.m. in Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

City's Sales Tax Check Increases

The City of Bovina received a payment of \$2,531.03 as its sales tax receipts for the month, in a check from State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

This represented a gain of 5.4 per cent from the total of \$2,401.39 which the city received for the comparable period a year ago.

For the year to date, the city has now received a total of \$15,145.20. This is up from the total of \$13,812.77 for the same time a year ago, a gain of 9.65 per cent.

Parmer County's three municipalities collected checks totalling \$19,949.78 for the current month. That was up by 2.81 per cent over the total of \$19,403.62 for the same time last year.

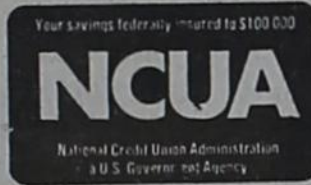

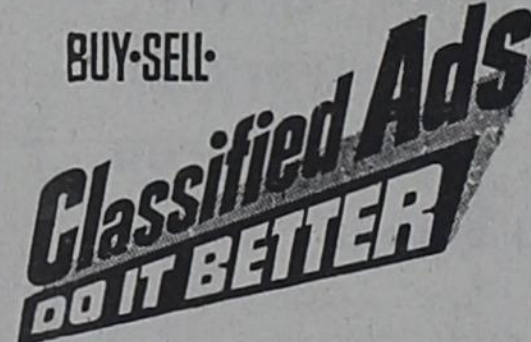

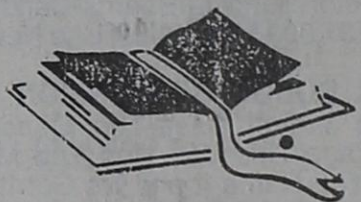
