

In the cemetery at Paris, Texas is the tombstone which bears a statue of Christ wearing cowboy boots. We have visited the beautiful ranch home of popular cowboy cartoonist Ace Reid. We met the 80-year-old mayor of Pittsburgh, Texas who has single-handedly built several of the fire engines used by their volunteer fire department.

There is a flock of about 35 bald eagles who come down from Canada and winter at Lake Buchanan, Texas each year. A group of volunteers brave the chilly weather to watch, count and keep tabs on the birds each winter. The flock, which was once endangered, has been on the increase in the past few years.

The first female member of Congress in Texas was Lara Thomas, now age 86, living in Nacogdoches, Texas. She has taken on the task of preserving many of the old homes and other buildings of that area which were scheduled for demolition. Many are 150 years old, as Nacogdoches calls itself the oldest city in Texas.





According to the American THE MOBILE BREAST CANCER Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast mammography in asympconcer.
