June from the State Comptroller Public Accounts.
As was the case for virtually the immediate area, the chec amount was down somewhat from the same time period in 1985. The check amount was $\$ 976.21$. his was down $\$ 285.52$ from the 1985. For the year, the city has received $\$ 10,606.26$. This is $\$ 1423.60(11.3$ per cent) below the total received as of the same time a year ago. The three Parmer County cities
eceiving the one per cent sales tax had received $\$ 83,195.97$ for th period ending May 30, 1986. This was down $\$ 5,628.67$ from the sam period of 1985 , or 6.77 per cent.
