Fort Worth-A record run cattle appeared at the nation's major markets ffor mid-April on Monday when an estimated 112,700 cattle and 9,000 calves were re ported. This compared with 94,700 cattle and 9,500 calves a week earlier, and only 44,000 cattle and 3,000 calves on the same date a year ago.

Immediate effect was to slow trade on fed cattle at Fort Worth and other points around the coun try. Here fed cattle closed 50 cents to \$1 below last week's close, and some points in the North reported more severe slumps before trade was completed. Cows at Fort Worth were fully steady and bulls closed 50 cents to \$1 lower to hit the lowest level for that class in over a year.

Killing calves were 50 cents or more lower. Stocker trade was bearish throughout, prices \$1 under last week's best. Hogs advanced 25 cents to sell up to \$22 and \$22.25, and sows and pigs were steady. Sows drew \$17 to \$19. Pigs sold from \$15 to \$17. Lambs were weak to 50 cents





and not depend entirely on stocker and feeder demand to take care of our lamb and calf crop. If calves are out of plain cows, creep-feeding is almost a MUST. But even for the best quality calves or lambs the two-way market will help.

Fact is a young animal eats very very little until he near weaning time. To capitalize on creepfeeding the young animal should be sold or put in drylot when weaned and not allowed to "shrink" off that bloom.


Don't let early pasture keep you from setting up a creepfeeder. Those extra pounds are the cheapest gain you can put on any animal and the price they bring will just about double the cost of the feed.

The Southwest will be more presperous when they sell more livestock for slaughter at heavier weights at home, and every indication is that feeder buyers in the North will be BEARISH in the coming season after the feedlot losses of the past season!
