Burning Crop Residue
Issue Is Discussed

## In a meeting in Plainview, Wednesday morning, the issue of burning has finally been resolved

 at least for this year.Texas Air Control Board (TACB) officials, Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) staff, and
other area officials were on hand at other area officials were on hand at
the meeting to give their opinions the meeting to give their opinions.
"All in all, this meeting was a good beginning. We now have a
revised set of guidelines that must revised set of guidelines that must
be followed before the burning of be followed before the burning of
crop residue," stated Carl King, crop residue," stated Carl King,
Executive Director of the Texas Corn Producers Board.
Until such time as a definitive policy is set for the future, the po-
sition of the TACB is that the farmer must send a written notification to the TACB regional office
which certifies that there is no which certifies that there is no prac-
tical alternative, guarantees complitical alternative, guarantees compli-
ance with the seven conditions of Regulation I (listed below, and contains a map of the site including uses of adjacent lands. The notifi-
cation must also indicate when the burn will occur. Such written notification must be received by the Regional Office at least five (5) days prior to the burn, and tele-
phone verification of the continued phone verification of the continued
intent to burm must be made to the Regional Office 24 hours prior to eral tracts of land are to be burned in the same area at the same time, it may be necessary for the TACB
to require the scheduling of to require the scheduling of burn
times over several consecutive days to avoid cumulative nuisance and
traffic safety problems. Compliance with the conditions specified in Section 111.103 will be required, and they are as follows:

1. Burning shall be coll menced only when the wind will
carry the smoke away from city, town, residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial area, navigable water, public road, or land
strip, and shall not be conducted strip, and shall not be conducte
when a shift of wind is predicted; 2. Burning must be at least
300 feet from any 3ies which have residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial
use; use; Burning shall commence the same day as soon as is reasonthe same day as soon as is reaso
ably practical prior to 5 p.m.; 4. Burning shall not com-
mence when wind speed is predicted to be less than $6 \mathrm{~m} . \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{h}$ or greater than 5 . Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or

temperature inversions; 6. Burning must be outside
