Some people draw quite different conclusions from the same set of facts. "I'm proud of the reputation I've won in baseball as a competitor and as the last of the Gashouse Gang, but behind that reputation is a story of the fathers and sons who read The Sporting News.

"One man can do a lot for you, though. Take my case and Billy Southworth, who then was beating his way back to the big leagues as a scout. Just when they

were about to bounce me out of the trout camp, Southworth saw something. 'Look, kid,' he said 'do you realize you're running flat-footed? Try running on your toes.'

"Billy took me in the outfield, demonstrated proper running technique, and I practiced. So help me, within three days I was four steps faster getting down to first base.

"That's nothing, though. Within three years I was in the big leagues."

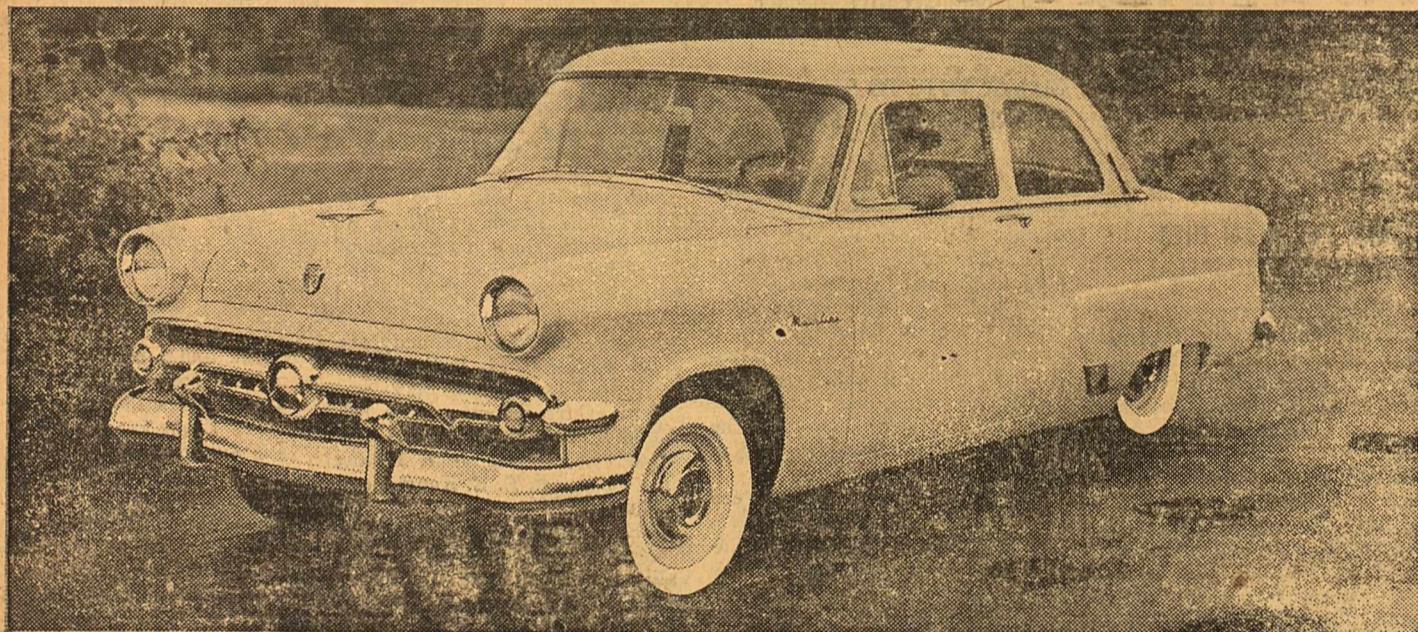
"That night at the dog track there was the kid with my 20, betting his head off. That cured me."

Space Twin Duet

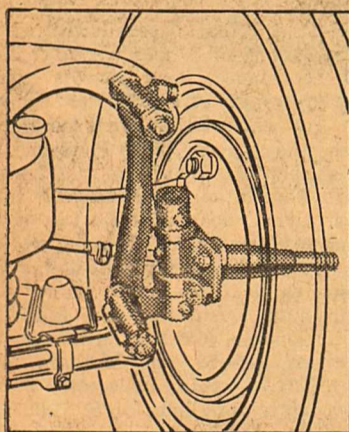

Your Health

Sufficient sleep is an important part of healthy living. Adequate sleep helps you to feel well, and builds up your resistance to disease, declares Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. An occasional night of too little sleep will not hurt you. However, when you habitually go from day to day without enough sleep, damaging results are felt.

In addition to ruining your disposition, insufficient sleep plays havoc with your coordination and timing. Workers who are short of sleep and rest tend to be accident prone. Some men who try to hold an extra-time job to increase the family income, have paid a heavy penalty in damaged health and accidents.

Good sleeping habits take practice. It's like anything else you

do. No one can learn to become an expert swimmer, just by reading about various strokes. You have to spend many hours practicing to become a good swimmer.

Listening to the radio, watching television, or working on hobbies that persons are loathe to quit are sometimes causes of staying up too late. Late entertaining also cuts out many hours of sleep. A regular time and routine for getting ready for bed will help put you in the mood for sleep. The routine may mean reading the evening newspaper or a light story after you are ready for bed. Or it may be listening to soft music just before you turn out the lights and snuggle under the covers.

LEGAL AID ORGANIZATIONS OFFER EQUALITY BEFORE LAW

Self-evident is the fact that all citizens are in need of the services of an attorney at various times. Some citizens are not able, due to circumstances beyond their control, to properly compensate such services.

Texas lawyers, recognizing this need, have formed Legal Aid Clinics in several of the larger cities of the state. In a number of towns too small to support a clinic, a Legal Aid Committee has been formed. Its members are attorneys furnishing necessary legal services to the indigent. In other towns, legal aid services are provided by each private practitioner as worthy cases are brought to his attention.

The Legal Aid attorney performs a vital function in our social order. To understand his role, we must begin with the basic fact that a legal aid client

does not seek charity. The late Associate Justice Wiley B. Rutledge of the U. S. Supreme Court once said: "Equality before the law in a true democracy is a matter of right. It cannot be a matter of charity, or of favor, or of grace, or of discretion."

The legal aid client, therefore, is asking for what is his right—that he be given the justice to which he is entitled under the law. His poverty prevents him from securing the legal assistance and advice needed for the protection of his rights.

In providing these professional services, the Legal Aid attorney serves the highest social obligation, that of securing justice to those who under the law should have it but who otherwise might not obtain it.

This function places special and serious obligation upon the Legal Aid attorney. In the first place, his duty is to accept the client who is financially unable to employ private counsel. He cannot reject a client for personal reasons or convenience or because the case may be difficult or uninteresting or disagreeable. To do so is to close the only door of justice and to defeat the very purpose for which the legal aid organization he represents was created.

Finally, a Legal Aid attorney must be more than a good lawyer. His daily work confronts him with more than legal problems. Innumerable problems of his clients submitted to him are of a personal nature and the legal problems are inevitably interwoven with financial, social and

oftentimes domestic difficulties. He must have an insight into these difficulties and problems and know and make use of the social resources of his community available for their solution.

Every attorney performing legal aid services is conscious and aware of these serious and important obligations. The demands of the job are great, but so also are its rewards. Nothing is more gladdening than the appreciative handshake of a grateful client,

the only reward in his possession to give. The Legal Aid attorney knows the deep satisfaction of seeing justice secured. He knows that a vital tenet of democracy is being fulfilled, justice to all regardless of poverty or wealth. Through his services, democracy rests more secure.

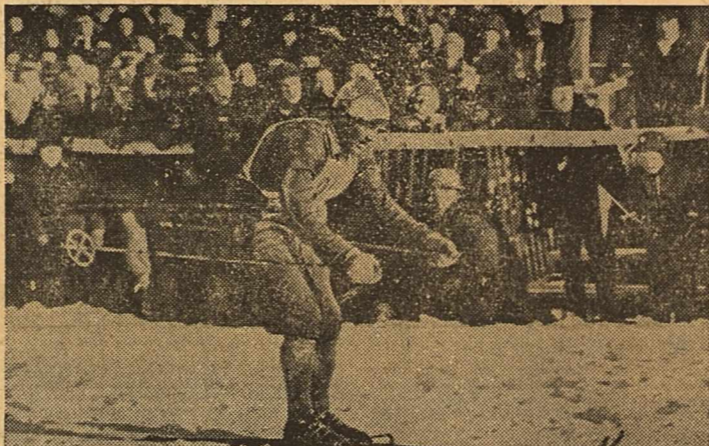

THE CIO AND THE pro-wet-back crowd took a licking last week when the House and Senate passed by overwhelming votes a bill which will enable the processing on this side of the border of Mexican labor to be used in areas certified by the Secretary of Labor as having inadequate local labor available.

There was indication they objected because they are unable to collect dues from Mexican braceros, particularly in the central valley of California where drives have been made to get all farm workers into unions.
 This legislation was needed to allow our own processing centers to operate without an international agreement with Mexico. The latter has heretofore refused to agree on a new arrangement with this country, insisting on conditions which our government could not accept.

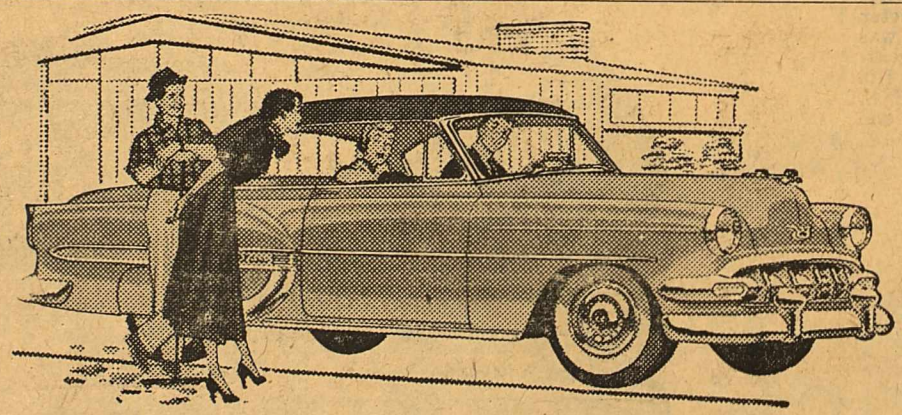


Steve Tips the Balance

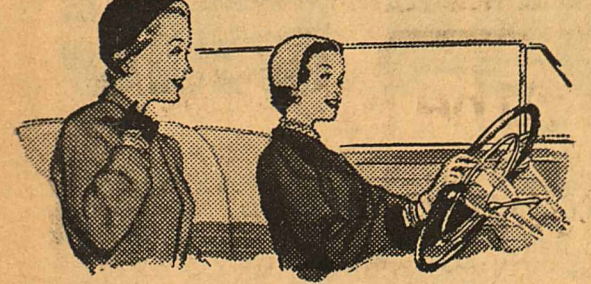

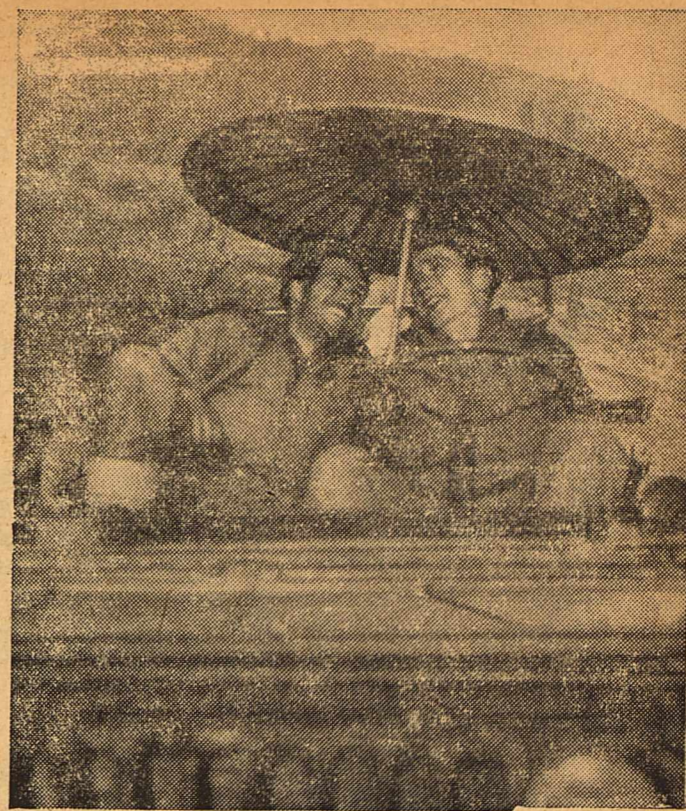
