




BY A VOTE OF 211 to 176 the House last week struck another blow at socialized housing. The vote was on an attempt to aut-horize 140,000 more units to be constructed. I spoke and voted against allowing any new units to be built.

The fight against public housing has been a long and bitter one. Back in 1949 the Congress authorized 810,000 units to be built by the government at government expense, then to be rented by the government to people at about one-third of what they would rent for it opened to public competition. Some of these new apartments rent as low as \$12 a month. Already more than 200,000 of them have been built or contracted. But later Congress recaptured the right to pass on how many are to be built from year to year.

The chief gimmick in the scheme is the fantastically high price which the taxpayers have to dig. up to finance them-much higher than ordinary housing. Financed by government bonds, which are exempt from income tax, Uncle-Sam pays a direct subsidy of \$33 each month to pay the bonded
