WE DON'T HATERUSSIA any more. In fact, with the US economy in bad shape, we feel a lot of empathy with the Russian people who are going through hardships while their country is in the re-structuring process. Today, when things go wrong, we no longer say its a "Communist plot to destroy America!"

There must be some significance to the fact that we no sooner became friendly with Russia, than we suddenly got this big "Hate Japan" thing going. Various Japanese leaders have lately said tacky things about American workers such as "uncouth, pampered, lazy, uneducated, etc." This just adds fuel to the fire of American patriotism and now "Buy American" has become the battle cry!

Buying American is not quite as easy as it sounds. Every country on the globe today has some input in world trade and manufacture, as consumer products have become increasingly internationalized. The world has indeed become a smaller place. Many products which are labeled "Made in America" actually contain components which were made elsewhere. Plus in some cases, American made goods are shipped to other countries for assembly and US companies have large plants based elsewhere.

For instance, the Dodge Caravan is built in Canada and the Ford Festiva and Pontiac LeMans are assembled in South Korea. RCA televisions and Bic pens are made by companies based in France. Zenith TVs are made by a US based plant in Mexico. Burger King, Green Giant vegetables and Haagen-Dazs ice cream are made by British companies. Some GM cars are assembled in a California plant which is half-owned by Toyota.

While checking into some of these products, I was surprised to find that Tropicana orange juice is owned by a company in Canada, where there's nary a tropical orange tree in sight. For the most part, good old American blue jeans, are still "Made in America," as are most of the grooming products which we use everyday such as toothpaste, hair spray, shaving cream, etc. Some Caribbean countries assemble products with US raw materials for export back to the US. The Caribbean companies receive a break on import duties under US trade laws.

In order to remain competitive with Europe, the time is near when we will need to establish a North American common market with one monetary system for the US, Canada and Mexico. I'm glad to see that we are working toward a free trade agreement with Mexico as a step in that direction. Such an agreement would create a market estimated at 360 million consumers.

Yes, the Japanese are pretty good at making their little cars but we can do without them. We have become a "throw-away" society by depending on cheaply made junk from Japan, and this has had devastating effects on our environment. The attitude has been, "So what if it breaks. I'll just throw it away and buy another one." Remember those expensive toys you bought the kids for Christmas and they fell apart ten minutes after they were unwrapped? Most likely made in Japan.

Now that we are facing economic hard times, each item bought should be thought of as an investment in the future, something you'll pass on to your children someday. We can no longer afford to buy things that won't last or can't be repaired.

The USA has a few items which could be exported to Japan. Why don't we send them some of our finest labor leaders to form unions for improving difficult working conditions there? Since we seem to have more lawyers than we need, how about sending some of those to Japan along with some civil rights leaders. We also have some politicians who could probably solve all their internal problems. How about sending them Kennedy, Biden, Metzenbaum and company!

Griggs Leads Team In Season Statistics

Senior Donna Griggs led the Bovina High School Fillies in most of the team's statistical departments, according to the 1991-92 team records released this week.

Miss Griggs led the team with 360 points. Cindy Quintana was second with 290 points and Kim Kirkpatrick was third with 147 points.

Teresa Stone played the most quarters, 96, to 91 for Misses Griggs and Kirkpatrick.

Miss Griggs also led in field goal percentage, hitting 142 of 240 attempts, 59 per cent. She hit eight of 29 three-point attempts, 28 per cent, and had 47 of 81 at the free throw line, 58 per cent.

Cindy Quintana led in free throw percentage, making 45 of 69, or 65 per cent. Teammate Teresa Stone hit 76 per cent, but had much fewer shots, 16 of 21.

Miss Stone led in three-point baskets, with 26. She attempted 97, for a 27 per cent ratio.

Miss Griggs also led the team with 100 steals. Miss Quintana added 61 steals and Miss Kirkpatrick 50.

Miss Quintana led the team with 86 offensive rebounds and 163 in all. Miss Kirkpatrick had the most defensive rebounds, 78, and had 135 total. Miss Griggs had 120 rebounds for the season.

Miss Griggs topped in assists with 66, to 34 for Miss Stone. Griggs also led in possessions gained, with 64. Cindy Quintana had 61 possessions and Miss Kirkpatrick 52.

Cindy Quintana, Kim Kirkpatrick, Stephanie Rackley and Ione Molinar each had two blocked shots, pacing the team in that category.

The Fillies finished the 1991-92 season with a 12-13 record, much improved from the previous year's 5-19 mark. Coaches were Beverly Robison and Jeri Been.

Bovina's varsity basketball boys played a couple of warm-up or "practice" games during the past week.

Last Friday, the team met play-off-bound Nazareth on a neutral court at Dimmitt. The Swifts scored an 80-71 win. Then on Saturday, the Mustangs hosted Tulia of District 2-AAA, and the visiting Hornets scored a 94-78 win.

In the Nazareth game, the Mustangs were off to a good start, scoring 17 first-quarter points. Rusty Venable scored six, and Corey Kirkpatrick seven, as Kirkpatrick had a three-point basket.

New Office Manager Now At Excel Corp.

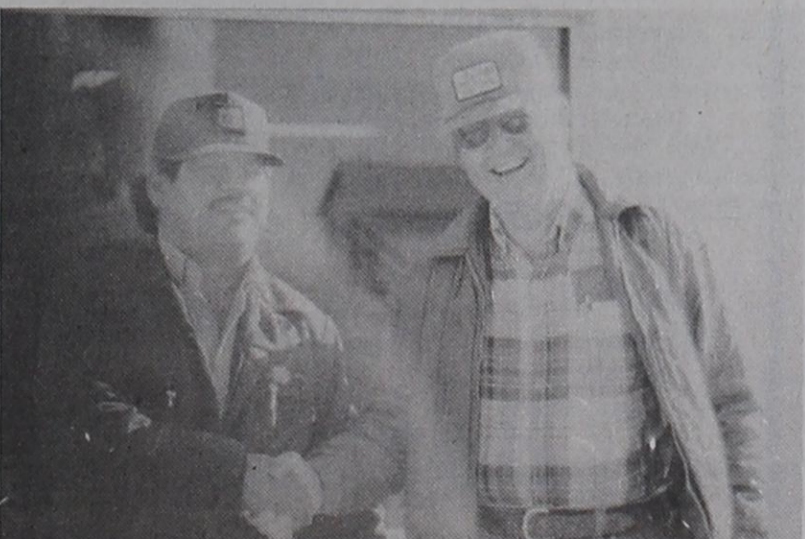

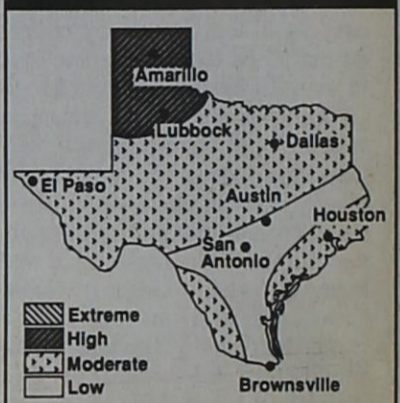
The Bovina Fire Department answered a call last week to the Caprock Industries to extinguish a fire in the elevator let that caused an estimated damage of \$2,500.00.

Wildfire Danger Report



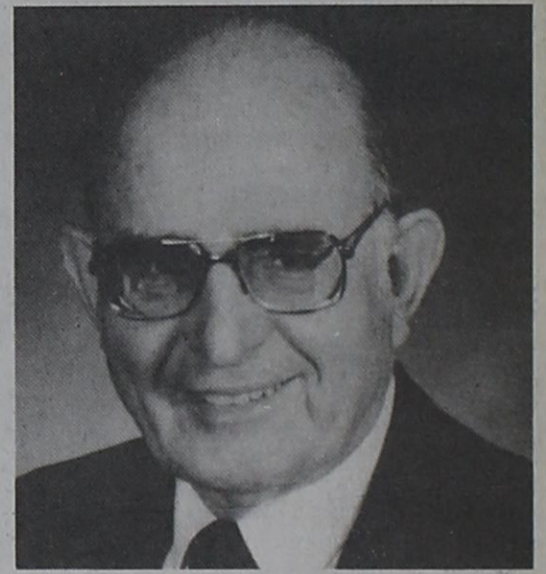

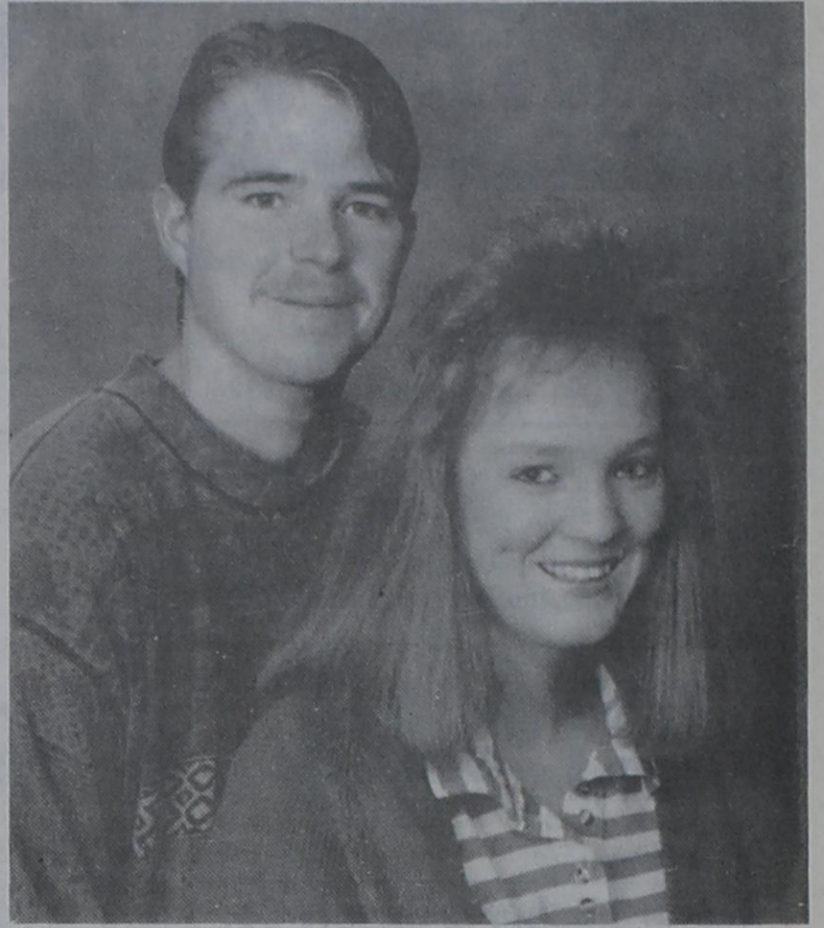

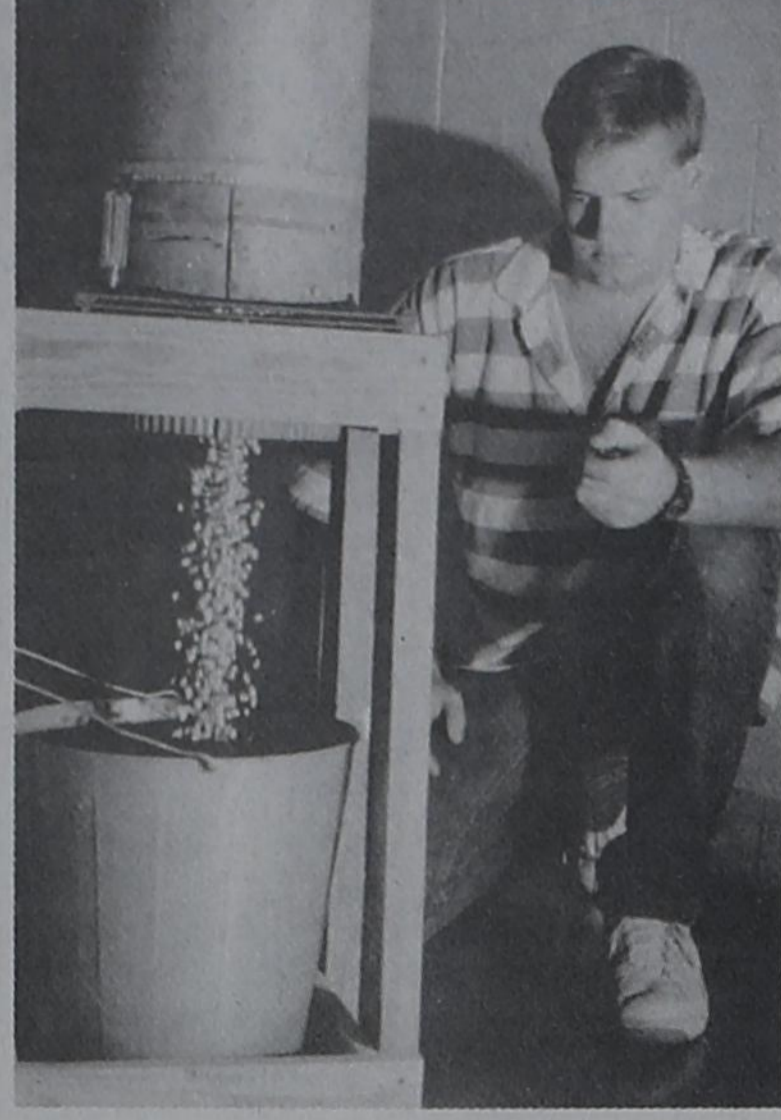

Non-Conventional Students Have Become Professionals: In Tech's Project SUCCEED

The following article appeared in "Engineering Today," which is a publication of the College of Engineering at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Byron is the son of Tony and Dottie Neal of Bovina and graduated from Bovina High School in 1988. He will graduate from Texas Tech in December, 1992.

If we expect to meet our nation's need for new scientists and engineers, we must look beyond the traditional student population towards the large, untapped pool of non-conventional students. Unfortunately, only a small number of non-conventional students choose the fields of Engineering, Mathematics and Science (EMS).

Non-conventional students are defined as (1) minority students, (2) female students, (3) adult students (25 and older), and (4) students from small schools that lack the personnel and facilities to train students adequately before they enter college.

Project SUCCEED stands for Structuring Undergraduate Curriculum and Courses for Essential Educational Development. Its main goal was to test the efficacy of involving non-conventional undergraduates in research as a means to stimulate creativity, improve comprehension of basic skills, and encourage the transfer of the critical components of a discipline.

Student Research Projects The philosophy of Project SUCCEED was to involve students in research with national and international implications--important and consequential research. The research projects were designed to reinforce basic engineering principles, to help students design and use equipment, and to teach process design. Each student was treated as a peer researcher--for instance, as a graduate student or fellow faculty member might be treated. They were to state objectives, develop an experimental design, present their design and objectives for peer review, prepare necessary equipment for testing, and collect data necessary to draw conclusions.

Each student wrote a publishable paper, first, for the Proceedings of Project SUCCEED and, next, for submission to a refereed journal. A number of these papers are now being reviewed by national publications.

Project SUCCEED Case Studies The students in Project SUCCEED went through the entire experimental design process, producing in many cases, the equivalent of graduate projects.

Byron Neal is a senior in Agricultural Engineering. He is 21 and from Bovina, Texas. Neal's uncle is an engineer, and he says engineering is something he's always wanted to do. He knew he had abilities in problem-solving, but Project SUCCEED let him prove and improve those abilities.

Neal's project was "The Effects of Mixed Sizes on the Flow of Hygroscopic Granular Materials." Using a formula developed by Clifford Fedler and James Gregory in two ASAE prize-winning papers in 1987, Neal investigated the effect of mixed-size granular materials on gravity flow through a horizontal orifice. He tested five different levels and six different ratios of mix-

ture with cracked corn and black-eyed peas. His results will be presented at the 1992 meeting of the ASAE and may be published in the Transactions of the ASAE.

The National Science Foundation awarded Project SUCCEED a grant of \$49,000, from which each student received a \$3,000 scholarship. Results clearly point to the value of interactive research projects. Project SUCCEED has become a model for this and other engineering colleges and will be a part of the working philosophy of the Minority Engineering Program at Tech.
