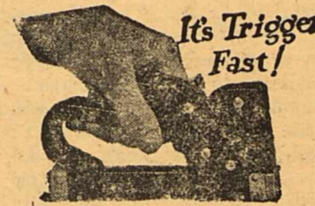

Oven Method for Barbecuing  
Chicken: Select young broiler-  
fryers chickens weighing about  
1 3-4 pounds dressed. Cut in half,  
place skin side up in roasting or  
broiling pan and pour sauce over  
them one half to one inch deep.  
Bake uncovered in a slow oven  
(325 D. F.) about 1 1/2 hours or  
until tender. Test leg joints for  
doneness. If they come apart easily,  
when twisted, the chicken is  
done.  
For rich crustiness, place cook-  
ed chickens skin side up, baste  
and turn up heat to 500 D. F. or  
place under broiler heat for 2 or  
3 minutes. Serve extra barbecue  
sauce over the chicken.

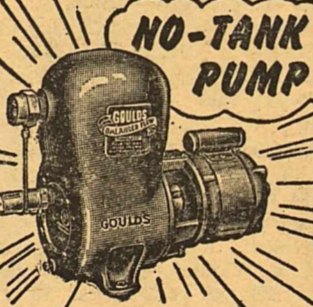

TO THE RESIDENT QUALI-  
FIED PROPERTY TAXPAYING

TAKE NOTICE that an election  
will be held on the 17th day  
of July, 1954, in said County, in  
obedience to an order duly enter-  
ed by the Commissioners Court  
on the 14th day of June, 1954,  
which is as follows:  
"On this 14th day of June,  
1954, the Commissioners Court  
of Sutton County, Texas, convened  
in regular session at a Regular  
Term thereof in the Courthouse  
at Sonora, Texas, the following  
members of the Court being pre-  
sent, to-wit:

George Wynn, County Judge;  
Dave Locklin, Commissioner  
Precinct No. 1,  
Dan Cauthorn, Commissioner  
Precinct No. 2,  
Aldie Garrett, Commissioner  
Precinct No. 3,  
Elmer Wilson, Commissioner

F. L. McKinney, County Clerk,  
at which time there came on to  
be considered the petition of  
William L. Galbreath and 53 other  
persons, praying that an election  
be ordered to determine whether  
or not bonds shall be issued by  
said Sutton County, Texas, in  
the sum of Fifty Thousand  
(\$50,000.00) Dollars, bearing inter-  
est at a rate not to exceed two  
and one-half (2 1/2%) percent per  
annum, and maturing at such  
times as may be fixed by the  
Commissioners Court, serially or  
otherwise, not to exceed twelve  
(12) years from their date, for  
the purpose of the construction,  
maintenance and operation of  
macadamized, graveled or paved  
roads and turnpikes, or in aid  
thereof, in said County; and  
whether or not an ad valorem  
tax shall be levied upon all the  
taxable property in Sutton County  
for the purpose of paying the  
interest on said bonds and to pro-  
vide a sinking fund for the re-  
demption thereof at maturity;

And it appearing to the Court  
that said petition is signed by  
more than fifty of the resident  
property taxpaying voters of said  
Sutton County, Texas, who own  
taxable property within said  
County and who have duly ren-  
dered the same for taxation;  
And it further appearing that  
the amount of bonds to be is-  
sued will not exceed one-fourth  
of the assessed valuation of the  
real property of said Sutton  
County;

IT IS THEREFORE CONSID-  
ERED AND ORDERED by the  
Court that an election be held in  
said County on the 17th day of  
July, 1954, which is not less than  
thirty (30) days from the date  
of this order, to determine whether  
or not the bonds of said  
County shall be issued in the  
amount of Fifty Thousand  
(\$50,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose  
of the construction, mainte-  
nance and operation of maca-  
damized, graveled or paved roads  
and turnpikes, or in aid thereof,  
in said County, bearing interest  
at a rate not to exceed two and  
one-half (2 1/2%) percent per an-  
num, maturing at such times as  
may be fixed by the Commis-  
sioners Court, serially or other-  
wise, not to exceed twelve (12)  
years from date thereof; and  
whether or not an ad valorem  
tax shall be levied upon all the  
taxable property in Sutton County  
for the purpose of paying the in-  
terest on said bonds and to pro-  
vide a sinking fund for the re-  
demption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held  
under the provisions of Chapter  
3, Title 22, Revised Statutes,  
1925, and only legally qualified  
voters of this State and of this  
County, who own taxable prop-  
erty within said County and who  
have duly rendered the same for  
taxation, shall be allowed to vote.  
The ballots for said election  
shall have written or printed  
thereon the following:

FOR THE ISSUANCE OF  
THE BONDS AND THE LEVY-  
ING OF THE TAX IN PAY-  
MENT THEREOF.

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE  
OF THE BONDS AND THE  
LEVYING OF THE TAX IN  
PAYMENT THEREOF.

Each voter shall vote on the  
proposition hereby submitted by  
placing an X in the square be-  
side the expression of his choice,  
or said voter may scratch or  
mark out one of said expressions,  
thus leaving the other as in-  
dicating his vote.

tion.

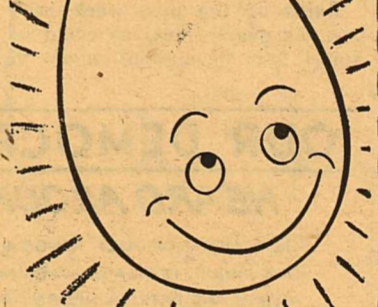

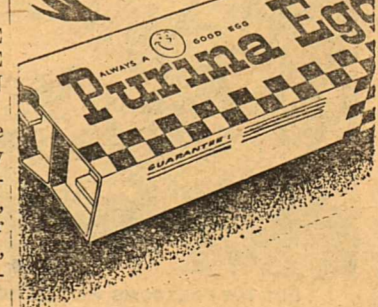

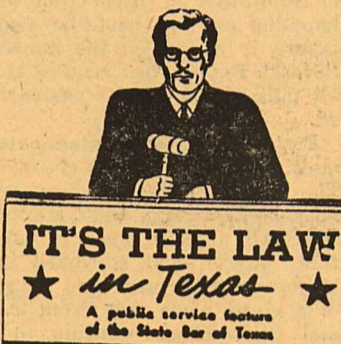

When a lawyer saves a client from trouble or financial difficulty, the client knows only that he has been charged for "advice" a commodity oftentimes too freely given by us all. Often overlooked is the study, work, and time the attorney has spent in order that he be in a position to give advice that can be relied upon. First, a practicing lawyer must have had six or seven years of academic education. In Texas this means at least three years of college work and three years in a recognized law school. Because the community at large has an interest in the qualifications and conduct of members of the bar, these minimum educational requirements must be met before examination for admission to the bar may be taken. During the three years of formal legal education, the law student attempts to read, digest, reconcile and understand from 10,000 to 20,000 separate cases, statutes, and monographs. He must draw from these an understanding of basic legal principles, of processes of legal reasoning, of methods of fact and legal investigation, and of court procedures which bring relief to clients. From the standpoint of court proceedings, the community then expects the work of a lawyer to be a prompt and efficient trial of their causes at a fair cost. From a counselling standpoint, it expects reasonable promptness and efficiency with, above all, the utmost of sound judgment. In both counselling and litigation, a lawyer must draw upon a wealth of precedent which he has attempted to store in his memory in order to apply one or more principles of law to the fact situation presented by his client. Ordinarily, many legal principles and rules of statute or decision are involved in even the simplest situation. Too, the problems raised by various clients, like fingerprints, are never exactly the same. After searching his memory, the lawyer will usually check the pertinent rules and precedents. These are found in an ever-increasing volume of statutes with which modern legislation seeks to regulate many aspects of our life, and in the decisions of the courts, boards and bureaus. Almost every problem presented to a lawyer requires research in the statutes and law books before proper answer can be given. Therefore, you will not receive an immediate answer to your problem from your lawyer, unless it is of the most elemental type. Your lawyer should, and you should give him time to, form his opinions from the authoritative statutes and decisions. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not advise. 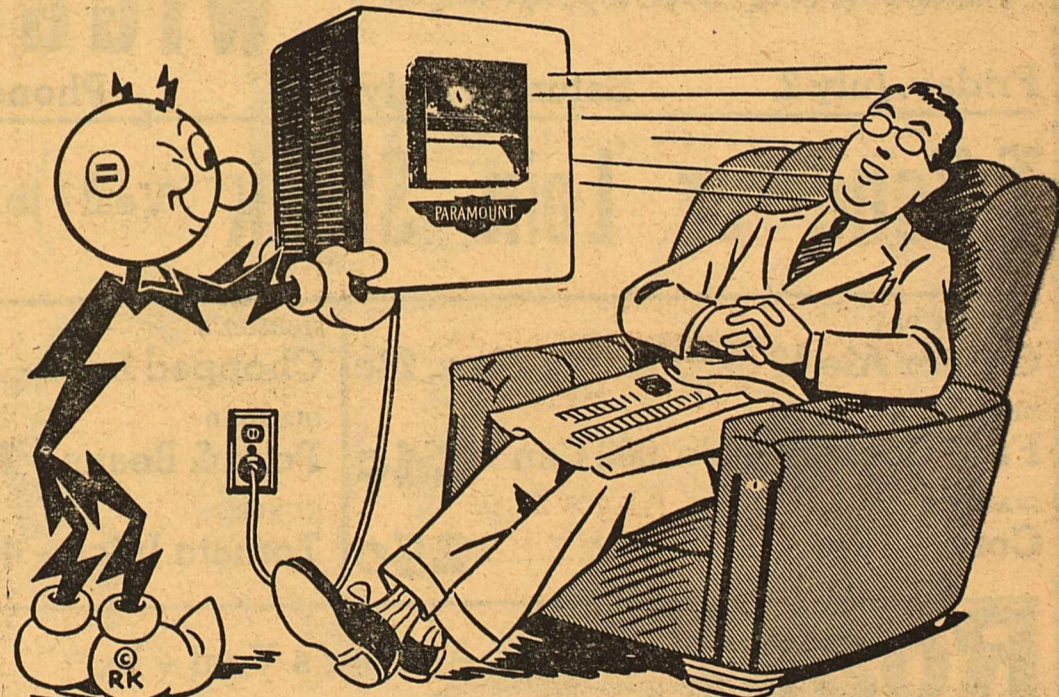

**Your Health**

Of all the kinds of food on the market today, there is none more important than milk, declares Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. Milk is the first food of infants and one for which there is no fully satisfactory substitute. It contains a large amount of protein, also calcium, phosphorus and some but not all of the necessary vitamins.

The only drawback to milk is that it is highly susceptible to contamination and if it is contaminated, disease germs grow readily in it. Dr. Holle says that in order to keep milk safe for human consumption milk sanitarians of local and state health departments help Texas milk producers set up standards of cleanliness and freedom from disease organisms. Many cities in the state have adopted the Standard Milk Ordinance sponsored by the Texas State Department of Health. 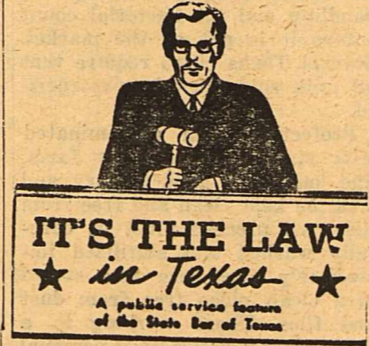

When a lawyer saves a client from trouble or financial difficulty, the client knows only that he has been charged for "advice" a commodity oftentimes too freely given by us all. Often overlooked is the study, work, and time the attorney has spent in order that he be in a position to give advice that can be relied upon.

First, a practicing lawyer must have had six or seven years of academic education. In Texas this means at least three years of college work and three years in a recognized law school. Because the community at large has an interest in the qualifications and conduct of members of the bar, these minimum educational requirements must be met before examination for admission to the bar may be taken.

During the three years of formal legal education, the law student attempts to read, digest, reconcile and understand from 10,000 to 20,000 separate cases, statutes, and monographs. He must draw from these an understanding of basic legal principles, of processes of legal reasoning, of methods of fact and legal investigation, and of court procedures which bring relief to clients. From the standpoint of court proceedings, the community then expects the work of a lawyer to be a prompt and efficient trial of their causes at a fair cost. From a counselling standpoint, it expects reasonable promptness and efficiency with, above all, the utmost of sound judgment.

In both counselling and litigation, a lawyer must draw upon a wealth of precedent which he has attempted to store in his memory in order to apply one or more principles of law to the fact situation presented by his client. Ordinarily, many legal principles and rules of statute or decision are involved in even the simplest situation. Too, the problems raised by various clients, like fingerprints, are never exactly the same.

After searching his memory, the lawyer will usually check the pertinent rules and precedents. These are found in an ever-increasing volume of statutes with which modern legislation seeks to regulate many aspects of our life, and in the decisions of the courts, boards and bureaus.

Almost every problem presented to a lawyer requires research in the statutes and law books before proper answer can be given.

Therefore, you will not receive an immediate answer to your problem from your lawyer, unless it is of the most elemental type. Your lawyer should, and you should give him time to, form his opinions from the authoritative statutes and decisions. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not advise. 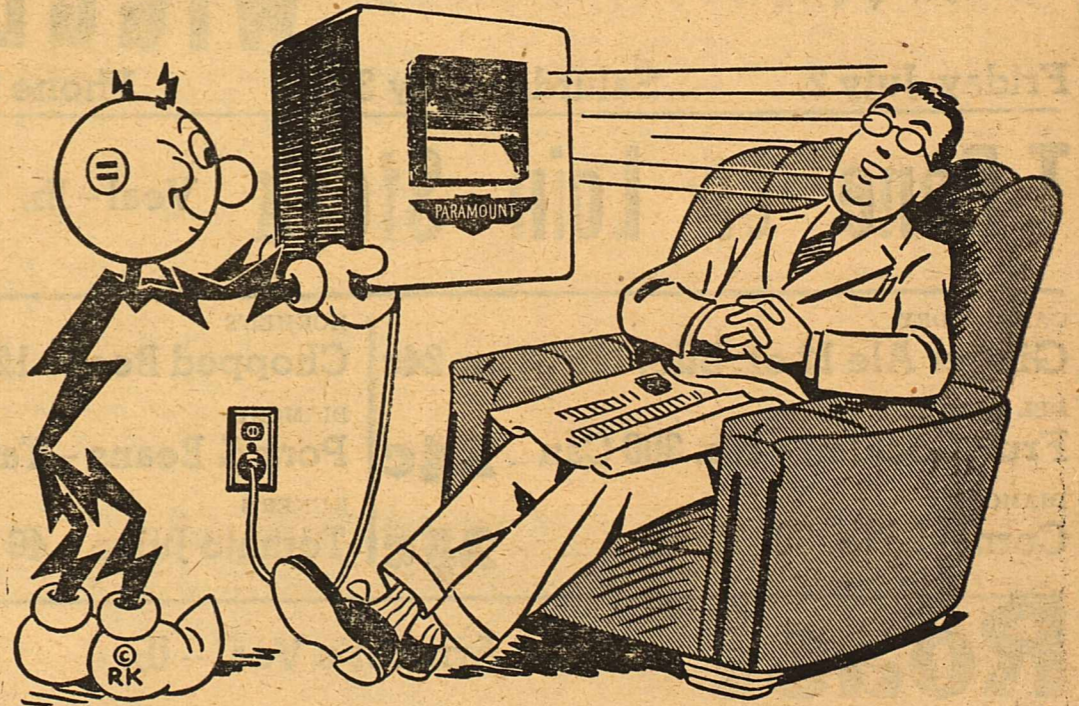

**Your Health**

Of all the kinds of food on the market today, there is none more important than milk, declares Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. Milk is the first food of infants and one for which there is no fully satisfactory substitute. It contains a large amount of protein, also calcium, phosphorus and some but not all of the necessary vitamins.

The only drawback to milk is that it is highly susceptible to contamination and if it is contaminated, disease germs grow readily in it. Dr. Holle says that in order to keep milk safe for human consumption milk sanitarians of local and state health departments help Texas milk producers set up standards of cleanliness and freedom from disease organisms. Many cities in the state have adopted the Standard Milk Ordinance sponsored by the Texas State Department of Health.
