-#%\$&-July The Fourth plays a memorable role in the drama of American traditions. On that day the United States of America was that it completely eclipses the memory of other historical anniversaries which, through the years, have gathered about the same date.

Nearly a century and a half before the Revolution, Roger Williams aroused the indignation of the Puritans of the Massacchusetts colony by championing the cause of religious liberty. As a result, Williams was banished from the colony, and July 4, 1636, he founded the settlement of Providence, where all men could worship God according to the dic-

tates of their own consciences. On July 4, 1776, a group of men, declaration drawn up by Thomas restore ground cover. Jefferson, which dissolved all ties binding the American colonies to Great Britain.

War followed the Declaration of Independence. Five years later, to the day, General Cornwallis surrended at Yorktown,

and America was free. On July 4, 1804, Nathaniel Hawthorne, author of numerous romantic tales, which have become American classics, was born in Salem, Massachusetts. Many of his books, among them "The Scarlet Letter" and "The House of the Seven Gables" are familiar

to every American schoolboy. Death came to John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, two of the most distinguished signers of the Declaration of Independence, while the nation was joyously celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the adoption of that historic pronouncement. Five years later, on July 4, 1831, James Monroe, fifth President, and framer of the Monroe Doctrine,

Q - - I'm a World War I veteran, drawing a pension from the VA. My wife has just gone to work part-time. In figuring my annual income, will I have to count the money she earns to see whether I come within the limits of the law?

A - - You will not have to count your wife's separate earinings in computing your annual income for pension purposes.

Q - - Are all post-Korea veterans affected by the August 20, 1954 deadline date for starting Korea GI Bill training?

A - - No. The only post-Korea veterans who must be in training by that date, in order to continue afterwards, are those who were separated from service before August 20, 1952. Veterans separated afterwards have two years from their separation date inn which to begin Korea GI

trainiing. Q - - If a veteran dies without naming a beneficiary for his GI insurance what happens to the


proceeds? A - - The insurance will be paid to his estate in a lump sum.







IT'S THE LAW * in Texas *

When a lawyer saves a client from trouble or financial difficulty, the client knows only that he has been charged for "advice" a commodity oftentimes too free- construction and those who are ly given by us all. First, a practicing lawyer must have had six or seven years of academic education. In Texas this means at least three years of college work and three years in a recognized law school. During the three years of formal legal education, the law student attempts to read, digest, reconcile and understand from 10,000 to 20,000 separate cases, statutes, and monographs. He must draw from these an understanding of basic legal principles, of processes of legal reasoning, of methods of fact and legal investigation, and of court proce-

dures which bring relief to clients From the standpoint of court proceedings, the community then expects the work of a lawyer to be a prompt and efficient trial of a counselling standpoint, it expects reasonable promptness and efficiency with, above all, the utmost of sound judgment.

In both counselling and litigation, a lawyer must draw upon a wealth of precedent which he has attempted to store in his memory in order to apply one or more principles of law to the fact situation presented by his client. Ordinarily, many legal principles and rules of statute or decision are involved in even the simplest situation. Too, the problems raised by various clients, like fingerprrints, are never exactly the same.

After searching his memory, the lawyer will usually check the pertinent rules and precedents. These are found in an ever-increasing volume of statutes with which modern legislation seeks to regulate many aspects of our life, and in the decisions of the ccurts, boards and bureaus.

Almost every problem presented to a lawyer requires research in the statutes and law books before proper answer can be

Therefore, you will not receive an immediate answer to your problem from your lawyer, unless it is of the most elemental type. Your lawyer should, and you should give him time to, form his opinions from the authoritative statutes and decisions. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not advise. 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

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


