QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - Two years ago, a friend of mine filed an application for disability compensation. VA asked him to come in for a physical examination, but he never showed up. Recently his disability started bothering him. Can he still follow through on that original application.

A - No, VA considers a claim abandoned, if the veteran makes no response within one year after he was requested to take an examination. Your veteran friend

will have to file a new application. If it is approved, his compensation will start as of the date of the new application.

Q - My mother and father are dependent on me. If I go to school under the Korean GI Bill, could I count them as dependents, for GI Allowance purposes? Or are the dependency allowances limited to wives and children?

A - Under the law, you would be permitted to include your parents as dependents, so long as they are in part dependent on you.

Q - I am drawing a VA pension as the widow of a World War I veteran. I have a small endowment policy that has just

matured. Must I count the monthly payments as income, for VA pension purposes?

A - The monthly payments will not be considered as income, at first. But after you have received an amount equal to the money you paid into the policy, any further payments that you receive will have to be counted as income.

Q - My son is receiving a pension for a total and permanent disability. He is entitled to an additional amount of money because he needs constant aid and attendance. Will he receive the extra payments even though I

CONTRACT ESSENTIALS EXPLAINED

Only in exceptionally important instances must contracts be entered into with any great degree of formality. In the usual case the simple requisites of a binding

contract may be completed in the most informal manner. Probably today the contracts in force today are merely spoken agreements. Many contracts are created by informal letters written by persons to one another.

Many are made over the telephone, as when you call up a store and they agree to deliver some goods, you order. Much of the world's grain supply is bought and sold, in the first instance, merely by hand signals in the great Pit in Chicago.

If the contract is of importance, involving substantial sums of money or vital services, it is a good idea to reduce its terms to writing to minimize the possibilities of fraud and misinterpretation.

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but written contracts endure unchanged. And, if a difference of opinion must be settled in court, a written agreement speaks for itself.

Certain kinds of contracts, such as those involving the sale of real estate or the lease of real estate for more than a year, will not be enforced in the courts unless written. In the same category are contracts wherein one person undertakes to stand good for the debt of another and those which are not to be performed within one year from the date on which the agreement is made.

In order to create a valid contract of any sort, each party involved must be legally competent to enter into the agreement. Each must be sane and of legal age. A contract entered into by a male or unmarried female under 21 is voidable at the option of the minor (but not at the option of the other party). A married woman is competent to contract if 18 or over, but she is subject to a number of contractual restrictions because of her marriage.

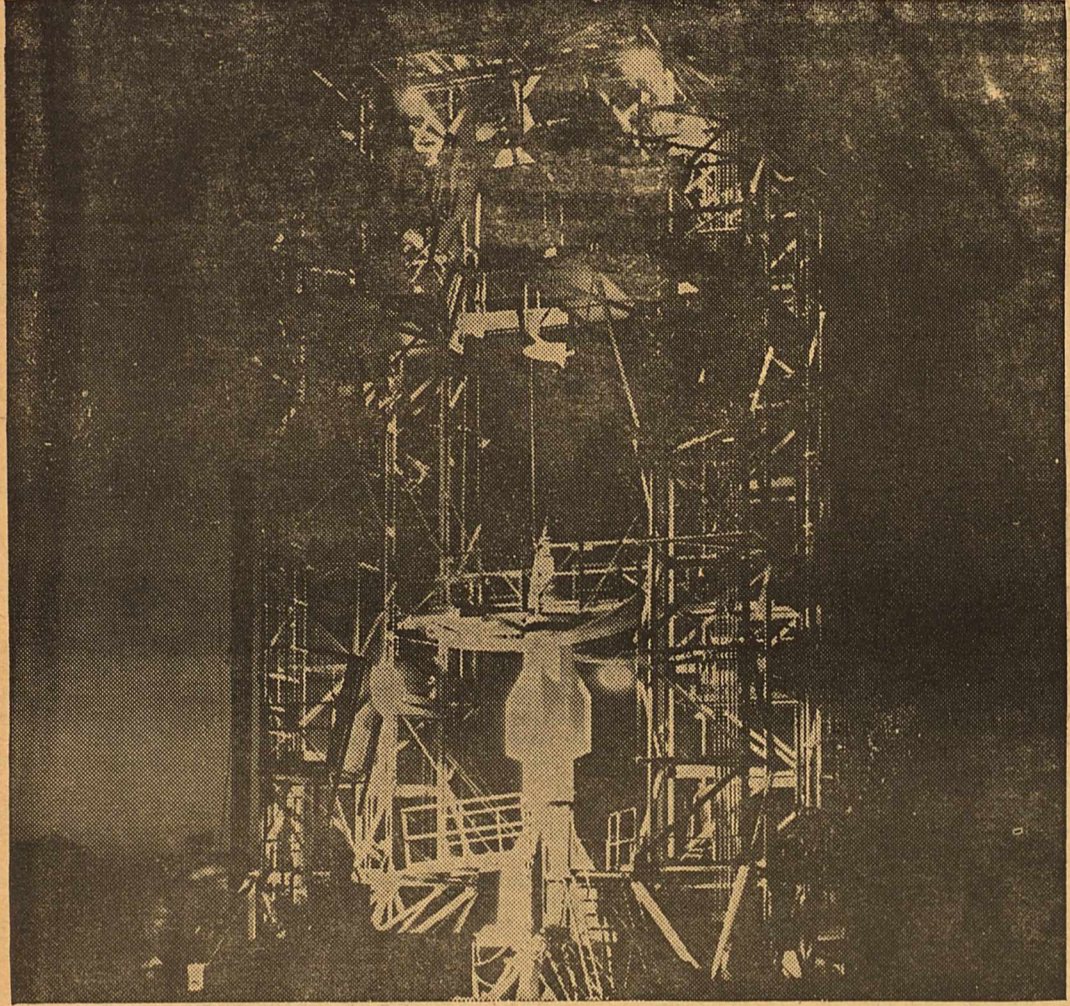
To be enforceable, a contract must be entered into freely by each party involved. Their consent must be genuine. Compulsion or

coercion will make the agreement void. Mistake, misrepresentation or fraud may also serve to invalidate a contract.

Another requirement of a contract is that each party shall perform some part of it. Similarly, there must be some object or benefit to be gained by each party. In return for your work, your employer agrees to pay you certain sums of money. He gains the use of your services, while you are benefited by the wages or salary received.

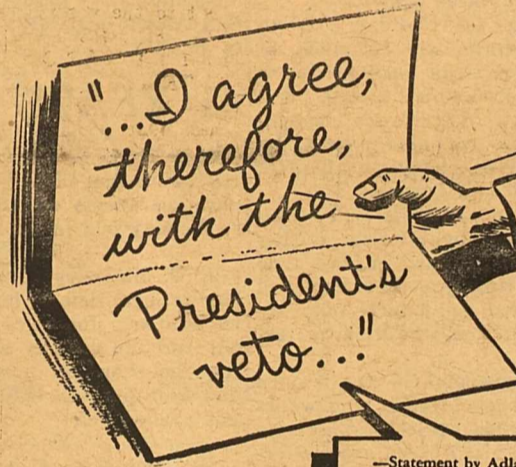
Also, a contract must be entered into for a lawful purpose. You cannot enter into a binding contract to commit a crime or to evade the law. Thus, since gambling and wagers are prohibited by law, gambling debts cannot be collected by legal process. Nor will the courts enforce an agreement to pay interest in excess of the legal maximum provided by statute.

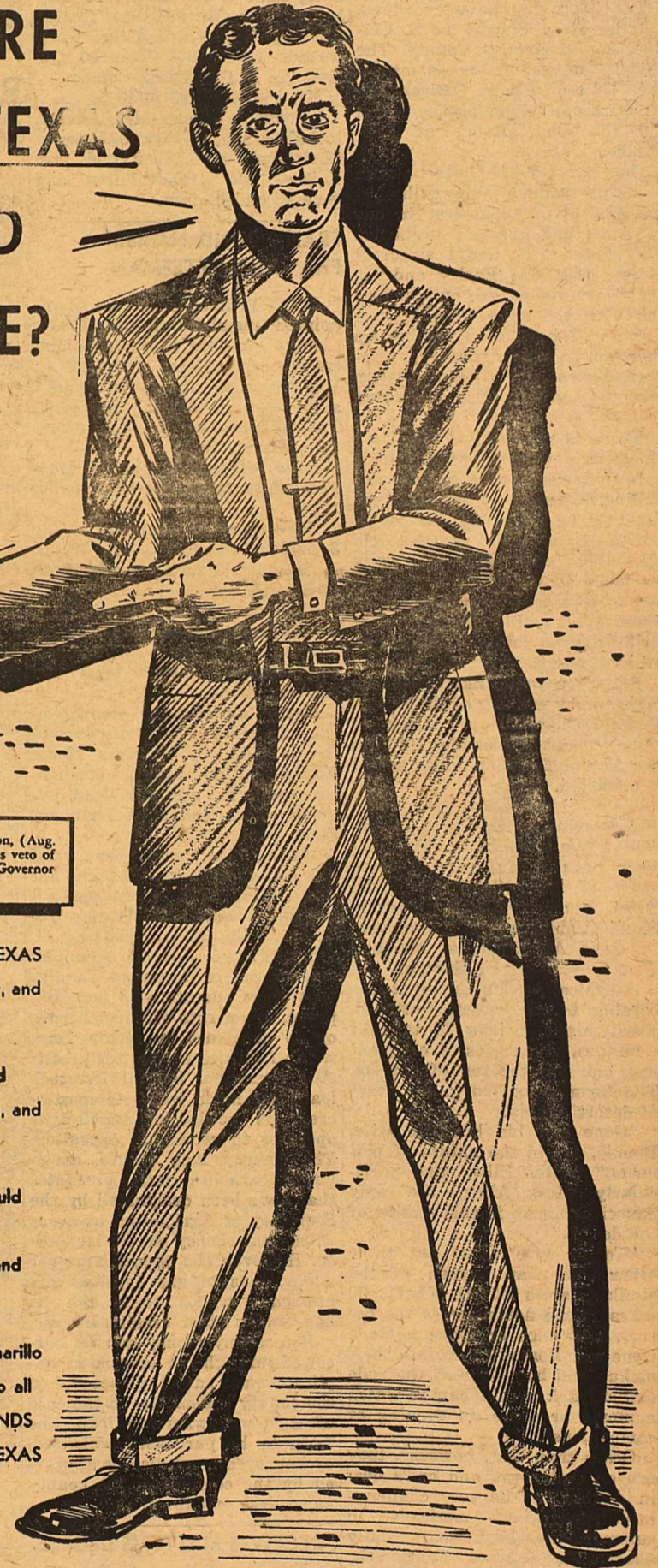

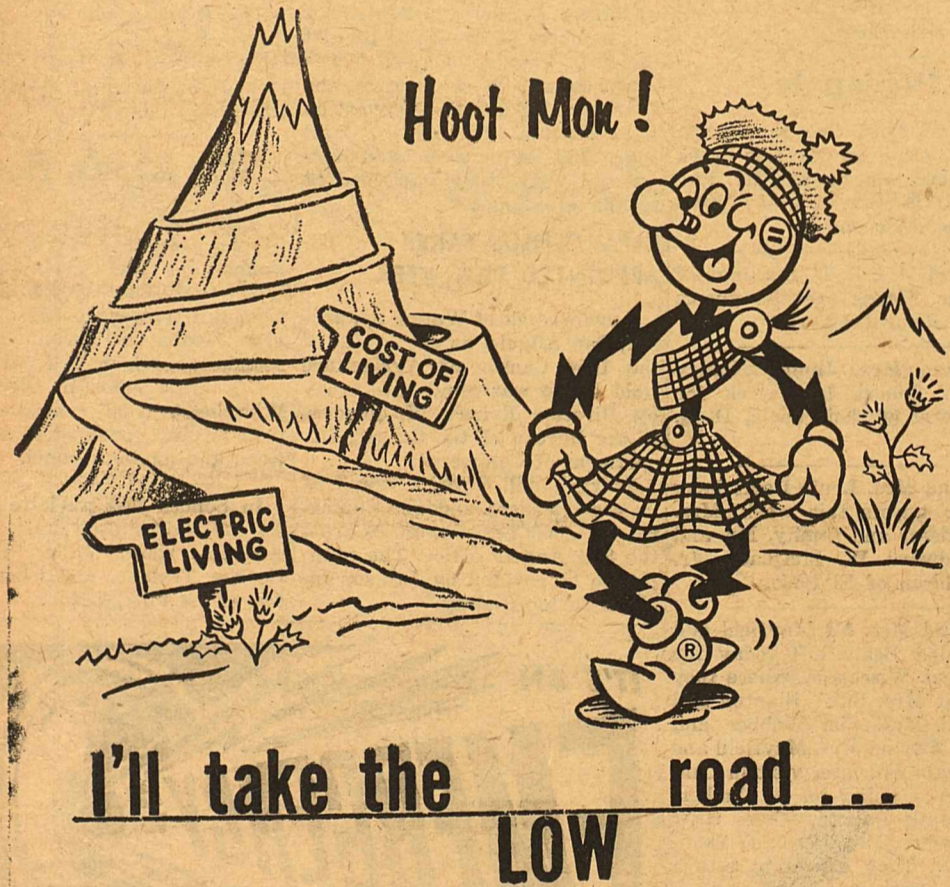

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section, to be numbered 63; providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. Qualified members of the Teacher Retirement System, in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Teacher Retirement System shall be entitled to credit in the Teacher Retirement System for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as an appointive officer or employee of the State. Likewise, qualified members of the Employees Retirement System of Texas in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be entitled to credit in the Employees Retirement System of Texas for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public school, colleges, and universities of the state, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year; providing for enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection; providing for the necessary election form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any

State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20,000) Dollars per month.

"(2) Needy blind person who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than \$20.00 Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any

Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof; creating the State Building Fund; providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund; providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature; providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon, the proclamation of such election, and the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b and reading as follows:

"Section 51-b. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for some other State official to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate as such State official he shall be so confirmed as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner that other State officials are confirmed.

"(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, and each year thereafter, the Comptroller of Public Accounts shall certify to the State Treasurer the amount of money necessary to pay Confederate pensions for the ensuing calendar year as provided by the constitution and laws of this State. Thereupon each year the State Treasurer shall transfer forthwith from the Confederate Pension Fund to the State Building Fund all money except that needed to pay the Confederate pensions as certified by the Comptroller. This provision is self-enacting. The State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the uses and purposes set forth in subdivision (c) hereof.

"(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may be hereafter provided by law, the Commission may acquire necessary real and personal property, salvage and dispose of property unsuitable for State purposes, modernize, remodel, build and equip building for State purposes, and negotiate and make contracts necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes herein mentioned.

"The first major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be known and designated as a memorial to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be devoted to the use and occupancy of the Supreme Court and such other courts and State agencies as may be provided by law. The second major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be a State office building and shall be used by whatever State agencies as may be provided by law.

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) per cent of the moneys available to it in any one year, for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America. Shall memorials may be upon battlefields or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1965.

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be permitted by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Republic in the Texas War for Independence. Said Memorials may be erected upon battlefields in cemeteries, or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1965.

"(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article VII (Adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purposes of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

"(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas as the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

"FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) per cent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Those opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

"AGAINST the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) per cent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, prohibiting the Legislature from ever lending the credit of the State, or granting any public money, or assuming or otherwise discharging indebtedness of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the State, now authorized, or which may hereafter be authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads, or turnpikes within this State; and providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of this State of Texas be amended by adding hereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52-b. The Legislature shall have no power or authority to in any manner lend the credit of the State or grant any public money to, or assume any indebtedness, present or future, bonded or otherwise, of any individual, person, firm, Partnership, association, corporation, public corporation, public agency, or political subdivision of the State, or anyone else, which is now or hereafter authorized to construct, maintain or operate toll roads and turnpikes within this State."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 2, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the Legislature from lending the credit of the State or granting public money to, or assuming any indebtedness of, any one authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes in this State."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

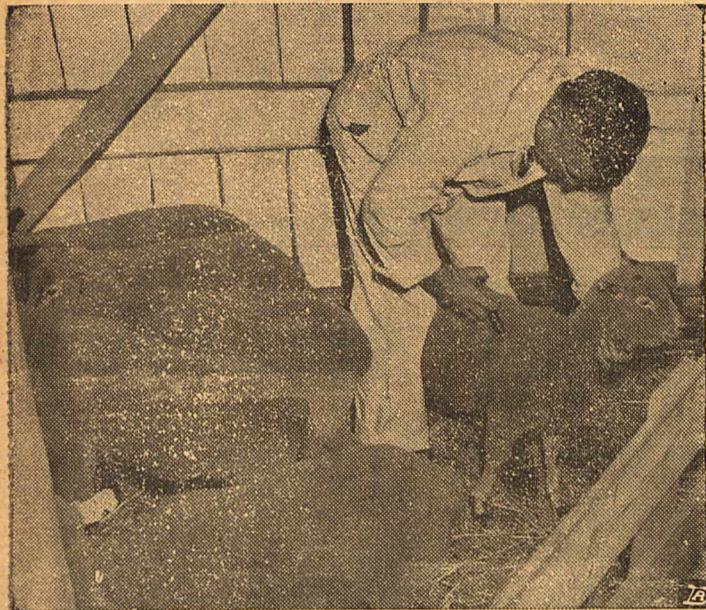

Science Conquers New Sheep Disease



Dr. N. H. Casselberry, veterinary medical director of Cutter Laboratories, injects a number of sheep with Blucine, the new vaccine for the prevention of bluetongue. Bluetongue, a new sheep disease problem in this country, has caused serious losses in many sections of the west.

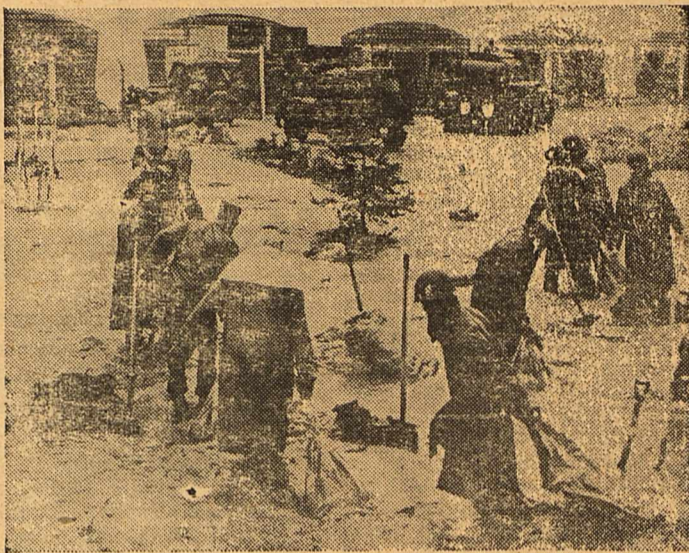
The disastrous losses caused by bluetongue infection, a relatively new disease of sheep, can be prevented. This was indicated by Cutter Laboratories' announcement that a vaccine for the prevention of bluetongue, known as Blucine, is in production at their Berkeley, California plant.

Bluetongue in the United States was first recognized in California in 1952 when an estimated 325,000 sheep were infected with bluetongue disease. Since the disease has been identified, there is good indication that it has also been a problem in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Nevada. The disease is transmitted by gnats and possibly by other biting insects.

Although there is no known treatment or cure for the disease, vaccination has proved a practical and effective method of preventing bluetongue infection. Production of Blucine provides the sheep industry with an important means of preventing the serious losses this disease may cause.

Europe's Worst Flood Disaster

Retarded — Or Just Hard of Hearing?



Children with hearing trouble repeat their grades four times as often as children with normal hearing.

At least two-million children in the United States have impaired hearing and the hearing of more than 20-million others in the 5 to 17 age bracket is receiving virtually no attention, according to the American Hearing Aid Association. (There are about 34,775,000 school-age children in the U.S. Fewer than 300 cities and only 21 states require periodic hearing tests in public schools.)

Most parents whose children suffer a slight loss of hearing don't discover it in time to prevent a greater and more serious loss.

Parents should watch for such tell-tale signs of hearing loss as inattentiveness, awkward listening posture, excessive fatigue, slowness in learning, shyness in playing with other children and voice peculiarities.

From 50 to 60 percent of all hearing impairments among children can be corrected if discovered early enough.

Air Conditioning For Tractors



A farmer's inventiveness has resulted in a unique machine which in effect brings air conditioning to operators of tractors and self-propelled combines. No longer is running these machines the hot, dusty job of the past. The unique machine, called the Air-Brella, shades, cools and protects the driver from dust, insects, fumes, sprays and dusting chemicals.

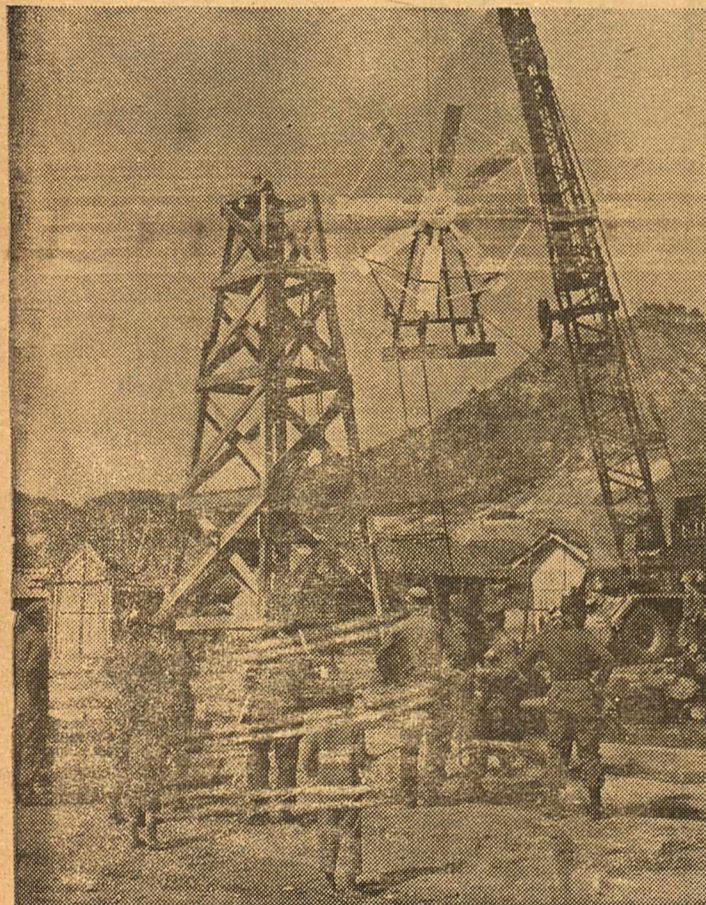
Though it looks much like an aluminum umbrella, it mounts an electric fan in the top which draws air and directs it along the inside contours of the bonnet in such a way that it actually puts a wall of fast-moving air around the operator, yet does not blow directly on him.

The invention is being made by Farmhand, Hopkins, Minnesota, manufacturers of farm materials handling implements, which has developed the machine so it is adjustable both vertically and horizontally, and is easily powered from the battery of the unit on which it is mounted.

Trains For Channel Swim

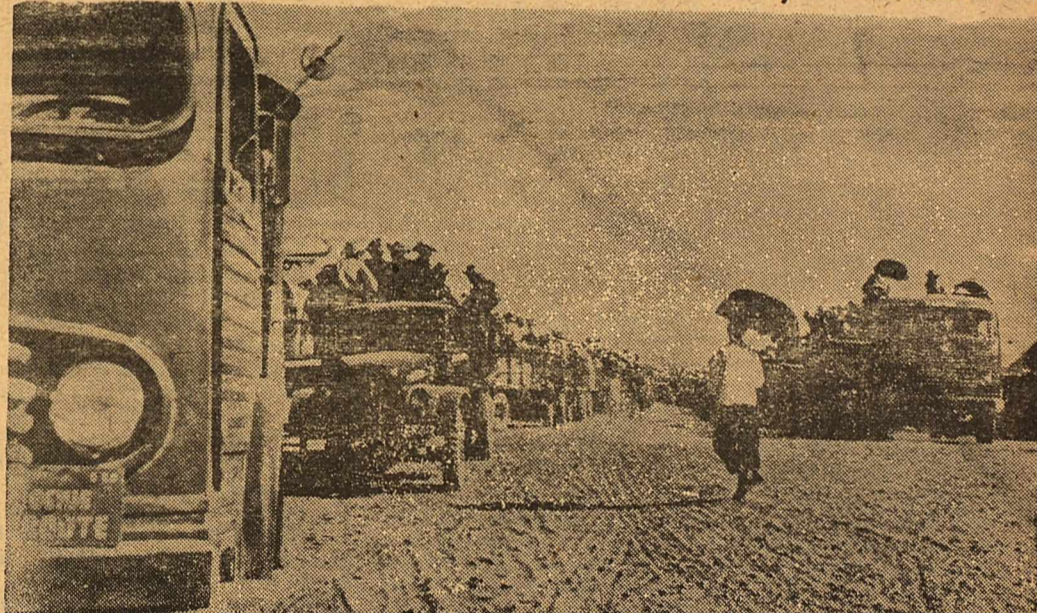

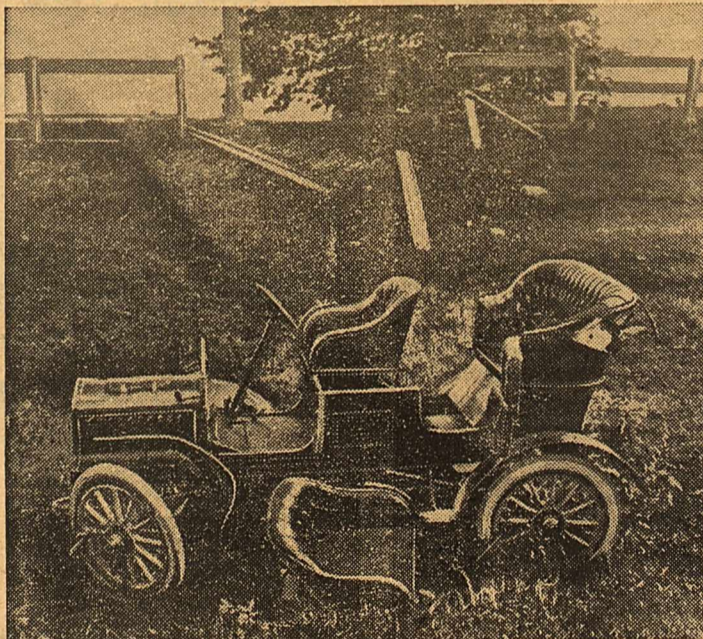

Indo-China Red River Delta Abandoned by the French

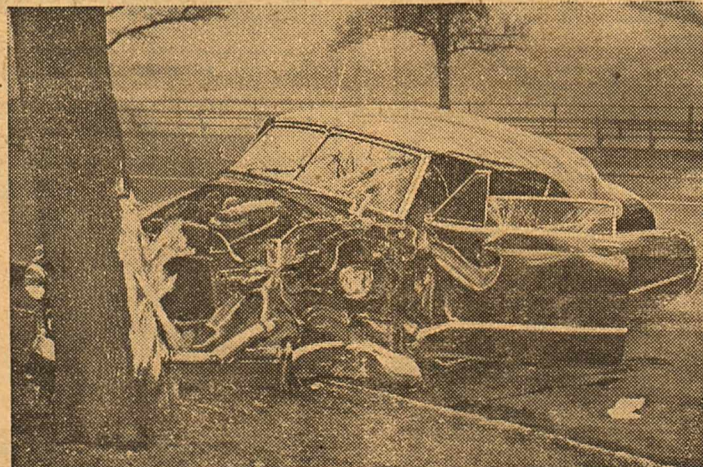

When the Cubs recently recalled Pitcher Bob Zick from Beaumont, Zick reported to the club at Wrigley Field, walking up to Manager Stan Hack to identify himself, he said: "I'm Zick." Hack didn't tumble, but replied: "I don't feel so good myself."
In the eyes of Branch Rickey, the best player in the minor leagues today is second baseman

Gene Freese of New Orleans in the Southern Association. When he came to the question, "What is your pet superstition?" Freese wrote: "I hate to hear anyone say

the opposing pitcher is easy to hit." Freese, incidentally, is hitting about .345.
This has been a bad year for Enos Slaughter, so far as holding records is concerned. When the season began, Slaughter led all active major league players in the number of games played, times at bat, and singles. He has lost all three. Mickey Vernon has edged him out in the number of times at bat, and Stan Musial has caught and passed him in the number of singles. Enos lost the lead in the number of games played with Phil Ca-

varretta returned to the wars.
When Joe Adcock of the Milwaukee Braves hit four home runs and a double in a game against the Dodgers July 31, he did something no National leaguer had done in 65 years. That is, rap five extra-base hits in one game. The last time this was done in the National League was when Larry Twitchell of the Cleveland Nationals hit three triples, a double and home run back on August 15, 1889.
Catcher Yogi Berra has a reputation of being one of the best men in the game in settling down a pitcher. A story is told by former Yankee Pitcher Joe Page, about the game in which the Yankees beat the Red Sox to clinch the 1949 pennant. Joe was having trouble. The Red Sox had two men on base, with the score tied, and Vernon Stephens at the plate. Out came Yogi. "How long have you been married?" he asked. Page said 11 years. "Got any kids?" Joe said no. "You gotta have kids, Joe," Yogi said. "Best thing in the world for a family." Then he walked back behind the plate and Page proceeded to strike out Stephens.

The St. Louis Cardinals, as they completed their first 100 games of the season, led all other National League clubs in the number of runs scored, although they had scarcely played .500 ball. They scored 562 runs in the 100 games, an average of better than five and one-half a game. However, their pitchers had been generous to the foe. Cardinal pitchers had given up 537 runs better than five a game.

The Philadelphia Athletics were losing to Cleveland, 15 to 4, and scored 13 runs in the eighth to win the game, 17 to 15, June 15, 1925—27 years to the day before the Cardinals set the National League mark.
St. Louis Cardinals had a 25 won, 25 lost mark in both sets of fifty games.
Ralph Kiner hit 11 home runs in 1941 for Albany in the Eastern League and 14 for the same club, to lead the league in 1942. He had two homers in 1843 before going into the service while on the Toronto, International League roster. He has hit 23 or more home runs in each of his major league seasons.

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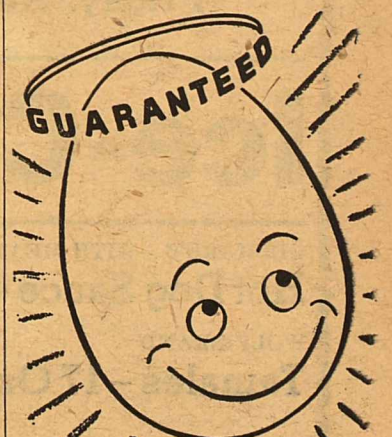

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

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

This session of Congress, now drawing to a close, has moved to plug some loopholes through which communists and subversive have escaped exposure and in some cases conviction for espionage activities.

The most recent bill on the subject was passed by the House last week, 293 to 55. It was the so-called immunity bill, and its passage reflected the popular revulsion against the abuse of the Fifth Amendment by "I refuse to answer" witnesses.

Recent abuse of the Amendment has been flagrant. Too many witnesses before congressional committees, especially when questioned about Communist affiliation, have refused to answer the simplest questions.

The application of the House bill is strictly limited to cases affecting the national security. A witness granted immunity (which could only be done after a Federal Judge approved the action in a particular situation) would have to testify truthfully. If he refused he could be sent to jail for contempt. And if he were to lie he could be sent to jail for perjury.

Entirely too many people who are out to destroy our constitutional system have been permitted to hide behind the Constitution while engaged in their wrecking maneuver. This bill, if finally enacted, will strip away this "immunity", and rob the subversives of a convenient weapon.

Another recent bill passed by the House would strip citizenship from persons convicted of seeking the violet overthrow of the Government. The law already provides for revocation of citizenship for persons convicted of treason or of bearing arms against the United States.

Another House-approved measure would permit wire-tapping evidence in security cases to be admitted in court. It will be re-

Fat lambs were fully 25 to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday as the market found stronger support from smaller supplies and from a 2c to 3c per pound advance in dressed lamb prices in New York.

Good and choice fat lambs cashed at \$17 to \$19, the top established by a string of lambs averaging 83 pounds at \$19 that come from Zack Taylor, Tatum New Mexico.

Stocker and feeder lambs cashed at \$10 to \$14.50. Slaughter yearlings wethers sold from \$8 to \$12, while aged wethers drew \$6 to \$9. Slaughter ewes drew \$3.50 to \$4.50, and old bucks sold around \$3.
