





A NEW "EYE" IN THE TEXAS SKY

This spectacular night photograph shows the new half-billion candlepower beacon atop the new Republic National Bank Building in Dallas, Texas. Towering 150 feet above the roof of the building, 598 feet above the sidewalk, the light is visible 120 miles from Dallas. In the left foreground is the building now occupied by the Bank. Several blocks nearer the camera, it seems almost as high as the new structure. When completed, the tower supporting the beacon will be covered with more than two miles of brilliant luminous tubing, in changing colors of red, white and blue. Dedication of the \$25,000,000, 40-story building is scheduled for December 1.

A Famous American Shin

The gallant MANHATTAN. of the United States Lines, was one of America's most famous passenger ships. This graceful liner, with her sistership WASHINGTON, were the first American ships built for North Atlantic service in over forty years when they came out in the early 1930s. Their imme-diate popularity with travelers upturned the entire system of class nomenclature aboard Atlantic liners. The MANHAT-TAN's red, white and blue smoke stacks and her clean, sweeping lines readily identi-fied her as an American ship. She saw extensive war service, surviving a fierce fire off Halifax. Rebuilt as a troopship she could carry 7,000 men. When peace came, the MANHATTAN was retained by the Navy as a mothball transport. Her peacetime career of only nine years

was indeed too short, particularly for such an outstanding example of American shipbuilding, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. Since the Civil War only twelve ships have been built for American passenger service on the North Atlantic route. High construction and operating costs make it virtually impossible for American ship lines to compete. For years this lack of ships in deepsea service was made up for in large part by a thriving passenger and cargo service along our coasts. Today, this domestic fleet is extinct. New liners for deep-sea operation are necessary.







The local T.V. System would consist of one 440 ft. tower to receive the signals, and wires would run from this tower to the home of persons wanting television much the same as your telephone wire runs from the telephone office to your home. You would not need to buy T.V. tower or aerial. All you would need would be a T. V. set. Any make or model T. V. set would work, regardless of cost.

This system will guarantee excellent reception of San Angelo 100% of the time, and reception, part of the time on two other stations to be determined later. Probably these stations would be San Antonio and Midland.

It is planned to charge a tie-on fee of \$150, and a rental charge of \$6 per month. The \$150 tie-on fee could be paid in installments. It is possible that a lower tie-on fee and higher monthly rental charge could be worked out if people want it that way.

About the cheapest T.V. set available at the present time sells for about \$150, so a person in Sonora could have television in his home for about \$300 and \$6 per month.



"Tragedy season" for the aged may be here again, manifested in the form of one or more catastrophic fires in convalescent or nursing homes, State Health Officer Henry A. Holle said today.

"It is only natural that dangers of destructive fire in homes caring for aged people rises in direct proportion to temperature drops during fall and winter months," Dr. Holle pointed cut.

"Full time use of heating and electrical equipment in these homes, plus the fact that ambulatory patients who smoke are forced inside during cold weather,

calls for greater fire precautions."
Dr. T. E. Dodd, in charge of nursing home licensing activities at the State Health Department, said every nursing home administrator should insist that local fire department personnel make regular inspections of their premises and operations at least every thirty or sixty days, "even though we require each licensed

nursing home in Texas to be approved for fire safety." Dodd added:

"In addition to carrying out all suggestions made by the local fire department, each nursing home administrator should have a definite plan that has been practiced and perfected to meet all emergencies caused by a fire.




