Billy Richards, a former Bovinian who played on those good BHS Mustang basketball teams back in the mid-'50's, is bringing his girls' basketball team back close to home for a state tournament.

Richards doubles as high school principal and coach of the team at Reserve, N.M. People who know about geography tell us that's out on the western side of our sister state.

Nonetheless, Richards and his Reserve Mountaineer girls basketball team will be in Portales this weekend for the state playoffs. They're bringing with them a winning streak that'll rival UCLA's --- 50 straight.

The team is undefeated in 15 outs this season. That winning streak projects back to '69, according to our information. This is the first year for New Mexico to have a state tourney for girls' basketball.

But, he figures that's just a chance they'll all have to take, because he has plans made to be right there.

We don't blame him.

Plans Vocational Shop Addition --

School Board Rejects Change Of Hair Code

Bovina Schools board of trustees rejected a Student Council-sponsored amendment to the hair code for boys which is now in effect at a regular monthly session Monday night.

Student council representatives requested that boys be allowed to wear more liberal hair styles. The current hair code for boys, which the board agreed to leave unchanged calls for hair to be "neatly trimmed above the eyebrows, ears and collar."

Supt. L. F. Jacobs explains

that organizations within the school have more restrictions in regard to hair. The student council requested the change for boys who are not in such organizations.

Student council representatives making the request to the board were Heidi Corn, council president; Rodney Hromas, council vice president; and Ronnie Nuttall, senior class president and a council representative.

In other business, the board

accepted a bid from Sherrill Lumber Co. to make a 40 by 50 foot addition to the vocational agriculture shop area.

The addition is to be completed by the beginning of next school year.

This will meet the requirements of 2400 square feet as made by the state board of education as the present shop area has 1240 square feet.

Also, according to Jacobs, by using the former music room in the shop area and a portion of the new space, another shop or

vocational course can be added. New vocational and technical courses are being recommended by the state with the possibility existing that these will become a requirement in the curriculum of Texas schools.

The new construction will cost approximately \$10,600.

The board called the annual school trustee election for Saturday, April 7. Deadline for candidates for two positions on

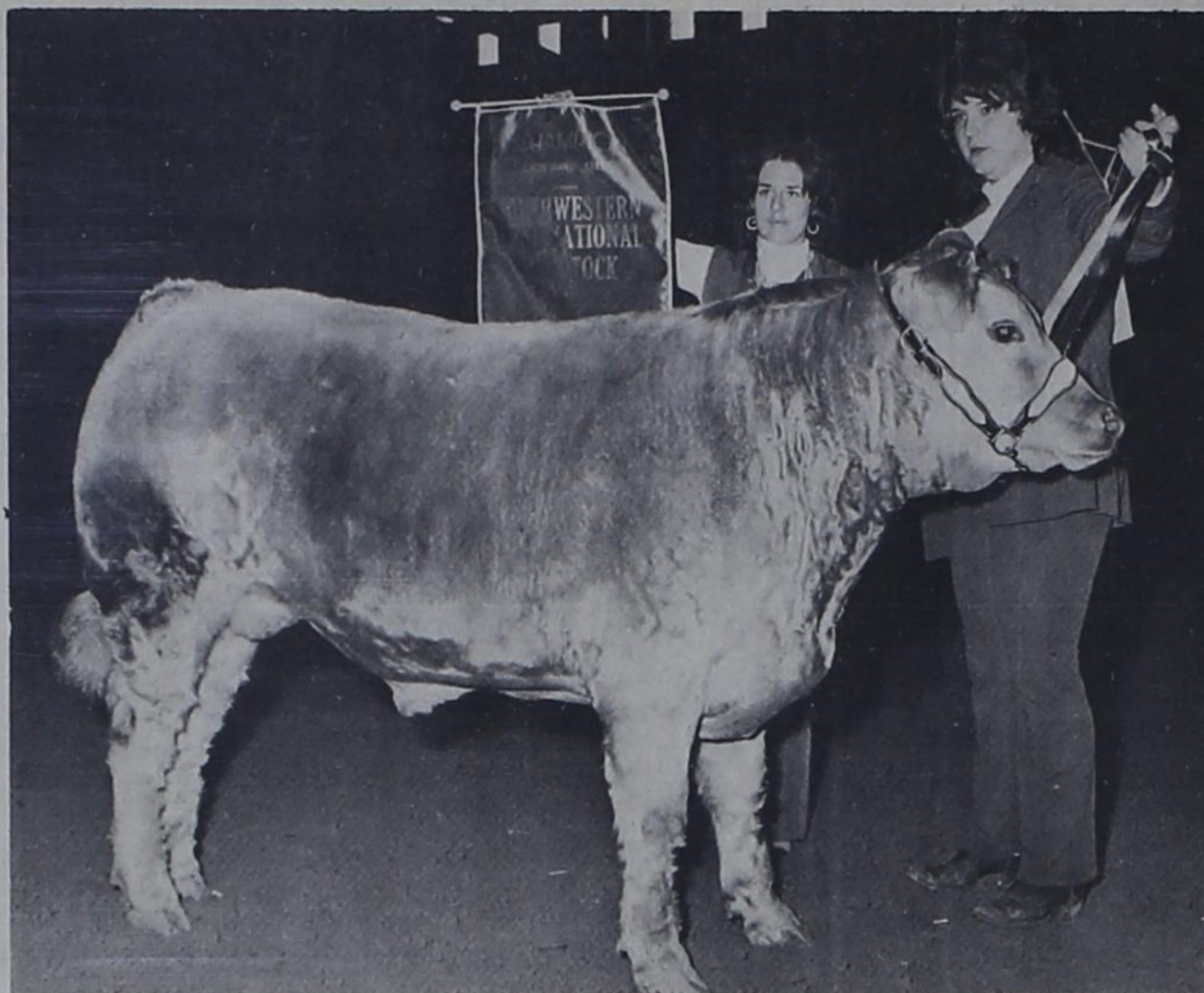

Friona Loam --

Discover New Soil In Area

Friona loam.

This is the name of a new soil found during the soil survey of Parmer County says Herb Evans, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS). Herb Bruns, Soil Scientist, who mapped Parmer County, was the first to discover this soil. He couldn't make it fit into any soil series classified at that time, says Evans. "So Bruns carefully described the soil, took samples, and determined its extent. The information was sent to SCS soil correlators. After thorough study of the data, the new soil was approved by the Washington Office," Evans explains.

The Friona soil series has taken its place in the nationwide system of soil classification. Hereafter, any soil found in the country that fits the Friona series classification will be given this name. There are

about 10,000 different soil series in the United States.

Soils are named for a local community, town, city, school or other landmark.

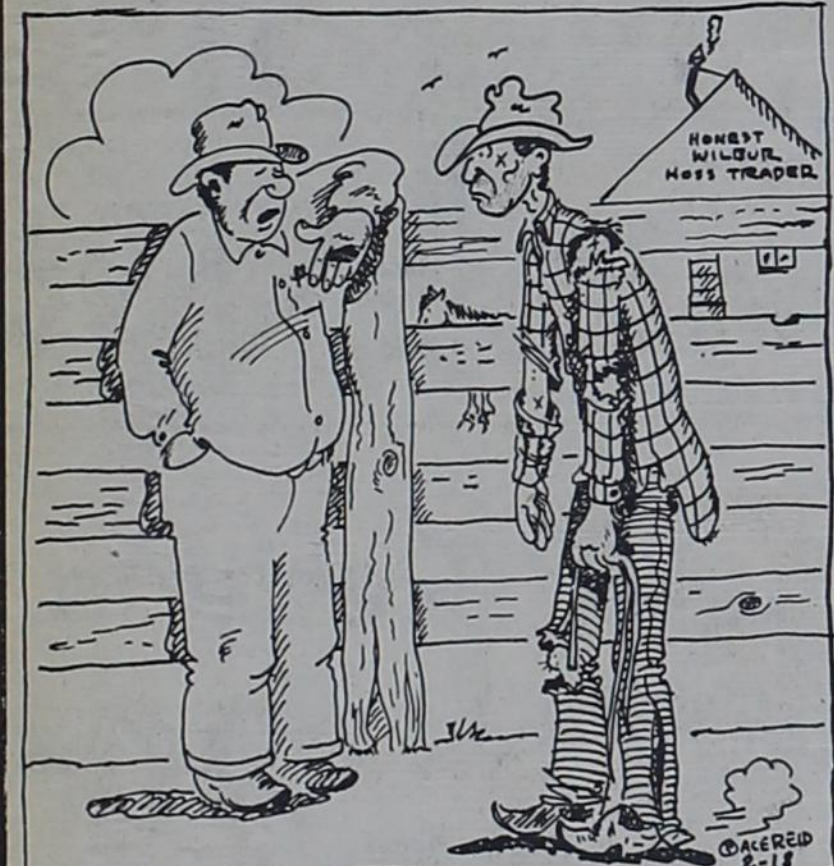

10 Accidents In January

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person being injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region No. five for January 1973 shows a total of 572 accidents, resulting in 16 persons killed and 207 persons injured as compared to January 1972 with 500 accidents result-

ing in nine persons killed and 217 persons injured.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor reminds motorists that it takes 16 times the normal distance to stop a vehicle on ice than on dry pavement. The icy weather will still exist in these winter months.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of January, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Hartley, four; Gray, Sherman, and Lubbock, two each; Dallam, Deaf Smith, Roberts, Swisher, Palo Pinto, and Parker with one each.

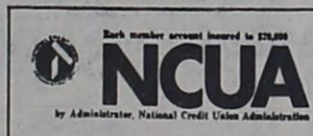

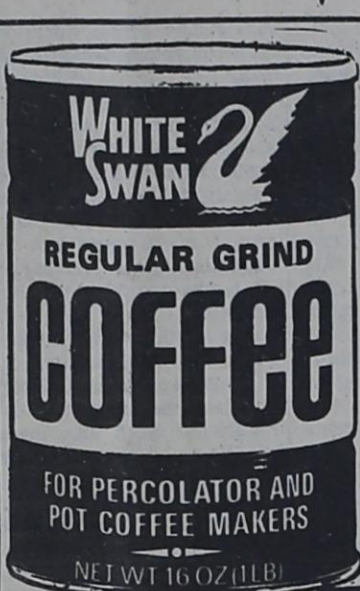

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17th Annual Event --

County Show Begins Friday

The 17th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show is scheduled at Friona Friday and Saturday.

FFA and 4-H members from the county's four schools -- Bovina, Lazbuddie, Friona and Farwell -- will participate in the show.

Lazbuddie showmen will, once again, be striving to hold their outstanding record in the event, having entered the grand champion barrow for 12 consecutive years and 15 years of the past 19.

Dwain Menefee of Friona is superintendent of the show.

Barrows will be judged beginning at 8 a.m. Friday. Lamb judging will begin at 1:30 p.m. that day. Judging of the steer exhibit will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday.

Weigh-in time for barrows

and sheep is from 2 to 6 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday). Steers are to be weighed in between 7 and 8 a.m. Saturday.

Trophies and rosettes will be awarded the top animals in the show with showmanship awards to be awarded in each of the show's three divisions.

An auction sale of all top animals will begin at 1 p.m. Saturday. Gross amount of the sale annually ranks among much larger shows. Last year's sale brought exhibitors a record-breaking \$43,676.95, topping the '71 mark by about \$3,000.

Show officials urge entrants to be prompt in having their animals weighed.

Jim McManigal of West Texas State University at Canyon will judge the barrows and sheep. Judging the steers will

be Herman Boone, vocational-agriculture instructor at Spearman.

The annual show, co-sponsored by Friona Young Farmers and the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show Association, is expected to draw some 260 entries this year, an increase of 30 over last year. Officials expect 130 barrows, 60 lambs and 70 steers to be exhibited.

Site of the show will be the Friona Schools bus barn.

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Building Site Obtained --

County Show Barn Fund Drive Slated

The Parmer County show barn building committee announced this week that a concentrated fund drive will be kicked off for the project in conjunction with the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show this weekend.

Much work and planning has been accomplished during the past year in regard to a location for the structure and details have been worked out, according to a spokesman of the committee.

Following a series of meetings of the steering committee after the 1972 livestock show, the Friona groups' proposal to locate the building in the Friona area was approved.

Efforts then proceeded to nail down a site with several locations considered for the show barn.

A site adjacent to Reeve Lake in the northwest section of Friona was proposed. Representatives of the KIS Development Corporation of Roswell, which

owns the proposed site, were contacted and agreed to a proposal to donate a 21-acre plot, which includes Reeve Lake, to the City of Friona provided the city would develop the lake area as a park.

The Friona city council agreed to the terms and legal papers are presently being prepared.

"I think we can move forward with the project now," says Dwain Menefee, superintendent of the county show and chairman of the steering committee. "Nailing down the location took more time than we intended, but I think everything is working out for the best."

The location will be just off north Highway 214 in Friona, north of the intersection of that highway with U. S. 60.

Menefee states that this year should definitely be the last year for the show to be staged in Friona Schools bus barn, which is too small to adequately house the show.

Plans call for the building of a 100 by 150 foot steel structure with a concrete floor. A 50-foot section will be partitioned off at one end of the structure for showing and auction sale purposes.

Carroll Gehlin, chairman of the fund drive, says about \$12,000 is on deposit in the building fund. The project is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

Officials will make a detailed report on the project during the auction sale at the show Saturday at which time an appeal

for donations to the fund drive will be made, Gehlin says.

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For Conservation --

Recognize Max Self As Farmer Of Year

Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District has recognized Max Self of Friona as its Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Year for 1972. Self, reared on a farm near Muleshoe, has been farming continuously except for two years he served in the Army. Self, his wife, Dorothy, and their three children, Gayla, Gary and Terry, reside on their farm seven miles west and two north of Friona. He now farms over 1000 acres of irrigated land. The 160 acres he owns is the base of his operations. "In 1969," says Herb Evans, district conservationist, "being aware of the benefits of good soil and water conservation, Max asked the Parmer County SWCD for assistance. With technical help, he developed a conserva-

tion plan for his farm and instituted it as finances permitted. "When Max heard of the Great Plains Conservation Program," Evans goes on, "he investigated and found the program would speed up his applied conservation and was tailor-made for his farm goals. "Wanting to protect and improve his and to conserve his underground water, his primary objective was to plant grass on the sloping land to check erosion. Secondary benefits were grazing and protection for his pheasants. His pasture plantings were half cool season grasses and half warm season grasses. These pastures provided year-round grazing for his herd of Angus cattle. "Since pheasant watching is a favorite pastime for the family" Evans continues, "the increased ground cover created by grass planting and good crop

residue management has increased the pheasant population around the Self farm and contributed to the enjoyment of the entire family. "Good residue management also reduces wind erosion and conserves moisture. The conservation plan developed by Self improved his irrigation efficiency by designing a complete irrigation system for his farm. The design includes a distribution system plus proper application for his particular soils and crops. "In short," says Evans, "Self has installed an efficient irrigation system, managed crop residue on the soil surface, established and managed grass and improved his pheasant watching. "Self is an outstanding man and conservationist and his farming operation is proof that conservation pays," concluded Evans.
