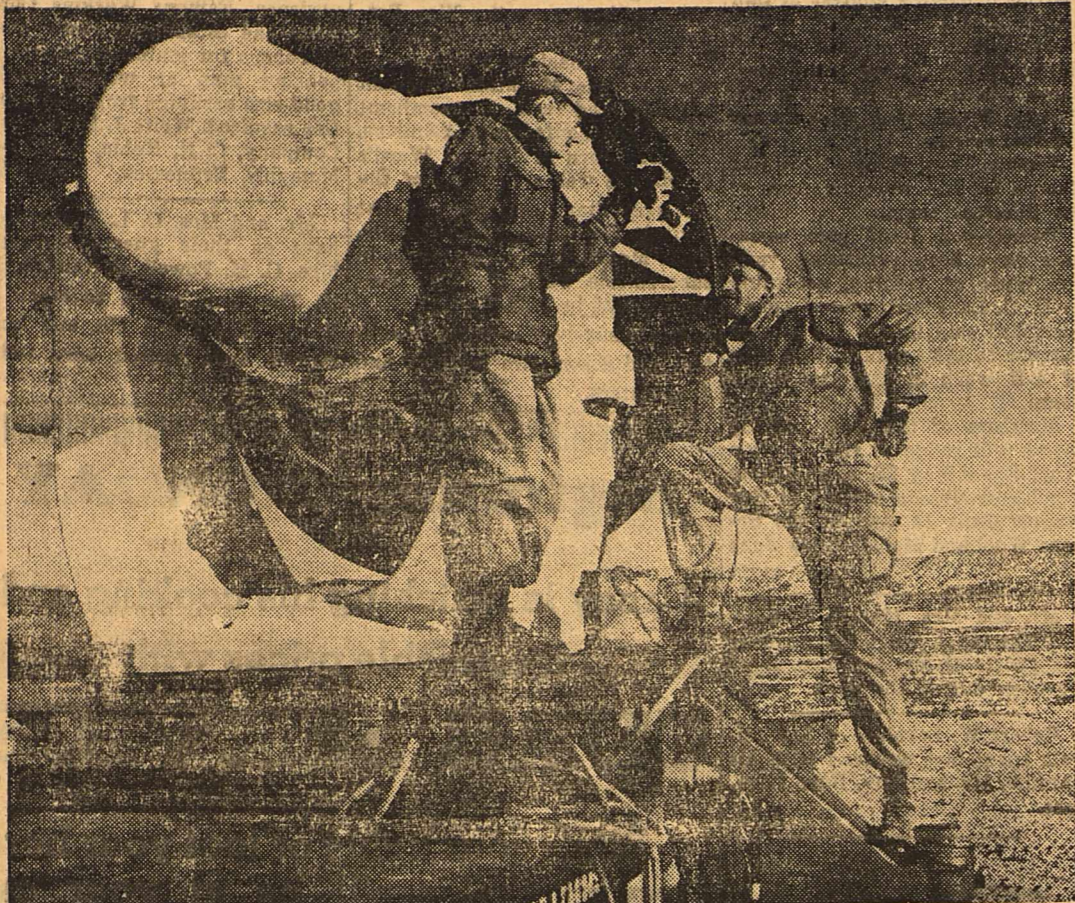

The guided missile battalion being put through its paces is the 36th, which guards the important Washington-Baltimore area against possible enemy air attack, first unit to complete the practice run.

DOLLARS (\$45,000), in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof in said County; said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE PER CENTUM (3%) per annum, and to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Fifteen (15) years from the date thereof; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied annually upon the property in said Sutton County, Texas, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the annual interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at maturity.

THE SAID ELECTION shall be held under the provisions of the Acts of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature, First Called Session, Chapter 16, as amended.

ALL PERSONS who are legally qualified voters of said Sutton County, Texas, who are resident property taxpayers of said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

THAT the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with V.A.T.S. Election Code, adopted by the Fifty-second Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO THE foregoing proposition each voter may mark out with block ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition; or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

THE POLLING PLACES and election officers of said election shall be, respectively as follows: Precinct No. 1. County Courthouse, Sonora Texas, Election Officers, Geo. D. Chalk, Presiding Judge, Ralph Mayer, Clerk.

Precinct No. 2. Sonora Wool and Mohair Co. Warehouse, Election Officer Mrs. Lloyd McMullen, Presiding Judge, Mrs. C.W. Taylor, Clerk.

Precinct No. 3. Cedar Hill Schoolhouse, Election Officers, J. P. Riecks, Presiding Judge; Oscar Adams, Clerk.

Precinct Number No. 4, John Reiley Ranch, Election Officers

Bob Hardgrave, Presiding Judge, Nolan Gibbs, Clerk.

Special Canvassing Board: J. T. Ratliff, Louie Trainer and A. E. Prugel.

THE COUNTY CLERK of Sutton County, Texas, is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published once each week for three consecutive weeks prior to said election, in a newspaper of general circulation published in Sutton County, Texas, and in addition thereto, by posting notices of such election at four public places in Sutton County, Texas, of which shall be at the Court-house door of said County, for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

A COPY OF THIS ORDER, signed by the County Judge of Sutton County, Texas, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

THE ABOVE ORDER having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner D. L. Locklin and seconded by Commissioner Dan Cauthorn that the same be passed and adopted. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of said Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Locklin, Cauthorn, Garrett and Wilson; and none voted "NO".

Locklin, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; Dan Cauthorn, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2; Aldie Garrett, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; Elmer Wilson, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4; being present and participating; there came on to be considered the petition of G. B. Barker and 82 other persons, for an election to be held in said Sutton County, Texas to determine whether or not bonds be issued by said Sutton County, Texas, to the amount of \$45,000, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of

macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property in said County, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity; and

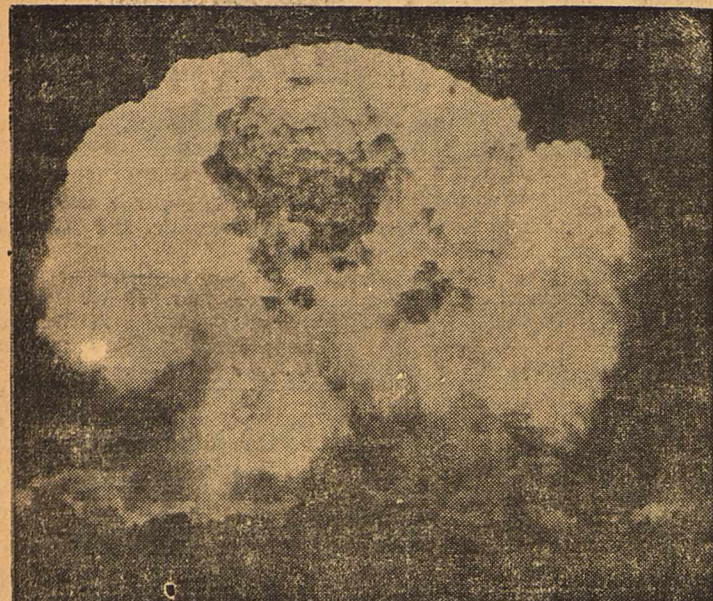

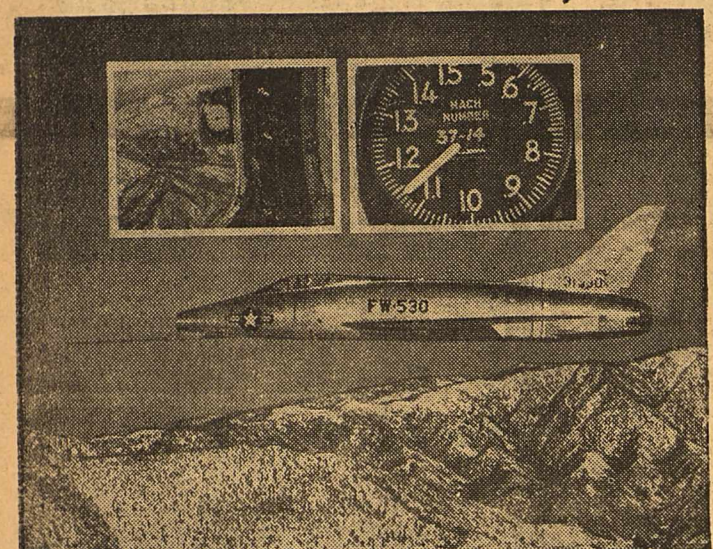

LAS VEGAS, NEVADA — This exceptional photo of the fireball atomic test, made with a 40-inch lens from the site observation area, shows the blast at its peak just before the shock-waves hit "Doomtown".

World's Fastest Laboratory



This new U.S. Air Force F-100 Super Sabre Jet hits speed of over 755 mph as it tests endurance of standard wristwatches in supersonic flight. Control panel dial (upper right) shows plane traveling at over Mach 1.1, indicating that it has already crashed sonic barrier and is exceeding speed of sound by over 100 mph. A newly designed "Senator" watch (upper left) on outside of pilot's canopy, is one of many attached to jet in experiments conducted by Bulova Watch Company in cooperation with North American Aviation.

Super Sabre's specially installed camera kept check on time pieces as plane went through strenuous test flight. The watches, first to be tested under supersonic flight conditions, kept accurate time throughout experiments. Holder of the official world's speed record, and first operational jet designed to fight at supersonic speeds, the Super Sabre is successor to the famous F-86 Sabre which outfought the Communist MIG-15s in Korea, winning the first large-scale test for jet plane supremacy.

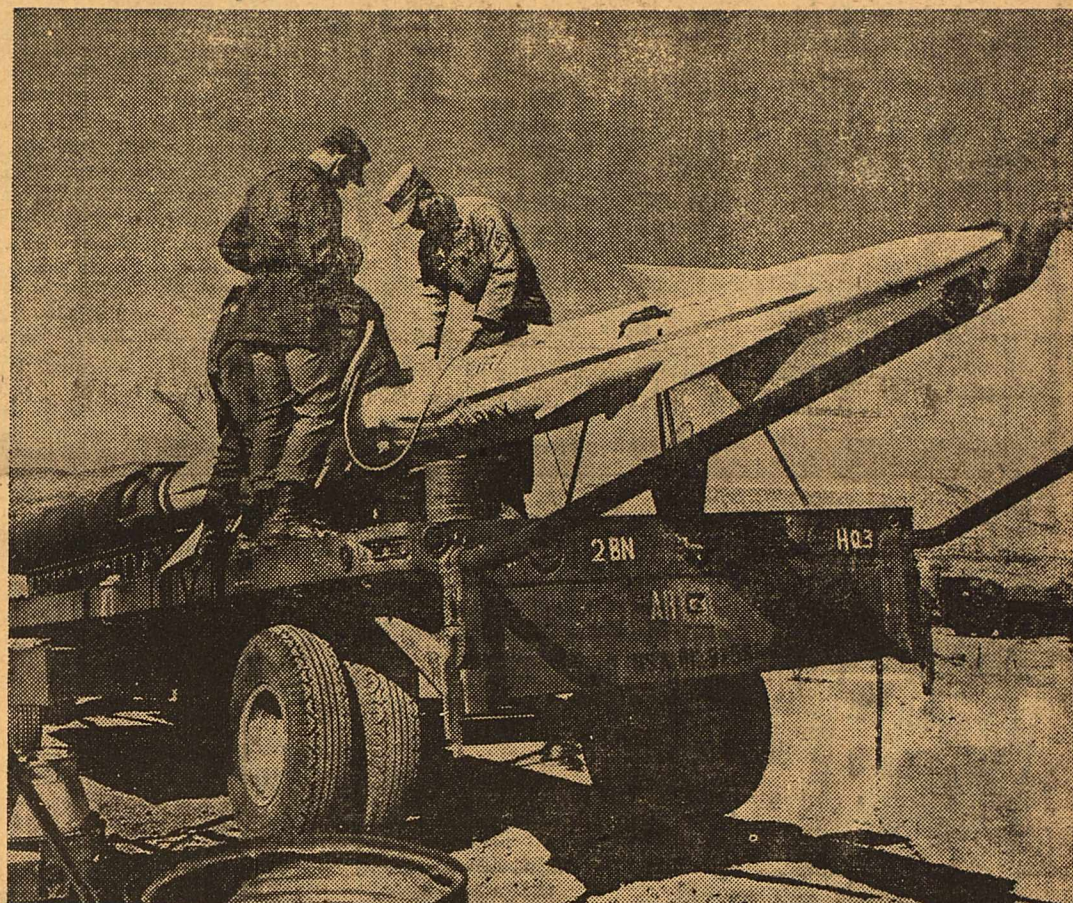

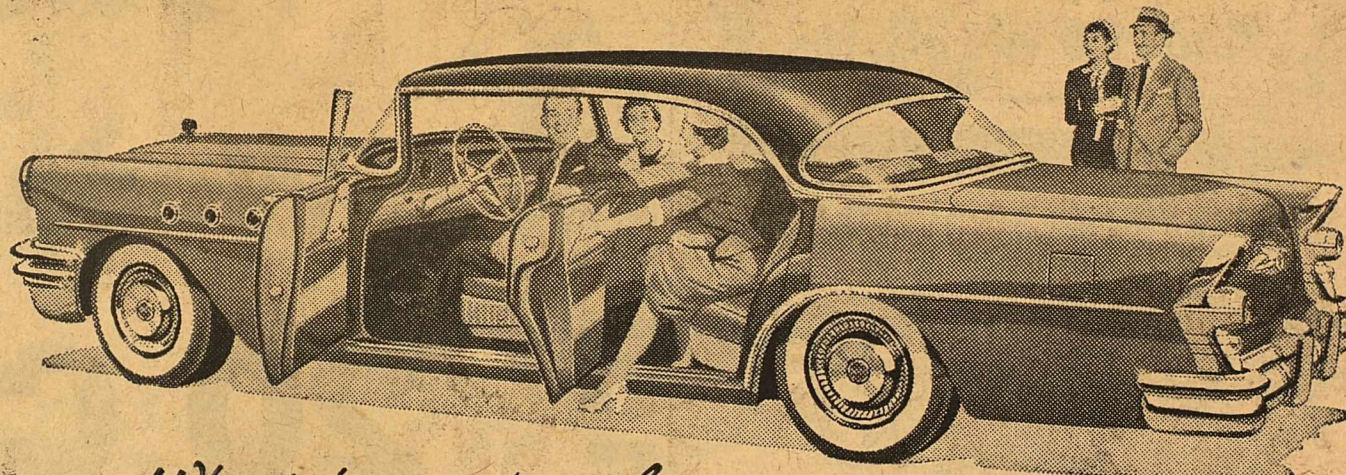

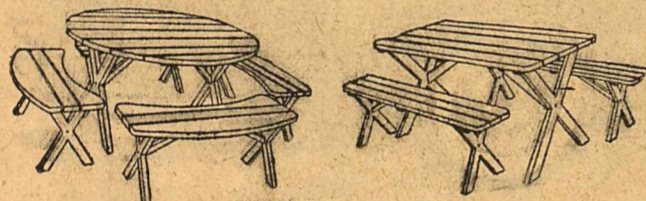

Your Health

The outlook in the fight against rheumatic fever has improved, but this disease, which begins most often between the ages of five and fifteen, still results in serious heart damage in many cases, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

Rheumatic fever usually strikes after a nose and throat infection caused by germs of the streptococcus family. An average of 3 out of one hundred of the commonly called "strep" infections are followed by rheumatic fever. Sulfonamide and penicillin usually can overcome the infection. But if rheumatic fever develops, strict bed rest is first resort to ease the load on the heart and to help the patient avoid added infection.

Sometimes sulphur or penicillin may be given to the convalescing patient to help avoid a recurrence of the disease. Repeated attacks of rheumatic fever are more like to lead to heart damage.

The rheumatic heart condition can involve damage to one or more of the four valves of the heart or to the heart muscle itself. Rheumatic fever inflames the valves and muscles and when the inflammation subsides, it usually leaves a scar.

In about two out of three cases this fever leaves no heart dam-

age, or causes so little injury that the victim can regain active, everyday living. In other cases, modern surgery may help.

No matter how slight an attack of rheumatic fever may seem the first and most important thing to do is to follow your doctor's advice to the letter.

The pine box score of Texas traffic deaths in 1954 was 2,431. This was a 2.7% increase over the deaths in 1953 when 2,368 people were killed. (Traffic fatalities in the nation in 1954 decreased 5% from 38,300 to 36,300.) During 1954 someone was killed in a traffic accident every 3 hours and 36 minutes on an average. Someone was injured every 5 minutes and 7 seconds.

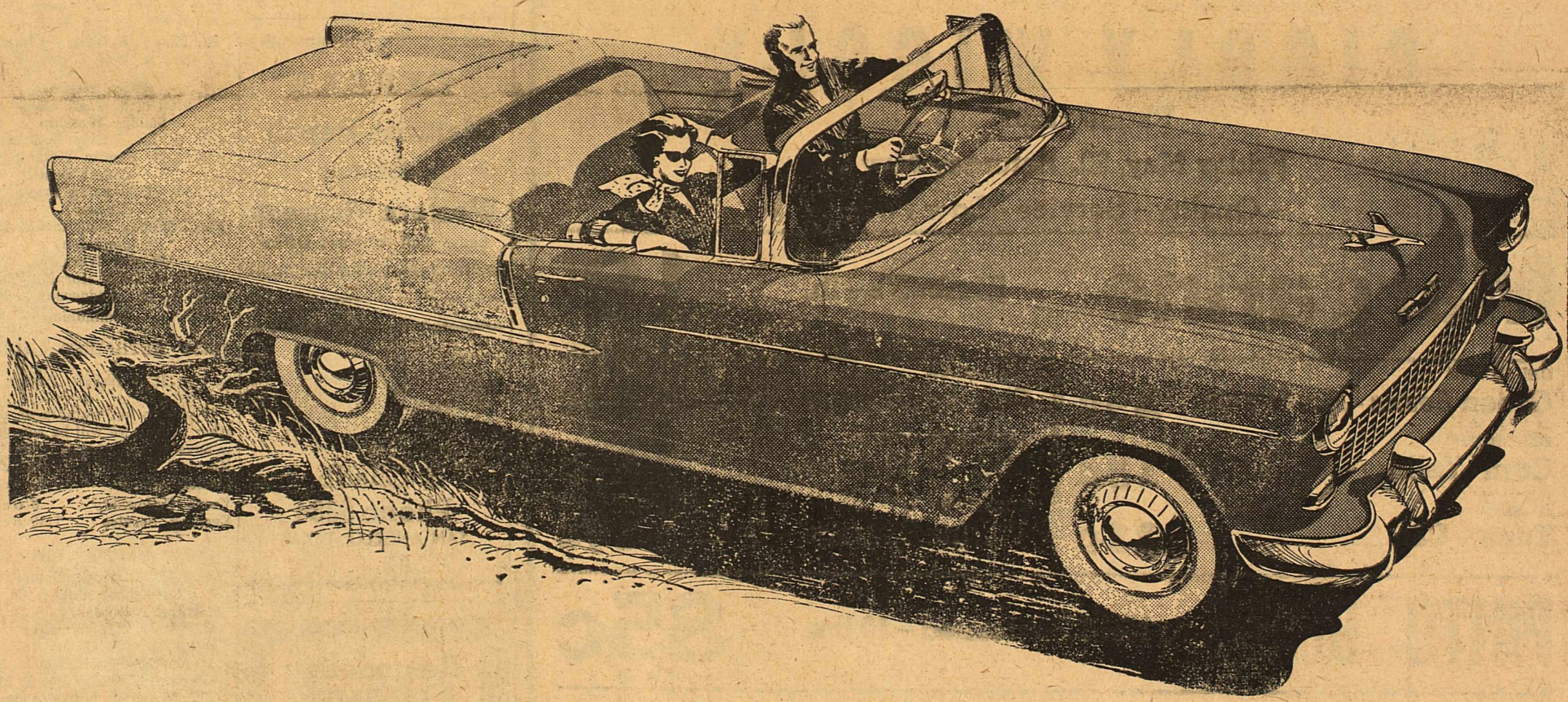



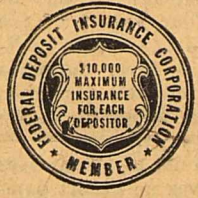
