## High School To Enroll Aug. 25

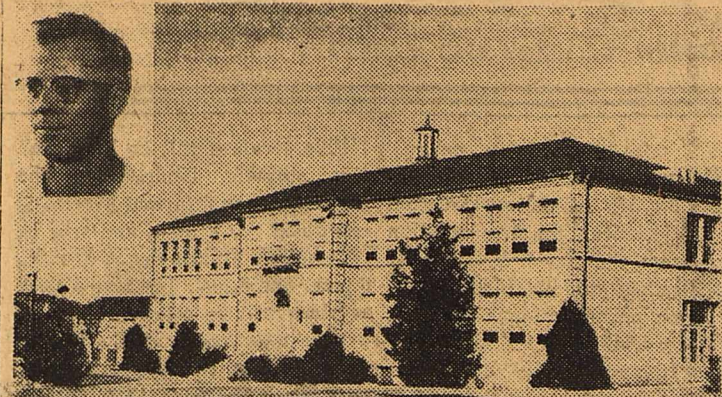

Eighth grade students will have their classes assigned to them on August 31, the first full day of school.

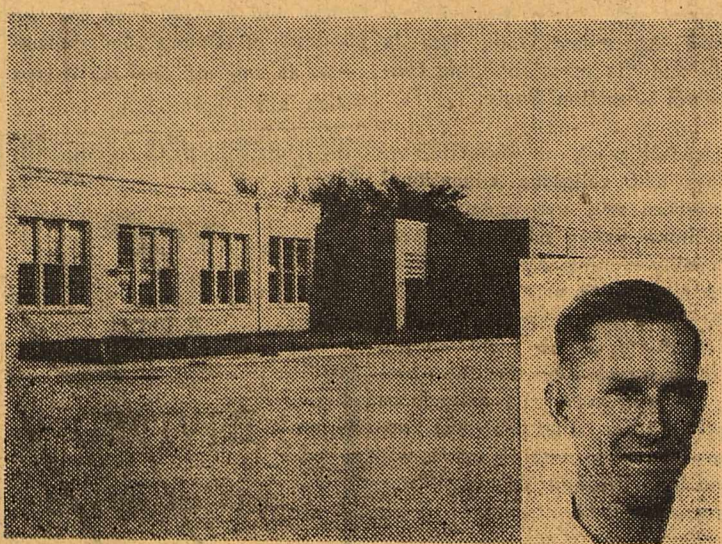
Any new students who did not attend school in Sonora are to register on Wednesday, August 24, Davis said.

## Over 70 Years Of Education

The modern school plant which serves the children of Sonora and Sutton County bears witness to the steady, healthy growth of the area. The roomy, light and pleasant atmosphere of the present

building shows little relationship to the county's first public school.

Sometime in the late 1880's Sonora's founding fathers established the first public school for their children on the site now occupied by the Masonic Lodge and the Church of Christ. As the enrollment grew, new rooms were added to the existing building, some being moved intact from former sites and attached to the building.

One of the first superintendents was a Professor Stephenson who is still remembered by some of the early day residents. Another was a Professor Johnson who became superintendent when he, along with a majority of former Fort McKavett residents, moved to Sonora with the closing of the fort.

From the "Devil" of October 17, 1891 we take the following items pertinent to the school of the day:

"Don't forget that school opens in Sonora on Monday. A full attendance should be had from the first day."

"There is talk of a private school in Sonora for scholars over twelve years of age, if a suitable building can be had."

"Bring your children to Sonora and give them the advantage of a first-class public school and possibly a private high school."

By 1904 the high school student but real knowledge can dispel that fear. One of the best ways to learn what your schools are doing is to enroll in your local P. T. A. and "Know your School."

Meet your teachers and see demonstrations of school work. A community which is well-informed about the work of its schools will be able to support and defend its school system and to help in the solution of the problems facing education.

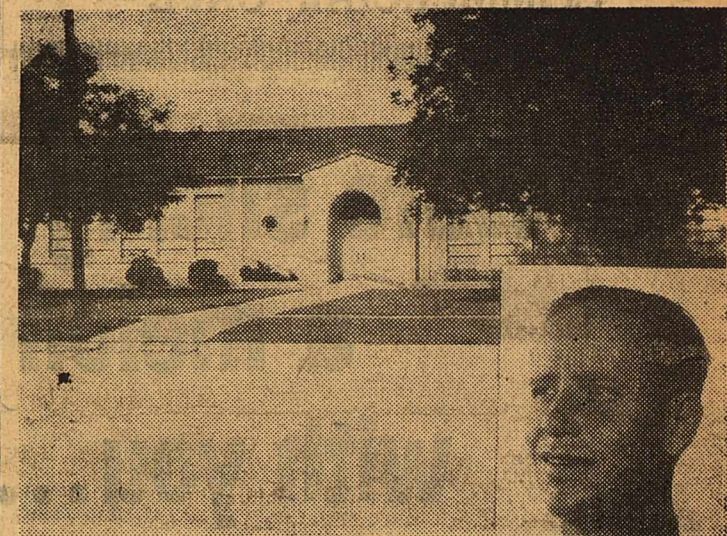

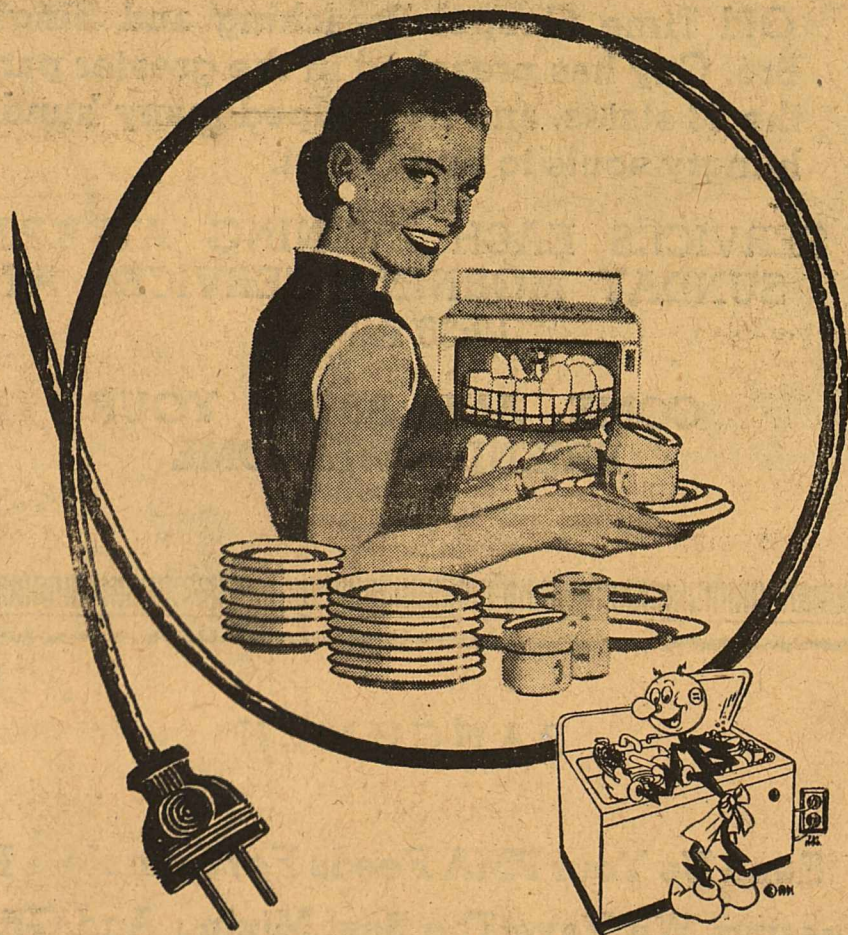

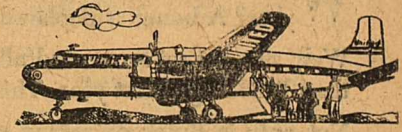

## Exchanging News

Thirteen F.F.A. boys from the Fort Stockton High School Agriculture class returned recently from a two week trip through nine states.

The group left Fort Stockton on July 18 and traveled directly to Yellowstone where they spent six days of their trip. From Yellowstone the boys traveled into Montana and Idaho where they observed farms at close range and

studied the agriculture methods of farming on the side of a hill rather than in the plains of their home country.

On the way home the boys passed through the lush fruit orchards of Utah valleys and completed their trip home by way of the Grand Canyon, Painted Desert and Petrified Forest.

Study of the condition of farm crops, animals and grazing land along the route was part of the purpose of the jaunt as well as a vacation for all hands. The combination vacation and study trip is entirely financed by the boys through their F.F.A. projects during the school year. The school provided a school bus in which to make the trip but no expenses.

The boys and their leaders camped out and cooked their own meals for the two weeks. -The Fort Stockton Pioneer.

Registration in the Big Lake Elementary School will start Monday, August 22, between the hours of nine in the morning and four in the afternoon, in the library, it has been announced by Principal Ralph Havenhill.

Wednesday, August 31, is the date for the official opening of the school, Mr. Havenhill stated. The following Monday, September 5, being Labor Day, will be observed as a holiday. -The Big Lake Wildcat.

Commencement of initial operations looking to the construction of the natural gas transmission line from the gas field south of town to the city limits is expected to get underway sometime next week, according to information received here Monday afternoon.

The first connection to be made will be on the school campus where natural gas heating equipment is in the process of being installed now.

Construction of the distribution system will begin immediately after the transmission line is laid and the school building connected. -Junction Eagle.

A full week of worship services and religious educational activities will get underway at Skillman Grove north of Marfa Tuesday evening, August 16, when the sixty-sixth annual session of the Boys Camp Meeting association starts. Some 1,000 visitors are expected there for the opening night, with the attendance growing as the weekend approaches. The camp meeting will continue through Tuesday morning, August 23.

The four protestant churches cooperating in the religious event are the Methodist, Presbyterian, Christian and Baptist, with well known Texas ministers from each of the churches alternately speaking throughout the meeting.

Five services will be held each day, starting Wednesday. The first, a rather informal service is scheduled for 8 a.m., and will be followed by preachings at 11 a.m., 5 p.m., and 8 p.m. The five o'clock services will be more in form of prayer meetings, with the women gathering at the big tabernacle and the men under the Prayer tree. At the same time Mrs. C.M. Kahn will meet with the children at Miss Bloys' tabernacle.

As has been the custom throughout the years, feeding camps will provide food for the hundreds of visitors who are welcome at any of the six camps which are operated by one or

more of the old-time ranch families. As in other years those camps will be the Means-Evans; Brite; Mitchell-Medley; Merrill; Jones-Finley-Espy, and the Hal Burnett. No charge is made for food at any camp, nor are collections taken at the meetings. Cost of operations are met by any contributions visitors care to make to the association. -Big Bend Sentinel.

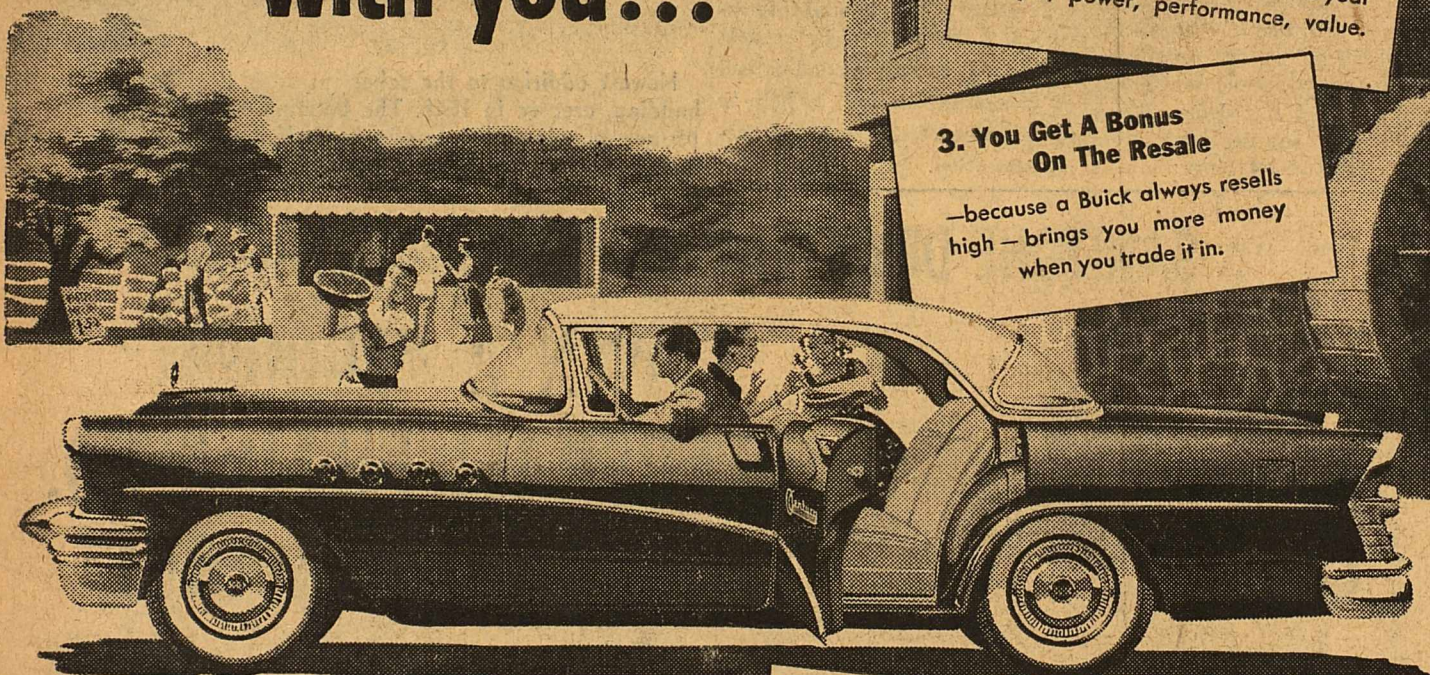

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION**

**Q - -** I understand that if I apply for disability compensation within a year from my discharge and am found eligible, the payments can be made retroactive to the date following my discharge. What happens if that one-year deadline falls on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday?

**A - -** If it falls on Saturday, Sunday or a holiday, your one-year deadline will be extended to cover the next regular working day.

**Q - -** I am going to school under the Korean GI Bill. Would I also be entitled to a GI loan to buy a house?

**A - -** You would be entitled to a GI loan, even though you are in school under the Korean GI Bill-provided your lender will make the loan. The law does not prohibit simultaneous use of both benefits.

**Q - -** If I enroll in a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill before my starting cut-off date, will I be permitted to switch to classroom training in the same field, after that date has passed?

**A - -** No. A correspondence course is considered a program of training within itself. A change from correspondence training to classroom training would be considered a change of program, regardless of the subject of the course. Changes of program generally are not permitted after a veteran's starting cut-off date has passed.

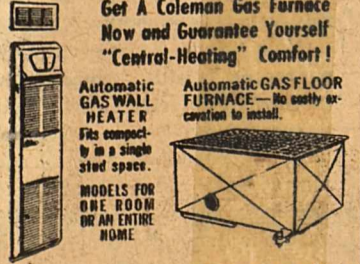

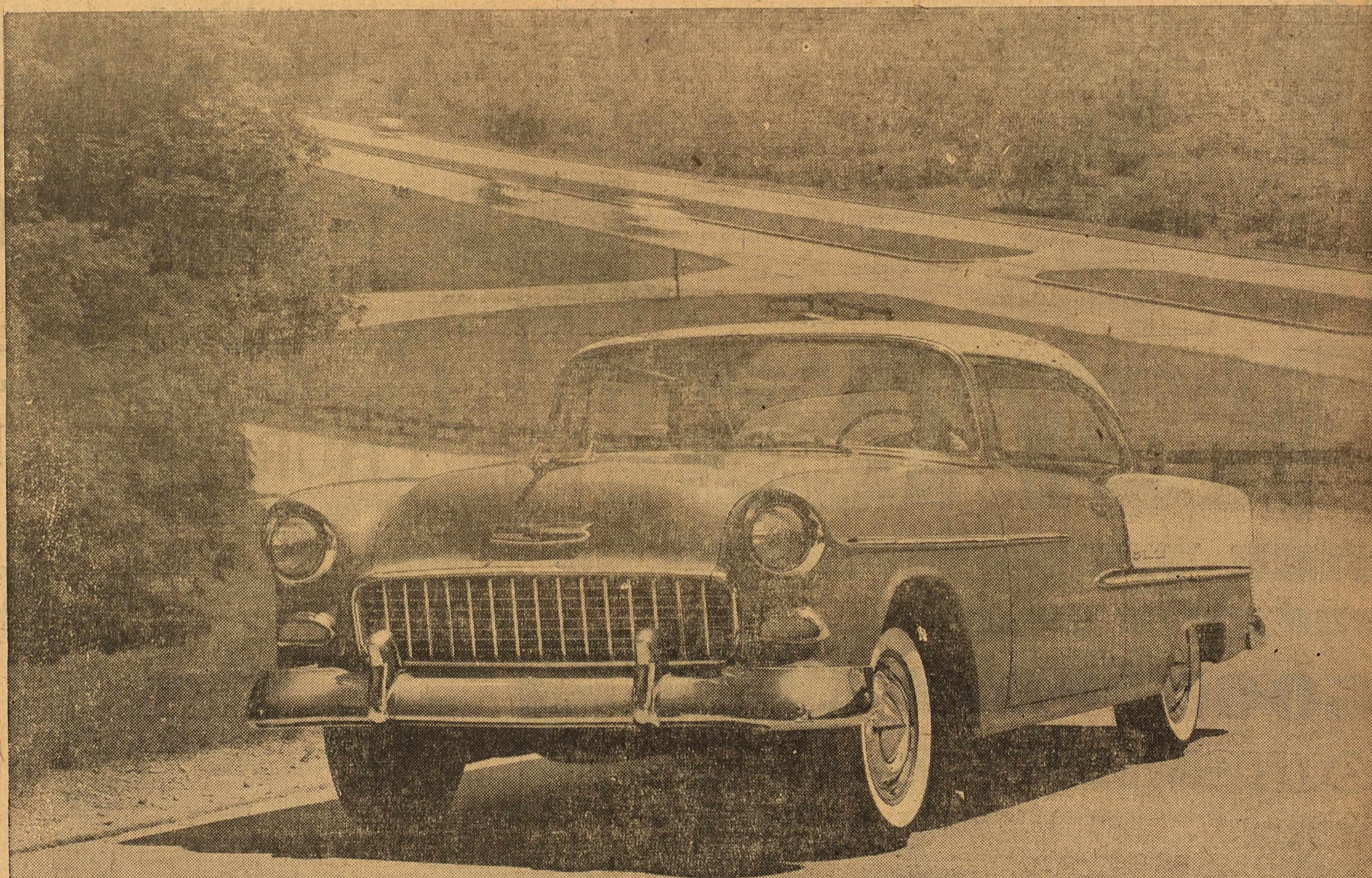

News of Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District

Some 1,600 acres of rangeland pitted in June and July is making rapid recovery following rains. This acreage is found on ranches owned by Ben Cusenbary, Mrs. Thomas Espy, Herbert Fields, Alvis Johnson and Rip Ward.

Range pits filled several times in July, and the live grass clumps are spreading rapidly. A tremendous growth of hairy caltrop is providing a rapid cover which will further aid the pits in storing moisture. Bare, valley soils not pitted have been unable to store enough water to make appreciable week or grass growth.

Mrs. Thomas Espy is pitting and seeding several old fields to grass. A mixture of sideots grama, KR bluestem, blue panic and buffelgrass is being seeded.

There are some 5,000 acres of old cultivated fields in the District which would produce excellent native grasses. Most of these fields have been bare several years and wind erosion has been active.

The Edwards plateau SCD trial area received 1.80 inches of rain last Friday. The grass plantings are making very rapid growth and most species are seeding. Native grasses on the 357 acres trial area are also making a rapid comeback.

### Stop On Red Go On Green

"Stop on the red, go on the green. Don't sneak through on the in-between."

Safety is sponsoring in cooperation with the National Safety Council this month applies to pedestrians as well as motorists.

"Too many walkers expect drivers to accept all the responsibility for traffic safety," he said. "They ignore the traffic signs and signals provided for their protection, and very often their carelessness costs them their lives."

McFadden said that last year alone 7,900 pedestrians were killed in traffic accidents. It is his belief that many of these persons might be alive today if they had heeded the Signs of Life.

According to McFadden, some of the unsafe practices indulged in by these unfortunate walkers were: crossing against the signal at intersections, crossing intersections diagonally, and crossing between intersections.

"Such careless actions invite disaster," he said, "and our pedestrian death toll will remain high as long as walkers have so little regard for their own safety."

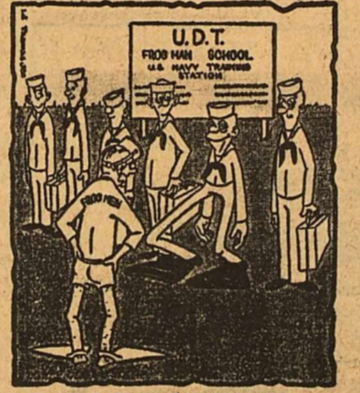

### Fish Antics To Be Sifted

The seasonal mid-summer lag in fishing has prompted Texas anglers to look around for possible causes, including increased motor boat traffic, according to the Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission. Some disgruntled fishermen have requested use of the Commission's projected skin diving crew to see what can be done

about the situation. The Chief Aquatic Biologist replied that the new facility is not ready for service and suggested that there is nothing wrong with fresh water fishing that a few cool nights, soon due, cannot correct. He wrote one fisherman, who thought motor boating should be banned from specially marked fishing areas, that some fish, notably white bass, have been caught practically in motor prop wash.

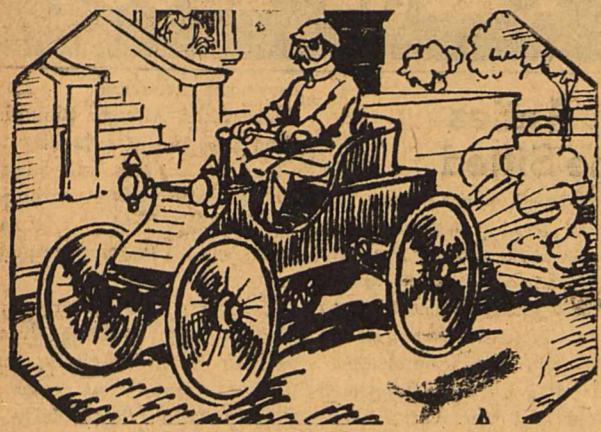

### LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Packers again showed little liking for the fat cows at Fort Worth Monday, but boning types of cattle were strong, including canner and cutter cows. Bulls held steady. Slaughter calves and stocker and feeder cattle and calves ruled steady.

Comparative prices: Medium to good slaughter steers and yearlings \$16 to \$20; choice quote to \$22 to \$23. Commoner kinds 10 to \$15. Fat cows -10.50 to \$12; canners and cutters -7 to \$10.50. Bulls \$10 to \$13.75; slaughter calves good and choice \$16 to \$19; common and medium \$12 to \$15; culls \$9 to \$11 stocker steer calves \$20.50 down; steer yearlings \$18.50 down; stocker cows \$8 to \$11.

Good and choice fat Springs lambs topped at \$18 to \$19.50 at Fort Worth Monday. Medium and lower grades sold around \$12 to \$17. Feeder lambs cashed at \$13 to \$15.50, strong to 50 cents higher. Old ewes sold for \$4 to \$5.50; old wethers drew \$7 to \$12. Fat yearlings cashed at 14 to \$16, lower grades \$8 to \$13. Old bucks sold around \$4 to \$4.50. Breeding ewes scarce and in very strong demand.

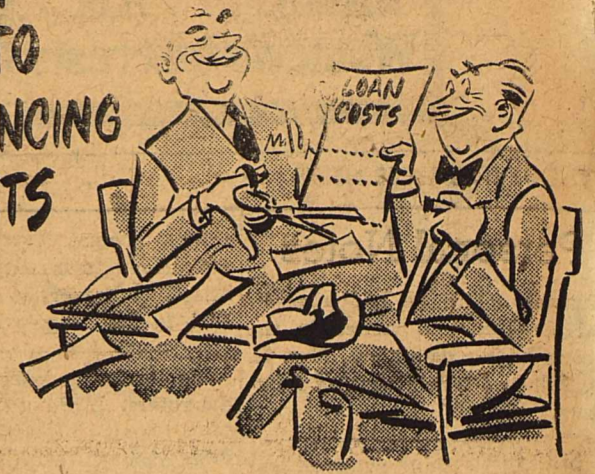

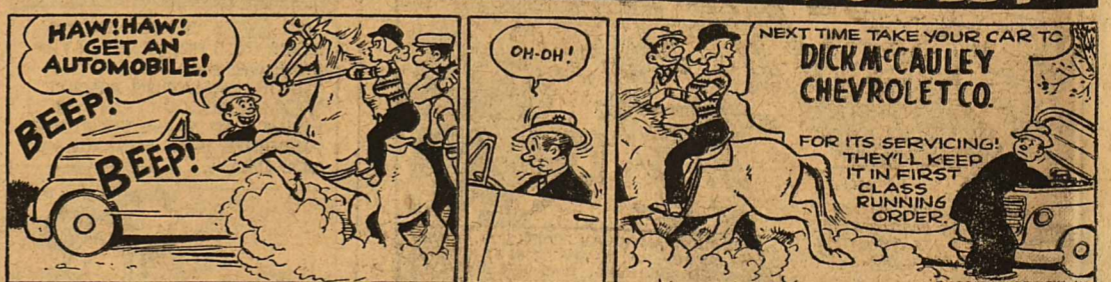
