"In the backfield are Bobby Allman of Albany (quarter), George Johnson of Sonora and Veon Scott (halves) and Pete Perry of Menard (full).

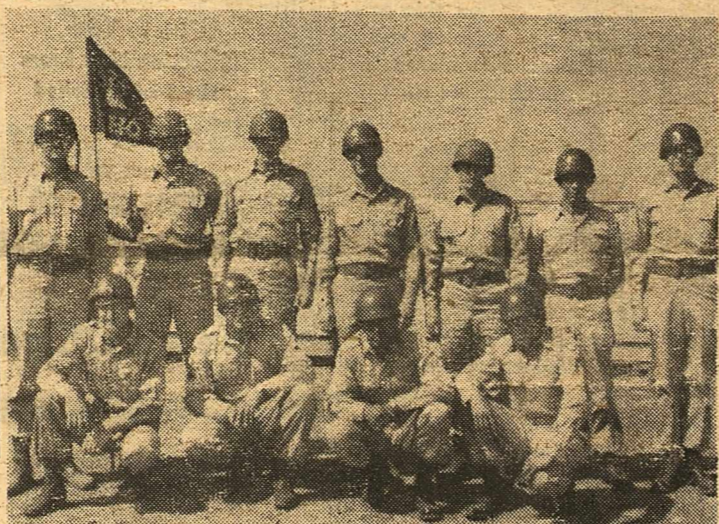
"Johnson, the 176-pound Sonora scouter, is the only junior of the bunch.

"But look what he's done! 'He's scored 163 points on 23 touchdowns, 19 conversions and two field goals and averaged 165 yards a game rushing.

"Guy Wheeler of Menard sums it up briefly by saying, 'He can do anything.' 'Iran's Royce Smith verifies this with: '... runs, catches, throws, kicks off-all well despite the fact that everybody is laying for him."

Johnson is the only junior on the all-state team, the other ten men being seniors.

Scopes, a Tennessee school teacher, was the central figure in the trial which brought forth the moral question of a teacher's right to explain to his students whatever a subject revealed, in this case the subject in question was the teaching of Darwin's evolutionary theories. In the original trial, William Jennings Bryan was prosecutor and Clarence Darrow defended Scopes.

Paul Muni originated the lead role on Broadway and was later replaced by Melvyn Douglas.

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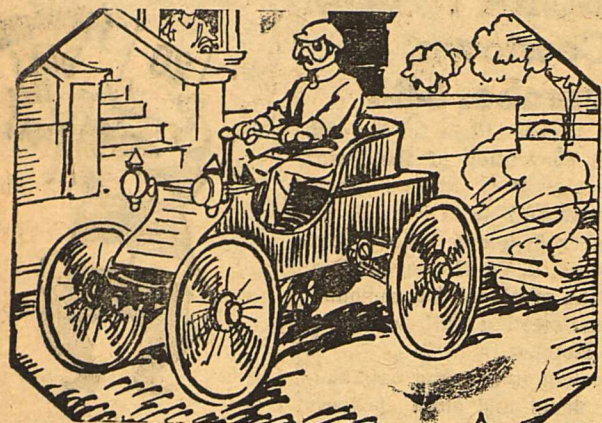

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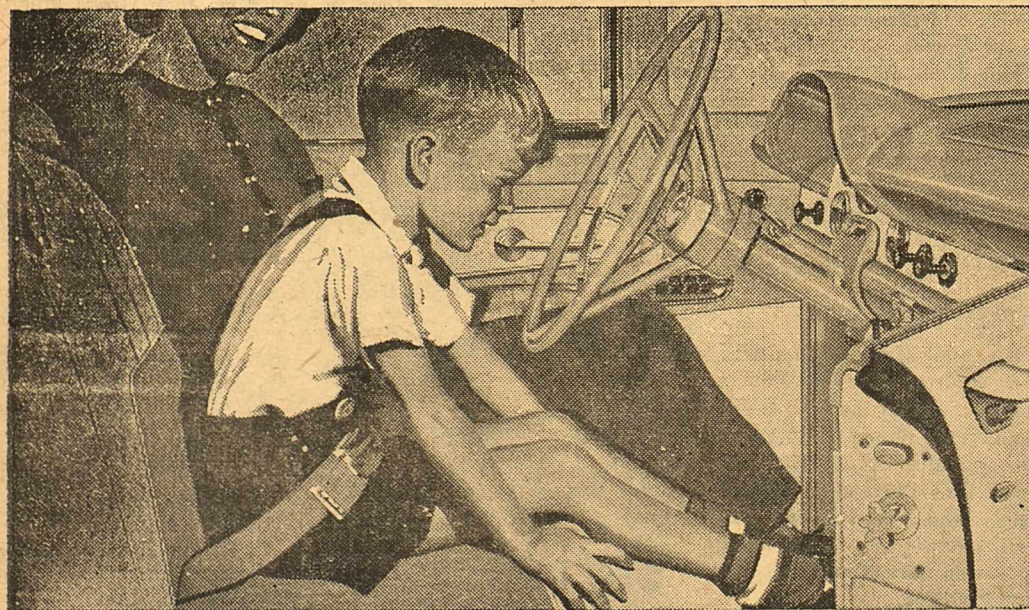

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### Looking Through The Windows Of Life

The great author, Carlyle, never realized, as long as his wife lived, how much he owed to her. His constitutional irritability made him intensely sensitive to petty annoyances. He suffered from dyspepsia; he was often sleepless, and tired. After the death of his wife, Carlyle, the penitent husband said of her: In her bright existence she had more sorrows than are common but

also a soft invincibility, a capacity for discernment, and a noble quality of heart which are rare." He writer goes on to say of Mrs. Carlyle, "She forwarded her husband."

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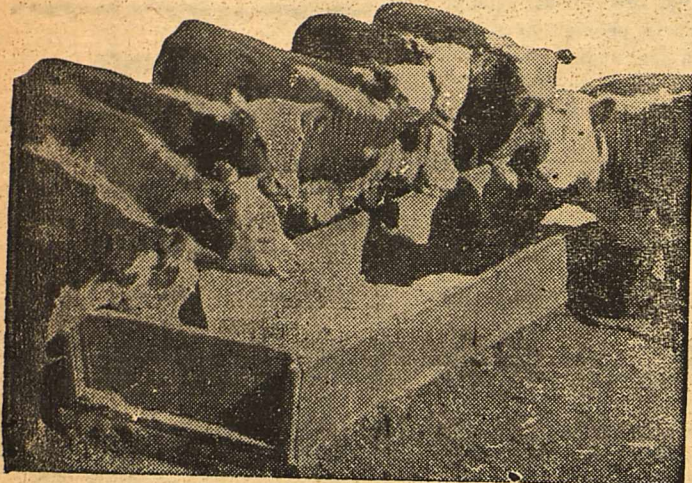

Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District News

By E. B. Keng Soil Conservation Service



The Edwards Plateau SCD Trial Area, located three miles southeast of town on the Herbert Fields ranch, have been stocked with a combination of cattle, sheep and goats since October 15. The stocking rate is 27 animals units or 100 lambs, 100 kids, 3 yearling steers, and 3 calves on the 367-acre plot. All of the livestock are to be removed in April 1956, after six months of grazing. Figured on a yearlong basis this stocking rate is equivalent to 27 acres per animal unit or 24 animals units per section on a fair condition range.

Grasses seeded in April of this year on pitted areas as well as native grasses, cured out well and are furnishing good feed for the livestock. All grasses both native and introduced are being grazed by the different classes of livestock. Many forbs such as orange zexmania, Indianmallow, kidneywood, and bushsunflower are also being grazed readily.

Some late seedlings were damaged by frost, buffelgrass seedlings being the hardest hit. As a whole, however, late seedling losses have been small.

The rain which fell Wednesday, and at 2 o'clock that afternoon measured .14, did not come too early for small grass seedlings which were seeded late in the summer. Since October was a dry month and the only moisture earlier in November was the light snow which amounted to .17 of an inch, small seedlings were in need of moisture. In addition to giving the seedlings needed moisture the rain will help to "tie down" the short rooted seedlings, which were very loose in the ground due to loose dry soil and winds.

An important meeting of ranchers and professional people interested in range will be held in Sonora, December 16 and 17. The Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management will hold its annual meeting in this area.

The Society is composed of range personnel, ranchmen, and others interested in range management. All ranchmen in West Texas are invited to attend.

Friday afternoon, from 1:00 to

3:00 P.M. the group will register at the Sonora Courthouse, and have a "get acquainted" visit. From 3:00 to 5:00 P.M. a tour of the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District trial area will be made. At 6:30 P.M. a banquet will be held, with Rev. Al Brown the principal speaker. Slides of outstanding range conservation work will also be shown.

On Saturday morning the group will study conservation work on the Ed Willoughby ranch, 15 miles North of Sonora. This ranch has been through the severe drought, common to this area, and the observation of recovery made this year with some 13 inches of rainfall will be very worthwhile.

Roger Landers, Menard ranchman, is the present Chairman of the Texas Section, and Leo Merrill, vice-chairman. Newly elected officers will be announced at the banquet on December 16.

We hope we will have a good attendance of ranchmen from this area.

Business firms throughout the Nation are being asked to encourage young men to participate in the Army Reserve units of their community, Capt. Joe R. Andrews, commanding officer of

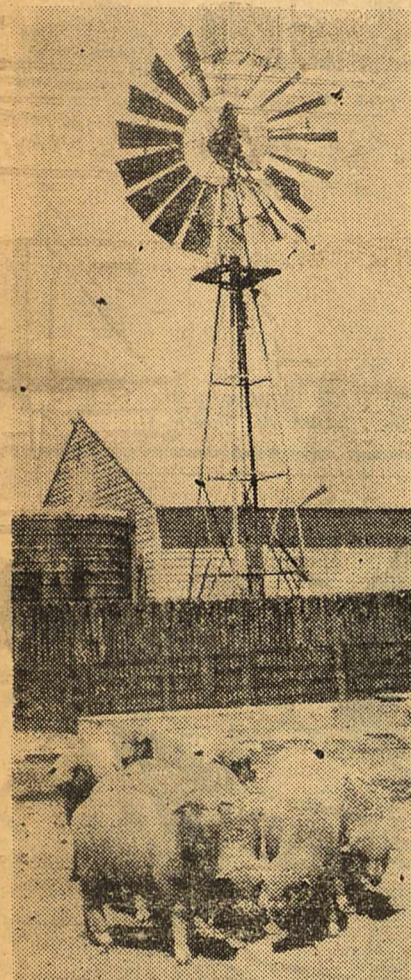
Co. B. 830th Engr. Avn. Bn., local Reserve unit, said today. The Reserve Forces Act of 1955 will give the nation the greatest amount of security possible without the heavy tax expenses that would be necessary with a huge standing Army,

Capt. Andrews said. He urged local businessmen to give the new Reserve Forces Act their fullest support, particularly from an employee relations standpoint. "Each employer has a strong moral obligation in this program, and I hope that no employer in

Sonora will penalize an employee or prospective employee because he happens to be a member of the Ready Reserve," Capt. Andrews said. Increasingly large numbers of able-bodied young men now acquiring a Reserve obligation and are required by Federal law to take Reserve training, he pointed out. 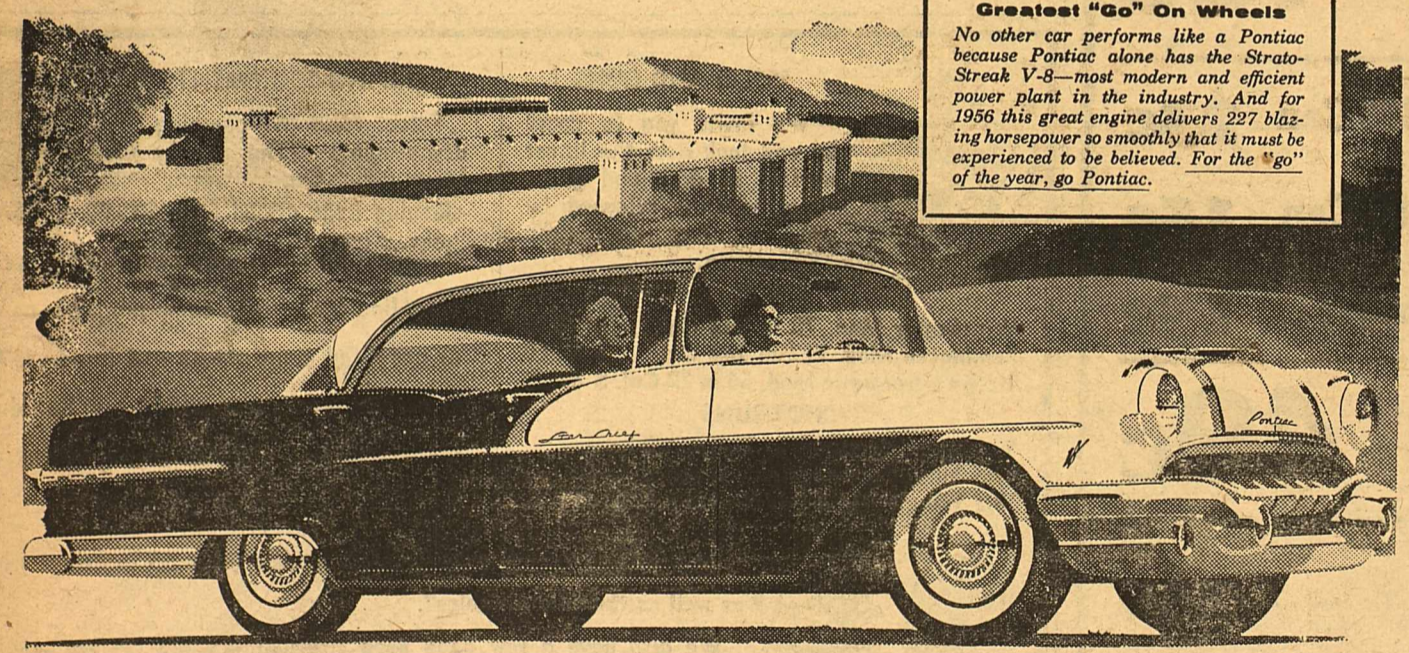

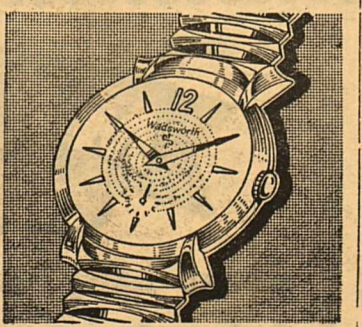


