

Manager of City Utilities R. M. McCarver again urges all dog owners to comply with city ordinances requiring all dogs to be vaccinated and tagged, thus enabling city employees to distinguish between pets and strays, vaccinated, and unvaccinated dogs.

McCarver recounted an experience of last week when he saw three children playing in a yard with seven dogs. Only one of the dogs was tagged!

The possibility of any one of these dogs having been bitten by a rabid animal is much greater than is generally rea-



He wants to be helped, at the same time he helps. "He wants his people to feel

that the ministry is an all-inclusive experience, shared by people and pastor." As one preacher says: "If laymen are sometimes dissatisfied with the quality of ministry they are receiving, they might try ex-

pressing gratitude for their minister's efforts, inadequate as they so often are; recognizing some small contribution he is making in his preaching and pastoral work; showing him the affection which sheep show to the shepherd who leads to the brook from which they may drink life-giving water. Unfortunately, there are many who have never learned to say 'Thank you,' or 'You did a grand job.' -The Christian Adocate.
