ECWPA Votes One Gobbler Limit - '56



More than 40 law enformement officers from Sonora and surrounding area Tuesday afternoon concluded a manhunt which began early Monday night and saw some 16 hours of intensive search which reached a climax shortly after one o'clock Tuesday afternoon when Nick Bermea, driver of a gasoline truck, reported seeing the men near the John Cauthorn-Martin ranch.



sidered the best months to plant grass seed, so ranchmen planning to seed grasses should make plans to start as soon as possible. G. T. Rode is planning to rootplow 30 acres of mesquite for Billy Galbreath This acreage will be seeded by hand. Edwin Sawyer has completed pitting on 30 acres and will seed it this week.

The beautiful "petaya" or strawberry cactus is approaching full bloom in most of the District. This cactus, resembling very closely a number of bananas arranged in a compact circle with the concave surface pointing upward, has a mass of beautiful red flowers. Camera enthusiasts can make some beautiful color photographs from this plant.

All cactus plants, of which there are many kinds and varities, are historically associated with deserts. They have a widespread, shallow, fleshy root system which can quickly drink up and store large quantites of water from small showers. During long droughts the roots gradually shrink up as the stored water is used by the plants.

Cactus is especially adapted to desert conditions because the plants have either no leaves or very small leaves that quickly droup off when dry weather comes. The enlarged stems are green and serve the purpose of leaves, but loss of water through transpiration from the leaves is greatly reduced. The brilliant flower colors common to all cacti is a special adaptation of Nature to enable insects to find and help pollinate the plants in the wide open desert areas.

Generally speaking the better the grass the less cacti, particularly pickly pear. The young pear seedlings must start from a very tiny seed, and cannot come up and thrive among good grass. Observations also indicate that mature pear plants will usually die if good grass is developed to compete with them. The competition of grass probably involves at least three principles: (1) Grass enables the soil to store more moisture than the desertloving cacti can stand (2) Insects which prey on pear are furnished protection from their enemies. (3) The excellent root system of grass furnishes direct competition for nutrients, water, and soil
