

# Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On At An Election To Be Held On November 6, 1956

at which election all ballots shall have be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes, provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes: namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes to long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, long the foregoing tax levies does not exceed the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect duries that taxable year; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected





Q-Has Congress done anything yet with health insurance? A-Nothing to speak of. The Administration bill which would provide a

Government fund for reinsuring private insurance companies against the year amounting to \$3,724.00. loss, intended to encourage extended health coverage, is still pending. The Health, Education and Welfare Department recently sent a bill to congress which would permit smaller health insurance companies and non-profit associations such as Blue Shield and Blue Cross to pool their resources in an attempt to develop improved coverage, but no action has been taken. This pooling of resources would have to by-pass the anti-trust laws.

Q-If a veteran dies without selecting any option of payment, how will GI insurance be paid to the beneficiary? -It will be paid in 36 equal monthly installments. However the beneficiary has a right to choose some other method, so long as it is not

a lump sum payment. Q-Can you tell me how many volunteers are engaged in the skywatch for the Ground Observer Corps?

A-At present there are approximately 400,000. There are about 1,000,000 more trained for duty if needed. Q-How many government employees are affected by the new Civil

-About 30,000, plus new recruitments of about 4,700. Increase will mean about \$12 million a year in salary increases. These increases apply only to engineers, physical scientists and other types of specialists, such as chemists, meterologists, metallurgists, actuaries, and some patent specialists. Efficiency of Sonora's fire department and it material value to citizens were pointed up recently in a report from the Fire Insurance Division of the Board of Insurance Commissioners in Austin in which fire losses for the five-year period 1951-1955 were listed as \$19,285.00, as compared with a total premium payment of \$107,899.00, for a fiveyear loss ratio of .178 giving the eity fire record credit of 25%.

During 1951 a total of \$18,210.00 was paid out in premiums with total fire losses for For 1952 the records show total premiums of \$18,537.00 and losses of \$2,688.00.

In 1953 losses were \$3,636.00 as compared to \$29,070.00 in preniums. For 1954, largest year for fires, losses amounted to \$6,745.00 with \$20,810.00 in preniums. Last year showed only \$2,492.00 in fire losses with \$21,272.00 in premiums.


