

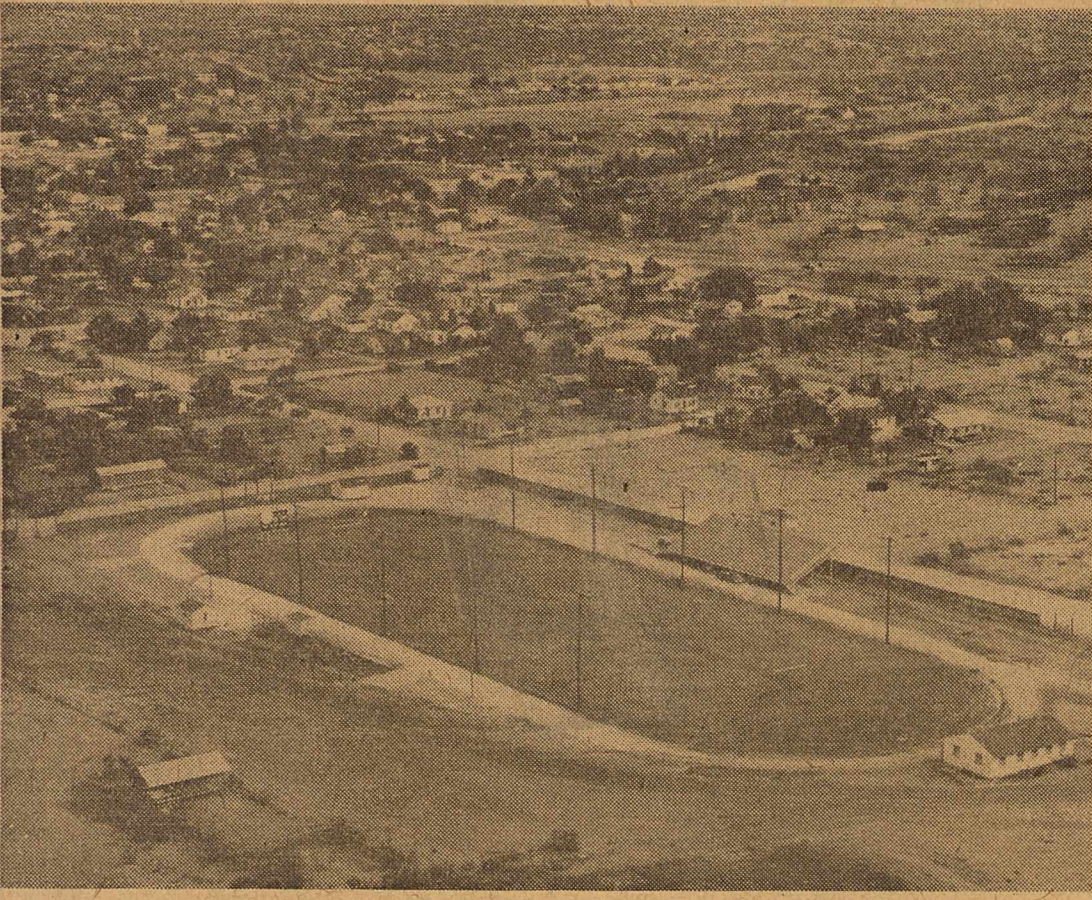

Sonora Firemen Relieve Ozonans Of \$70 In Prizes

Sonora firemen returned from a meeting of the Hill Country Firemen's Association, held Tuesday at Ozona, \$70 richer, according to Lee Patrick, Sonora Fire Chief and President of H.C.F.A. Sonorans Must Raise \$5,000 To Assure Early Consideration

Substantial progress was made this week on plans to raise \$15,000 to pay the cost of developing a flood prevention work plan on Lowrey Draw. Lowrey Draw the 96th application in the state for this type of work, and the \$15,000 contribution is a necessary evidence of local interest in securing early work on the project.

Public Urged To Contribute

Flood protection on Lowrey Draw is of vital importance to every Sutton County citizen, either directly or indirectly. In event of a major flood, as Ozona had, many homes and businesses on both sides of Lowrey Draw would be inundated, and property losses would amount to several hundred thousand dollars. The tremendous amount of dead brush on the watershed would be expected to clog the bridges, causing part of the water to cut through an old slough south of the railroad tracks and under the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company.

Season Tickets Go On Sale Tuesday

Seasons tickets will be offered for sale beginning 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon August 21 at The First National Bank, according to E. A. Brodhead, superintendent of schools.

Bronco supporters who held season tickets in the reserved section last year will be given opportunity to retain their same seats again this year. Price will be \$6.25 each.

Home games covered by season tickets are as follows; September 7 Bandera, September 21, Iraan, September 28 McCamey, October 19 Ozona, and November 16 Eldorado.

A complete Bronco schedule appears elsewhere in this issue.

Project Estimated at \$420,000.

The field examination showed that the four structures planned on Lowrey Draw would cost approximately \$389,000 construction cost, and an additional \$30,000 would be needed to widen Lowrey Draw through Sonora. Under the newly passed amendment to Public Law 566 the Federal Government would bear the total cost of construction, if the project is finally approved.

The \$15,000 contribution by Sutton County people would be a very small token of interest in the development of a project which would mean so much in terms of lives saved and property protection. Businessmen and others would profit from \$400,000 local construction money, and the four small lakes might provide excellent recreational facilities. Arrangements, however, would have to be worked out with landowners to make the lakes available for public use.

Football Practice To Open With Interteam Scrimmage Monday

"The boys had better be in good shape because we are going to open practice with an interteam scrimmage the first day", says Joe Turner, head coach for the Sonora Broncos. Practice is scheduled to begin Monday August 27, and is divided into three periods per day with scrimmage during each period.

On Saturday September 1, at 2:30 p.m. less than a week after practice begins, the Broncos will scrimmage against Fort Stockton here in their own stadium, and on September 7, 8 p.m. the Broncos will play their first game of the season against Bandera. This game will be played in Sonora.

Bandera produced a championship team last year, and goes into the 56' season minus only one first string man.

Junior High practice will not begin until the second week of school.

ODDS & ENDS

With all the talk about farm problems flying thick and fast now that political convention time is on us again, we'd like to formulate our own farm program and it's one we don't doubt would rake in every vote in West Texas for which ever political party advocated it, since anyone who failed to agree with it would obviously belong somewhere else.

Here with all its impossibilities is our Farm Program:

The Federal Government, through its Department of Agriculture, would guarantee each landholder in West Texas an average annual rainfall of 30.0 inches, to be distributed every two weeks on alternate Wednesdays. Rainfall would not exceed four inches on any one Wednesday and minimum rainfall would not be less than a half-inch. This is to be portioned out to all ranchers equally over the four-year period to be covered by this bill but may be issued in varying amounts at one time, enlivening conversation on the party line considerably.

Further, the Federal Government and the USDA would guarantee each rancher a calf and lamb crop free from clabberbelly, bluetongue, scrapie, scabies, pink-eye. The USDA would undertake a practice of seeding clouds with dry ice or silver iodide crystals impregnated with DDT and 2-4-D, thus eliminating the necessity of spraying stock, drenching sheep, burning pear and spraying bit-terweed.

As for the rancher's wife, she gets baby chicks that are not prey to any diseases, cannibalism, or the usual lack of desire to live. Her orphan kids and lambs are provided with automatic self-feeders, her garden is weedfree, the milch cows won't eat weeds to make the butter taste, and her house gets a fresh coat of paint every two years.

Broncos, Parents Insurance Meet Called For Sunday

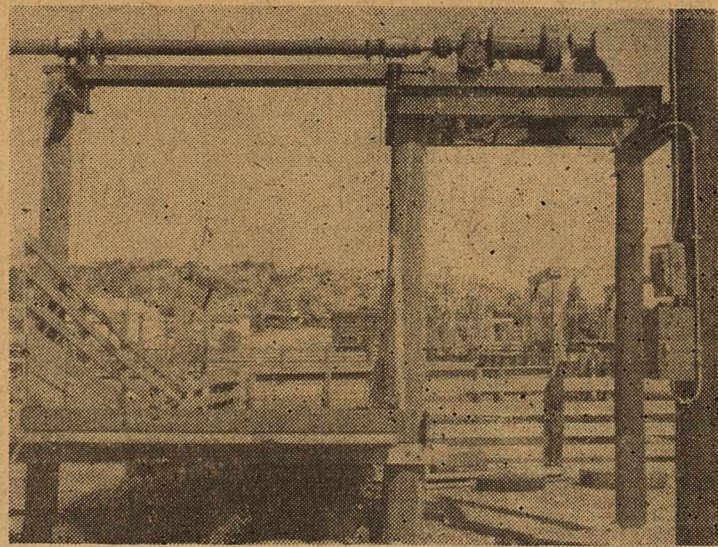

Junction Billy Sale Called "Best Livestock Sale This Year"

Perhaps the revival of the old West Texas custom of free barbecue helped to stimulate buyers into paying an average price of \$130.76 per head at Junctions Annual Hill Country Race Meet and Billy sale last Friday.

The \$130 average paid for 104 billies set a record for the event.

The top 15 billies averaged \$351, with the highest price of \$800 being paid when Mrs. Annie Krause of Fredericksburg was successful bidder for the grand champion billy consigned by Will Allison of Roosevelt.

Other buyers were: R. A. Cotter of Junction who took 13 billies for \$3,280, F. J. Whittenbury and Son of Rocksprings bought 8 for \$700, Henry Speck of Menard took 2 for \$700 Bryan and Nancy Hunt of Sonora were active buyers at the sale.

New Hay, Grain Program Announced As 'Betsy' Moves Toward Gulf



Local Office Says "No Instructions As Yet"

A drought relief conference between state officials and top Washington agriculture leaders culminated with the announcement of a new proposed hay and grain program, last Friday. Governor Allan Shivers made the announcement after the all day session with Undersecretary of Agriculture Kenneth Scott. Final approval necessarily rests with Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

Almost simultaneously came a report from the U.S. Weather Bureau announcing "Betsy", The seasons first hurricane. "Betsy" is significant because of her unreasonable earliness, giving drought stricken ranchmen hope for early fall rains.

The new feed program provides for an increase of from \$1 to \$1.50 per hundred pounds, to eligible ranchers and farmers, for purchasing surplus grains, and for \$7.50 a ton subsidy for hay and roughage.

Local ASC office manager Mrs. Marie Ellis has received no instructions for the new drought feed program, and states that in her opinion, final approval for the new program must come from Washington.

Texas received \$2,492,826 during July for feed purchase orders for buying commodity grains. However only 78 counties were included as disaster areas as compared to 160 counties listed at present.

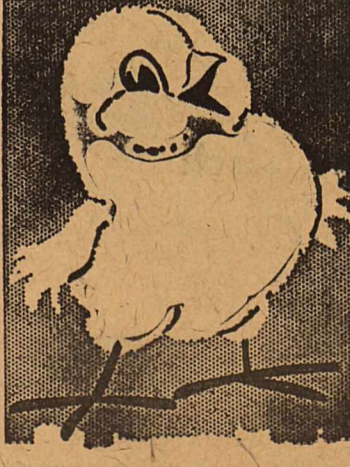

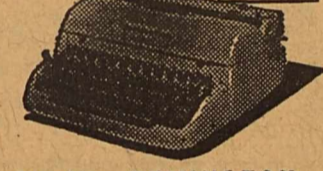

Incidentally, the water company got a flood of payments on overdue bills that day. Lots of "forgetful" folks must have figured they were being warned!

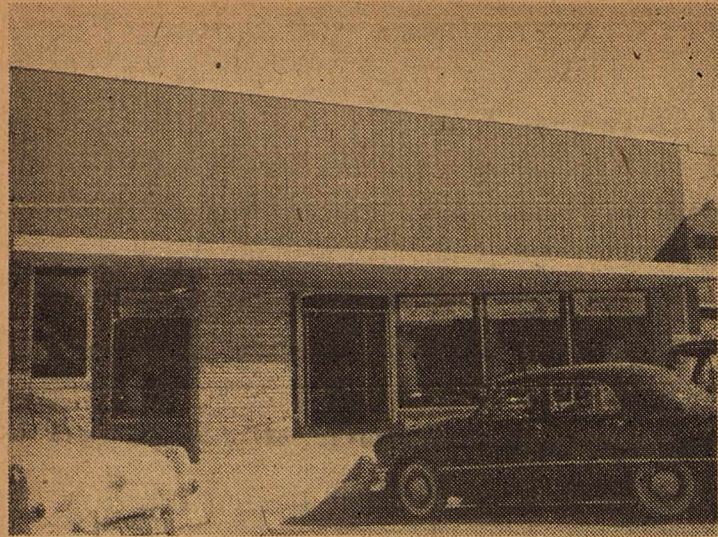

God gives us many gifts, but the gift of gaiety is one of the best gifts. A patient in a hospital who was fighting for her very life said to her pastor one day: "There are so many little religious things they say and do here. These bits of religion help a whole lot."

Prayer, beauty, hope, and love are helpful bits of religion. What about good humor—the flash of merriment that clears the air and makes the whole world kin? I think it too belongs in the manifold grace of God.

There are three ways in which the sense of merriment can take among the bits of religion that come from God.

(1) A Sense of humor is the best weapon we have in the fight to keep ourselves sane. It re-

stores balance; it brings the heart about on an even keel.

(2) A sense of humor if given us of God to demolish the pompous nonsense to which mankind is prone.

We are living in a day when it is not easy to bring our thoughts into conformity with reality. Nothing so helps us to that end as the man with a sense of humor.

Humor belongs to the people who are helpful; little people strike at the smiling heart; they race for the cesspool of slander.

(3) God grant us the gift of merriment to be a coat of mail or defensive armor around the sensitive heart.

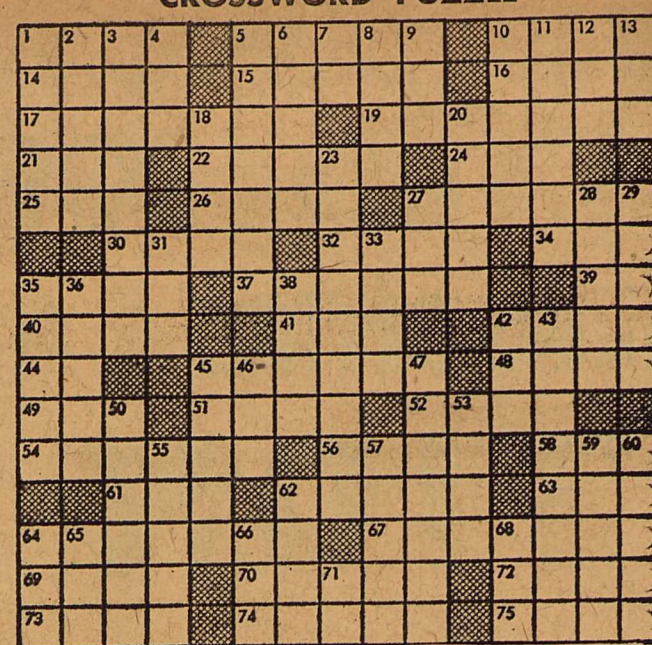

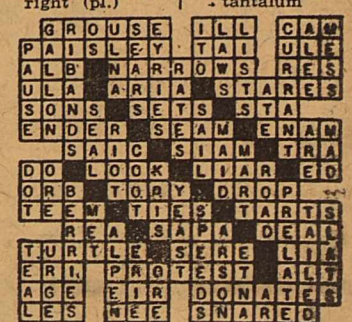



Ninth Annual Progeny To Get Under Way September 4

The first official weights will be taken September 12, giving the animals at least one week to become adjusted.

The ninth annual Ram Progeny and Performance test at the Sonora Experiment Station will begin September 4 or 5, according to information received from Maurice Shelton, assistant animal husbandman at the station.

Animals may be delivered to the station between the dates of August 25 and September 4. The animals will be sheared on September 4 or 5 and placed in pens

taken September 12, giving the animals at least one week to become adjusted.

Any breeder, irrespective of breed affiliation, who is attempting to carry out a constructive sheep breeding program may enter one or more sire groups. A sire group will consist of four animals sired by the same sire.

Breeders are expected to pay for the feed and shearing costs. The sheep, along with the wool they produce, remain the property of the breeder. A \$30.00 deposit on feed cost should accompany each animal entered. The breeder is also expected to furnish the station with the name or number of the sire, the approximate age of animal entered and the number of the dam.

Purpose of this work is to facilitate and encourage more rapid improvement of the existing sheep population through the collection and use of accurate records of performance.

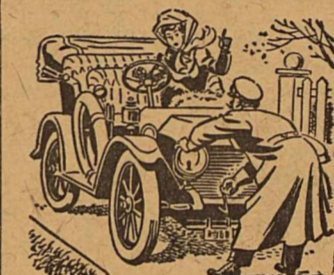

Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District News

Flood retarding structures constructed under Public Law 566 are frequently referred to as "small" dams. "The may properly be called 'small' only in comparison to such huge dams as the San Angelo dam", E. B. Keng, SCS technician pointed out.

In order to get a better idea as to the actual size of these structures, the seven dams planned above Ozona might be taken as a sample. These dams will vary in height from 39 to 56 feet at the highest place. The drainage areas above individual dams range from 1,757 acre feet to 4,850 acre feet when dams are filled to spillway level.

The detention pools (when lakes are full) will temporarily cover from 170 to 520 acres of land. The sediment pools will cover from 20 to 50 acres of land

above each structure. The sediment pools will hold from 66 to 187 acre feet of water (provided the soil will hold it), which may be used by landowner for fishing and other recreation.

When we recognize that an acre foot of water is water one foot deep over an acre of land it becomes apparent that these dams are not especially "small". The size of the drainage area, of course, determines the size of each dam. The seven structures above Ozona will temporarily store 25,062 acre feet of water, which is equivalent to water one foot deep over 26,062 acres.

The sediment pool is the area in the bottom of the lake which is not automatically drained. The detention pool is the water holding area above each dam, which is allowed to drain slowly through a large pipe after the flood. Ordinarily, from 7-21 days are required to drain a lake following

a flood, depending upon the size of the lake and the amount of water stored above the drawdown tube.

The field examination of Lowrey Draw showed that four water retarding structures could be built. The dam on Murphy Draw near the hospital would be small; the dam on a side draw near the Texas-New Mexico pumping station would be medium in size; and the other two would be large. The capacity of any single structure built under Public Law 566 is limited by law to 5,000 acre feet of storage capacity for flood prevention. They may be built larger if a city water supply is involved.

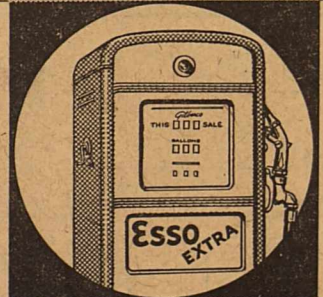

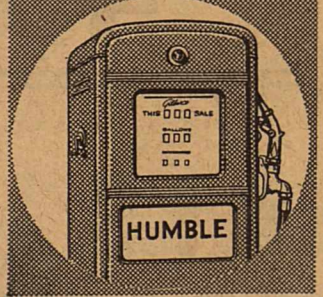
