## TS&GRA Adopts New Plan For Redistricting

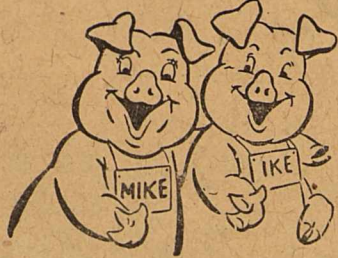
Meeting Saturday in Big Lake, directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association approved the districting plan outlined by Edwin S. Mayer of Sonora, head of the special committee which has completed the plan after a year's study. The plan calls for the state to be divided into 10 districts set up for the purpose of electing a board of directors under revised constitution and by-laws.

Association members of the various districts will caucus at the convention in San Angelo early in December to submit their director nominations to the convention for confirmation.

President J. B. McCord appointed a committee to consider nominees for second vice-president. Named to the committee were Henry Horn, Del Rio, chairman; T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Ozona; Virgil Powell, San Angelo; W. T. Stewardson, Santa Anna and S. L. Stumberg, Sanderson.

Announcement was made by McCord of the completion of a new agreement with Hiram Phillips, publisher of the organization magazine.

Mrs. Marie K. Ellis, local ASC office manager, says that applications received Monday will be processed the following day and no further applications for the period may be accepted.

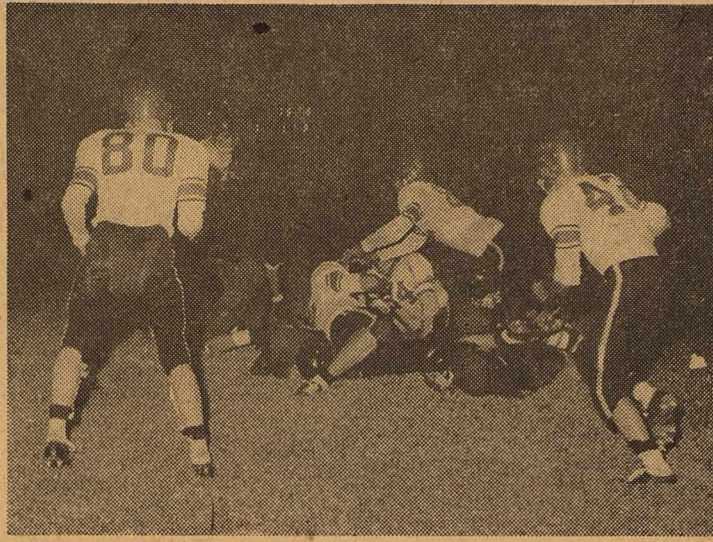

George Johnson, stellar Bronco back, plunges through right guard for another touchdown

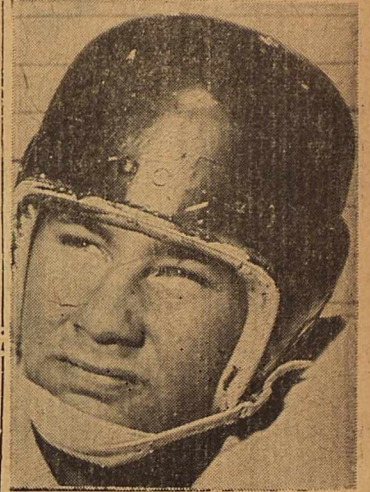
against the Iraan Braves. Good offensive blocking proved too much for the Braves' determination.

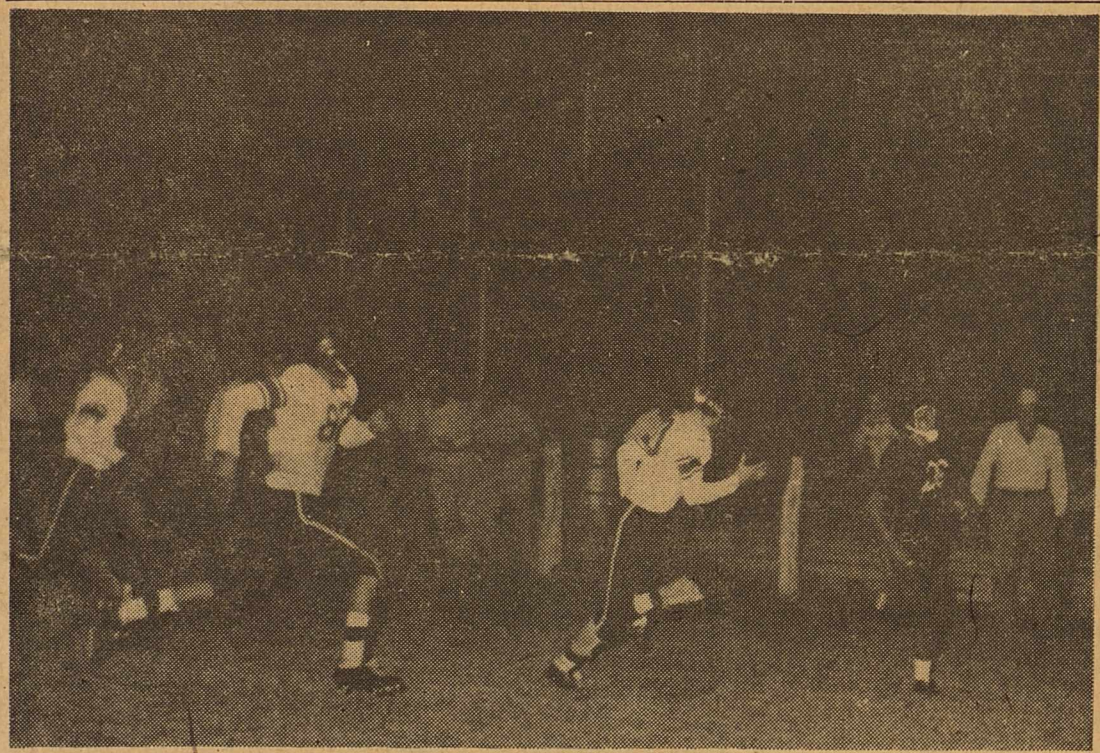
## Today Deadline For Private Transportation

## Hay, Roughage Approvals Being Temporarily Held Up Over State

The move came as the column of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage program exceeded the estimates of demand made when the program was negotiated. Temporary suspension has become necessary in order to make possible the reappraisal of actual cash requirements.

The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of \$1,000,000 of Federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs

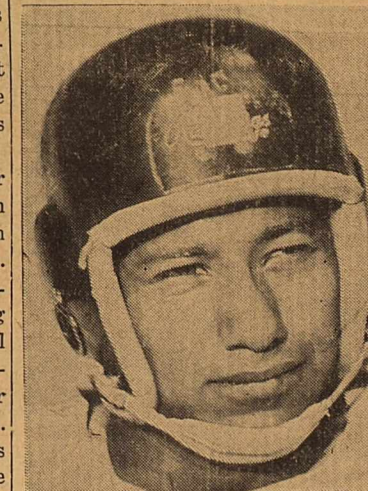


Preston Love, 165 pound end, back in the game after being laid out with an injured leg, played a bang-up defensive game Friday night.

Broncos about ten pounds to the man, averaging 167 pounds to the Bronco 157, and the McCamey backfield poses a real threat.

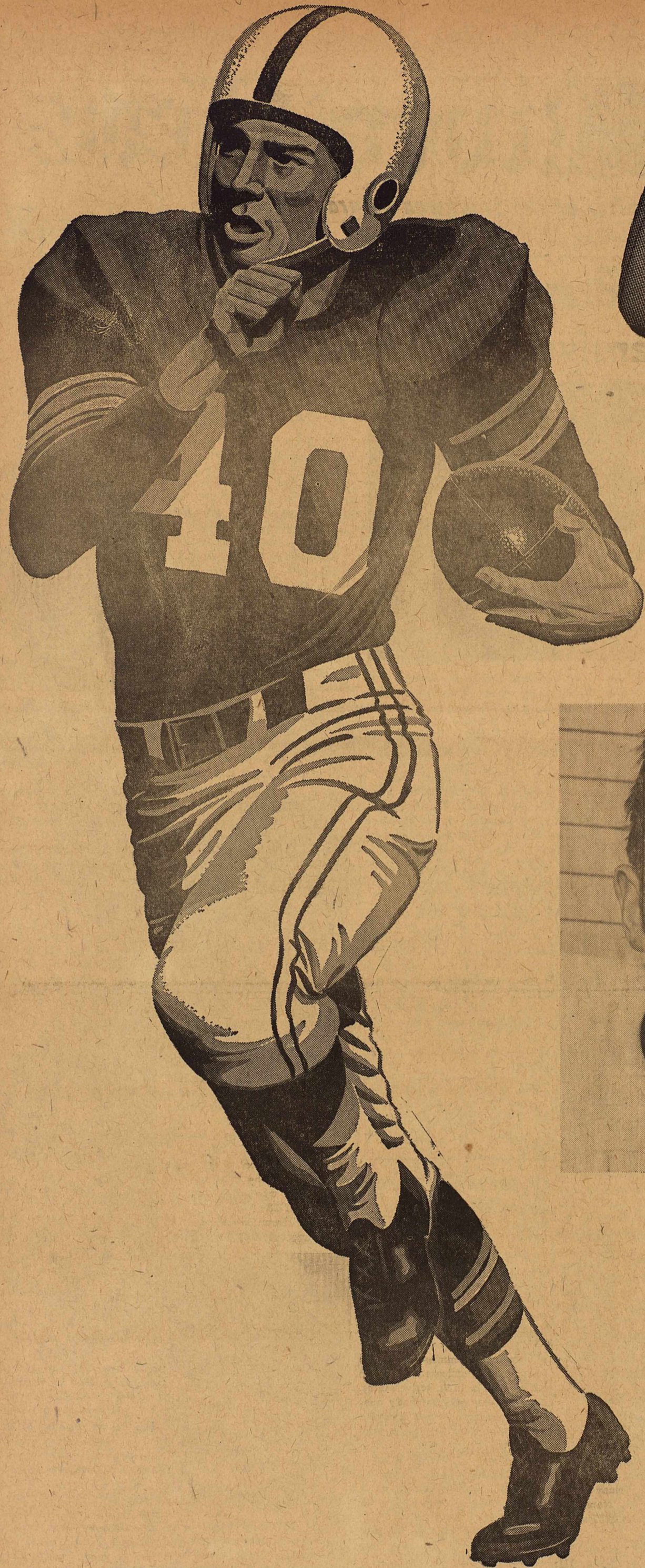
The Broncos are geared for the event, being determined to hand the Badgers their first setback of the 1956 season.

Center, Ellis, 190; Backs Nicholas, 145, Heard, 150, Huffman, 155, and Brown, 155.

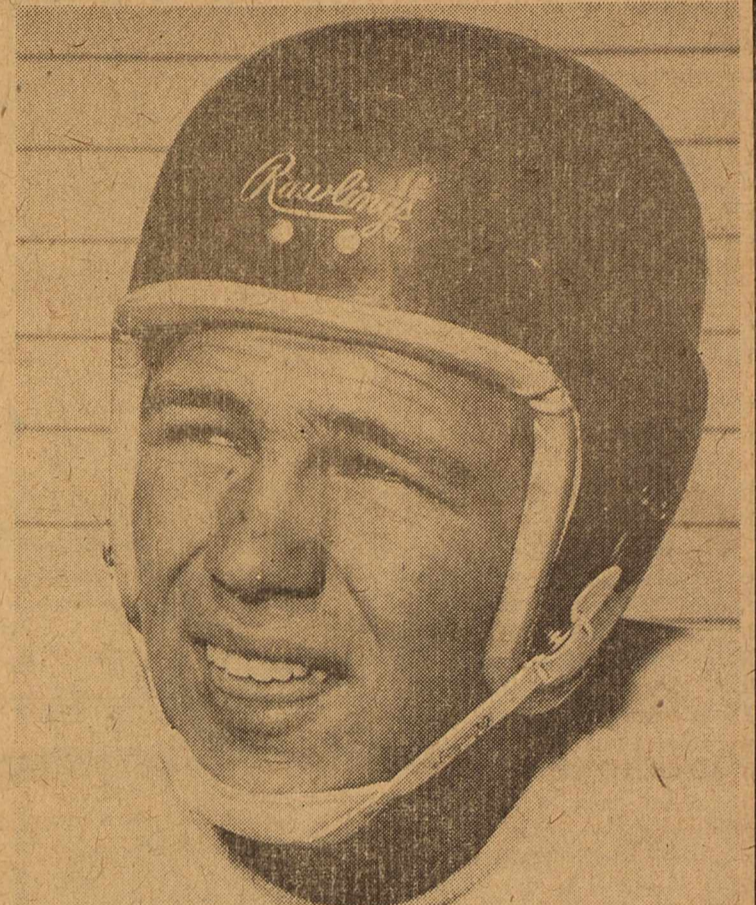

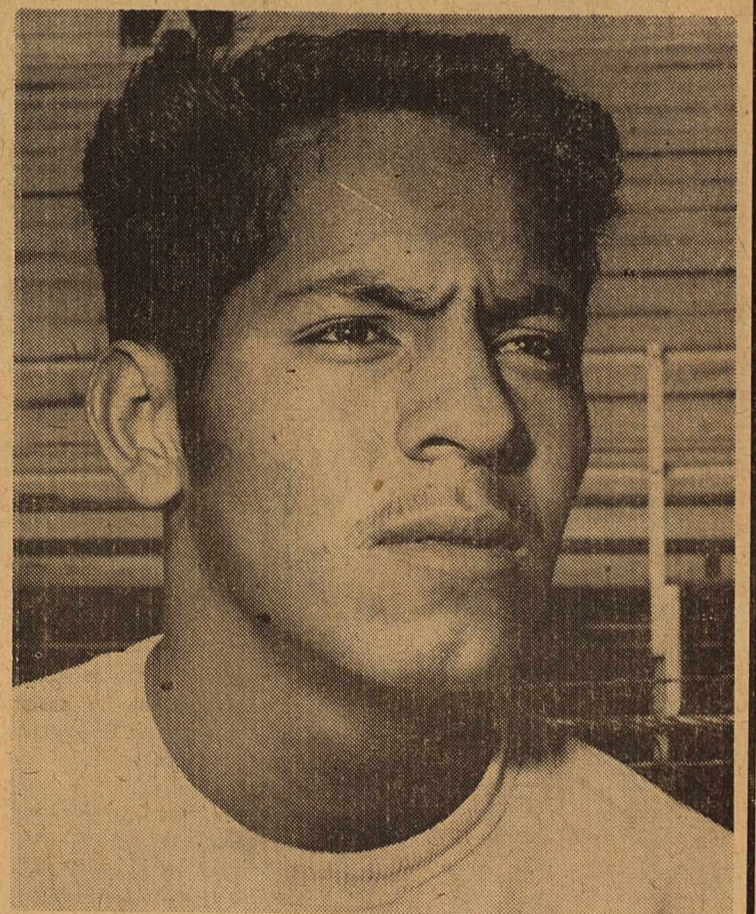

## PTA EXECUTIVE BOARD FILLS OFFICE VACANCIES

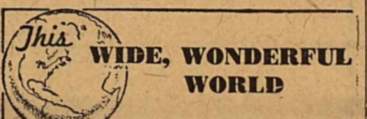

**SUCCESSFUL** campers have little right to consider themselves outdoor pioneers. Ingenious manufacturers have in recent years provided such things as complete camp cooking utensils, all nesting into one another and carried in a canvas bag; patent collapsible table-and-seat combinations; grids, broiling



devices, patent camp stoves; picnic baskets with ice compartments; two-gallon size vacuum jars; portable electric compartment cookers; special tents for automobiles; fuel tablets to insure quick fires on damp days; portable small Dutch ovens in which to bake, or folding ovens. Shades of the Conestoga wagon pioneers!

Today's playgrounds for the small fry, complete with such entertaining devices as carousels and swings, hark back to a sandpile in the yard of a Boston chapel in 1885. It was the first supervised playground in the United States. From that year until 1906, when the Playground Association of America was founded, not more than 10 cities in this country are known to have established playgrounds. In 1898 the Chicago City Council appropriated the sum of \$1,000 for "temporary small parks." This was one of the earliest examples of what has become an accepted responsibility of government—the establishment, maintenance and operation of playgrounds.

**Fatalities High In State's 1956 Traffic**

Multiple-fatality traffic accidents in Texas during the first eight months of this year are responsible for raising the State's traffic toll over the similar period for 1955 and if the current trend continues, the all-time record of 2,547 deaths which were recorded last year stands to be exceeded by the end of December.

This information was contained in a statement released this week by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, who said that while the records of the

agency's Statistical Division showed two fewer fatal accidents through August than in the first eight months of 1955 that 32 more people were killed. This is due, he pointed out, to the fact that more than one person was killed in many of these accidents.

Through August 31 of this year, 1,607 persons had died in 1,318 motor vehicle accidents in the State. In the same period last year, 1,320 mishaps claimed 1,575 lives.

The Public Safety Director pointed to this past August 18 as the deadliest day, trafficwise, in Texas so far this year. On that date, 24 persons died in 14 accidents. This was a Saturday which is consistently one of the most hazardous days for highway

travel but the traffic toll on that day approached the usual experience for a Christmas Eve which ordinarily runs the highest fatality total.

Garrison said that he could give no accounting for the extremely high number killed on August 18 but that 15 of the 24 persons were killed in just five of the total fatal accidents recorded on that date. He said that excessive speed was most frequently the contributing factor in the death of more than one occupant of a vehicle.

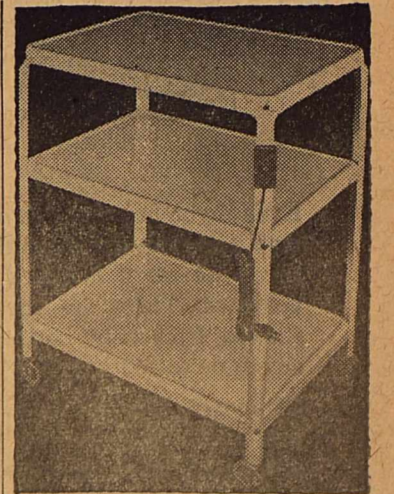

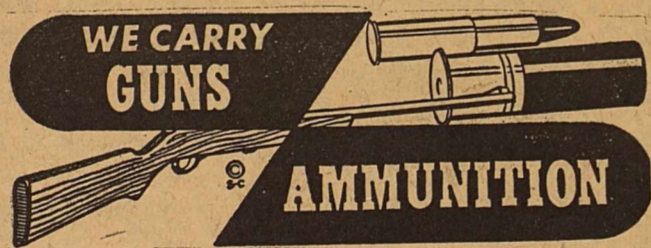

### Neill Reports County Has 51% Of Bond Quota

Texans are continuing their record purchases of Series E & H Savings Bonds, George H. Neill Sutton County Savings Bonds Chairman announced today. During the year of 1955 and the first eight months of 1956, Texans have purchased more bonds than during any like period since the war years of 1944-45.

Sales in Texas for the first eight months of 1956 were \$130,902,185. The people of Sutton County purchased \$62,073 for the same period. Our county has achieved 51.7% of its 1956 quota of \$120,000.

Chairman Neill reminded those people whose Savings Bonds have been lost, stolen or destroyed that the Bonds can be replaced by contacting their bank or the Federal Reserve Bank.

### Game Violators Receive Stiff Penalties

Fall hunting hopes of a few Texans were punctured by court-inflicted penalties for abusing wildlife, according to the latest arrest report issued by the Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission.

Fines ranging upward from \$100 were common as Justices of the Peace dealt sternly with violators some of who lost their licenses.

The Director said some sharp punishment was dealt out to deer herd raiders. A Houston man paid \$150 and costs for killing a spike buck. Fines of \$100 and costs for night hunting were levied against individuals from Chester and Cleveland.

Other cases on the report included those for hunting from an automobile, shooting from a public road, possession of wild fawn deer and killing quail out of season.

### Amendments To Constitution To Be Voted On

This is the second in a series of articles designed to acquaint voters with the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in elections on November 6 and November 13.

H.J.R. 31, if adopted, would add a new section to be designated as Section 51-c, to Article III of the Constitution of Texas.

The text of the proposed amendment is very simple and self-explanatory: "The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the law of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitation as the Legislature may deem expedient."

Many states have statutes providing for compensation of persons who have been wrongfully convicted of crime. The arguments for such provisions are appealing to the average citizen's sense of justice.

House Joint Resolution No. 31 would simply authorize such a statute in Texas; the Legislature would decide when such aid or compensation might be granted, how the amount would be determined, and who would be responsible for administration. The amendment is written broadly enough that a special law or appropriation could be adopted for an individual case.

H. J. R. 46, Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas prescribes the oath of affirmation which members of the Legislature and all officers of the State must take before they enter upon the duties of their offices. House Joint Resolution No. 46 proposes to amend this section so as to make a difference between the oath taken by elected officers and those officers who are appointed. Under the proposed amendment members of the Legislature and other elected officers of the State of Texas would take the same oath now provided in our Constitution.

### Date Set For Academy Exams

Civil Service examinations for Texas boys seeking appointment in 1957 to the Army, Navy and Air Force service schools will be held November 20 at 71 cities and towns throughout the state.

Results of these examinations are used as a guide by Senators in making appointments to the military academies.

Entrance requirements vary, but all three academies require that appointees be United States citizens. They must be between the ages of 17 and 21 years upon entry, must be single and must pass a rigid medical examination and a physical aptitude test. Candidates for the Air Force Academy must be able to pass the medical examination for flying training and a pilot aptitude test.
