Among the emergency measures which will go into effect unless the local office is otherwise notified are:

Commencing April 13, 1957, the local post office will be closed to the public on all Saturdays and

Window service will be limited to 81/2 hours per day beginning April 15. Hours will be 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The issuance of money orders will be suspended effective April

Trainer emphasized that these curtailments will become effective only if funds are not forthcoming.

Farming has always been hazardous in this area of West Texas. Dry winters usually cause small grain to fail, and few ranchmen have the time or farming tools to cultivate summer growing row crops. Cultivated fields are small, subject to erosion from outside water, and frethe wire, and his diversions funcquently lie bare and susceptible to wind erosion.


