

Oxidation Ponds May Be Solution To Waste Disposal

A California poultry-dressing plant disposes of its aste products in an oxidation pond. The wastes in the water and sunlight playing on it combine to make algae grow. Then the algae is harvested and fed to the plant's new crop of young chicks. It is the only feed they get.

Oxidation ponds are among the most recent developments in the. science of domestic waste disposal. Not to be confused with haphazard sewage lagoons, oxidation ponds conform to regular shapes and uniform depths. They work on this principale:

When partially treated domes tic sewage is discharged into shallow ponds, algae--a type of tiny vegetable growth--will flourish in the water. In the presence of sunshine, the algae releases oxygen into the water. The oxygen acts to convert organic matter in the sewage to carbon dioxide, which in turn is used by the algae in its growth processes.

Fight Cancer

If the chemistry involved in penicillin's slaughter of cancer were understood, drugs might be prepared to duplicate it. But no one knows just how penicillin acts against any kind of cell.

A Texas scientist, however, has almost worked out this problem. He has traced the lethal effect of penicillin to its action on a compound called ATP, or adenosine cle cells move and nerve cells tine structure immediately splits transmit impluses.
