Johnson's Booting Helps Northerners; Oil Bowl Game in Oklahoma Is Next

Although not on the field much, Sonora's own George Johnson distinguished himself in the Texas High School All-Star game at the Cotton Bowl, August 10.

Johnson made substantial contribution to the 28-0 win of Chuck Mosers' North Team over Bill Stages' South Team. By kicking four straight conversions, three of them in the first half. In one he was forced back to the 17-yard line due to a 15-yard penalty, but he booted the ball thirty-five yards to put it between the goal posts.

Bronco head coach Joe Turner said Johnson had difficulty adjusting to the "T" formation but was especially notable in his blocking performance.

Johnson's next football highlight will be the annual Oil Bowl benefit game at Midwestern University Stadium in Oklahoma, August 23, where the Texas All-Stars will tangle with Oklahoma's All-Stars.

He was given a wrist watch for his efforts at Dallas and will be given a jacket or a blanket at the Oil Bowl game.

He'll get a watch for his other wrist at the big Crump Bowl game in Tennessee at the end of this month.

All matmen on the five-foot card are of the highest caliber and will be out to make a good impression on West Texas fans, who seldom see them.

Masked Marvel Undefeated

It is hard to pick anyone of the stars as being outstanding over the others, but a man of particular interest to local people will be El Diablo, the Masked Marvel. A special clause in his contract stipulates that he will be unmasked only when he is defeated in a singles match, but so far he has won everyone of his Texas matches. He is 245 pounds of rough, tough hombre that Sonora fans will surely enjoy watching.

Rising Mexican Star

Another great attraction here will be Miguel Aguilar, who is a leading contender for the Junior Heavyweight crown. He is a young cousin of Rito Romero, and is following closely in the footsteps of his famous kinsman. He has just returned from Mexico where he was very successful.

Miguel started out to be a bullfighter, and conditioned himself by wrestling in the gym at the Mexico City Athletic Club. But his love for the mat game overshadowed that for the bull ring, and he now devotes all his time to wrestling and training, a fact for which the fans and promoters are grateful. He is now very much in demand in Texas.

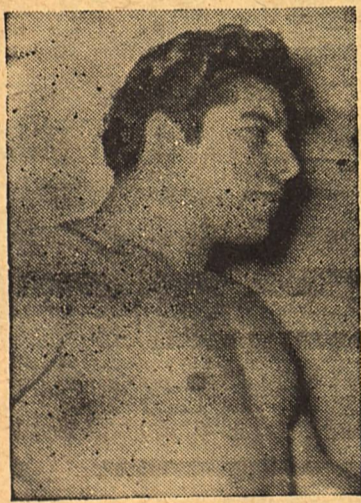
Miguel's match with Bill McCallum, a great young college man, will be the clean, scientific type of wrestling. Both men are very fast and specialize in aerial maneuvers. This match will be a crowd pleaser, a relief from the usual rough-house style which is typical of Texas wrestling.

The Shiek vs Bob Gurley

Another interesting bout will be the tussle between The Shiek, who claims to be from Arabia, and Bob Gurley of Atlantic City. The Shiek has been in this country a little over two years and during this time he has defeated

most of the nations stars. Not much is known of his personal life due to his lack of English. He prefers to wrestle clean, but he says Texas wrestling is too rough for this.

Gurley has long been associated with physical culture. He was a three-letter man in college and was later a physical instructor in the Navy. He began his professional career at the end of the war and has gone to the top.

Now he holds the Southern and Eastern States championships, but he dropped a close one to World's Champion Lou Thesz in Wichita, Kansas last year after a grueling 90 minute match. The fans may not approve of his buzz-saw style of attack, but they will admit that he really carries the fight.

Card of Variety

There will be matches on the card to suit anyone. First the Shiek will take on Bob Gurley; then Cowboy Cody, the former Rodeo rider, will wrestle and try to unmask El Diablo. In the third event will be the clean Aguilar vs Bill Callum match. In the semi-final all wrestlers will enter the ring for the great battle royal. There will be two men eliminated in this hassle, and in the main event, which will be two out of three falls with no time limit, the remaining four will divide into teams for a tag team match.

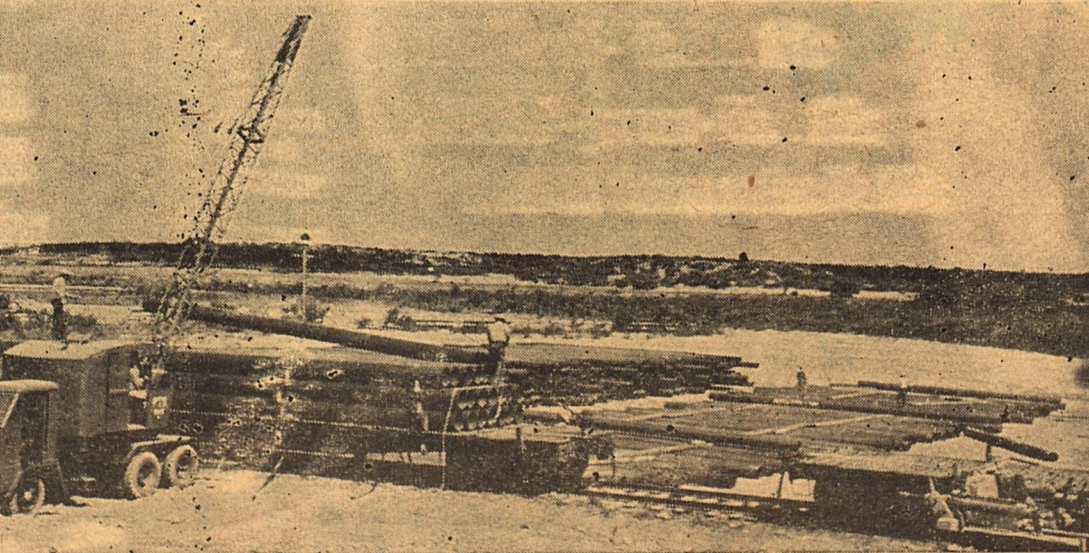
Youths To Conduct Religious Survey

Gas Gathering Companies Unload 40 Miles Of Pipe Here This Week

Twelve Miles Of Pipe Unloaded For Pioneer Gathering

Pipeline for the R. H. Fulton Company of Lubbock to lay began arriving in full volume last week and was unloaded at the Pioneer Gathering Company's new storage yard in West Sonora. About twelve miles of 16 inch pipe has already been unloaded, and this is just the beginning. There will also be many miles of 8, 12, and 10 inch pipe, but as yet the contract on the 10 inch pipe has not been let. The entire line will be about 70 miles long and will tie into the Permian Basin Line.

Several families who will work on pipeline laying will arrive in Sonora soon.

Clay Adams Rites Held Wednesday

Clay Adams, 55, prominent Crockett, Pecos and Val Verde County ranchman, and member of a pioneer West Texas ranch family, died suddenly of a heart attack in the Crockett County Hospital Wednesday, August 7. Funeral services were held at the Ozona Methodist Church Thursday and burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery. Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Jane and Camille Adams, all of Ozona and his mother, Mrs. W. A. Adams of Fort Stockton. Pallbearers were Jack Neill of Sonora, Sid Slauter, San Angelo; Frank Meadows, San Angelo; Dieter Holland, Silver City, N. M.; and Boyd Clayton, Rufus Ward, Albert Bailey, Sherman Taylor and Charles Black, all of Ozona.

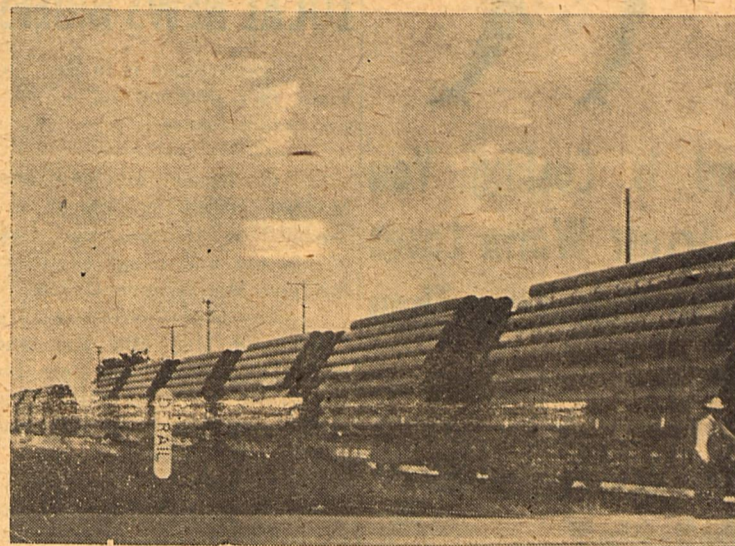
ASC Nominates Committeemen

SCS Flood Prevention Plan Work Party Arrives To Begin Study Monday

Development of a flood prevention work plan was started Monday with the arrival of a ten man SCS planning party from Brownwood.

Paul Kenner, engineer, is in charge of the party.

One of the first steps in progress is the development of a contour map of the city. This map will show points of equal elevation, and give a factual picture of the area which would be affected by floods of different intensities.

The economists are concerned with evaluating flood damages that would occur in a major flood. The project, to be eligible for Fed. assistance, must show at least one dollar reduction in flood damage for each construction-dollar spent.

All property valuation estimates are strictly confidential, and will only be used to arrive at lump sum value figure for the purpose of estimating potential flood damage. Local people contacted regarding property values need not be hesitant in estimating the present market value of the property, excluding the value of the lot.

As the plan development progresses each possible dam site will be surveyed in detail, to determine the size, cost, flood reduction, and other factors.

El Paso Kicks Off Pipeline Project

The El Paso Natural Gas Company has unloaded an estimated twenty-eight miles of 20 inch pipe in their storage yard area leased from Wesley Young and Carl Cahill. The shipping to Sonora of pipe was originally scheduled for sometime in September or October, but Dunn Bros, of Dallas, who are unloading the pipe, are staying one jump ahead of a federal tax increase on their operation by unloading now.

Included in El Paso's project are a major pipeline from seven and a half miles northwest of Sonora to five miles east of Hobbs; 53 miles of gathering line within Sutton County, and a dehydration plant and compressor station to be erected six and a half miles northwest of town.

About 185,000 cubic feet of gas per day will be gathered from the new project with 40 million cubic feet from the Sutton County field alone.

The Sutton County plant will consist of two separate installations, a dehydration plant and a compressor station.

The major portion of the output will go to California where some 150 million cubic feet will be received daily, and the remaining 35 million cubic feet will be sold to consumers in the Yuma, Arizona, area. Anticipated delivery date for California users in July 1, 1958, with Yuma commitments to be filled earlier.

The camp is sponsored by the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management. The boys were selected on basis of outstanding 4-H and FFA work and interest in or projects with range management. The week's camp is designed to give them an opportunity for additional training on range management, leadership and recreation.

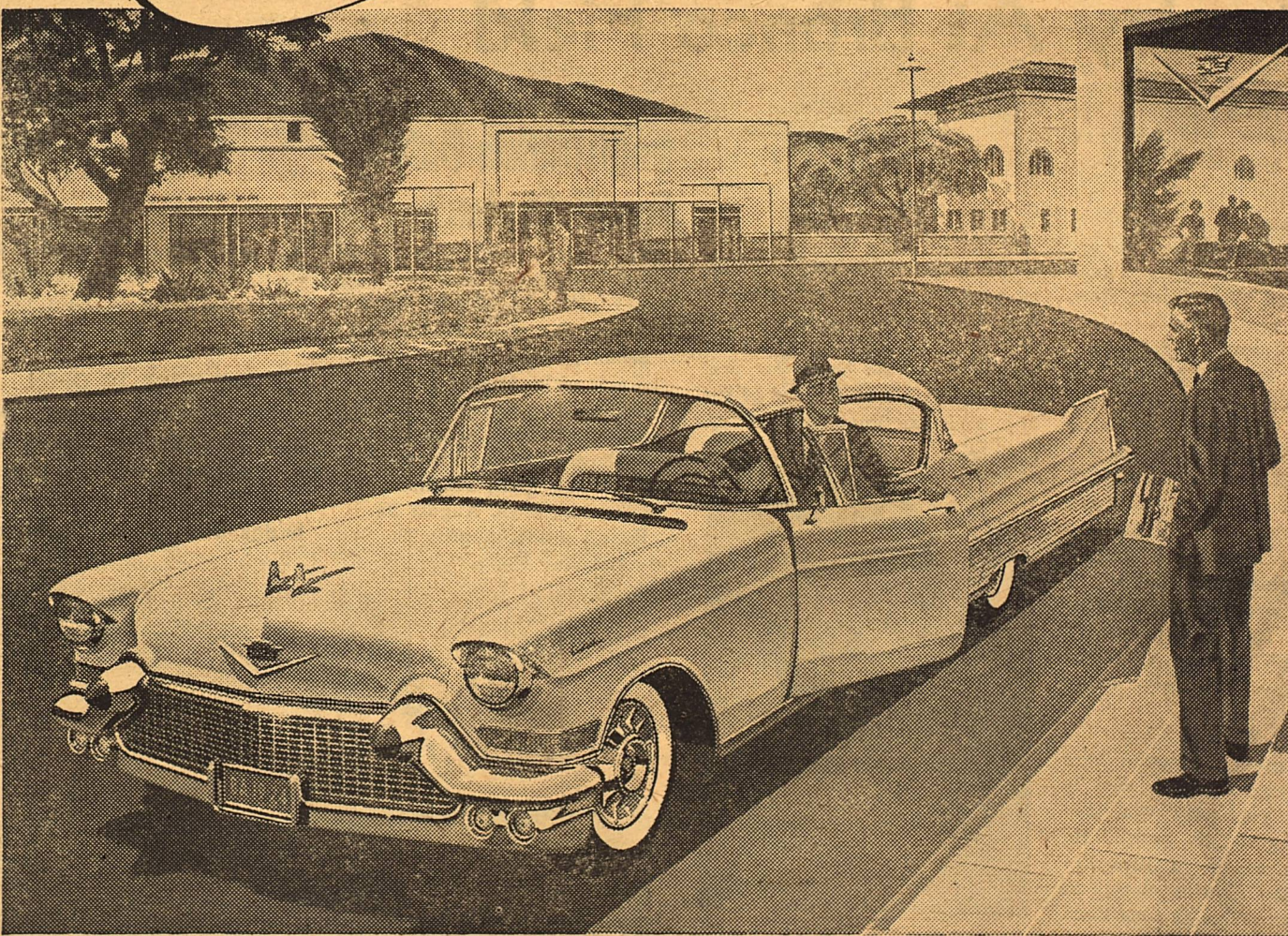

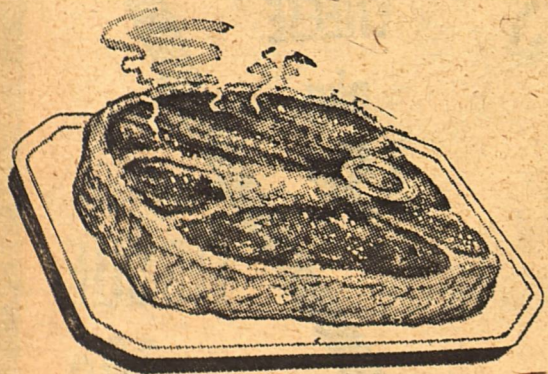

Devil's River Philosopher Armed Over Argument It's Illegal To Spend More Money Than You Make

And come to think of it, two years out of three, the Federal government itself spends more than it takes in, and who we gonna get to try it?

I'm not in favor of cheating on your income tax but if Wash-

ington figures anybody who spends more than he makes is guilty of it, all I've got to say is sidetrack the Federal road-building program, call off foreign aid and halt all the defense spending, put all the funds in one pot and start building jails.

I think there ought to be a law against spending more than you make, but take this up with your family and see how far you get.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Section 42 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement fund for officers and employees of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 42. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized by this Subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 42-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

Fisher Proposes Constitutional Amendment

WHAT CAN BE DONE to improve the Supreme Court? This question has been asked by people everywhere in recent years and a hundred suggestions have been advanced. Most of the proposals to improve the quality of the Nation's court of last resort deal with jurisdiction, limited terms, requirements for prior experience on the bench, etc.

Last week I introduced a resolution to improve the court in the future, and instead of treating the symptoms of the trouble I undertook to do something about the disease.

The disease springs from the political factors that so often enter in to modern-day appointments. It happens too often that a president, regardless of how good his intentions may be, is influenced too much by political obligations, his own preconceived philosophy, the ideology of the appointee, his religion, his sectional interests, etc.

While the human element is inherent in all such appointments and always will be, the trouble has been that the considerations aside from real judicial qualifications too often control.

MY RESOLUTION would amend the Constitution by providing that the Supreme Courts of each of the 48 States would, in case of a vacancy on the U.S. Supreme Court, select one from their respective courts, who would join with the other 47 from the other States, and that committee of 48 would, by majority vote, choose a man to fill the vacancy.

It seems to me that this plan should eliminate most of the politics from the appointments in the future. It should assure the Nation high quality type of Judges, with judicial minds and temperaments. The plan would undertake to treat the disease rather than the symptoms.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Article XVI, Section III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund for officers and employees of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Article XVI, Section III, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas to be known as the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds'. The bonds shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum, they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the amount of the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total early expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application;

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application;

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for at least one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for its useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs, levees, water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board, the repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1957 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water Development Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1957, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such moneys may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser, be general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election such ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section 49-c to be known as Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section 49-c to be known as Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by

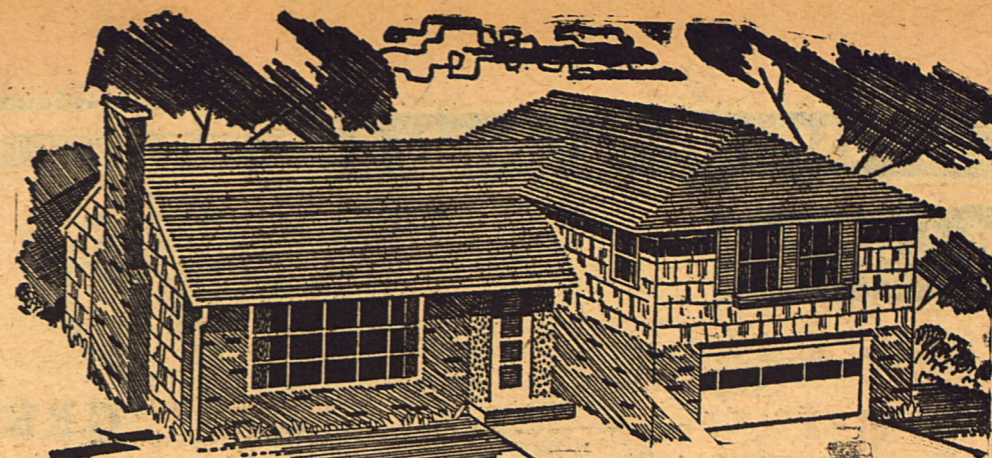

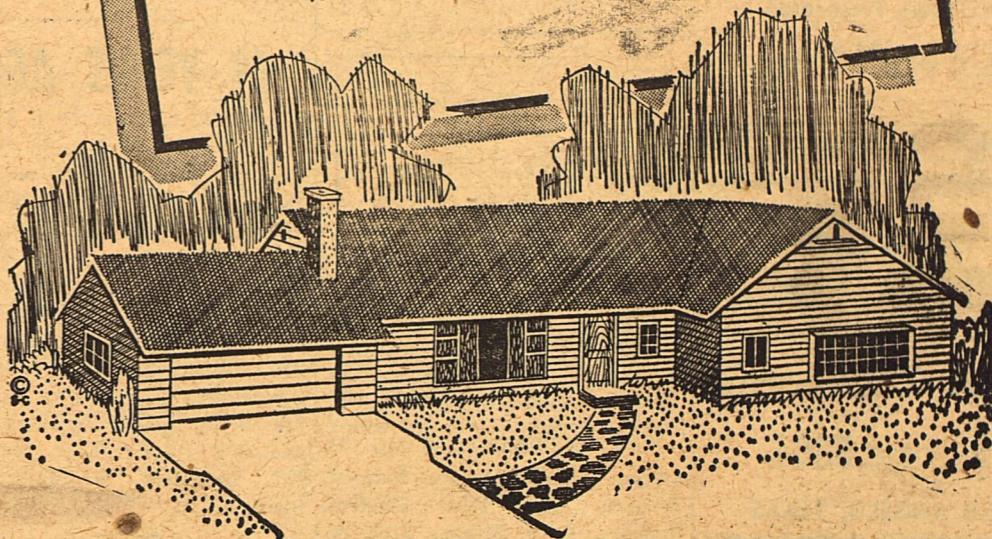
