### Gus D. Wheat, 76, Buried Saturday At Rocksprings

Graveside services were held at the Rocksprings Cemetery Sunday, August 25, for Gus D. Wheat, 76, pioneer Edwards County ranchman who died Saturday at the family ranch between Sonora and Rocksprings.

Mr. Wheat had been in the ranching business throughout his life. As a youth he worked cattle in the Frio and Nueces Canyons and Edwards Plateau country. At his death he was known as the oldest native of the county, which his father, the late Ira L. Wheat, longtime Edwards County sheriff, had helped organize.

His death was attributed to a heart attack. He had suffered a series of strokes in recent years.

### Drivers' Age Limit Raised To 16 Years- To Be Enforced With Periodic Checks

Texas Highway Patrolman Herman Moore this week reminded young drivers and their parents of the juvenile driver law which went into effect with Governor Price Daniel's signature May 20, 1957.

Under the new law, the age limit for holding a driver's license was raised to 16 years. Drivers 14 to 16 years of age are eligible to receive a driver's license only upon completing successfully a course in driver education or in cases of extreme emergency. Emergency licenses are available only upon application through the State Department of Public Safety, Austin, Texas.

Moore announced that in compliance with the new law, periodic checks will be held in Sonora and Sutton County. Drivers will be required to produce their licenses. Moore also stated that he will enforce the law against cut out mufflers which have

### September 1 Is Deadline For Gas Tax Refunds

You barely have time to make a last minute rush to the Internal Revenue office for that gasoline tax refund.

The first day of September is the deadline for Texas farmers and ranchers to apply for refunds on gasoline used for farming and ranching between July 1, 1956 and June 30, 1957. The rebate amounts to three cents per gallon on gas used in farm and ranch operations during that period.

The opportunity for a small return is also available on gasoline purchased during the first six months of 1956. The Dallas office of the Internal Revenue Services says that two cents will be repaid on each gallon used during that period.

Rapid progress is being made in developing a flood prevention work plan on Lowrey Draw watershed. A contour map of the City of Sonora has been completed, and survey work on individual dam sites has started. Field survey work is expected to be completed next week.

Thirty-nine valley cross-sections have been made from approximately one mile below Sonora to near the head of Lowrey Draw. The cross-sections show the depth, width and shape of the draw and flood plan, and will enable engineers to determine

### Miss Alley To Teach In Arabia

Miss Ethel Alley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Alley, left Wednesday for Saudi Arabia, where she will spend two years teaching school at Nariya, a settlement of 10 families near the Persian Gulf. She will be teaching six children of employees of the Arabian-American Oil Company. They will be between six and nine years of age.



This will not be Miss Alley's first journey abroad, for only a year ago she was teaching in Augsburg, Germany at a U.S. Army base. She taught last year in Pueblo, Colorado. Besides this, she has taught at several Texas towns.

Arabia will be the climax of her plane trip, which will include a two-day stay in New York City, a stop at Amsterdam, and a night at Rome.

Formerly a student at the University of Texas and Sul Ross, where she received a degree in education, Miss Alley has been teaching for six years.

### Savings Bond Sales In Sutton County At 47.8% Quota

Sales figures just released show that \$10,084 in Series E and H United States Saving Bonds were purchased in Sutton County during July. This announcement was made by George H. Neill, chairman of the Sutton County Savings Bond Committee.

"We have now achieved 47.8 percent of our 1957 goal of \$71,792. Sales for the first seven months of this year were \$34,327," Neill said.

Sales in Texas for July were \$14,178,703 which is the highest monthly sales since February of this year.

### Postal Delivery Investigator Here

E. E. English of the U. S. Post Office Department, has been investigating the advisability of establishing a postal delivery system for the City of Sonora.

English is an investigator for the department, analyzing laying out zoning plans, and making any

recommendations for house-to-house delivery. Whether he will recommend the establishment of delivery is not known yet and is pending complete compilation of questionnaires.

Work is also in progress on developing a soil-cover complex map of the area. Soil types and range conditions have a direct effect on the amount of runoff produced.

Work has started on developing a topographic map on Site 2 on the W. A. Miers ranch near the Texas-New Mexico pumping station. Engineers will use this information to develop specifications for structures. In addition to the four dams originally indicated, two additional sites on the upper reaches of Lowrey Draw will be investigated, in an effort to develop maximum control of flood water.

An economic survey of business and residential property in the Lowrey Draw flood plain is in progress, also. A flood similar to the Ozona flood can then be projected on the Lowrey Draw watershed and expected damages can be calculated.

Anyone having day by day rainfall records of storms that produced floods in Sonora in 1930, 1932, 1936 or 1938 are urged to call E. B. Keng, SCS. Such records, coupled with high water marks are needed to develop the work plan.

New elementary school students will continue to register at the Central Elementary School office from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. daily, according to Principal Rex Lowe. This is to enable students who must register to do so before the official opening of school Tuesday, September 3.

Kindergarten registrations will be accepted until the maximum number of students has been reached and enrollment in kindergarten will be on a first-come, first-serve basis, Lowe said.

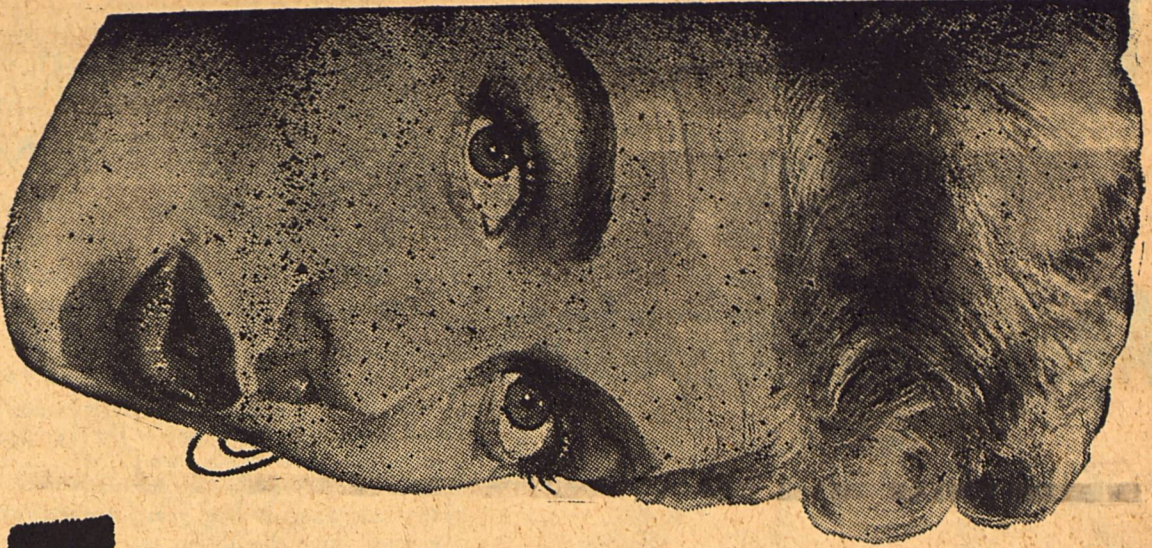

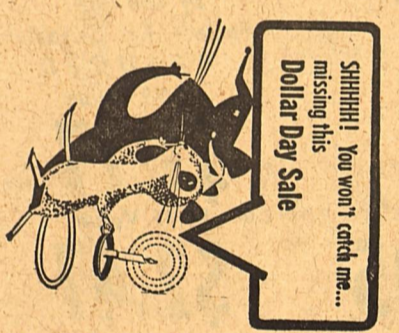

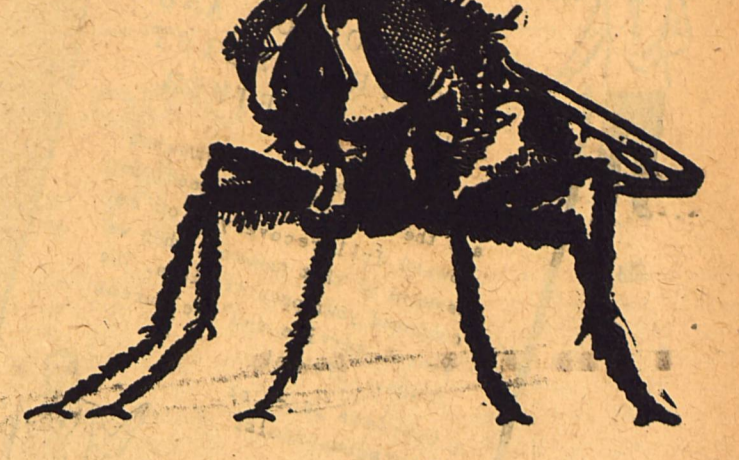

## Personal Driving Habits Make Welcome Or Unwelcome Visitors

Before you answer that question it would be a good idea to check your usual vacation driving habits pretty carefully.

J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, says that drivers are often inclined to see the mote in the other fellow's driving while ignoring the beam in their own. He says the current vacation driving program, which the Texas Safety Association is conducting, is intended to get drivers to turn a critical eye on their own highway performance and correct any bad habits they find.

The vacation driving program is part of the nation-wide Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents campaign, which this summer is advising motorists to Slow Down and Live.

"Heeding this advice will add to your popularity wherever you drive," Musick said, "because by driving at a sensible pace you show a decent respect for your own life and for the lives and rights of others."

He explained that by "sensible" pace he meant speeds that are safe for the condition of the road, the weather, the traffic, and the condition of the driver and his car—not slow-poke speeds that tie up traffic and invite accidents.

"Another way to boost your

stock," he said, "is to obey all the traffic laws, signs, and markings of the areas through which you travel."

Musick also mentioned a few things that will have the opposite effect.

"Driving when you're tired, ill or after you've been drinking will pull the welcome mat right out from under you," he said. "In any one of these conditions you're a menace to yourself and anyone you meet."

The last session of the organization, which includes 15 member cities, was held in Sonora.

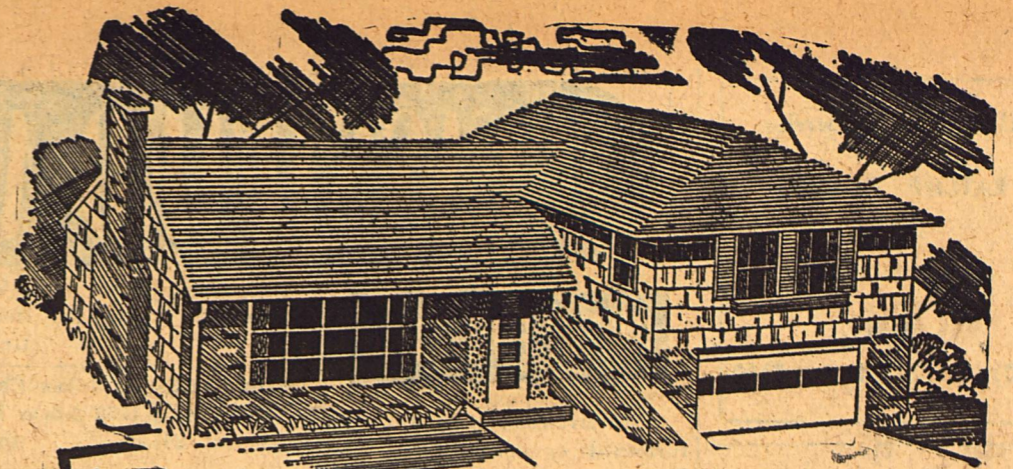
Ernest Stephen was among the six top ranking students who received degrees at A. & I. in Kingsville Friday, August 23. He received a MA degree and was exempted from all tests.

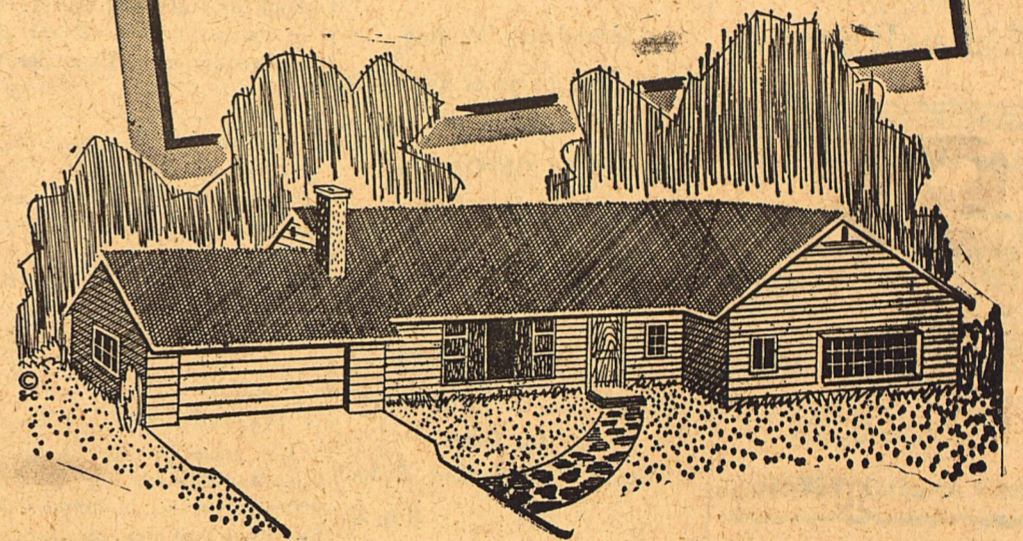
