Secondly, easements must be obtained from landowners permitting construction of dams or occasional flooding of 21 pieces E. (Bud) Smith of Sonora. of land. Six of the landowners live in Schleicher County. Most of the Sutton County landowners also own Sonora property which would be greatly benefited. All Sutton County landowners have a direct interest in schools, churches, and other institutions, as well as in the increased taxes required to rebuild after a severe

The proposed flood prevention project is essentially a landowners program. The landowner retains full title to his land and controls the permanent water impounded by the dam. He receives benefits from flood irrigation of some of his rangeland following major storms, which will greatly increase production of range feed. In many instances, fence damages from flooding will be greatly decreased. When your rig is on the bottom, fish is something like fishing for crappie. When a snapper gets on, it's up to you to crank him up as fast you you can. Occasionally if it is a small snapper a big old amberjack or ling may come by and decide it's hungry. If that happens, then you have a real fight on your hands.

Incidentally, you don't have to buy your own red snapper fishing equipment. It can be rented from any party boat operator. Also he'll show you how to use it. He wants you to make a good catch. If you do you'll tell your friends and his business stays

Party boats usually are pretty well dated up. It is a good idea to select one you want to use, early, and make a definite date. The boat usually leave the docks about 2 a.m. and returns about 6 p.m. with a load of fish and some pretty tired but happy fishermen.

These boats carry beverage boxes and most of them have lunches for sale. Some of them are equipped with ship-to-shore telephones, radio and other modern conveniences.

The trip will cost from \$10 to \$15 for your fare, plus your drinks, and a per-day rent on equipment. You'd better figure on spending about \$20 for the day, but if it's a good day you'll get more than your money's

If you are interested in such a trip, write the Chamber of Commerce in the area where you'd like to embark from. They'll be glad to send you folders and the names and addresses of the party boat operators. Satisfy yourself you are getting the best one possible. He's the cheapest in the long run.

3. The only thing you can do here is keep a firm grip, with both hands, on the steering wheel and try to hold a straight course. Use brakes cautiously and do not touch the clutch. Disengaging the clutch causes loss of traction, directional control and deceleration force of the car's motor.
