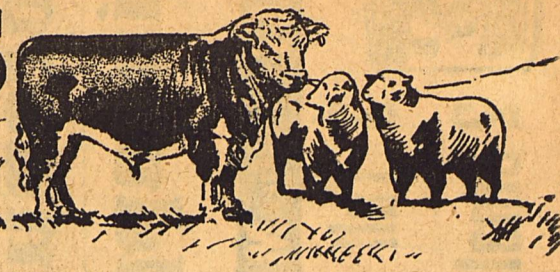

## PROCLAMATION

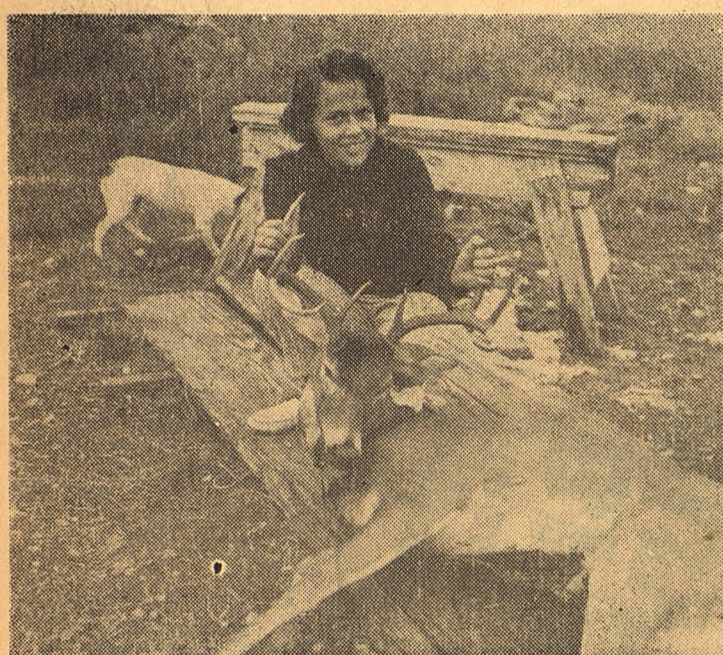
WHEREAS, the safety of our children is always uppermost in the minds of our citizens; and

## Lone Star Gas Co. Files For Application

Lone Star Gas Company has filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas an application for an upward adjustment of the Company's authorized intra-company city gate charge.

The present charge of 30 cents per thousand cubic feet for gas delivered at the city gates in Texas cities served by Lone Star for domestic and commercial usage and unaccounted-for gas would be adjusted upward to 40 cents.

Approval of the requested upward adjustment would serve to re-establish the charge that existed for a long period of years prior to the year 1952 when the charge was reduced from 40 to 30 cents.

The application states that the proposed increase is based primarily upon the drastic increase in cost of gas at the wellhead. This cost has risen approximately eight cents per thousand cubic feet since January 1, 1951. Additionally, there have been substantial increases in taxes, material costs, labor and other operating expenses.

Residential and commercial consumer rates would not be immediately affected by Railroad Commission authorization of an upward adjustment in the city gate charge. But a Company spokesman stated that the Company may be required at a later date to file applications for increases in residential and commercial rates.

of the Methodist Conference of the San Angelo District, that our proposal for a Methodist Retirement Home at Sonora was approved, as were the bids of Bronte and Eden. These approvals are on condition that the applying towns furnish at least 20 acres of land to be approved by a special board and that each contribute at least one-fourth of the construction cost.

The action of the Conference expressed the belief that a Home in each of these cities would not conflict, should all three meet all conditions. Many favorable comments were made in regard to Sonora's location for such an institution, mention being made of our Hospital, highway connections, airport and climate.

The Sonora committee presented to the McCamey Conference proof of good faith in the form of an option on the necessary land and a petition a bond issue, as one means of financing this humanitarian project. Those representing Sonora at this meeting were Rev. Doyle Morton, Edwin Sawyer, Joe B. Ross, S. M. Loeffler and Mrs. Thelma Phillips.

The land procurement committee, composed of J. M. Vander Stucken, A. E. Prugli and F. L. McKinney, assisted by C of C president, Edwin Sawyer and Lions Pres. Hillman Brown are still working on other locations that several might be shown the district board when inspections of sites are made.

## Core Drilling Near Completion On Lowrey Draw Watershed

Necessary steps are in progress to start construction of two flood prevention dams on Lowrey Draw shortly after the first of the year. An operation and maintenance agreement and a project agreement setting aside some \$144,000 have been completed. Easements are being recorded, and a certification that all local obligations have been met will be prepared soon.

Laboratory analysis and detailed engineering specifications should be completed soon, allowing bids on Sites 9 and 10 to be advertised. Bids will be awarded to the lowest bidder whose equipment and reputation is satisfactory.

Foundation investigations are continuing on Lowrey Draw watershed. Core drilling has recently been completed on Site 13, and is expected to be completed on Sites 11 and 12 within the next two weeks.

The core drilling unit determines the depth of fill material in the borrow area, and the nature of material under the dam

and in the spillway. Samples of material collected by geologists from the borrow area are sent to a laboratory for analysis. The laboratory then determines the optimum compaction necessary for safe construction, and where each type of material will be used in the dam.

Each structure will have a deep core trench under the center, which is usually filled with compacted clay to prevent seepage. The heavier gravelly clay material is placed on the back side of the structure, while the lighter material is used on the front side of the dam. Available rock from the spillway is used to blanket a portion of the dam.

# Citizens Committee To Help Solve Traffic Problems

The first step toward controlling a growing traffic safety program around the schools was taken last Wednesday night with the formation of a Citizens Committee for Safety Control.

The committee came as an outgrowth of a meeting held at the school at the request of the Sonora City Commission. Present were representatives of the Commission, Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Parent-Teachers Association, High School Student Council, school board, faculty, and Sonora Woman's Club.

Earlier this fall the PTA, acting on the recommendation of its safety committee, asked the Commission to hire a peace officer to enforce existing traffic regulations. The Commission called the meeting to discuss this and other pertinent problems.

A lengthy discussion of the hazards and problems revealed that those present believed adult drivers to be as much at fault as students. Two main hazards were recognized as the speeding of students around school premises and improper turning and stopping of parents, complicated by the one-way street east of the school plant which prevents drivers from circling the school to let children out on the right side of the street.

Solution to the physical problems is being worked out by the City and it is hoped that a parking area near the high school can be obtained leaving the streets east and south of the campus open to two-way traffic. Crosswalks will be painted with teachers pledged to instruct students in their use and speed zone signs will be erected near the school as an additional warning to drivers.

As a result of discussion and in the face of a shortage of funds to correct other physical defects,

a campaign will be started immediately by a sub-committee to educate adults and children on the seriousness of the problem. Every citizen is urged to cooperate in the hope that a solution may be found before some tragedy occurs.

The safety education committee will point out, by letter, bulletins, personal contacts, announcements from pulpits and at civic meetings, what driving errors and traffic violations are contributing to the existing hazard. Mrs. Charles F. Browne will head the committee. Working with her will be Joan Young, Milby Sexton and Stanton Bundy.

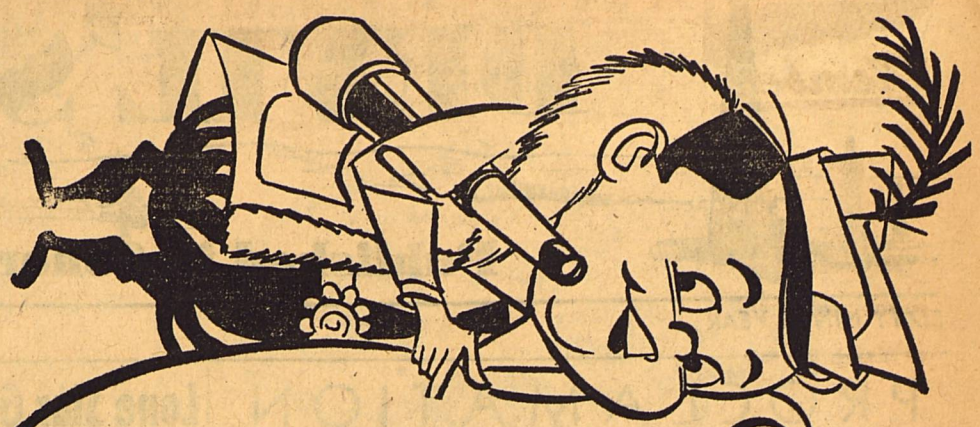

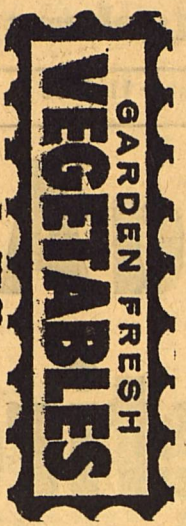

Now I don't know what sort of ranchers this expert is acquainted with, but we don't know the same group. The group I know, since I'm one of them, works in just the opposite fashion. We don't say, if you'll pay us enough, we'll produce this food for you. What we say is, here's all this food, how much can you let us have for it?

And I guess it's as good a system as any. It saves a lot of responsibility. When I start a ranching year, I don't know what I'm going to get for my work, but on the other hand the consumers don't know what I'm going to produce to eat. This way nobody's responsible for anything. It's sort of like marriage. Parents don't know how their children are going to turn out, and children don't know how their parents are going to turn out.

### Exam Dates Set For Highway Patrol Applicants

### Texas Safety Assn. Names Three Major Traffic Threats

Three major threats to traffic safety at this time of year were described today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

"One threat is reduced visibility," he declared. "It's obvious that our daylight hours this month are the shortest of all the year. Add to this the everpresent possibility of bad weather, the poor condition of some vehicles' lighting systems, and the dark clothing worn by many pedestrians, and you can see that a driver really can't afford to relax vigilance one moment."

The safety official said another threat is posed by inadequate traction.

"The fellow on foot is far more likely to slip and fall these days than in summer, and the fellow behind the wheel must be constantly alert against skidding hazards," Musick observed.

"The third threat is that presented by quick change in temperature," he added. "Icy or rain soaked highways greatly increase traffic hazards. The defensive driver takes these conditions into account and reduces his speed, lengthens distance between moving cars, starts signalling turns sooner, and makes his stops more gradual."

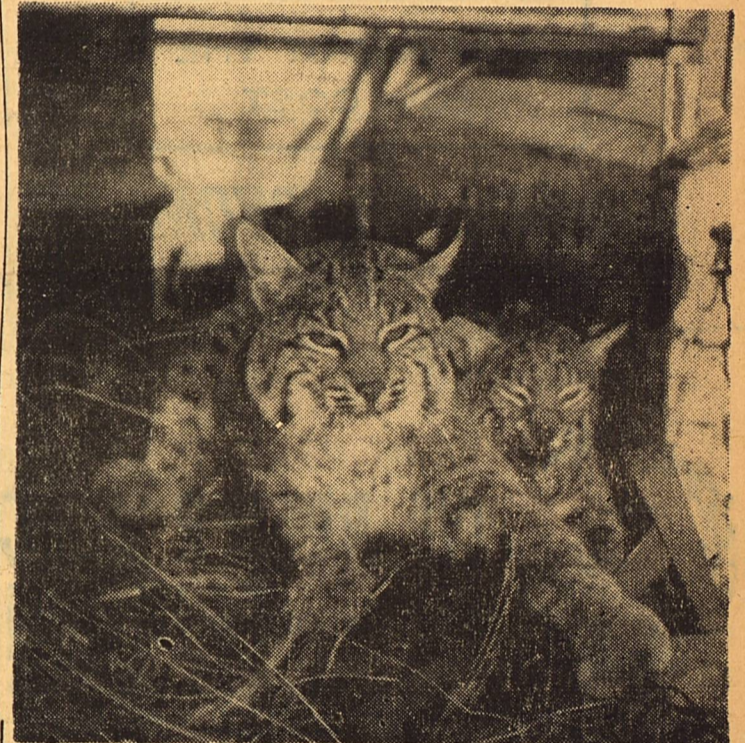

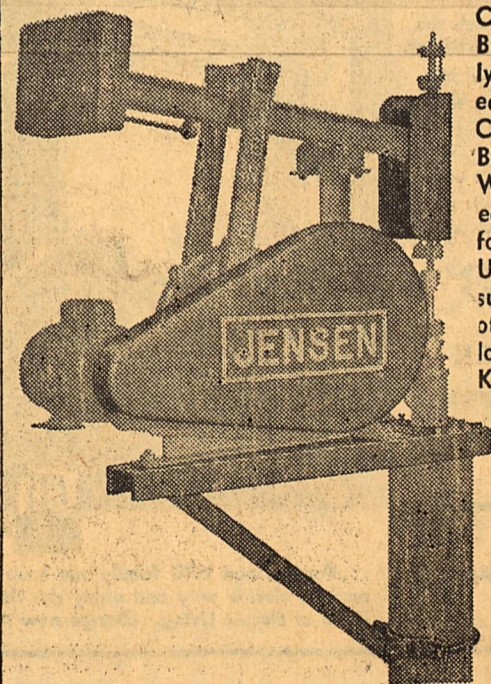

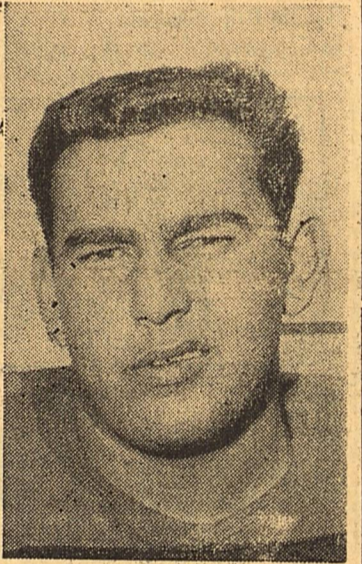
## Chalk, Castro, Smith, Sosa Named To All-District 8-A Grid Team

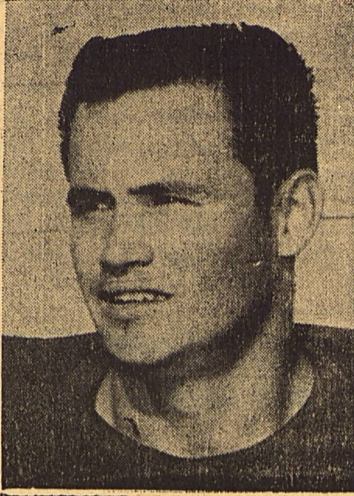

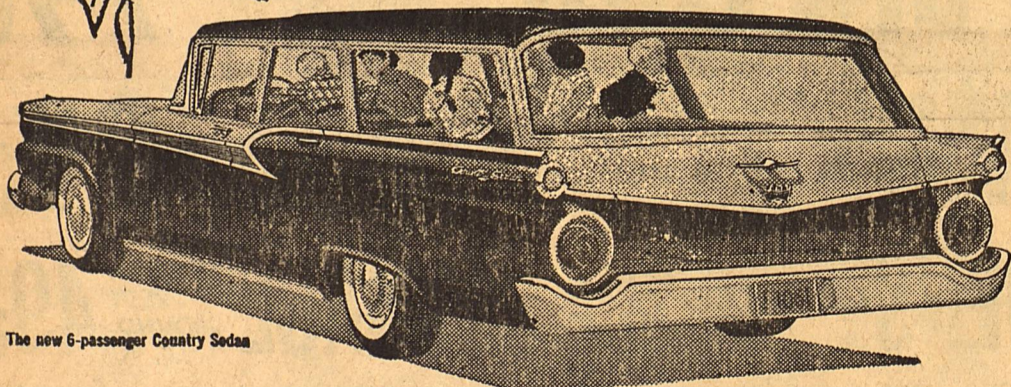
